NORTHUMBERLAND v. NORTH AND EAST RIDINGS OF YORKSHIRE.

Fine weather favoured the second day's play between these teams. It will be remembered that at the conclusion of Thursday's play the visitors were a century ahead of the local team, the scores being:—North Ridings, 209; Northumberland, 100. Northumberland resumed, Walton and Cradock bowling to Bookless and Simpson. Simpson was caught at 48 by W. Frank, Bookless going down after adding a single. Shotton and Robson were in evidence for 39 between them, and the innings closed for 169. The Ridings sent in Baker and Marsden, and the pro. put on 8 before being caught by Bookless, and Marsden had 11 to his credit, when he was bowled by the Middlesbrough "pro." R. W. Frank held his place for 83 before being caught by Hansell off Robson long field on. The innings closed for 178, and Northumberland wanted 210 to win the match. Ashmead and Anderson opened operations for Northumberland, but the latter was bowled by Walton, and after a patient innings Bookless was clean bowled by Baker for 21. **CRICKET.**

**CLEVELAND v. NORTHUMBERLAND.**

An enjoyable day's cricket was witnessed yesterday on the Linthorpe road Ground, Middlesbrough. Those interested in county games will remember that the elevens of Northumberland and Cleveland should have met some weeks ago, but the Yorkshire organisation failed to raise an eleven, and the match was delayed until the first two days of the present week. Neither Cleveland nor Northumberland had their full strength. Wardle, the Cleveland professional, is ill, and neither of the Messrs Crossby could play, while Mr Farmer was unable to take the journey to play for Northumberland, and his place was filled by Mr T. Makepeace, of Darlington, who, although a resident in Durham county, is a Northumbrian by birth, and is thus duly qualified. Mr S. J. Crawford unfortunately sprained his ankle on Saturday, but, failing to get a substitute he gallantly took his place at the wickets, with another player to run for him, and how well he batted under difficulties will be found related in the details. For Wardle, Cleveland found a capital substitute in Blenkhorn, the Northallerton professional, and it should be mentioned that Northumberland are playing three colts, namely—Weir, of the West End Club, and Colvin, of Hylth, for their bowling, and G. Irwin, of the Trinity Club, for his batting. The morning was rather dull, and a cold wind blew, but the afternoon was bright and sunny, and brought a very fair number of spectators to the scene of action. Northumberland had the good fortune to win the toss, and the captain, J. F. Ogilvie, opened the defence, in company with J. W. Dawson, who had done so well against Yorkshire a fortnight ago. The wicket was a fast one, and Ogilvie at once began to hit the bowling, which was spared by T. Harrison (pavilion end) and Blenkhorn. Amongst other hits the Northumberland captain got a 4 to the leg boundary, which was hit very cleanly, but with only 11 runs scored Dawson was caught at the wicket off Blenkhorn. Hansell partnered Ogilvie, and after the latter had hit Blenkhorn to leg for 4 and cut him for 3 the two parted company, Hansell playing on, and the second wicket falling at 19. Bookless came in and, together with Ogilvie, began to wipe out the ill effects of a bad commencement. The professional opened somewhat luckily, for he should have been run out soon after his first appearance at the wickets, and he had scored very few when he gave a chance to the wicket keeper. The score was raised rapidly, however, Ogilvie playing by far the best cricket, and the 50 being displayed after three-quarters of an hour's play, the bowlers by this time having changed ends. With nothing further added, Stamper relieved Harrison, but failed to separate the batsmen, who were not parted until 64 had been recorded, when Ogilvie was very badly run out, having shown excellent defence and good hitting power, for 36. When Hutchinson joined Bookless, the two played until the luncheon interval, which was taken with the total at 90, Bookless being not out 33, and Hutchinson not out 4.

On the resumption the bowling remained unchanged, and the 100 was reached at five minutes past three, or after an hour and twenty minutes, batting, but at this total the professional was clean bowled for a rather lucky 35. Hutchinson, on Makepeace coming to his assistance, gave a difficult chance in the long field and then made a fine drive for 4, bringing on Harrison again for Stamper at 105. Makepeace played away the second ball of the change to leg for 4, but the partnership was not destined to be of lengthy duration, for Hutchinson was stumped at 112, and Makepeace was clean bowled at the same total. Crawford—who, as already stated, had a man to run for him—together with Thompson, put an entirely different complexion on the game. Thompson opened a little unsteadily, but soon settled down to his work, and hit as hard and clean as one would wish to see a player hit, whilst Crawford batted with his wonted force and freedom. Several bowling changes were resorted to, but they were all unavailing until at 155 Worsley went on at the foot-ball end, and his first ball proved fatal to Crawford, who was caught out at long-on for a fine 21, which included a 6—a splendid drive out of the ground—and three 4s. The partnership between Crawford and Thompson had realised no less than 65 runs, and the former was loudly cheered on leaving the field. Thompson continued to punish the bowling, whilst

