

CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITY v. YORKSHIRE.

Played at Cambridge on May 27 and 28. Cambridge University won by six wickets.

The visiting side was not at full strength for this match, Hirst and Rhodes playing at Birmingham, and Linaker, of Huddersfield, making his debut for the county. The opening day's play, which favoured the University, was seriously curtailed by rain. When Yorkshire had made 30 without loss, Lockhart was put on and proved very successful. Half the wickets were down for 58, but an improvement was effected by Radcliffe and Burton, who added 22 in 25 minutes, and by Haigh and Newstead, who put on 38 in 20. Lockhart's slow leg-breaks accounted for five wickets in 15 overs. The University lost Wright at 27, but after his dismissal Collins remained with Nason for an hour, during which time 49 were added without further loss. On Friday Collins was caught and bowled when his stand with Nason had resulted in 58 being added for the second wicket. A collapse followed his departure, but Nason, who reached 50 in 140 minutes, found another good partner in Lockhart, with whom 42 were put on for the seventh wicket in 40 minutes. The Sussex cricketer was then dismissed in an unfortunate manner. He had hit a couple of 4's off Linaker, and is making a third overbalanced himself and broke his wicket. He batted 170 minutes for 78, hit thirteen 4's, and offered no chance. The innings closed for 179, and the county lost a couple of wickets before the arrears had been made up. Then five wickets went down for 13 in half-an-hour, and although Radcliffe made a few good hits, the innings amounted to only 88. Lockhart took eight wickets for 45 runs, making his record for the match thirteen for 117. Tufnell stumped seven and caught one in the two innings of Yorkshire, seven of his victims being off Lockhart's bowling. The University, set 48 to win, made the number for the loss of four wickets. With Jessop and Relf (A. E.) at Birmingham, neither side was fully represented. Langdon, upon opening the Gloucestershire innings with Godsell, quickly got off the mark, but his partner batted nearly 20 minutes ere making a run. The stand for the first wicket realised 25 in 35 minutes, but at lunch six men were out for 61 as the result of an hour and a-half's play. Huggins and Mills put on 19 for the eighth wicket and Parker and Dennett 14 for the last, but the total reached only 124. Sussex lost Vine in the first over and Relf at 15, but Killick (who batted an hour and a-quarter for 39) and Chaplin put on 44 together, and Leach and Cox 40, so that at the end of the day the home side, with three wickets in hand, were 39 runs on. On Friday Sussex took their total to 220, Cox and Smith both scoring well. Dennett's six wickets cost 13 runs each. With arrears amounting to 96, Gloucestershire fared so badly upon going in the second time that in three-quarters of an hour before lunch they lost half their wickets for 31. After the interval the innings closed for 48, Dipper, who batted 70 minutes and was last out, being the only player to make any resistance. Leach took six wickets for 27, and with Cox bowled unchanged. The collapse was inexcusable, for the wicket was a very fair one. Score and analysis:—

The home side were obliged to take the field for this match without Brearley and Tyldesley (J. T.), who were at Birmingham. Owing to the state of the wicket after heavy rain, it was not until 2.40 that play could commence on the opening day. Essex lost Reeves at 22 and Douglas at 27, and, with the wicket gradually growing more difficult, run-getting proved no easy matter. Perrin and McGeahy added 26 together, and Makepeace, in catching the latter, dislocated the third finger of his left hand. The best batting of the day was shown by Freeman (J.), who carried out his bat for 23. The last six wickets went down for 19 against Huddleston and Dean who bowled unchanged. Lancashire received only 4 balls at the end of the day before rain put an end to the play. The second day's cricket was marked by a fine partnership by Sharp and Hartley, who, coming together after two wickets had fallen for 40, added 167 in two hours. Hartley hit five 4's in his 87, for which he batted just under three hours, whilst Sharp hit sixteen 4's in making 110 out of 194 in 145 minutes. The latter drove well and made some fine strokes to leg, and the only fault he was guilty of was when, at 55, he offered a hard chance to point. Once the pair had been parted the end soon came, Buckenham taking the last seven wickets for 39 runs in thirteen overs and a ball. In the final hour and a-quarter of the day Essex scored 50 for the loss of Douglas and J. Freeman and, with only Perrin and McGeahy offering much resistance on Saturday, Lancashire were left winners by an innings and 75 runs. Score and analysis:—

**CHESHIRE v. YORKSHIRE SECOND ELEVEN.**

**A SHORT DAY'S PLAY.**

The revived Cheshire County Club had an unfortunate experience in renewing acquaintance with county cricket yesterday. It was at Sale, where a strong local cricket interest obtains, that they played their opening match, and as a good side representing the Yorkshire Second Eleven provided the opposition, it was expected that the event would attract a large crowd, especially as it was fourteen years since any county cricket had been played in Cheshire. Heavy rain, however, delayed the start and kept the crowd away, and recurring showers would not permit of more than two and a half hours' play. With such little progress made, there will have to be some extraordinary bowling if the match is to be played to a definite issue to-day.

