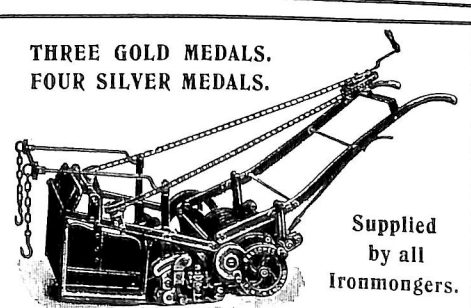

On Friday and Saturday, at Elstow School, near Bedford, Hertfordshire played Bedfordshire, and commenced what promises to be another successful season in the Minor Counties Championship. On Friday Bedfordshire batted first, and thanks to good play by their professional, Holdstock, who made 113, and E. E. Apthorp (69 not out), compiled the admirable total of 302. It appeared then that they were in an impregnable position and this impression was certainly strengthened when in the evening Hertfordshire lost three good bats—A. Butcher, C. H. Titchmarsh, and J. N. Cowley—for 80 runs.

Next morning Hertfordshire started in an unpromising fashion. Golding appeared to be set, but M. H. Doll and R. B. Cowley, who have both played some good cricket this season, were dismissed cheaply. Then White joined Golding, and a splendid stand was made. When Golding was given out lbw, Hertfordshire were in a good position, and in the end led on the first innings by seven runs. White made 103 not out. Bedfordshire batted again, and made 172 for the loss of six wickets.

Players from our corner of the county have gained much honour from the match. In addition to making the priceless century, White, in the first innings, took eight of the Bedfordshire wickets. Golding will not be able to do much better work this season than the 64 he made at the critical stage in the game. Next week we shall have the pleasure of seeing Herts at Watford, and perhaps shall be able to form some idea of their prospects this season.

The West Herts cricket week, which began yesterday, will conclude on Saturday with a match v. Bushey, for the benefit of Harry White. The match will doubtless be interesting, and lovers of cricket, remembering what White has done for the game in West Herts and the county, should make a strong effort to be present.

Directly afterwards Marsh, in running a couple off Grierson, was nearly run out, the umpire's decision being eagerly awaited. White, by cutting Grierson for a single, placed the issue out of doubt. The innings closed with the score at 309, Clark clean bowling Marsh. White carried his bat for an excellent 103, which included four 4's.

Beds. commenced their second venture at 3.30, Hastings Squire and King being opposed to Coleman and Golding. Runs came at a good rate, King finding the boundary on several occasions. Marsh was tried at the School-end vice Golding. With 48 on the board Hasting Squire played on a good one from Marsh (48-1-13). Foy was the new comer, but after scoring a single he was cleverly caught in the slips by Golding. On Keenan coming to the wicket runs came slowly. Misfortune early overtook Beds., for at 57 Keenan was out to a catch in the slips by Coleman. The new comer was Willett, who hit his first ball from Marsh for a boundary. He did not remain long, however, falling a victim to a straight one from Marsh (65-4-5). The Luton professional was next at the wicket, and had a narrow escape of being run out in running a single. Immediately afterwards King reached his half century, the result of sixty minutes play, and the century went up with 4 byes from Coleman. King made some nice off drives at the expense of both bowlers, but the scoring on the whole was rather slow. At 125 J. Cowley handed the ball to Golding. King scored the faster and with a hard square cut off Coleman made his figures 80, next putting him to square leg for a brace and snicking him to the boundary. This brought on Wright (slow right) for the first time vice Coleman and Holdstock lifted him to the square leg boundary twice in successive hits. In his fourth over King let out to the slow bowler and was captured by Marsh in the country. King was heartily applauded as he left, and this partnership had put on exactly 100 (165-5-89). Apthorp followed in, and with a single off Golding the professional completed his 50. The next ball disposed of Apthorp, and stumps were drawn. Full score and analysis:

