CRICKET TOPICS.

TEAMS FOR THE NORFOLK v. HERTS MATCH.

The weather is still behaving very badly for the time of the year, and if the cricket statisticians took notice of such matters we should probably be informed that the demand for sawdust this season has been most exceptional. The amount of time killing that has to be done by players during a wet season is one of the most regrettable features of the game. It is bad for the cricket temperament, and the depression created in cricket circles by a continuance of the bad weather has been increased by the inability of England's best players to rise to the occasion in the big matches with the Australians. If it may be assumed that the Selection Committee will stick to their guns in the appointment of Maclaren as England's captain in the present series, of which the Australians have won two and England one, it is comforting to note that the Maclaren we remember best was on show in the Manchester match which ended so disastrously for Notts. R. H. Spooner, who may be regarded as a possible England player, took part in the same match, and is also playing for the Gentlemen at Lord's to-day. In the opinion of many good judges, K. L. Hutchings is the best possible substitute for Jessop, and there are others prepared to advocate the inclusion of D. W. Carr, the Kentish "googly" bowler, who justified his place in the Gentlemen's side at the Oval last week. Reports credit Carr, a schoolmaster at Stanmore, with having taken as many as 200 wickets during August in good class club cricket. Simpson-Hayward was anything but a failure against the Australians last week, but the inclusion of the Worcestershire lob bowler in a representative match would probably be regarded in the light of a wild experiment. The public would doubtless more readily accept the name of another Worcestershire player, and it may be worthy of note that R. E. Foster, whose 287 made at Sydney in 1903 is still a record for Test matches, has just given startling proof of his powers in a good club match. It reads like a fairy story, Witham declaring at 342 for eight, and H. W. de Zoete's XI. losing four wickets in twenty minutes for 60 runs, and then "Tip" Foster going in and winning the match against time by scoring 262 not out, out of 290 in an hour and a quarter! England certainly has need of men of that stamp.

Beginning on Wednesday at St. Alban's, the Norfolk players enter upon a period of almost continuous match playing, the county being engaged, with but three brief intervals, up till August 12th, the last day of the Norfolk season. In all there are 18 playing days out of 26, and if the personnel of the team is subject to few variations, the players should experience some of the benefits derived from combination and co-operation, and also learn something of that strain which the regularly engaged first class professor is wont to mention. On the whole we are inclined to think that the advantages to be gained from regular match playing far outweigh the disadvantages and the possibility of staleness. As a rule a side is stronger after it has played a few matches, and we recollect that just after Norfolk won its eighth match and the championship in 1905, the members of the team agreed that it was a pity there were no more matches to play, as they were then really a strong side, and the enjoyment of playing was so much greater.

There is not, we learn, a probability of the Norfolk eleven being very different from that which has been seen on two previous occasions this season. The time has not yet come when the side will have the help of the great players which schemes release, and, as in other years, it is only during August that the Selection Committee experience the difficulty of knowing who to leave out. The customary visit of the Cambridge University players to Ireland doubtless accounts for the absence of M. Falcon, who enjoyed the distinction of making the highest score hit for Cambridge this season, and his aggregate was only beaten by K. G. McLeod, who was the only other Cantab to make a century. Both Falcon and the Suffolk Ireland played prominent parts in the recent inter-Varsity match, and it may be noted that a younger brother of the Norfolk man bowled with some success for Harrow in the big match which ended so disappointingly owing to the wet of Saturday. An important golf meeting will prevent B. K. Wilson from journeying to St. Alban's. Mr. Wilson enjoys the double distinction of being captain of the Norfolk County Cricket Club and captain of the Royal Norwich Golf Club. The growth of

golf has done much to remove the cricketers' old objection to the wee-ball game, and the golfing cricketer is no longer a rara avis. Cricketers' opinions in regard to golf have also changed, and we believe it is now claimed that a man's golf is far more likely to suffer from playing cricket than for his golfing habits to handicap him when he is at the wicket. There are now many examples of men being equally good at both games, and, supplementary to the dual captaincy just mentioned, we may quote the local instance of J. F. Ireland, who has represented his University at both games.

