



#### DEATH OF MR. F. J. CUMMINS

#### Long service to **Bedford School**

Mr. F. J. Cummins, who was for 34 years a member of Bed-ford School staff, died sud-denly at his home in Kettle-baston, Suffolk, on November 24. He had retired from the School only in July of this

24. He had retired from the School only in July of this year.

Mr. Cummins went up to St. John's College, Cambridge, as an exhibitioner, in October, 1914, but came down after one term's residence in order to join the Forces. He served throughout the 1914-18 war in the Dorsetshire Regiment and attained the rank of Captain. Returning to Cambridge in 1918, he graduated in 1920. He came to Bedford School in 1926 as resident house tutor in Pemberley, and his teaching was chiefly concerned with Middle School mathematics. He was then an established athlete, having played cricket and golf for Dorset and hockey for Lincolnshire, and was also no mean performer on the Rugby field. For many years he coached both cricket and Rugby colts sides.

It was in 1945, after a serious illness which had forced him to abandon active participation, that he became master in charge of cricket, an office he held for 15 years. During this period the secretaryship of the Senior Games Committee fell vacant and this he accepted. Latterly he remained on the committee as vice-chairman where his knowledge of what had happened over the years was invaluable.

In 1940 he was appointed master in charge of the Howard Bulldings and this became an organised school house with himself as house master.

In his younger days, Mr. Cummins had taken a considerable interest in amateur dramatics and he was instrumental in founding the School Dramatic Society in 1928, and for a number of years afterwards, when masters as well as boys took part in School productions, acted in the plays. For five years from 1935 he ran the Scout Troop with keenness and success.

In a tribute written shortly after his retirement, the "Ousel" stated, "He stands no nonsense but he is a warm, kindly man. One to whom a boy in trouble could turn, assured of help and a fair hearing, one from whom young masters could ask advice without fear of patronage and one from whom the four headmasters under whom he served could seek wise counsel."

The funeral took place at Kettlebaston on Monday.

Former colleagues and pupils paid tribute at a memorial service in the School Chapel on Tuesday conducted by the School Chaplain (the Rev. A. D. Drake-Brockman). Sir Douglas Gordon, president of the Old Bedfordians' Club and Chairman of the Harpur Trust, accompanied Mrs. W. M. Brown, wife of the headmaster, to the service. Organisations represented included the Old Bedfordians' Club and Bedford School Mothers' Guild.
