C.). Leicestershire replied with 67 for one wicket, Shields being bowled at 29. On Tuesday Knight was bowled at 83 and 6 runs later stumps were drawn for the day on account of rain. After a late start yesterday Leicestershire lost five wickets for 30, but Crawford and Astill made double-figures and the total reached 157. Going in again, Essex also found difficulty in run-getting, the fourth wicket falling at 33. Perrin, however, played a sound game, and Russell (A. C.) and Freeman made useful scores. SPORTING NOTES.

THURSDAY.

It is getting rather late in the day to talk about the Test match, especially as most people I am sure, would be glad to forget the match, and the stain it has left on English cricket. The one consolation to Cambridge people is that Jack Hobbs at least did not disgrace himself. He was the only man on the side to play anything like his usual game, and his inclusion in the teams for the two remaining matches is a certainty. I think that when we have finished calling the English teams names, when we have all picked our own teams for the next Test, somebody might find time to say just a word of praise for the Australians. Our victories have been told that they are by no means a great cricketing side. If that is true then the greater the degree of truth the greater is England's defeat. But whether they are a great cricketing side or not, they have at least shown that they possess the power of facing great issues calmly and confidently, and I for one honour them.

In many respects the Cambs. match against Herts was very similar to the Test match. I am not suggesting that the county men made such a shocking exhibition as the English team, for they fought on very pluckily to the end, but the play at Bishop Stortford veered about very much as it did at Leeds. The Australians, for instance, were out for a comparatively small score. Herts were out for a ridiculously small score. England failed to drive home the advantage she had obtained, and so did Cambs. The Australians recovered, and so did Herts, and that is where the similarity ceases. The country was set an easy task and failed miserably, the county was set a difficult task, and though they failed they did at least make a fight for it. Altogether Cambs. had no reason to be ashamed of their opening fixture, and if they will only persevere there is no reason why they should not have a successful season.

Cambs. really lost the match because they did not help themselves to a substantial lead on the first innings. In an hour's batting before lunch they lost seven wickets in obtaining a lead of three runs. The wicket was undoubtedly awkward, but it was improving very rapidly indeed, and if Cambs. had been content to simply stay in before lunch I believe that they would have piled up a respectable score, and would have won the match. The rate at which the wicket was improving may be realised from the fact that Herts made 255 in the second innings, and that they obtained the runs without any great difficulty. This left Cambs. 256 to win, and when they had lost six wickets for 72 I certainly thought they were on for a bad hiding. Watts, Thomas and Pigg came to the rescue, however, and after a very game struggle Cambs. were only beaten by 47. Watts' innings was superb, and I believe that if he had been able to last he would have won the match for Cambs. He never made a mistake until he was 85, and then he was so obviously tired that no one was surprised when he came out.

His brother pro. also distinguished himself, for his bowling in the first innings was a little short of marvellous. Fancy, 8 for 13 in county cricket, and all cleaned bowled! Coulson will look back on the match with pride, while the ball with which he accomplished the feat should occupy a prominent place among his trophies. In Capt. Cooke, of the Connaught Rangers, the county have found a very useful man. He bowls well and he keeps on bowling well when things are going against his side—a valuable asset. And now Cambs. wants a good fast bowler, but where they are going to get one I don't know. By the way, mention ought to be made by the Cambs. fielding, which was magnificent, and which the Herts spectators cheered repeatedly.

For the second match v. Suffolk at Felixstowe on Friday and Saturday the Cambs. team will be: C. Pigg (captain), A. E. Bellars, O. W. Boccock, F. E. Collier, W. Fromant, A. E. Ling, B. W. Pigg, H. C. Tebbutt, T. S. Thomas, Coulson and Watts.

Now that the Rodney are turning out representative teams they are holding their own. Following on their fine victory over the Camden they took a couple of points out of the "Church" on the succeeding Thursday, and did it in good style too. On a really good wicket the "Church" totalled 167—a pretty good score for them, but not big enough. However, as they lost the first five wickets for 73, they did well to make so many. H. Stamford obtained 50 by good batting. He seems likely to develop into a very fine bat. The nearest scores to that were 29 by Thomas and 24 by R. Missen. Brown again proved himself the most deadly of the Rodney bowlers by capturing six wickets for 55. Stamford and one or two others spoil his figures, for at one time he had 3 for 13. Stubbings took 3 for 25. The Rodney had a hot batting side out, and knocked the runs off with the loss of six wickets, nearly everybody getting into two figures. Watts got 53 runs, and Brown 30 not out.