Yorkshire have a team engaged which is strong in bowlers, and in at least one—Broadbent—who bore the brunt of the attack yesterday, considerable interest is centred just now. There are those who have an eye to his inclusion in the premier eleven, though it can hardly be that he quite fulfils Yorkshire's most urgent want at the present time. Broadbent is a Leeds man, who is engaged as professional for the Ucklington Club, near Glasgow, by whom his merits both as a bowler and as a batsman have been appraised in no mincing terms. As a bowler his success in club cricket, one opinion, is secured more by pitch and average than by pace. He is not a fast bowler—not so fast even as W. Brown, the Mexborough professional—so that if he gets a trial in the First Eleven it must be rather as a fast medium bowler than one of great pace.

He and the other Yorkshire bowlers were at a disadvantage yesterday in that the ball was wet all the time. All the same, Broadbent was the most difficult man to play, as Mr. F. S. Church, who was Cheshire's second highest scorer, would no doubt testify. He joined Mr. H. P. Rigby at the fall of Cheshire's third wicket, when only 34 runs were on the board. Several times Broadbent beat him, only to just miss the stumps, but ultimately both Mr. Church and Mr. Rigby got the measure of the bowling, and, scoring freely, carried the total to 118, at which figure Richardson, who was "mixing-up" his bowling a good deal, dismissed both batsmen in the same over. Playing a straight bat and giving nary a chance, Mr. Rigby had just reached his half-century, after an hour and a half's batting, while Mr. Church, who had been associated with him an hour and a quarter, had scored 47, chiefly on the leg side. When stumps were drawn for the day, the Rev. L. Hamilton and Bent were together for the sixth wicket at 135. Bent is the former Holbeck, Leeds, and East Lancashire professional, who is now engaged with Dukinfield. If he is in anything like his old form, he should prove a tower of strength to the Cheshire side, which expects, by-the-by, to fully justify its inclusion in the Minor Counties' tournament. That was when the home team's score had reached 209 for eight wickets. Only an hour's play was possible yesterday, but in that time 74 runs were added to the overnight score, the chief contributor being Mr. A. S. Turner, who, in a short but merry innings of 25 drove clean out of the field on three occasions for sixes. All three wickets yesterday fell to Broadbent, whose analysis for the match showed that he had taken four wickets at a cost of 52 runs. He maintained a consistently good length throughout, and considering how difficult it must often have been to grip the greasy ball, one is entitled to suppose that on a dry wicket he might have been much more successful. Yesterday forenoon a wire was received by Wilfred Rhodes from Mr. H. D. G. Leveson-Gower, requesting him to attend at Birmingham to-day, to be in readiness to play in the Test Match if required. As W. H. Wilkinson's damaged thumb is still painful, two vacancies had to be filled in the Yorkshire team to play to-day against Cambridge University at Fenner's.

An invitation was sent to Mr. D. C. F. Burton, who is in residence at Cambridge, to play in the match, and he has consented to do so. Mr. Burton, it will be remembered, played for Yorkshire against Cambridge University and in one or two other matches in 1907. When Yorkshire visited Cambridge last year he was in the selected University team against them, but owing to indisposition he could not play.

As the Second Eleven are playing at Sale, a young player altogether new to Yorkshire cricket will be included in the Eleven in L. Linaker, of the Paddock Club. Linaker is a left-arm slow-medium bowler, with excellent local credentials. His club won the Huddersfield League championship last season, and his bowling played a conspicuous part in the team's success.

COUNTY CRICKET.

CHESHIRE v. YORKSHIRE SECOND.

MATCH AT SALE.

The resuscitated Cheshire County Club opened its season with a match against Yorkshire Second in the Minor Counties Tournament on the Sale Club's ground on Wednesday. This was the first occasion on which a county match had been played at Sale. Unfortunately the weather was broken in character, and this militated against the attendance. Yorkshire's team was a strong one, and Cheshire was as well represented as circumstances allowed. There were three changes in the team as originally selected. Messrs. J. Cookson (Sale) and H. Hancock (Oxton) could not play owing to business engagements, and Chambers, of Winnington, had injured a bone in his hand. The vacancies were taken by Bent, Church and Jones. The teams were as follows:—

Yorkshire.—R. W. Frank (captain), H. Rudston, Hardisty, Booth, Brown, Grimshaw, Dolphin, Richardson, Broadbent, Robinson and Turner.

Umpires.—B. Atkinson (Yorkshire) and W. Copeland (Durham).

