But the good work was continued by Captain Murray who cut and off-drove besutifully interspersing his strokes with many pulls to the squara-log boundary off Allsopp who was pitching them rather short. Assisted in 'a minor degree by Penfold, Cobbold, and Healey-the last named of whom scored 14 not out by very good aricket Murray saw the score mount up to 188 before he was clean bowled for 59, the highest score of his side and for which he was warmly applauded.
Norfolk were set 119 to win and made a terribly bad start. Four wickets fell for five runs and then Suffolk held the upper hand. How the collapse came about is inconceivable for that the wioket was not to blamo for it wes proved by Allsopp who played a grand game for his side. He certainly pught to hare been oaught in the out field by H. ought to hare been oaught in the oub held by this notwithstanding, bis innings-a mixture of keen notwithstanding, his innings-a mixture of keen attack and sturdy defence-was Worthy of high praise. We hope we shall not be considered captious if we mention two minor points that might receive attention later. One is that a hit to the pavilion should not count as many runa as a huge hit to the Melton end of the field. Two runs are quite enough for the former and to count four is absurd as woll as being unfair to the bowler.
The other is the absolute necessity of two screens. Possibly the one at the Woodbridge end was blown down but the need of some arrangement for keeping it up pras patent on Tuesday evening, for keeping it up way on when play was stopped on ssveral occasions the consequence of passessstructed.