On Saturday the Crown went over to Newmarket with reasonable hope of winning their second match in the League, as they badly wanted another victory to pair that rather fortunate triumph over the holders. The visitors batted first, and scored 139, W. Tabraham (41) and S. Pailthorpe (30) making the best stand. Pailthorpe was unfortunate in hitting his wicket, as it was more a matter of accident that his leg was forced back by the bowler. With the score against them of 139, Newmarket's hopes fell, when three such good bats as J. Edmondson, Roger Robins and F. Golding were dismissed for 13 runs. Fortunately, Guy Robins showed really good cricket, sound defence and free hitting. His brother and he looked like making a stand, but G.P.M. was cleaned bowled for 15. The stand came when C. H. Parish partnered Guy Robins. Parish is one of the most improved players in the Newmarket team, and carried out his bat for 57, G. Robins making 57. When the partnership ceased it only needed somebody to hit off the runs. Phil Chaloner knocked off 13 when he was very smartly taken by Walton at mid-off, letting in the captain to score the winning hit.

A very even draw resulted from the second Senior League match of Saturday. Though, this month, competition matches may be prolonged until seven o'clock, there were still six wickets to fall when stumps were drawn in the St. Giles' v. Rodney match. St. Giles' occupied the greater part of the afternoon in running up 184, in which there were several good individual performances. The star performer from the spectators' point of view, E. Laurier, the Jessop of local cricket. He was not long at the wickets, but he made things lively while he was there, and scored 27 while his partner was scoring a single. Previously J. Richardson and W. Kidman had made a most valuable stand for the third wicket, and later on G. Wolfe and A. Stearn made substantial contributions.

Time precluded a possibility of Rodney topping the total of 184, but there was plenty of time for defeat. With great steadiness E. B. Darby and J. O. Preston opened. Their defence was particularly fine, and while defending sturdily they did not keep the scorers idle. It was not until the hundred was well in sight that they were separated. Fromant had taken a turn with the ball, and from the Madingley end Darby made a powerful drive. King was fielding at long-on, and taking a long run behind the screen brought off a magnificent catch close upon the boundary. By that time a draw was the only possible result. Preston followed Darby into the pavilion two runs later, and two other wickets fell cheaply. At seven o'clock the Rodney claimed 103 for four wickets. During the St. Giles' innings the only bowler who met with anything like success was T. Brown who took 5 for 43.

Albert Institute II. had no difficulty in putting Old Chesterton Rovers, last year's semi-finalists, out of the Junior Cup. The Albert scored 138, after having 129 runs on the scoring book with but five wickets down. The Chestertonians might not have allowed such a total to be compiled, but their fielding was very slack. E. Clark and Gould, who made 74 of the runs between them by attractive cricket, were several times missed. In one over three easy catches were offered in the slips, and no one was taken. The Rovers never looked like getting the runs, and were dismissed for 59. Beaconsfield had the luck of the draw in being drawn against a young team like Holy Trinity I., and it would have been miraculous if they had lost. Holy Trinity lost nine wickets for 26, but their last two men brought the score up to 47. Smith took 4 wickets for 32 and Beard 4 for 13. The Beaconsfield lost two wickets in knocking off the runs.

The City would not have been dismissed from the Junior Cup by the County School Old Boys if Gray had been in such form as he was on Saturday. Going in first against the Albert he carried his bat right through the innings for the excellent score of 94. It was hard lines in not getting the other six runs. The Albert hit up 80 for two wickets, A. Bowman being 40 not out. Another who nearly got a century was G. McAlpine, who obtained 89 out of 194 for the Ainsworth, being eighth out. Seventy-two of those runs were made in 3's. McAlpine, with Turvey, who is batting extremely well this year, put on 73 for the fifth wicket. Romsey Town had been dismissed for 33, Cousins taking six wickets for 13 and Meadows 4 for 17. The Regent beat Comberton by 114 to 54, Constable taking 7 wickets, and getting 42 runs.

