Coulson managed to run his score up to eleven, and then came down through a smart ball from Bassett.

A. S. Ling partnered L. J. Reid, but before any addition was made to the score a very smart catch by Trudgett dismissed Reid. With A. S. Ling and C. H. Pigg together, the scoring became more rapid, Pigg on one occasion driving three four's in succession. When he had but 23 to his credit, Ling had a narrow escape from being stumped, but he managed to jump within the crease before the ball was gathered. A change of bowling was tried, H. C.