During the absence, which we may hope will be only temporary, of B. K. Wilson, the Norfolk side will be captained by B. Cozens-Hardy, and those who accompany him will be pleased if the luck of the toss, which went against Norfolk at Woodbridge and Bedford, changes with the captaincy. Some captains, notably F. S. Jackson, are notoriously lucky with the toss, and needless to say a toss-winning captain is a valuable asset to a side. Among those to whom an invitation has been extended for the Herts match is Norman W. Stevens. He made his debut against the same county at Watford in 1903, and, like his more famous younger brother, he was a heavy scorer in his Norwich School days, but except for occasional appearances for the C.E.Y.M.S. and Old Norvicensians during the holiday season, his cricket has since been obtained north of the Tweed with Edinburgh University. He was at no time regarded as the best of the three brothers, but "G. A." has developed tremendously, and is to-day one of the best batsmen in the Eastern Counties. Geoffrey Stevens has hitherto been rather modest in his dealings with the Herts bowlers, and we hope he will not let White & Co. off so lightly this week.

The Norfolk side will be selected from the list of twelve given, and Dr. Earl Norman, the Herts secretary, writes that the team sent should not be taken as final, and that in all probability alterations would have to be made:—

Last year Norfolk lost their match with Herts by four wickets, after leading by 15 runs on the first innings. The wicket was damaged by rain, and Norfolk batted first. A few days ago Herts were similarly successful in pulling a match out of the fire after being behind on the first innings. Cambridgeshire surprised themselves at Bishops Stortford by getting Herts out for 37, and, although Harry White's figures—seven wickets for 14—were not quite so good as Coulson's, the little Herts man followed up his bowling performance by a good second batting effort, and when the play ceased on the first day Herts had gained a strong position, and finally won by 47 runs, the number of extras given away by Cambs in the Herts second innings. Harry White is getting on in years, but he is still doing big things for Herts. He seems to be always doing one of two things—either making runs or getting wickets. He played brilliantly in getting three points for Herts from Bedfordshire, and took fourteen wickets against Suffolk when the latter won by 6 runs. The Herts batting has not yet revealed itself in the strength to which we have been accustomed, but the bowling is still very good.

NORFOLK v. HERTFORDSHIRE

HOLLOW DEFEAT OF NORFOLK AT ST. ALBANS.

MATCH COMPLETED IN 4½ HOURS.

FINE BOWLING BY WHITE AND COLEMAN.

Some remarkable play was seen yesterday in this match at Clarence Park, St. Albans, the game being begun and finished in a single day. The wicket was much affected by the heavy rainfall of the previous evening, and between a quarter to twelve and eighteen minutes to six thirty wickets fell for an aggregate of 213 runs. The actual duration of play was four and a half hours, and Norfolk, who were twice dismissed for an aggregate of 92 runs, were beaten by an innings and 29 runs. On a wicket at all helpful to a bowler there is no more deadly bowler in the Eastern group than White, and prior to yesterday's match he had taken thirty-three wickets at an average cost of nine runs per wicket. Yesterday he took six wickets in each innings for less than four runs per wicket, and though helped by the pitch and to some extent by poor batting, it was a fine achievement. There was, as usual, a difference of opinion about the state of the wicket, and during the morning it did not play so easily as was expected after so much rain, but early in the afternoon the confident batting of Golding and Titchmarsh tended to support the contention that taking first knock was a doubtful advantage. There were, however, many failures on the Herts. side, and the last five wickets fell for 10 runs. In their second attempt the Norfolk batsmen adopted cautious methods, with disastrous results.

Winning the toss, Norfolk made a wretchedly bad start, losing their first three batsmen in four overs for 7 runs. It was obvious from the way in which the early batsmen shaped that the wicket was anything but easy. The bowling, and especially White's, required most careful watching. The professional caught and bowled C. B. Smith with the first ball of the second over, and in the same over Wharton was sent back beaten and bowled by a turning ball. Thurgar brought Coleman his first wicket, the last ball of his second over coming back to hit his leg before going into his wicket. Stevens and Taylor effected some improvement, Stevens scoring two 4s in White's third over, the first a pull, and the second an off drive, both hits being run out. Stevens twice missed hitting White to leg, but he generally got the ball in the middle of the bat, and his batting was calculated to impart confidence to the remaining batsmen. Disaster, however, continued to overtake the Norfolk team, and with the total at 25, Taylor had his leg stump uprooted by a ball from Coleman, off whom he had previously made a lucky snick. Two runs later Stevens employed his chop stroke with fatal results, Coleman being presented with an easy catch at the slips, and half the side were out in forty minutes for 27 runs, of which Stevens had made 15 in twenty-three minutes. Cozens-Hardy and Page came and went, and Pilch, after opening with a big hit, and stealing some singles with Allsopp, was well caught near the boundary over the bowler's head off a skimming hit, the eighth wicket falling at 33. Allsopp, who was let off when 2 for a hot return to Coleman, hit out pluckily and well, and the 50 had been passed when he was caught at slip. One run later Smith was bowled, and the innings closed at one o'clock for 53, having lasted an hour and a quarter. White and Coleman bowled unchanged, and had a fine analysis.

