Neither county was at full strength for this match, Surrey being without Hayward and Hobbs and the home side lacking the services of Lawton, Morton (injured) and Rickman. Surrey won the toss and sont their opponents in and their policy was thoroughly justified. Derbyshire lost Wright and Bowden for 22 and so difficult a matter did run-getting prove that only 28 were made in the first hour. Needham and Cadman added 30 together, but the former was very slow, at one period of his innings making 11 singles in succession. At lunch half the side were out for 85, and, although Chapman played a sound game for 50 minutes, the innings closed for 146. Smith took seven wickets for 46. Surrey's first wicket realised 42, but the fourth fell as me over. At the end of the day Davis and Smith put on 31 without being parted, the score when stumps were drawn being 161 for six. On Friday the wicket was in much better condition and Surrey took their score to 306, thereby gaining a lead of 160. Davis, making many fine drives and leg-hits, scored 112 in 115 minutes; his chief strokes were twenty-twe 4's. Smith helped him to put on 6's h55 minutes, Lees 59 in 35, and Strudwick, who hit Warren for our 4's, 44 in a quarter of an hour. Derbyshire gave a miscable display when they went in the score dime. The county which does not begin its first match before June 21st, the longes: day of the year, might not unreseonably expect to have decat cricket weather; but the experiences of the Nortolk County eleven at Wooubridge and Bedford lust week were, from a weather point of view, most disappointing. A severe storm at woodbridge on Tuesday very nearly lost worfolk the match; whilst the weather at lied-ford wes simply abominable, the net result of the vasit being an hour and a half's play, and during the greater part of that time the condi-tions were scarcely oricketable. Competition natches in which no result has been obtained on the first innings are not taken into account in the championship table of results, and the draw at Bedford is therefore into account the orresponding matches last scason Norfolk has made a great advancement, the Suffolk match of 1908 having been lost by an innings and 243 runs, and three points being dropped at Bedford, where the home county were in a position to make Norfolk follow on.

In the Suffolk and Bedford out matches last season the Norfolk bowlers captured only eixteen wickets at a total cost of 882 runs. Last week only half that number of runs were hit off the I Norfolk bowlers and twenty-four wickets fell. The conditions of weather and wicket were not the same. A twelvemonth ago batsmen were revelling in hard wickets, and had the bowlers at their merey. Nearly 1000 runs were scored at Bedford for twenty-five wickets, and the pitch was as true and easy at the close of the second day as it was at the beginning of the match. 
TO DAY'S NORFOLK V. SUFFOLK MATCH AT WOODBRIDGE, THE NORFOLK ELEVEN TO MEET BEDFORDSHIRE.

England did not even "muddle through" the second Test. The best eleven was not chosen, and it will probably be a long while before a selection committee will omit a recognised fast bowler from an England team. The error of the passing over of Jeasop was emphasized in the manner characteristic of a player of his temperament and talents. He made a century the next time out, as they say in racing, and than made another, or 290 runs in all in two innings. It is open to anyone to make com-parisons between the Hampshire bowling and that of the Australians; but England could have done with half an hour of Jessop on Wed-needay. Two other non-selected—Brearley, and Rhodes—have also pointed the moral by some smart bowling. The Selection Committee cannot, however, be blamed for the feeblences of the home batting. The home player does not seen able to piay his natural game so well as the Australians in the Test matches, and it has been put on record that half-volleys were played gently back to the bowler. The methods adopted by England's batsmen are said to have made Armstrong appear a much better bowler than he really was, and it is no good blaming the selectors for the failure of accredited batsmen on a plumb wicket, nor for the loss of two wickets through misjudgment in running. Albert Relf played his part well, and the many friends the Sussex man made during his brief but glorious connec-tion with Norfolk crickst were naturally pleased. England is so rich in good players that it would be uncharitable not to give the Aus-tralians credit for a splendid victory. Noble's policy of putting England in was probably a declensive move. Had England won, he would doubtless have been blamed for his audacity. Standing high the School Ground dried quickly under the influence of sunshine and a strong wind, but the wicket did not favour the prospect of Norfolk getting 119 runs in an hour and three-quarters against bowlers like Cobbold and Penfold, and after Suffolk had captured the first four Norfolk wickets in twenty minutes for 5 runs, there was a great danger of Norfolk being beaten. This unexpected happening was averted mainly through a valuable partnership between Allsopp and George Stevens. All hope of a Norfolk victory was practically abandoned after the disastrous practically abandoned after the disastrous opening of the second innings, and efforts had to be concentrated upon avoiding defeat and the loss of the three points gained for a first innings lead. In this Norfolk were successful, but they had to fight very hard, and at five o'clock they appeared to be in a tight place. They got out of it very well in the end, and are to be congratulated upon having made a better start in the competition than was the case last Suffolk, with everything to gain and Vear. and nothing to lose, would have doubtless liked to have played the match out, the state of the game presenting possibilities of a close finish. This time Norfolk were called upon to visit the town and additional interest was lent to the fixture—as was indeed the case last year-by the inclusion of a townsman in the home team.