## Cricket.

## BEDS. v. HERTS.

Bedfordshire opened their campaign in the Minor Counties competition on Friday last, when Hertfordshire were entertained on the Elstow School ground. The weather was delightfully fine, but the attendance left something to be desired, no more than a score or so being present when the game was started. An excellent wicket, somewhat on the fast side, had been prepared by Mr. G. Dunn, and there seemed every probability of it yielding a fair harvest of runs. Misfortune befel the Beds. team at the eleventh hour, for whilst practising at the nets a short time before the match, Wharmby badly split his finger and was unable to play. His place was taken by Mr. Lunce Clark. The Beds. skipper was fortunate in winning the toss, Holdstock and N. Keenan opening the batting to the bowling of Coleman and White, the former taking the first over from the School end. In his first over Holdstock nicked Coleman for a single, but runs came slowly, both batsmen playing cautiously. The first hit of any note was in the third over, when Holdstock placed a loose one from Coleman for three. White, who was bowling a medium fast ball, gave the batsmen some trouble, Holdstock doing most of the scoring. Twenty runs were registered as the result of half an hour's careful batting, immediately after which Holdstock gave a difficult chance to the bowler, which Coleman failed to accept. Runs came at a very slow rate, twenty minutes elapsing before thirty appeared on the board. Keenan took forty minutes in collecting ten runs, and it was left to Holdstock to save the game from becoming very tedious. A nice cut of his produced four (all run). At 39 Doll relieved White at Saunderson's end. Runs at once came at a faster pace, Holdstock making five off his first over, though he was fortunate in not being out to a fluky shot between slips. At the other end Marsh took the ball from Coleman, but despite the double change Holdstock continued to score freely. Fifty was telegraphed as the result of seventy minutes play, and of this total Holdstock was responsible for 34. Both batsmen by now appeared to be well set, Keenan hitting with greater freedom. At 73 White was given a trial at the school end vice Marsh, and once again the batsmen found him difficult to play. With a fine off-drive Holdstock completed his half century shortly before the luncheon interval, the total at the time being 80. Immediately afterwards Keenan was beaten by White, the score then reading: 82-1-23. The newcomer was Hastings Squire, who early opened his account with a drive for three off White. Coleman took the ball at Saunderson's end. Runs came freely, Holdstock punishing Coleman severely. Five minutes before the interval 100 was telegraphed, this score being reached as the result of a fine drive to the boundary by Holdstock. Directly afterwards Hastings Squire was out to a straight one from White, the score then being 102. H. Willett, who was making his initial appearance for the County, was the next batsman, and he and Holdstock were still together when the interval was called with the score at 106.

After lunch Coleman and White resumed the attack and runs came slowly by singles until Willett glanced White to leg for 3. In his next over however White dismissed Willett, who was succeeded by his skipper. The latter opened his account by lifting White to the on boundary and in his next over got him twice to leg for a brace each time. At his very next ball however he mis-hit one which went high in the air, and Wright brought off a running catch. With four out for 126 the position was not so healthy looking for the homesters. King was the incomer, and he and Holdstock put on runs at a good rate, the latter scoring all round the wicket. At 156 Marsh relieved Coleman, and in his first over Holdstock put him to the boundary. King treated White in a similar manner in the next over. Two minutes later King was out to a fine catch by Doll off White, the score at the time being 175. The Rev. R. H. Moss was the newcomer, who opened his account with a single off White's next ball. A few minutes later Holdstock, with a huge drive to the boundary, reached his century, a fact which was hailed with loud applause. This had occupied him just under three hours, and but for a difficult chance in the slips just before lunch was free of blemish. Moss made several nice strokes, until he got in front of a straight one from White and had to retire. The vacancy was filled by Aphorp, who drove White twice in succession to the boundary. In the next over Marsh got Holdstock caught at long-off for an excellent 113. The Luton professional had been batting over three hours, and his total included six 4's. Foy was not long at the wicket, being neatly caught by Tichmarsh with the score at 206. On being joined by Clark, Aphorp scored freely, finding the boundary in frequent succession. Marsh proved rather expensive, and was relieved by Coleman. A loose one from White Aphorp skied towards the bowler, but although the latter put in a good

run he just failed to get up to it. Runs came steadily, and Doll was put on at the school end vice White. Aphorp reached his 50 in 45 minutes. With 270 on the board Golding displaced Marsh, but the batsmen continued to score freely, and were firmly set when the tea interval arrived with the score at 284.

After tea Clark was out to a brilliant catch in the long field, the score being 298-9-22. Grierson, the incomer, did not stay long, and the innings closed for 302. Aphorp carrying out his bat for an enterprising 69, which included ten 4's.