There was some remarkable cricket in a friendly match between Old Chesterton and Histon on Saturday. The game, I believe,

opened in the usual dull style and the score crept up to 13. And then a wicket fell. Now whether superstition encouraged the bowlers or unnerved the batsmen I do not know, but at any rate five more wickets fell before the total was moved from that unlucky figure. Four of the six wickets were taken with successive balls. Watson obtaining two with the last balls of one over and Underwood two with the first balls of the next over. The Chesterton spectators were naturally excited at such a memorable performance, and the dismal procession of Histon batsmen was greeted with hilarious cheers. Eventually Histon made 30 and Old Chesterton 64 for nine.

My Ely correspondent writes:—The chief point of note regarding Saturday's sport was the fine performance of Nicholls, who, bowling for Fordham against the Ely second XI., took seven wickets for five runs. I am sorry that he had not the satisfaction of reflecting that he had done the "hat trick," but notwithstanding, it was a performance of which he may well be proud. Ely were beaten by 32 to 61.

CAPTAIN.

Junior Cup Protests.

Two protests in the Cambs. Junior Cup competition were considered by the Council of the Cambs. Cricket Association at a meeting held at the Castel Hotel on Tuesday evening. In the first case Old Chesterton Rovers protested against the Albert Institute II. playing H. Stubbings, alleging that he had played for the Albert Institute I. against Newmarket in the Senior League, and was therefore ineligible to take part in a Junior Cup match.—The Albert stated that Stubbings did not play in the Senior League, and the protest was lost and the deposit forfeited.

In the second case the Post Office protested against A. T. Titchmarsh playing for Barrington on the ground that he did not reside in the county, and had no birth qualification.—It was stated that Titchmarsh resides in the Parliamentary division, and though the protest was lost, the deposit was returned.

Lemoine, the diamond maker, seems to be finally disposed of by the decision of the Court which has been rehearing his case. He is again found guilty of swindling, and condemned to six years' imprisonment, five years' exile from Paris, and a fine of £120.

CRICKET.

Camb. v. Herts.

EXTRAORDINARY CRICKET.

Camb. played their first county match this season on Friday and Saturday, when they met a strong Herts. team at Bishop Stortford. In many ways the cricket was remarkable. Batting first, Herts. were all out for 37, and in reply Camb. could only make 67. In the second innings, however, Herts. ran up a total of 285, and though Camb. made a gallant attempt to get the runs they failed by 47.

On Friday Thomas lost the toss, and Camb., who played as advertised, had to field first, Coulson and Captain Cooke, who was assisting Camb. for the first time, shared the attack, bowling to Golding and White. The former was twice beaten in the first two overs, and with the score at seven Coulson clean bowled him. With nine runs added, White, who had been batting with plenty of confidence, and had made practically all the runs scored, was beaten by a beauty from Coulson, and two wickets were down for 10. With Titchmarsh and C. C. T. Doll in, the pro. continued to send down some first-class balls, and he repeatedly had both batsmen in difficulties. Cooke, on the other hand, appeared to be easy to play, and mainly off his bowling the score was taken to 26. Then Coulson knocked Titchmarsh's off-stump back, and Camb. began to feel very pleased with themselves. They felt better pleased still when Doll, after fluking a couple from Coulson, was bowled by the next ball. M. H. C. Doll, the Trinity senior, got his first ball to leg for two, and the second one sent him back to the pavilion. At this stage Coulson had taken five wickets for 13, all clean bowled. He made the total six for 13 by bowling Cowley with his next ball. That concluded the over, and off the first ball of the next over, Butcher, who had only made one, gave an awkward return to the bowler. By diving forward Cooke got his hands to the ball, but it slipped through his fingers. When Coulson took the ball again there was a keen desire on the part of the Camb. men at any rate, to see him accomplish the hat-trick. He failed to do this, but with the fourth ball of the over, and with no addition to the score, he bowled Wright. His next ball sent back Cuthbertson, but again he just missed the hat-trick. His last two overs had resulted in five wickets for five runs. Disaster followed disaster, for with the first ball of the next over Cooke bowled Cuthbertson. Marsh, the last man in, hit Cooke for a two and a four in succession. The last hit split his bat, and after he had changed it he was bowled, the side being all out in something under an hour for the miserable total of 37. Coulson bowled superbly throughout. He got a good deal of assistance from the pitch, and he took full advantage of all his opportunities. The manner in which he made the ball turn was little short of marvellous, and batsmen after batsmen stared at the wreck of his stumps as though wondering by what supernatural means he had been got out. One man voiced the general feeling as he unbuckled his pads, "The thing was a foot off the wicket," he grunted, "and how on earth it got into the stumps I don't know." Coulson's analysis was remarkable, as will be seen below.

