The first of the two games allotted to Swanges in connection with the minor counties competition was mached on Friday when Carmarthenshire made their maden appearance at St. Helon's. Glamorgan secured first knock on a good wicket, and a start was made with N. V. H. Riches and Encroft. Hugh Howell and E. Gee shared the attack. With only 22 rune recorded Bancroft had the misfortune to be "thrown out." Biches and Percy Morris carried the otal past the 50, but the Swansea man did not remain much longer. Stanley Rocs, who succeeded him, left at 65, so that in less than an hour Glamorgan had lost three wicekis. Curiously enough only Swansea wickets had fallen up to date. Juck Davies, of Pontyberem, bowled distinctly well, and the ground fielding being excellent runs were more difficult to get at the outset. Nevertheless good progress was made, Riches in particular shaping in a way which suggested that he was out centuring hunting. The downfall of Maxwell was wrought by Gee, who got the fast bowler caught at the wicket—82—4—8. Glamorgan were certainly not doing as well as had been expected of them. Until Carmarthenshire are in a position to engage some good all-round professionals, they cannot hope to enter into series competition with the best of the singer counties. Allowance has, of course, to be made that they are the "infants" of the competition; but surely they can place a stronger eleven in the field than that which duty for them against Glamorgan at St. Heisen's on Friday and Saturday? Why, for instance, was Soar, the ex-Hampshire howler, overlooked?