At 5.15 Herts. commenced their innings, A. Butcher and Golding being opposed to the bowling of Grierson and Foy, the former having the first over at the school end. In Grierson's second over Butcher had the misfortune to break his bat, and with only 16 on the board he was clean bowled in Grierson's next over. With Tichmarsh in runs came freely, the Beds. fielding being somewhat poor at times. Tichmarsh, after collecting 9, was bowled by Foy with a ball which whipped in from the off, the score then being 30-2-0. His place was taken by J. N. Cowley, and the pair were together when 50 was telegraphed, the result of 30 minutes play. At 65 Moss relieved Grierson whilst a double change was rung on by Clark deposing Foy at the school end. This failed to keep the scoring down, both batsmen hitting with freedom. King was put on versus Moss, and in his second over had Cowley beaten with a full toss ball which disturbed his middle stump (74-3-18). The incoming batsman was M. H. C. Doll, and at the end of the over Grierson was given the ball at the school end. Doll and Golding played out time, stumps being drawn with the score at 80 for three.

When the game was resumed on Saturday Bedfordshire were in a fairly good position, as with three of the visitors' wickets down for 80 they appeared to have a slight advantage. Early in the morning there was a slight shower, but this in no way affected the wicket, the game being able to be commenced at the usual hour. Golding and Doll were the overnight batsmen, the latter facing Grierson at the school end. Orr relieved King at the other end, but was badly punished by Doll, who got him nicely away to the boundary. In his third over Doll was smartly stumped by Aphorp (94-4-9). The next batsman was White, who opened very cautiously. Foy took the ball from Grierson, and in his first over had White nearly caught. The first hundred was registered after thirty minutes' play. Several changes were made in the Beds. bowling, Grierson relieving Orr at Saunderson's end. Runs were very scarce, both bowlers keeping a nice length with plenty of pace. Three maiden overs in succession were bowled, and the monotony was broken by White placing Foy between the slips for a couple. Grierson was particularly difficult to play, six overs of his producing only one run. At 112 Moss was put on vice Foy, and a double change was brought about by King relieving Grierson. The rate of scoring at once increased, both Golding and White playing the bowling with ease. With a couple of fours to leg off King, Golding reached the half century, the result of over two hours' careful batting. King was punished for eleven in one over. A double change in the bowling was rung in by the Beds. skipper, Clark relieving Moss and Grierson displacing King. Despite these changes the batsmen continued to score freely, and at 155 Orr took the ball from Grierson. Both batsmen appeared well set, but at 166 Golding got in front of a straight one from Clark and was given out for obstruction. R. B. Cowley was the next batsman, but he only remained at the wickets a few minutes, for with a very tame stroke he returned the ball to mid-on, and was out to an easy catch (169-6-2). White was joined by E. L. Wright, and after scoring seven the latter should have been caught at the wicket by Aphorp, who badly fumbled the ball. The second hundred was reached after two hours play, immediately after which Wright was unfortunately run out in attempting a third run. Coleman was the incomer. At this time White had just completed his fifty. Foy took the ball from Clark in the next over, and Grierson again resumed bowling at the other end. With the score at 230 a second double change was brought about, Clark going on vice Grierson and King instead of Foy. Despite these changes the batsmen put on runs at a good rate, and were still unbeaten when the luncheon interval arrived with the score at 265 for seven.

Upon the game being resumed Grierson again went on bowling at the school end, and Foy at the other end. White punished the bowling severely, scoring all round the wicket. Coleman was badly missed by Hastings Squire with the score at 280. Steadily the score rose, until the Herts. batsmen were within 12 of the Beds. total. Grierson made a fine but unsuccessful attempt to catch Coleman, and a minute later the Herts. batsman was nicely caught by King (290-8-30). With the Herts. skipper in, runs came slowly, but when five short of the Beds. total Harford was clean bowled by Grierson. Excitement ran high as Marsh went to the wicket. White was opposed to Grierson, but this proved to be a maiden over. Foy at the other end appeared like securing a maiden until Marsh drove his last ball for couple. A single off Grierson enabled White to reach his century.

BEDFORDSHIRE v. HERTFORDSHIRE.

These counties occupied the excellent table at the Elstow School on Friday and Saturday in opening their respective campaigns in the Minor Counties' Championship for 1909. The home groundman had prepared a perfect pitch, which was always quite easy and as good for the last ball as for the first. There was not even a blade of grass awry to give the bowlers inspiration. It was just the wicket upon which Wharmby and R. L. Peel could have performed to some purpose, and it was just the wicket upon which White did make the ball speak most eloquently. It was not fast enough for Coleman, although he was not bowling at anything like his pace of a few seasons back. In the light of after events it may safely be assumed that Bedfordshire owed their defeat to the accident in the nets just before the game started, which deprived them of Wharmby's services, the third finger of his bowling hand being split while he was practising with the bat. Bedfordshire really did magnificently to get such a fine batting side as Herts. out for only 7 more than they themselves made with their 3 best bowlers away. It speaks well for their reserve material, who were every one of them triers. The home county's fielding, however, was not up to standard. Athorp, at the wickets, was not his usual self, and he missed one sitter, which, if taken, would have broken up a stand which added another 25 runs, while Squire dropped another easy catch at a critical stage. Few sides can drop catches like this and win, or even come so near winning as Bedfordshire did.