Camb. commenced their innings with Thomas and Ling. Both men hit a four, but in attempting another boundary Thomas was splendidly taken in the long field, a by no means promising start. With only four added Collier was given out lbw to Marsh. Ling, who was playing a very steady game, in marked contrast to his usual dashing style, obtained a single or two, but with the score at 18 Bryan was out for a "duck." Reid also failed to score, and four wickets were down for 22. When Tebbutt came in he held a whispered consultation with Ling, and both men tried to hit. The result was that at 27 Tebbutt was out to a magnificent catch in the long field, Golding taking the ball high over his head with one hand as he was running backwards. With Pigg in Ling sent up the 30 with a beautiful off drive, and the score equalled the Herts. total before Pigg was bowled. Watts, however, was out in trying to drive his second ball, and seven wickets were down for 37. Coulson stayed with Ling until lunch, when Camb. were six runs on with three wickets in hand. Half an hour after lunch sufficed to finish off the Camb. innings, which realised 67. Ling was ninth out, and his 20 was invaluable to his side. Herts. wiped off their deficit without loss, and before the first wicket fell they were 60 runs to the good. The batting was in marked contrast to the feeble display in the morning, and when stumps were drawn they had scored 200 for six, and were 176 to the good with four wickets in hand.

When the match was resumed on Saturday morning Cooke and Coulson bowled to White (39) and Cowley (31). In Cooke's second over White was missed behind the wicket. After this both men batted confidently, and the score rose steadily. At 230 Cooke gave way to Pigg. In the new-comer's second over Cowley reached his 50 with a beautiful off drive, but the next ball he returned to Pigg, and seven wickets were down for 230. The next wicket put on 18, and then Wright hit out at Pigg and was easily caught by Ling in the long field. With Harford in, White, who had stuck at 47 for nearly a quarter of an hour, obtained his 50 with a snick through the slips. In the same over, however, Harford was bowled by Pigg, nine wickets being down for 262. The last pair took the total to 285, before Marsh was given out lbw to Coulson.

Wanting 256 to win, Camb. opened their innings at 30 minutes to one with Ling and Reid, the bowling being shared by White and Marsh, who played such havoc in the Camb. first innings. Both men batted steadily, and only four had been collected by singles when Ling

pulled a ball from Marsh into his wicket. With Bryan in three more runs were added, and then Wright went on for an over in order to allow the bowlers to change ends. Neither batsman took any risks, and the first half-hour only produced 11 runs, eight singles and one three for byes. The first boundary came from Reid, a fine off drive all along the ground up the hill. At 19 an attempt at a close run and a fine piece of fielding by Titchmarsh resulted in Bryan being run out. Collier, the new-comer, started with a couple of singles, and then had hard luck in not getting a six from White, the ball hitting the top branches of the trees. At lunch Camb. wanted 225 to win with eight wickets in hand.

After lunch Camb. fared badly, and six wickets were down for 72. A fine stand by Thomas and Watts, however, practically doubled the score, the former being bowled at 140. Watts, ninth out at 206, batted superbly, and his 88 included one 6, nine 4's and two 3's, and occupied 87 minutes. The innings concluded at half-past four for 206, Herts winning by 47.

Notes by "Vigilant."

The only important match last Thursday was in the Senior League Competition, when the Rodney beat the C.E.Y.M.S. by a substantial margin on King's and Clare ground. The "Church" opened the game on a very good wicket but their first three batsmen, Brooke, Ford, and F. J. Missen, were all out without a score of runs being registered. R. S. Missen and Harry Thomas, however, brightened matters up considerably and made a prolific stand, the former obtaining a couple of dozen and the latter knocking up 28. The next batsman, Fabb, the old Pesean, did not stay long, but the next cover, Stamford, played a good innings for his half century before getting out to a catch by Darby. K. L. Wormell contributed 18 without being beaten, Tomlin just reached double figures, and the innings closed for 107. Brown was responsible for six of the wickets at a moderate total, and Stubbings got three of the remainder. The Rodney, the old cup fighters, who will probably carry off the trophy this year unless the holders show more consistent form, passed their opponents' total with four wickets in hand. Towards their score of 168 Watts (G.) hit up 53 in fine style, Tom Brown was the next highest scorer with 30 to his credit, Frank Hayward made 24, and E. B. Darby 23.

