## BEDS. C.C. v. M.C.C. AND GROUND.

It was originally arranged for the annual match between an eleven of the County Cricket Club and the Marylebone C.C. and Ground to be played on the County School Ground, Bedford, but this was considered somewhat inconvenient and the club officials thought it prudent to obtain the use of the Modern School Ground, on the Goldington-road, which certainly is more easily accessible from the town, but a doubt naturally arises as to its being better adapted for a county match. The ground is somewhat sloping and very lumpy about the wicket, a defect which Marshall, the school prof., did his best to overcome but he was foiled in his efforts by the heavy rainfall on Wednesday night and Thursday morning. The ground was saturated and the wicket in a wretched condition when the M.C.C. put in an appearance about half-past eleven, on Thursday morning, and the weather had a threatening aspect. Shortly afterwards, however, the sky cleared, and it continued fine for the remainder of the day, the welcome sunshine improving the ground, encouraging the players, and inducing the attendance of a large body of townspeople. Marylebone were two men short and played C. H. Polhill-Turner (Eton eleven), and F. W. Hill, a local cricketer, as substitutes, the former doing good service in the first innings of the visitors. The state of the ground prevented large scoring and was greatly in favour of the bowlers. As will be seen from the appended score Marylebone only succeeded in obtaining 59 the first innings, the home team making 75, thus being 16 runs to the good. Marylebone followed on and Hearn and Clayton seemed well set when stumps were drawn at a quarter to seven o'clock. The fielding of both teams was excellent.

Play commenced shortly before one o'clock. The Marylebone captain having won the toss, sent in Wild and W. Hearn, who were opposed by C. B. L. Tylecote and Brown. The first ball from Tylecote, Hearn sent to leg for two, while he obtained a single off the second, but Brown succeeded in displacing his stumps with the fourth ball in his first over when only three runs had been scored, thus dismissing a batsman from whom much was expected. He was succeeded by Lambert, who quickly got Tylecote away for a single after one had been contributed by Wild. A maiden over was then accredited each bowler, and Lambert, with a well played ball to square leg, added two to the score. Wild directly afterwards made a single, and the next ball from Tylecote shot clean into Lambert's wickets. Two for 10. Miller followed on and soon after his arrival Wild put on a triplet of singles, the score being then augmented by a one from a somewhat fluky hit by Miller. Wild added another to his long list of singles, but directly afterwards made two good drives for three each of Brown, and a two off Tylecote. After another strong hit for two he was splendidly caught by Stileman Gibbard, off Tylecote at mid-off. Three for 25, of which number Wild had contributed a useful 18. Clayton, Wild's successor was cleverly caught and bowled by Tylecote with the second ball in the first over, nobody being more surprised than the striker, who failed to get the ball fairly on to his bat. Four for 25. Smith, the next man in, augmented the score by a single and a two, the latter the result of a hard drive towards the Pavilion. Both batsmen now played very cautiously as the bowlers were dead on, and it was sometime before the score was increased by Miller, who added a single and a three, but Smith almost immediately afterwards was clean bowled by Brown. Five for 32. Nixon, who followed, just had time to contribute a single when play ceased for luncheon at two o'clock. The bowling up to this time had been very effective as will be seen from the following analysis:—

On the resumption of play a little before three o'clock a bye was scored from Tylecote's first ball, and off the second Miller made a single. A leg-bye having been added, Nixon drove Brown for one, a like number being made by Miller, before Nixon was caught by Green off Brown. Six for 38. Blundell was the next to take the defensive, and he soon made a couple of singles, one also being contributed by Miller. Blundell snatched a single, but directly afterwards succumbed to one of Brown's well-delivered balls. Seven for 42. F. W. Hill, the new comer, was quickly disposed of, his wickets being scattered with the next ball from Brown without an alteration in the score. C. H. Polhill-Turner (Howbury Hall) then went in and sent Brown's first ball to the Workhouse boundary for three. Miller, after a few balls had been bowled, was caught by E. F. S. Tylecote off Brown. Nine for 45, Miller having made nine by very careful play. Randon, the next man in, got Brown well up for two. Turner followed with three singles, a like number being added by Randon and a two by Turner, directly succeeded by a single and a three from the same batsman, who hit very freely. Unfortunately he "skied" one of Tylecote's and was caught by Captain Vernon, the innings closing for 59, Randon carrying out his bat.

The Beds. representatives first sent to the wickets were E. F. S. Tylecote and Goodyear, the bowling being entrusted to Randon and Nixon. In the first over, Tylecote made one single. Two maidens were then bowled, and in the third Goodyear made a two, but directly afterwards was given out leg before. Stileman-Gibbard followed on. His companion made a splendid drive for three, also adding a single, a like number being contributed by Gibbard. Tylecote then made a two and afterwards two singles off Randon and one off Nixon. Gibbard in the next over made a single, but on facing Randon in the next was clean bowled. Two for 15. Snow then came in and made a single off Randon's third ball. The score was subsequently increased by a