Irwin played exceedingly careful cricket, and the total was raised to 205 before Thompson was caught at mid-off for a capital 52, in which there were eight 4s. Thompson was, like Crawford, warmly cheered, and after his departure some slow play was witnessed. Colvin played a ball on to his wicket, Blenkhorn clean bowled Irwin with a shooter, and the innings closed at 4:30 for the excellent total of 228, Blenkhorn having secured no less than six of the wickets, although Worsley was responsible for the dismissal of the two most dangerous batsmen. Cleveland had an hour and a half's batting, which they opened with Branton and Blenkhorn to the bowling of Bookless and Weir. Both batsmen played well, Blenkhorn hitting with the most freedom, and two stumps were tried, Colvin taking the place of Weir and Ogilvie relieving Bookless. Both the colts named bowl tolerably fast, with a round-arm delivery, Colvin keeping the better length, but failing like the other to get the first wicket, which was obtained by a catch at long slip off the Northumberland captain, Blenkhorn being the first to go for a meritorious 25, the total being 20, which had taken as many minutes to compile. Simeson went in first wicket down and played a very steady game, and when stumps were drawn at 6:30 80 runs had been made for the loss of but one wicket. Blenkhorn was missed by Colvin in the long field, when he had made only 2—a mistake which proved expensive—although the colt's bowling fully atoned for it, inasmuch as, although no wicket is as yet credited to him, but few runs have been hit off his deliveries, and he gave the batsmen a lot of trouble. The game will be resumed at noon to-day, and there should be a full day's cricket. Present score, with bowling analysis:—

**CRICKET.**

**CLEVELAND v. NORTHUMBERLAND.**

The wicket continued to play capitally on the Linthorpe Road Ground, Middlesbrough, yesterday, when the above named game was resumed and concluded, and with its aid the batsmen proved again superior to the bowlers. During the match, which ended in a pretty even draw, no less than 658 runs were scored for the loss of twenty-two wickets, and the ground played easier at the close yesterday than at the opening of play on Monday. Godfrey, of Middlesbrough, who was played as a substitute, and selected chiefly for his bowling, came off grandly with the bat, his 117, although not free from fault, being compiled very skilfully and by a great deal of patient play, the batsman fairly mastering the bowling before he began to hit it with the freedom that characterised the close of his innings. Together with Beadle he put on 72 runs for the fifth wicket, and this stand so bothered the Northumberland bowlers that it really led to the success of other men, the latter half of the Cleveland players following it up well, the full total being 311, or 83 runs on. Altogether during yesterday the visiting team were in the field for three hours and a quarter, and all interest in the game was over when they went in at the close for an hour and a half's batting. Colvin bowled remarkably well although only two wickets were his share, and this young player, who keeps very straight and maintains a splendid length, has in our opinion a future. Ogilvie, who can bowl both round arm and underhand, went on once and bowled "grubbers," getting a lot of work on the ball, and bowling with so much science that it was surprising to hear an opposition player giving utterance to loud objections. There have been many very prominent players who have bowled in the style Mr Ogilvie adopted yesterday, and in sending down these deliveries he certainly did nothing unworthy of the game. At the close, Northumberland, with eight wickets to fall in their second innings, were 36 runs to the good.

It will be remembered that the overnight state of the game was that the visitors had obtained 228 in their first innings, in response to which Cleveland had compiled 80 for the loss of but a single wicket. The overnight not outs, Brunton, with 22 to his credit, and Simeson, with 23, went to the wickets at 12-25, having to bat against the bowling of Bookless and Colvin, the latter of whom, up to the drawing of stumps on Monday, had bowled a long string of maidens, although he had failed to secure a wicket. Yesterday the young Blyth amateur made an excellent commencement, for he bowled Simeson off his pads with the first ball he sent him, and, with the score at 88, had another success, taking Brunton's off stump when the latter was attempting to cut him, and the hopes of the Northumbrians became highly favourable to the possibility of sending their opponents in again. Brunton had been in half an hour and only added two to his overnight total. When Godfrey came in to Rutherford, the play slowed down a great deal, the Northumberland fielding being close for a time. Early in his career Thompson just failed at a difficult running catch for the dismissal of Godfrey in the long field, and Ogilvie, missed a low down catch at short leg by which Rutherford's wicket was saved, while the latter just after narrowly escaped being run out. Favoured by these pieces of good fortune, the batsmen raised the score slowly, no vigorous hitting being witnessed until Godfrey played a delivery from Bookless well to leg for four. Mostly by uninteresting play the figures were raised to 108, at which total Rutherford was secured at cover point off Bookless. Beadle and Godfrey now became associated, and each playing very steady and correct cricket the Northumberland bowling was got fairly into a tangle, the two players being still together at the adjournment despite a number of changes, during which Ogilvie tried "grubbers" without success.