The Beaconsfield, as anticipated by their recent form, easily got through the first round of the Junior Cup Competition, beating Holy Trinity on Parker's Piece by four wickets and 107 runs. Holy Trinity went to the wickets first but were soon in difficulties, the first half of their wickets producing only 17 runs, and the innings closed for 47. Marsh, their captain, who was tenth man in, was the only man of the side to make a double figure score, contributing 18 before being caught by L. Smith off Metcalf's first ball. The downfall of the Holy Trinity team was no doubt due to the splendid trundling of Beard and H. T. Smith. Beard, who is a fast left-handed bowler, captured four wickets for 13 runs, and Smith took a similar number for 30. The Beaconsfield also started badly. They led off with Henstead and Solly, their captain, but the latter was bowled with the score at seven, and Henstead was out with a run required to send up a score of runs. H. T. Smith and Crouch played careful but by no means unattractive cricket, and were together when their opponents' total was passed. Curiously enough, both got out from consecutive balls, and had made equal scores. The total was 62, the pair having added 42. Afterwards Carter, Beard and Jubby hit out in capital style, Carter's 38 not out being a particularly good display.

There was a good crowd on St. John's ground on Saturday to witness the League engagement of the Rodney and St. Giles', and the match was played under ideal weather conditions. The wicket was good when St. Giles' opened their innings with Fisher and Fromant against the bowling of Stibbon and Ling. The latter dismissed Fromant cheaply and Fisher was nicely caught by Unwin when he had made 17. Richardson and Kidman made a good stand, the former getting 30 and Kidman 22. Wolfe played well for his 25, Laurie quickly got 27, Stearn contributed 21, and Mr. "Extras," with a large total of 23, brought the score up to 184. The Rodney's first pair, Darby and Preston, made a prolific stand for the first wicket. Darby hit up his 47 in a very short time, and then succumbed to a well judged catch in the long field by King. Preston contributed 32, but Unwin, who went in at the fall of the first wicket, was out for obstruction before scoring. Stibbon was bowled by Laurie for a "duck" and when time arrived Brown was not out 11 and Ling not out 2. The total was 103 for the loss of four wickets, so that the Rodney were in a fairly strong position to win when stumps were pulled up.

The Crown sustained another defeat in the League, being beaten by Newmarket on the latter's ground after a well contested game. The visitors had first knock. The first four wickets fell cheaply, all of them by catches but Tabraham and Pailthorpe made a plucky stand, but for which the Crown would have been sadly defeated. Both men played stylish cricket and their contributions of 41 and 30 respectively were invaluable. The tail, however, played well, and the total reached 139. The homesters were given about two hours to get their runs in, but they started very badly, losing three men for a baker's dozen of runs. Guy Robinson, who went in at the fall of the second wicket, offered a sturdy resistance. His brother did not stay with him long, but Parish rose to the occasion and helped to put on nearly sixty runs before Robinn was clean bowled by Walton. When Chaloner came in, 33 runs were required with five wickets to go, but with 11 wanted he gave a chance to Walton, who brought off the catch. The veteran cricketer, Holland, however, came in and made the winning hit, Newmarket gaining the victory by six wickets. For the winners Parish got half the Crown's wickets for 59, Sheldrick took three for 26, while on the other side Woolston got four for 31, Tabraham's cost 18, and Walton's 31.

The second string of the Albert Institute made a good start in the Junior Cup Competition on Saturday when they played the Old Chesterton Rovers on Parker's Piece, and were victorious by 79 runs. The winners batted first and amassed the respectable total of 138, of which Gould contributed 42 in fine style. The other chief compilers of the score were E. Clark 32, R. Clark 23, and Jackson 21. The latter also bowled well, taking eight wickets for 28 runs. The credit, however, must be shared by Kirkup, who proved himself a most capable wicket-keeper and stumped out four of the Chesterton men.

The postponed match between Burwell and Chevely in the Newmarket and District League was brought off on Saturday, when Chevely won their first match in the competition by 15 runs. On the Chevely side Rolfe and Hornigold, were the top scorers with 13 each, but Dennis was the only man on the Burwell side to get into double figures and he only just managed it. Harding for Burwell, and Hitch for Chevely, bowled extremely well.