Neither side were fully representative, but in this respect Bedfordshire were the worst affected. H. Willett, L. Clark, P. A. Foy, and H. Grierson were new to county cricket, and it was the Rev. R. H. Moss's second match this season. Clark, Foy, Grierson, and Moss were all played for their bowling, and all justified their selection. The Grammar boys hardly bowled up to their School standard, but one wonders what Mr. Orr would have done without them, for, with Clark, they were the life of the attack.

**BEDFORDSHIRE LEAD OFF.**

The home skipper won the toss, and sent in Keenan instead of Wharmby with Holdstock to open the Bedfordshire innings. So admirably were Coleman and White bowling, and so cautious were the batsmen, that Keenan obtained his first run when he had been at the wickets fifteen minutes. Meanwhile, Holdstock, who had shaped more confidently, had collected a capital dozen. No loose balls assisted the batsmen. As the result of 90 minutes' play, Holdstock sent up 89, and completed his 50. In the next over Keenan was bowled by a breaking ball from White. One for 82 was a good start, but Bedfordshire's score came very much in patches, and when the score book read four for 126, and Squire, Willett, and Orr had left, it betokened a change in prospects. These three had lost their wickets in an attempt to force the pace. Squire started to score at once, but only stayed ten minutes. Willett showed an affection for the leg-glance, and two or three pretty strokes were applauded, but he retired very early, and Mr. Orr, who followed him, had an all too brief, if merry, innings, for just as the spectators were looking for some lively cricket, he only partially got hold of a ball from White which shot up into the air, and Wright brought off a capital running catch at point.

**STAND BY HOLDSTOCK AND KING.**

With Willie King with Holdstock, runs came quicker, the amateur displaying a nice variety of strokes, and occasionally opening his shoulders for lusty drives. Meanwhile, Holdstock jogged along leisurely towards his century. At 175, after a half-hour's bright partnership, King gave an easy chance to Doll at cover-point. His 25 included three boundaries and two threes. Soon after, Holdstock, with a snick for 2, completed his century, the result of three hours' patient and faultless batting.

**WHITE EARNS TALENT MONEY.**

Moss played his customary free cricket, keeping the ball well on the carpet, but with only six to his credit, he left (l.b.w.) to White, who thus had taken all the six wickets so far, and qualified for talent money.

The 200 was signalled at 3.30. In the next over Holdstock presented an easy catch to Golding at mid-off. It was his first mistake, and he had been at the wickets four hours. It was one of the best displays he has given for the county, in which quiet confidence and patience were the chief features.

Foy lifted his second ball, and was taken in the long field. Eight for 206.

**BRIGHT BATTING BY APTHORP.**

The 300 now seemed a long way off. Athorp took courage in both hands, and with that golfy stroke of his, went for the bowling. He took risks, but the ball always fell clear of the field. With the help of several boundaries he quickly became second scorer. In forty-five minutes he reached his 50, in

which time Clark, who had played a much quieter game, had collected 14. Tea was taken with the pair still together, and the score 284.

Fifteen minutes' play after tea served to finish off the innings. A magnificent running catch by Doll in the country terminated the partnership, which had added 92 runs in about an hour for the ninth wicket. Grierson offered a feeble resistance, and the end came at 5 o'clock, for 302.

**HERTFORDSHIRE BATTING.**

Mr. Orr began the home attack with the Grammar School boys. Grierson soon met with success, for at 16 he beat Butcher with a good length express. Then the spectators were treated to an exhibition of free hitting by Golding and Titchmarsh. Foy came in for punishment, but he received satisfaction when he knocked the top of Titchmarsh's middle stump at 39. With Cowley partnering Golding, scoring continued brisk, both men hitting all round the wicket. At 64, a double change was tried with Moss and Clark, and at 71, Moss, who had had three overs for 2 runs, gave way to King, with the object of getting another wicket before the close of play for the day. The plan was successful, for King bowled Cowley at 74. When stumps were drawn Herts. had made 80 runs for three.