On the resumption, Bookless, after missing a sharp return from Godfrey, cleverly caught and bowled Beadle, and a most valuable partnership terminated with the total at 180, the batsmen having put on 72 runs while together by really capital cricket. When Worsley joined Godfrey he had a life in the slips, but he stayed long enough to see the Northumberland score passed, but at 241 he was clean bowled by the Northumberland professional. Harrison came in, and for a time made matters lively, but, after giving a chance or two, he was taken in the long field off Bookless. Meanwhile, Irwin had been tried with the ball, but, failing to come off, Ogilvie went on

again; but Godfrey, who was now batting freely, hit every ball of his opening over for 4—a very merry 16 indeed. The Northumberland captain, however, bowled Brown, who succeeded Harrison, and Hobson being clean bowled by Bookless the ninth wicket fell at 269. Stamper brought up the rear, and after punishing the Northumberland captain was out lbw, and the innings terminated at a quarter to five for 311, or 83 on. Godfrey carried out his bat for 117, a really first-class innings, in which was included a fine drive out of the ground for six.

In their second venture the visiting county obtained 119 for the loss of two wickets, of which number Bookless obtained 75 by some free hitting. NORTHUMBERLAND v. CLEVELAND ASSOCIATION.

Two remarkably good bowling performances were accomplished on the Burdon Terrace (City of Newcastle) ground yesterday. Davis, the Berwick club professional, who is a native of Nottinghamshire, taking six wickets for 48 runs on behalf of Northumberland, and Blenkhorn, the Northallerton professional, doing still better for the visitors, his figures being 22 overs and 3 balls, 10 maidens, 32 runs, 6 wickets. Both men bowled from the same crease, and were considerably served by a bumpy wicket, but nevertheless the two performances are highly praiseworthy, and reflect immense credit upon the players. Although not so treacherous at the other end as at the end where the bowlers named did such rare execution, the wicket was decidedly a bad one, recent rains and a want, we should say, of proper preparation combining to make it very difficult for the batsmen. Cleveland went in first, and by play of a slow, and for the most part careful, character, managed to reach a total of 147. On Northumberland going to the wickets, Wardell

and seconded Blenkhorn's efforts, and two batsmen being run out to increase their misfortunes, the home county failed to save the follow on by one run only, so that at the close of play they were left in the unenviable position of having to resume batting this morning.

Play commenced at half-past one o'clock, Cleveland, who had won the toss, beginning their opening venture with Wardell and Simeson, to whom were opposed Bookless and Davis. Both batsmen played the bowling very carefully, and in the half an hour that they were together up to the luncheon interval, secured no more than 20 runs. On the resumption, Simeson was the first to go, being smartly stumped off Davis, and, when Blenkhorn came in to Wardell, he kept up his end while the latter, who was batting in capital style, added other runs; but he only made two singles himself before the Berwick player clean bowled him, the second wicket falling for 42. Brunton joined Wardell, and brought about a change of bowling, which proved effectual; Colvin taking the ball from Bookless and succeeding in getting Wardell caught in the long field, the Middlesbrough professional having played very good cricket indeed on the difficult wicket for 30 runs. Schofield and Brunton were now together, and more lively cricket was witnessed, Schofield driving Davis twice for 4's, and adding 17 runs pretty quickly before the Berwick bowler wiped out the punishment by bowling him. Brunton and Kemp brought on Dawson for Colvin, and off the change Brunton was secured at mid-on, and after this Priest was the only player who could settle down to the bowling, which was several times changed, although after opening awkwardly Gunter was getting comfortable when he was run out from a ball which a fielder had missed holding at short leg. Priest was not out for a well hit 28. Kemp was caught in the slips, Harrison at the wicket, and Robinson and Potts clean bowled, the innings terminating at a quarter to five, or after two hours and a half's batting, for 147. Bookless and Dawson opened the Northumberland innings to the bowling of Blenkhorn and Wardell, and an exceedingly disastrous opening was made, Bookless being run out before a run was recorded. But "Malsah" and Dawson played the deadly bowling with extreme carefulness, and principally by some nice driving and a leg hit for 3 by "Malsah," the total was raised to 25 for the second wicket, Blenkhorn clean bowling the Tynemouth amateur. Some pretty lively scoring was witnessed when Hutchinson partnered "Malsah." The last-named played Wardell away to leg for 3, and Hutchinson drove him to the on and to the off for 4's. But, after "Malsah" had cut Blenkhorn for 3, the Northallerton man clean bowled Hutchinson, who had never appeared very comfortable with his deliveries. The third wicket fell at 39, and on Farmer following in he immediately lost "Malsah," who was caught by Blenkhorn running from slip. Ogilvie now partnered Farmer, who just afterwards was run out from a smart return by Gunter at short leg. Davis, who is a left-handed batsman but a right-handed bowler, framed well against the deliveries of the two professionals, cutting very prettily when he got the chance, but he had made no more than 7 before he was caught out at forward short-leg off Blenkhorn. Then came further disasters, for Gray was bowled with the next ball of the over that had been fatal to Davis, and on Ratcliffe coming in Ogilvie was caught at slip, the sixth, seventh, and eighth wickets falling at 52. Ratcliffe hit out pluckily, but lost Lynn, who was clean bowled, and when Colvin came in last the follow on had not been averted, nine runs being

wanted to save the innings. Four of these were secured, and then Colvin drove Blenkhorn to the off for 4—a lofty hit—but he pulled the next ball on to the top of his wicket, and left Northumberland in a minority of 80. There was no time to commence the second innings last night, so that the home side will go again to the wickets to-day. The weather yesterday was fine, but the attendance was small.
