182) Wilfred BARBER – Born 18 Apr 1901, Cleckheaton, Bradford Died 10 Sept 1968, aged 67

He was a RH Batsman and RA fast-medium bowler He also kept wicket if necessary

Test debut – v South Africa at Headingley, 13-16 July 1935 First-class debut – v Worcs, Bradford PA, 14-17 Aug (County Championship) Yorks career – 1926-1951

His best test score was made against South Africa at Old Trafford in the fourth test of that series. It turned out to be his final test innings. He took his only test wicket in his debut match at Headingley. His victim was the South African wicket keeper H B Cameron.

His highest first-class score (255) was made at Bramall Lane, Sheffield in the County Championship on 6-9 July 1935

His best first-class bowling figures (2/1) came against Worcs at Bradford Park Avenue on 15-17 Aug 1934 (County Championship)

He joined Yorkshire in 1926, having been on the Warwicks groundstaff. He played for Scarborough CC in 1929 and rejoined Yorkshire in 1932. He became a county coach upon retirement.

183) **Herbert William BARRITT** – Born 1904, Skipton, N Yorks Died 26 May 1967, Lisbon, Portugal, aged 62 or 63.

First-class debut – Playing for Western India in the Ranji Trophy, he made his debut against Maharashtra at the Poona Club Gd on 6-8 Jan 1940. He did not play any first class games for Yorkshire

Yorks career – 1926

His highest first class score (53) was made against The Rest, playing for the Europeans in the Bombay Pentangular tournament in Bombay on 20-22 Dec 1940

184) Brigadier **Raleigh Charles Joseph CHICHESTER-CONSTABLE** – Born 21 Dec 1890, Marlow, Bucks Died 26 May 1963, Burton Constable, E Yorks, aged 72.

He was a RH batsman and RA fast bowler.

First-class debut – v Essex, at the Circle, Hull on 7 & 8 July 1919. In that season, all County Championship games were of two days duration. The experiment lasted only one season. It was his only first class match for Yorkshire.

Yorks career - 1919-1938

His best first-class score (47\*) was made against the Europeans, playing for the MCC at the Rawalpindi Gd, on 3 & 4 Nov 1926. This was part of MCC's tour to India & Ceylon in 1926/27.

His best first-class bowling figures (2/42) were recorded against the Royal Navy, playing for the Army, at Lord's, on 24 & 25 June 1921.

His career-best score (65) came in the Minor Counties Championship game against Durham at Redcar CC on 13 & 14 Aug 1930

His career-best bowling figures (3/19) came in friendly encounter against Lancs at Old Trafford on 24 & 25 May 1920.

He changed his name from Raleigh Charles Joseph Chichester in 1895. He devoted his time at Yorkshire to the second eleven and took over the captaincy of the side after E F Holdsworth stood down at the end of the 1925 season. Chichester-Constable held the post until the end of the 1938 season. During his time in charge, Wilf Barber, Hedley Verity, Horace Fisher, Brian Sellars and Arthur Wood, amongst others, all graduated to first eleven and international cricket.

185) **Kenneth Richard DAVIDSON** – Born 24 Dec 1905 in Calverley, Pudsey, Leeds Died 25 Dec 1954 at Prestwick Airport, Ayrshire, Scotland, aged 49.

First-class debut – v Middx, Bradford PA, 15-18 July 1933 (County Championship) Yorks career – 1926-1938

His highest first class score was made against Kent at the Mote, Maidstone on 21 -24 July 1934 (County Championship)
His only deliveries in first-class cricket were against Yorks, playing for Scotland, at Harrogate on 24-26 Aug 1938
His career best score of 170 was made in the Minor Counties Championship against Staffs at the Hough, Stafford, on 7 & 8 June 1933.

His father, John Thomas Rawlin, had played five games in five years for Yorks before moving south to play for the MCC groundstaff and then qualify for and represent Middx for 10 years (1890-1909). In all, he played 315 first-class matches, scoring 7651 runs and taking 811 wickets. His son was not able to replicate his father's success.

188) **M SYKES** – There are no biographical details for this player. He played one match in the Minor Counties Championship game against Lincs at Brumby Hall, Scunthorpe on 10 & 11 June 1926. He scored 7 in his only innings and his bowling figures 11-1-29-0. He took one catch.