Herts made a sorry beginning, losing J. Cowley and White in three overs before luncheon for 1 run, a leg bye. Cowley's wicket was thrown away in the first over, Golding hitting the ball towards Allsopp at cover point, and changing his mind about running, after having called his partner. White came in to be caught at slip off Smith's second ball, both wickets falling before a run had been scored. Cuthbertson, the wicket-keeper, and an old Malvernian, who bats left-handed, played the remainder of the over, and Gibson bowled a maiden to Golding before lunch, three overs having produced one leg bye. After the interval a ball from Smith got up quickly and went for 3 byes, and then, with a single to Golding, Gibson bowled down Cuthbertson's off stump. With three wickets down for 5 runs Norfolk were doing famously; but with the advent of Titchmarsh, the game underwent a change. Runs came freely, Titchmarsh making

some fine strokes behind the wicket, and both batsmen playing and hitting well to leg. Allsopp came on for Gibson at 40, and Titchmarsh at once lifted the ball on to the cinder track. Titchmarsh made several other drives, and the Norfolk total was passed at three o'clock with seven wickets upstanding. Titchmarsh seemed in for a long score when he was finely caught at extra cover, Cozens-Hardy taking the ball on his left and close to the turf, the fourth wicket partner ship realising 60 in thirty-eight minutes, and Titchmarsh, who batted with confident ease, hit 4 4s and six 3s in compiling 33. R. Cowley was Golding's next partner, and he displayed free style in collecting a dozen runs, his innings being terminated at 83 by a ball from Smith, which hit the top of the wicket. Gausson, a big man, who had not previously played inter-county cricket for Herts, began by driving Smith finely to the track. He stayed to make a number of big, full-shouldered drives, the century being reached at half-past three. Gibson relieved Allsopp, and at 11 he bowled Gausson's off stump. Gausson's hitting brought him 27 out of 28 runs scored during a stay of nineteen minutes. Two runs later Golding, who had slowed down considerably, was leg before to Gibson. He was seventh out at 113, and was batting an hour and three-quarters for 29, in which were four 4s. Beyond a very hot and difficult catch to point when 5 he made no mistakes, and batted attractively during the first half of his innings. The remaining batsmen were little trouble. Wright and Brown were caught at slip, and with the bowling of Coleman by Smith, the innings closed at four o'clock for 121, having lasted just under two hours, the last five wickets going down in twenty minutes for an addition of 10 runs. Smith, bowling unchanged, took three wickets for 50, and Gibson five for 28, capturing four of his victims during his second spell of bowling.

Norfolk started on their second venture at twenty minutes past four, 63 runs in arrears. Gibson accompanied C. B. Smith to the wickets, and for the third time in the match the bowlers met with great encouragement at the beginning of an innings. Gibson was snapped at the wicket in White's second over with the score at 3, and 1 run later Stevens was out leg before to Coleman. With double figures on the board White bowled Allsopp, and in his next over got Wharton caught at cover, the first four wickets going down in thirty-five minutes for 13 runs. Twenty minutes later, and with the addition of only 11 runs, half the side were out, C. B. Smith, who had batted fifty-five minutes for 6, being bowled by Coleman. Cozens-Hardy offered resistance for nearly half an hour, and then with the total at 28 White did the trick, bowling Cozens-Hardy, Thurgar, and Pilch with successive balls. The end was soon reached, the innings being completed in eighty minutes for a total of 39, of which 10 were extras, and at eighteen minutes to six Herts had won the match by an innings and 29. White and Coleman again bowled unchanged.