**SATURDAY.**

Golding and Doll, the overnight not outs, adopted very different tactics on Saturday morning. It was a long journey before 6 p.m., and 23 runs were wanted for seven wickets. Probably, too, the splendid length Grierson and Foy were keeping commanded respect. The former sent down five overs for a single. The home skipper then began a series of rapid changes, and at 94 he tempted Doll to hit out at his own stumps. Doll missed, and was promptly stumped.

When Golding was joined by White, a long stand was made, despite the numerous changes in the bowling. Some thought the skipper erred, if anything, on the side of frequency, but he was obviously trying to get the best out of his bowlers. At last Clark brought about a separation, after the men had been together 90 minutes, and had taken the score to 164. Golding had played attractively for his 64, which included five 4's and six 3's. The newcomer sent his fifth ball to King at mid-on, a very tame stroke, and six wickets were down for 169.

It now looked Bedfordshire's game, and it probably would have been had Wright been accepted at the wicket off Foy at 182. 25 more had been added when Wright was easily run out. Seven for 207.

At this critical juncture for Herts., Coleman joined White, and when he left, the professional pair had nearly won the game. Coleman, as is his wont, at once got off the mark, and rattled up runs at a great pace. At lunch time he had made 25, White had 78, and the total score was 283.

**Remaining runs continued to come at a good pace, until at 280 Squire missed an easy catch at mid-on off Grierson. Then Grierson all but brought off a brilliant catch, stopping the ball as it was speeding away over his head but failing to hold it. At last, Coleman skied the ball towards mid-on, and King brought off a clever running catch.**

**AN EXCITING TEN MINUTES.**

With two wickets in hand, Herts. still wanted 12 runs. Seven having been obtained in the rush of great excitement, Harford was beautifully bowled by Grierson, and six were still wanted when the last man came in. White's score now stood at 99. The stillness became uncomfortably charged with nervous excitement as Foy and Grierson bowled magnificently, and the batsmen contented themselves with playing a straight bat. With a single, White sent up the 300, and completed his century, but the fact passed almost unnoticed. Then White got Grierson away. It was an easy single, but the batsmen turned it into a couple, and a smart return put down Marsh's wicket. Against a confident appeal for run-out, the umpire decided in the batsmen's favour, and the scores were even. Everyone agreed it was a close thing, and many held that the batsman was just out of his ground. Still there was a chance of a tie. Foy sent down a maiden, but White got Grierson away for a single, and left the issue no longer in doubt. Six more runs were added before Clark bowled Marsh.

**BEDFORDSHIRE BAT AGAIN.**

Bedfordshire commenced their second innings at 3.30, which left only two and a half hours for play. King and Squire were sent in to hit, and the quick scorers were grouped to follow in their wake, to see if fortune could be tempted once again. But only King could get going, for in forcing matters, the batsmen quickly lost their wickets. King experienced no trouble with any of the bowlers, and helped himself to three boundaries in White's first over. His strokes were beautifully timed. Only Holdstock could stay with him, and their part-

nership carried the score from 65 to 165. Stumps were drawn on Holdstock completing his 50, the captains agreeing that there was no chance of a finish. Herts. therefore gain three points for their lead on the first innings. Scores:—

**Cricket Notes.**

Still, when the circumstances are considered,—how they were without their three bowlers, etc.—the only thoughts are of congratulation that they should have come so near victory. To get within seven runs of a side like Hertfordshire, with a batting strength including only one pro, and with bowling entirely amateur is an achievement of which, after all, a county side may be proud. All this can be said without forgetting the two fatal mistakes in the field and the occasional loose fielding. The "gate" was about normal for county matches in Bedford, but the non-paying gate, who viewed the proceedings from the admirable grandstand constituted by the main road, must have been a record. Who says county cricket is not popular in Bedford, when men will walk two miles and stand all day to watch it? It is only the paying for it which is unpopular.

The second match of the championship series commences on the Grammar School on Thursday, when Norfolk are due again. Last year on the same ground, Bedfordshire won on the first innings by 432 to 232. On the first day's play in their match with Suffolk yesterday, Norfolk led their opponents by 213 on the first innings, and obtained three of the Suffolk wickets in the second innings for 58. G. A. Stevens, the ex-Norwich School boy, made 83. Stevens, a very stylish but, has a habit of compiling big scores at Bedford. The Bedfordshire side will be—H. R. Orr, R. W. Race, P. A. Foy, H. Grierson, H. Squire, W. E. King, Rev. R. H. Moss, N. Keenan, L. Clark, Capt. Porters, R. Jenkins, and Holdstock.