189) **J W TAYLOR** – There are no biographical details for this player. He played one match in the Minor Counties Championship game against Notts at Barnsley CC on 14 & 15 July 1926. He scored 4 in his only innings. His match bowling figures were 23.1-3-65-3 with best figures of 2/42. He did not take a catch.

190) **Hedley VERITY** – Born – 18 May 1905 in Headingley, Leeds Died – 31 July 1943 in Caserta, Italy of war wounds

First Class debut – v Sussex, Fartown, Huddersfield, 1930 Test debut – v West Indies, Kennington Oval, South London, 1931 Yorkshire career – 1926 to1941

Highest score in First Class matches – 101 v Jamaica, Sabina Park, Kingston, Jamaica in 1935/36. Best bowling in First Class matches – 10/10 v Nottinghamshire, Headingley, 1932.

This remains, after 87 years, the best analysis in first-class cricket. He also recorded 10/36 against Warwickshire at Headingley in 1931 and remains the only Yorkshire bowler to achieve the feat twice.

Yorkshire CCC must have thought all their Christmases had come at once when, in 1930, knowing that Wilfred Rhodes was retiring, they should then discover another gem in Hedley Verity.

Hedley Verity was born in Headingley and the family, Verity and his two sisters, Grace and Edith, eventually moved first to Armley and then to Rawdon, where he played some junior cricket. Indeed, the Rawdon club proudly displays above its bar a picture of their three most famous left-handers, these being Brian Close, Hedley Verity and Bryan Stott. All played junior cricket at the club. Verity's father was a lay preacher in Rawdon and chairman of the Urban District Council.

Verity had an interest in cricket from an early age. When he was old enough, he would go and watch Yorkshire at Headingley, Bradford Park Avenue and, occasionally, Scarborough. He also played school cricket at Yeadon and Guiseley secondary school. There, he was a purveyor of medium-paced swing.

Verity left school at 14 and joined his father in the family coal business. He was also achieving early success on the cricket field and this encouraged him to try to find a professional contract. He moved down the road to Horsforth Hall Park and was eventually spotted by George Herbert Hirst and Bobby Peel, who were scouting local talent for Yorkshire. This first trial in 1924 was not successful so he went back to club cricket, took wickets and scored runs, and secured a second trial, which resulted in a contract with Accrington CC in the Lancashire League in 1926. He was also playing for Yorkshire second eleven in the Minor Counties Championship, but more as a batsman than a bowler.

His time with Accrington was not successful so he moved to Middleton in the Central Lancashire League, who would release him to play for Yorkshire if necessary. He was still visiting the Yorkshire nets and, after Wilfred Rhodes had decided that 1930 would be his last first-class season, George Hirst persuaded Verity to change to bowling spin, as this style would give him a better chance of selection.

So Verity made his debut in 1930 and the die was cast and Verity, along with Wilf Barber, Bill Bowes, Percy Holmes, Maurice Leyland, George Macauley, Herbert Sutcliffe and Arthur Wood, Test players all, secured seven championships between 1931 and 1939. His last figures in the County Championship against Sussex at Hove in 1939 were 6-1-9-7. The championship was then suspended and possibly one of the greatest cricket teams of all time faded into the darkness that was about to swallow Europe.

Verity had made his test debut against New Zealand in 1931 at Kennington Oval. He was to play all his 40 tests before the war, including a first visit to Australia for the Bodyline tour in 1932/33. In 1933, he played against West Indies at home and then toured India and Ceylon, as it was then known, in the Winter of 1933/34. It was Australia again in 1934 and South Africa in 1935. India were the visitors in 1936. A further tour to Australia and New Zealand in 1936/37 and South Africa in 1938/39 had been interspersed by Australia's visit to England in 1938. So Verity played against every other test-paying nation in nine hectic years. It is interesting to speculate what his final figures would have been had he not died while serving with the Green Howards in Caserta in Italy in 1943.

On a personal level, Verity had married Kathleen Alice Metcalfe in 1929 and they had two boys, one named Wilfred after Wilfred Rhodes and then other George Douglas, after George Hirst and Douglas Jardine.

In the war, Verity had been commissioned into the Green Howards in 1940 as a second lieutenant and was eventually promoted to the rank of captain. He served in North Yorkshire, Northern Ireland, India, Persia, Egypt and Syria. His final overseas placement saw him end up in Sicily. It was there that he was shot and died of his wounds He is buried at Caserta in Sicily in the military cemetery.