single from Tylecote, the same batsman adding a two by a splendid drive to long-field and a hard-earned single to leg. After about half an hour's play 20 telegraphed. Tylecote soon ran up his score by drives for two, a single, and a two. He then "skied" a ball, but owing to the brilliant sun was missed by long-on, only to be caught out immediately afterwards by Polhill-Turner at long-leg. W. F. Higgins was the next in, receiving one over from Randon without scoring. Snow in the succeeding over scored two off Nixon, following this up with a single. One run only was obtained by Higgins for a hard hit, Snow making three singles. Clayton now went on bowling in place of Nixon, and Randon took the opposite end. The change was very effective, Snow's stumps being disturbed with Clayton's second ball. C. B. L. Tylecote, the next comer, quickly made a single, a bye also recorded, after which Tylecote supplemented his score with two cleverly obtained singles. Higgins added a two and a single to the total, when he was badly missed by short leg. From the next ball he secured a single, and Tylecote followed his example. The second ball in the next over from Randon Higgins played straight on to the wickets and had to retire. Five for 42. Tylecote, who was joined by Hill, made a couple of singles off Randon, Hill obtaining one off the same bowler, but in the next over he was given out l.b.w. Six for 45. J. Seabrook completed Clayton's over without altering the number, but his partner succeeded in scoring two singles and a brace of twos, causing 50 to be telegraphed. A leg-bye was the next contribution and shortly afterwards Seabrook luckily escaped being caught out, long-slip failing to hold the ball. Tylecote added a two and Seabrook then cut Randon for a single, driving his next ball for a like number. Tylecote sent Clayton for a single, Seabrook following with one. Then the hit of the day was made by Tylecote, who landed a ball from Clayton in the adjoining field nearest the workhouse, scoring four and obtaining well-merited applause from the spectators. He then made a single, a two, and a single in quick succession, the two being off Lambert's first ball, he having been put on in place of Randon. Shortly afterwards he had to retire being caught at mid-off by Hearn, whose fielding was very commendable. Seven for 68, Tylecote having by cautious play contributed 24. Brown joined Seabrook and several singles were made by the batsmen off each bowler, two being also added for a bye. Brown's innings, however, was of short duration, he being clean bowled by Clayton. Captain Green then went in but his stay was brief, Clayton taking his wicket before a single was added. Nine for 73. Captain Vernon was the last man in. An addition of two to the score was made by Seabrook, and Vernon was missed by point, low down, but was immediately afterwards caught by Wild off Clayton, the innings closing at twenty minutes to six o'clock for 75.

At six o'clock the M.C.C. commenced their second innings. Roger Miller and W. Hearn being sent to the wickets, Tylecote and Brown bowling as before. Tylecote's first over was a maiden. In Brown's first over Miller got him to leg for a single, but in the next over he was caught at mid-off by Gibbard off Tylecote. Wild, who succeeded him, drove Tylecote for two and

by a straight hit added a single to his credit. Hearn contributed a single, Wild two, and Hearn two, when Wild was run out. Two for 8. Hearn, having been joined by Lambert, made several singles and a two, Lambert also increasing the score by singles. A bye was recorded and Hearn made another two. At this time there was every prospect of a stand, each batsman playing very carefully and hitting hard whenever a favourable opportunity presented itself. Several singles were contributed by each player and a change in the bowling was deemed advisable, Goodyear going on in place of Tylecote. His first ball Hearn got well out for a single, but on the next try Lambert was run out owing to the admirable fielding. Three for 21. Polhill-Turner was the new-comer and after several singles—two leg byes—and three had been added by Hearn, Turner was clean bowled by Brown without having scored. Clayton followed in and drove Brown for three, Hearn afterwards sending Goodyear for two. Both batsmen now hit with great freedom, the score being rapidly increased and the wickets were kept up until time was called, play ceasing for the day at a quarter to seven o'clock, Hearn being not out 21 and Clayton not out 7.

### FELDAY.

Eleven was the time fixed upon for the commencement of play this morning, but it was nearly half-past before Clayton and Hearn went to the wickets, Tylecote and Brown resuming the bowling. The ground again was in a very bad condition, a mist having prevailed from an early hour, and the wicket played dead. Clayton, after adding four, was caught by J. Hill, off Tylecote; two or three overs were then bowled when Hearn had his wickets displaced by Brown without improving his previous night's score. Nixon, his successor, had similar luck, being caught at the wicket by E. F. S. Tylecote off Brown. Randon having made a two was splendidly caught out by J. Hill off C. B. L. Tylecote, eight wickets of the M.C.C. having fallen for 54. Matters had now taken a most unexpected turn, and there seemed scarcely a doubt that the home team would win the match, especially as Smith directly afterwards was caught out by C. B. L. Tylecote off Brown with only five to his name. Blundell and F. W. Hill were the last men in, the first-named making a two when he was caught by Snow off Tylecote, the innings closing at a quarter past twelve o'clock for 62, three more than they obtained in their first innings, leaving the home team 47 to get to win—not a very easy task with the excellent bowling of their professional oppo-

nents and the exceedingly bad wicket, large scoring being altogether out of the question. We subjoin the bowling analysis:—

After a short interval Beds. commenced their second innings with great confidence, E. F. S. Tylecote and Goodyear going to the wickets. Clayton and Randon went on with the bowling for the M.C.C. The first wickets to fall were those of Tylecote, who had contributed a well-played eleven. Soon afterwards Goodyear was caught and bowled by Clayton, his five having been put on with very patient and judicious play. Stileman-Gibbard and Snow now took the defensive and kept together for sometime, Snow being the first to succumb to a shooter from Clayton. Stileman-Gibbard having been badly missed by point, Higgins was caught out by Wild the wicket-keeper, off Nixon. Gibbard played very well indeed for sometime, making several very hard hits, but he was caught at last by Randon off Clayton. C. B. L. Tylecote was left in being joined by Hill, who soon after his arrival made the winning hit, Bedfordshire being victorious. The match terminated at 1.20.

**MANUFACTURERS' PICNIC.**—A very successful picnic organised by the manufacturers of the town, took place last Tuesday, at Chiltern Hall Farm, which Mr. Cumberland had liberally placed at their disposal.