The county team opened their season's programme on Friday and Saturday, when they were beaten by Hertfordshire by 47 runs. After getting their opponents out, chiefly through the remarkable bowling of Coulson for 37, they should certainly have obtained a much larger lead on the first innings than 30. In the first innings Ling and Bellars were the only members of the side to feel their feet at all. Ling, who was sent in first, is well-known for his hard hitting, but when he saw the trend of the game he restrained himself in a commendable manner, and although he had scored only 26 when he was sent back, the ninth man out, he made some very good strokes. When Herts. went in for their second innings it was soon seen that the wicket had improved, and the first pair put on 90. Butcher and Cowley also made another fine stand, with the result that Cambs. were given the task of getting 256 runs.

This, however, was too much for them although there was some spirited hitting, especially on the part of Watts, whose 80 so late in the innings was a splendid effort. He hit tremendously hard and once knocked the ball clean out of the ground for a six, and he also got nine 4's. A word of praise must be given to the fielding of the Cambs. representatives, which was excellent throughout, and in this department Thomas, the captain, Tebbutt, the old Leysian, and Ling excelled. In Captain Cooke, the new left-hand bowler, Cambs. have certainly got a find. He is a medium left-hand trundler but gets a lot of work on the ball and although we are all anxiously awaiting the advent of a fast bowler he should prove a decided acquisition to the team. Coulson's performance in the first innings was a remarkable one, and his analysis is well worth reproducing. It was as follows:—

MINOR COUNTIES' CHAMPIONSHIP.
CAMBS. v. HERTS.

Cambs commenced their fixtures in the Minor Counties Championship on Friday and Saturday, when they met Herts, at Bishop Stortford and sustained defeat by 47 runs. There was some remarkable cricket in the first innings, when Cambs. obtained a lead of 30 runs, but the second innings of both sides produced some spirited hitting. Both teams were well represented, the Cambs team including a new comer in Captain H. H. A. Cooke, who has much promise as a medium break bowler.

Herts. won the toss, and batted first on a wicket which looked in good condition, but subsequently proved to be most tricky. Coulson and Captain Cooke led the attack, the Herts. first pair being Golding and White. Neither batsmen appeared to have much confidence, and with the score at seven Coulson disturbed Golding's stumps with the first ball of his third over. Titchmarsh came to the wicket, but the pair were not long together, for in his next over Coulson bowled White. Sixteen runs were added when Titchmarsh was sent back, and with only three more added, C. C. T. Doll, who got a couple from Coulson, was bowled by the next ball. M. H. C. Doll was sent back with the second ball he received, and Cowley was dismissed with the score at 31, Coulson having got six wickets at a cost of thirteen runs. The next three batsmen failed to contribute to the score, and the whole side were out in about an hour for the paltry total of 37. Coulson bowled brilliantly on a wicket which suited him, and in his eight overs, three of which were maidens, he got eight wickets for only thirteen runs. The two taken by Captain Cooke cost a couple of dozen runs.

Ling and Thomas opened the Cambs. innings to the trundling of Marsh and White. White bowled a maiden over to Ling, but Thomas hit Marsh to the boundary in the first ball of his over. The two carried the score to nine, when Thomas was brilliantly caught by C. C. T. Doll off White in the long field. Collier came in, but with only four added he attempted his favourite leg shot, but missed the ball, and was out for obstruction. Bryan came to the wicket, but had the misfortune to pull a ball on the leg side on to his stumps. At the fall of his wicket the score was 18 for three. Reid came out with a "duck" in playing forward to White, and with three wanted for 30 to be sent up, Tebbutt was caught by Golding.

With Pigg in, Ling, with a nice off-drive, made the scores equal but when he had got a single, Pigg's off stump was disturbed by White. Watts failed to score, succumbing to another finely judged catch by C. C. T. Doll, but shortly afterwards Coulson gave Cambs. the lead on the first innings, and the luncheon interval arrived with Cambs. six runs on with three wickets to go.

Coulson was out after luncheon, his wicket having added eight runs. Meanwhile, Ling had been batting steadily but he was now dismissed having made an invaluable 28. Bellars brightened the innings up with 14 not out, but the total reached was only 67. White had the splendid analysis of seven wickets for 14 runs, and Marsh got his three at a cost of 46.

