THE NORWICE WHDK NORFOLK PROA PECTS $A G A I N S T$ HERTR. ANOTHER "CENTURYS BY COLLTNBON AN AP PEAL SAVEA OVERSTRAND.

It to plemant to bocable to congritulite the Noriolk elóven upon \& well deperved victory in the ohamplomghig. Butols, now rapidly epproaching the end of their programme, have found it dimoult to eustain the note struck by them in defeating Hert at Watford, but our neighboure are not the weakest of the connties in the Eastern group, and a victory orier Suffolk is not a thing to be acoomplished easily. Bedfordshire and Norfolk claimed that distine tion last Jear, and Norfolk is the first county to lower Suffolk's colours this ceacon. Twelve months ago the fonndation of an aight wickets ${ }^{\prime}$ triumph was laid by the fine bowling of Gibson, and in the subsequent proceedings Geofrey 8terens played a bis part. Curiously enough catigfactory were largely responsible for the satiofactory position in which Norfolk found themeelves last Tueeday morning. Gibson hae been bowing oxceptionally well this season, and he accomplished his beet piece of work on Monday in taking nsven Suffolk wickets for 30 Tuns. If Geofirey Stevens had been snapped up

F. Meyrick-Jones. The clergyman made a highly Muccoesful first appearance for Norfolk. He is a fearlees hitter, and the spectators who enjoved the snectacle of the clergyman going for the Suffolk bowling will be corry to learn that his absence in the North of Scotland will prevent him from playing in any of the remaining matches this seacon.

The fielding of the Norfolk eleven in the Suffolk match was full of sparkle and life and the players are aleo entitleal io bo ernzratulated upon their smart catching. Both Gibeon and splendid fiepding their own bowling by really splendid fielding, and one of the titbits of the
match was Allsopp's stopping of a fast retnrn match waś Allsopp's stopping of a fast return
from H. L. Wilson witil his left hand. and the promptness and accuracy with which he threw the striker's wicket down in an attempt to effect a run out. The ball was driven back with such speed that it split the fleshy part of Allscop's thumb. On the two following days the fielding honours were secured by the visiting team, and all round the dinplay of the Ilarrow Wanderers was worthy of much admiration. There was much graceful pasa and power in their batting, and the bowling was both diftioult and effective. The amount of swerve nroduced by E. W. Mann was so remarkable that one of the batsmen dracr:hed it aa "uncanny." Geoffrey Stevens informed the writer that it was the most puazling bowling he had played against since he had been in the Norfolk elaven.
He was in a long time on Thursday morning. but he did not create the impression that he had mastered the bowling. which was always good enough to account for the dismieasal of the side for a small total. Apropes of small Norfolk totale, Cambridgeshire dismisesd Norfolk for 40 at Norwich in 1905, the principal factor being the bowling of the Rev. Hrincipal Gray. and in the late ninctices Arnold of Worcester, and an England howler, tock ceven Norfolk wickets for 9 rune at Worcester, the side being out for 28 of which $\theta$ were extras. We have gome recollection of a very small soore at Iakenham, in which the bowling of Woore at for the M.C.C. was the dominant leature, but we cannot at the moment trace the particulars. Marry White of Herts has also been aesociated with eome Norfolk breakdowne, and if the sun does any work at all during the next few days he will be in his element after the coakings the wickets have had recently.

Mertfordshire are theg attraction for the pening of the 29th Norwich Week, and they have a strong aide. G. G. Dumbleton and C. I'. Rudd have not, we believe, played previously for their county this egeon, and ther bring strength to the batting, and are above the average of change bowlers. Thurgar in the two matches last week was most praise worthy and full of promise, and Norfolk is fortunato in having three kropers of tho clare of S. D. Page, Fowler, and Thurgar. There is a prospect of the Norfolk batting beisz stronger for the remaining matches, and a glance at the names below should convince the Herte men that they ara mecting a betier eido than that which ther defeated at S.. Albans last month. T. H. ## ONLY 2f HOURS PLAT

Cricket àt Lakenham was only poesible late in the afternoon of yeaterday, and then only amid surroundings which rendered the game more of a hardship than a pleasure. Following upon the raine of Friday and Saturday the turd received a eovere eoaking on the eve of the twenty-ninth Norwich Cricket Week, /and yesterday morning the rain was still falling pitilessly from leaden skies. By noontime the weather ceemed shaping for improvement, but the grcund was so saturated that fow imagined it would be possible to make a etart that day with the first of the holiday fixtures. The wenther moreover, continued showery until after two o'clock; but aided by a strong breaze the grcund made a surprisingly quick recovery, and by ten minutes pact four the match was in progroses on a hastily prepared wicket eome distance to the loft of the eoddened pitch ociginally pot ready for the match. The wicket vas, of course, too dead to promise any help to the bowlers, and IV. H. Mareh, captaining the vieiting team in the absence of $H$. M. Harford, who has suffered a ead bercavement in the loss of a daughter, rendered his side good service by winning the toss, a detail of the game in which the new Norfolk captain has belin signally unfortunate. Only once this season has Norfolk had the opportunity of batting first, and as this happened at St . Alban's the Merts players did not consider themselves unduly favoured yesterday, but the Norfolk captain has more looway to make up in this direction than will be possible this seacon. The advantage of gaining first knook yesterday was not oo pronounced as might have bsen expected, and if Norfolk had made the most of their chances Herts would not now be in ouch a good position, for the wicket is scarcely likely to improve, and if it be permitted to dry it may play queerly in the lator stages of the game. The light roller had been run over the spot choven for the new pitch, and judging from the amount of "gardening" done by the batomen it was not wearing any better than could be expected. The bait.
came along at different paces and at rarying heights, and Golding, who had ample opportunity of forming an opinion, told the writer that it was by no means an easy, wicket. Golding, had the good fortune to be misced in Stevens, first over when he had made only one run. 1 o hit the ball round to fine leg and at a convenient height for an easy catch to the waiting fieldsman, but N. W. Stevens dropped the ball after having apparently eecured it in both hands. The mistake proved coctly and in oxtennation of thjis and subsequent errors it may be urged that the weather was very cold and the wind strong, conditions which do not make a mon yearn for catches. Shortly after Golding's let-of. Stevens had an opportunity of securing for himeelf the encouragement which is 50 valuable to a bowler, but to the general disappointment the Lynn man failed to hold an easy return from White. These mistakes occurred before 10 runs had been obtained, and no other opnortunity of capturing a wicket presented itself before the $100 \mathrm{ap}-$ neared.