Cheshire won the toss, and a start was made a couple of minutes before twelve o'clock. Voss and Brewer were the first batsmen, and the first score was a single obtained by Voss from Broadbent, who, however, quickly brought about his fall with an excellent ball that kept low and whipped in from the leg. The first wicket fell at three, Voss having a single to his credit. Rain caused the players to leave the field. They returned in a couple of minutes or so, but soon had to retreat, a smart shower causing a quarter of an hour's delay. Rigby succeeded Voss, and a merry partnership ensued, the new comer and Brewer playing the bowling of Broadbent and Robinson with confidence. Rigby made the first boundary hit. Booth succeeded Robinson in the attack. Brewer, who had been batting with good defensive power, and looked like making a prolonged stay, played too late at a ball of excellent length, and so lost his wicket—two for 24. Morrice was the next comer, and opened with a single off Booth. The Yorkshire fielding was good, Frank packing his men somewhat tightly, and the batsmen finding it difficult to obtain runs. Morrice, however, waiting his opportunity, cut Booth fluently to the off for four. The stroke was applauded, as was a fine bit of fielding at long slip by Frank. Directly afterwards Morrice shied a ball from Booth and was easily caught by Richardson. The third fell wicket at thirty-four and Church came in. Rain caused another short delay. The score mounted steadily. Rigby in particular playing with confidence and Church supporting his efforts in good style. Rigby evidently had a partiality for a boundary hit and he drove Booth to the leg for four in a brilliant manner. Robinson went on for Broadbent and had only delivered a few balls in the over before he was no-balled. Richardson bowled vice Booth, the score now standing at sixty-seven for three, a good performance considering the inconvenience which the rain had made. Church made an excellent drive for four to the off, the interval arriving with the score standing at eighty for three, and the partnership of Rigby and Church having thus far produced 44.

Rain prevented a resumption until 4:55. Booth took up the attack in place of Richardson, and Broadbent resumed at the other end. Play was quiet for a time, but ultimately Rigby, with his penchant for a boundary, put Broadbent beautifully to the off, and the four stroke elicited its deserved round of applause. Church, a few minutes afterwards, emulated this feat with a stylish pull to the leg. Frank evoked hearty applause with another clever bit of fielding at long slip. Rain was responsible for another delay. The pitch, thanks to careful preparation by Greenhalgh, the Sale professional, was showing excellent quality, and despite the rain had quite satisfactory elasticity. Church pulled Booth beautifully to the leg for four, and there was enthusiastic applause when the hundred went up with the partnership still unbroken. Brown bowled in place of Booth and Richardson vice Broadbent. Runs hereabouts came merrily, and there were broad smiles on the faces of the Cheshire supporters. The fall of the fourth Cheshire wicket, however, was destined to come shortly—Church was out to a ball from Richardson that had a lot of "devil." The Timperley man had played dashing cricket towards the close, and his score of 47 was faultless. Bent was the new comer, and he opened with a single, only to part company with Rigby a minute later. The latter was out to Richardson and the umpire's decision was never in doubt. Rigby had scored 51, without a dot that left nothing to be desired. The stand by Rigby and Church accounted for 82, the last named retiring when the score was 114. Each player had hit five fours. Broadbent resumed in place of Brown. Both batsmen were applauded for pretty strokes and the run getting, considering the brilliant fielding—Frank was wonderfully safe at long slip—was satisfactory. Heavy rain again fell and stumps were drawn for the day shortly before six. Cheshire having obtained 135 for the loss of five wickets. It was generally agreed that the display by Cheshire had been exceedingly meritorious, considering the keen Yorkshire fielding and the fact that the Yorkshire bowling despite the disadvantage of a wet ball was fully in keeping with the county's reputation.

THURSDAY.

There was a little pleasant sunshine in the early forenoon but the ominous clouds that were gathering betokened more interruption by rain. The weather held sufficiently fine for a short spell of good cricket, but half an hour before luncheon time rain caused an adjournment and the match was finally abandoned at two o'clock without further play. Cheshire having eight wickets down for 200 runs.

There were not more than fifty people present when the not out, Bent and the Rev. Lowry Hamilton, resumed batting to the bowling of Broadbent and Richardson. From the last ball of Broadbent's first over Bent gave a chance to the bowler, which was not accepted. However, after putting the last ball of an over by Richardson through the slips for four he gave another chance to Broadbent, and this time it was accepted. Turner succeeded, and was not long before he had a "life" at the hands of Robinson. This good luck he appreciated by hitting Broadbent out of the ground for six.

The Rev. Lowry Hamilton who had been showing good defence hit Richardson to the boundary in gr. at style, and repeated the stroke in the same over—bringing up 150. After making 18 the Cheshire captain was bowled by Broadbent with a ball which appeared to break a good deal. Buxton came in and saw Turner hit the ball out of the ground for six. Broadbent in his next over was treated by Turner in similar fashion, but with the next ball the bowler had his revenge, the batsman losing his wicket in attempting another big hit. Turner had hit 25 in sparkling style. Jones was the new comer, and with 100 up Robinson relieved Broadbent in order that the latter might cross over. Robinson in his next over had a somewhat crowded experience. He bowled a no-ball and also a wide, and was afterwards hit by Jones to the leg boundary. There was applause when the 200 was reached, but soon afterwards rain stopped play for about twenty-five minutes. On resuming, Brown took up the bowling in place of Robinson. Heavy rain fell, and it was decided to adjourn for luncheon, and as the rain continued it was agreed to abandon the match. Score:—