When Herts. went in for their second innings it at once became evident that the wicket had improved considerably. Golding and White made a splendid stand, and in spite of the several changes made in the bowling they carried the score to 90 before Golding was out lbw., having just made his 50. The next three wickets fell cheaply, M. H. C. Doll being out to a brilliant catch by Ling. The tail wagged merrily and when stumps were drawn for the day Herts had scored 206 for six wickets, the not outs being White (39) and Cowley (31). On Saturday both men batted with confidence and Cowley reached his 50. The next ball, however, he was caught and bowled by Pigg. The innings realised 285, White being not out for 57.

Cambs. were set the task of knocking up 256 to win, but they failed by 47 runs. A feature of the innings was the fine batting of Watts who hit up 88, giving only one chance. EXTRAORDINARY CRICKET.

FINE BOWLING BY H. COULSON.

Cambs. opened their fixture list to-day, when they met a strong Herts. team at Bishop Stortford. The weather was ideal, and the ground, which was very prettily situated, but has rather a steep slope from the pavilion side, looked in excellent condition. Subsequent events proved the wicket was not so good as it looked. Thomas lost the toss, and Cambs., who played as advertised, led to field first. Coulson and Capt. Cooke, who was assisting Cambs. for the first time, shared the attack, bowling to Golding and White. The former was twice beaten in the first two overs, and with the score at seven Coulson clean bowled him. With nine runs added, White, who had been batting with plenty of confidence, and had made practically all the runs scored, was beaten by a beauty from Coulson, and two wickets were down for 16. With Titchmarsh and C. C. T. Doll in, the pro continued to send down some first-class balls, and he repeatedly had both batsmen in difficulties. Cooke, on the other hand, appeared to be easy to play, and mainly off his bowling the score was taken to 26. Then Coulson knocked Titchmarsh's off-stump back, and Cambs. began to feel very pleased with themselves. They felt better pleased still when Doll, after fluking a couple from Coulson, was bowled by the next ball. M. H. C. Doll, the Trinity senior, got his first ball to leg for two, and the second one sent him back to the pavilion. At this stage Coulson had taken five wickets for 13, all clean bowled. He made the total six for 13 by bowling Cowley with his next ball. That concluded the over, and off the first ball of the next over, Butcher, who had only made one, gave an awkward return to the bowler. By driving forward Cooke got his hands to the ball, but it slipped through his fingers. When Coulson took the ball again there was a keen desire on the part of the Cambs. men at any rate, to see him accomplish the hat-trick. He failed to do this, but with the fourth ball of the over, and with no addition to the score, he bowled Wright. His next ball sent back Cuthbertson, but again he just missed the hat-trick. His last two overs had resulted in five wickets for five runs. Disaster followed disaster, for with the first ball of the next over Cooke bowled Cuthbertson. Marsh, the last man in, hit Cooke for a two and a four in succession. The last hit split his bat, and after he had changed it he was bowled, the side being all out in something under an hour for the miserable total of 37. Coulson bowled superbly throughout. He got a good deal of assistance from the pitch, and he took full advantage of all his opportunities. The manner in which he made the ball turn was little short of marvellous, and batsman after batsman stared at the wreck of his stumps as though wondering by what supernatural means he had been got out. One man voiced the general feeling as he unbuckled his pads, "The thing was a foot off the wicket," he grunted, "and how on earth it got into the stumps I don't know." Coulson's analysis was remarkable, as will be seen below.

Cambs. commenced their innings with Thomas and Ling. Both men hit a four, but in attempting another boundary Thomas was splendidly taken in the long field, a by no means promising start. With only four added Collier was given out lbw to Marsh. Ling, who was playing a very steady game, in marked contrast to his usual dashing style, obtained a single or two, but with the score at 18 Bryan was out for a "duck." Reid also failed to score, and four wickets were down for 22. When Tebbutt came in he held a whispered consultation with Ling, and both men tried to hit. The result was that at 27 Tebbutt was out to a magnificent catch in the long field, Golding taking the ball high over his head with one hand as he was running backwards. With Pigg in Ling sent up the 30 with a beautiful off drive, and the score equalled the Herts. total before Pigg was bowled. Watts, however, was out in trying to drive his second ball, and seven wickets were down for 37. Coulson stayed with Ling until lunch, when Cambs. were six runs on with three wickets in hand. Half an hour after lunch sufficed to finish off the Cambs. innings, which realised 67. Ling was ninth out, and his 26 was invaluable to his side. Herts. wiped off their defeat without loss, and before the first wicket fell they were 60 runs to the good.
