Time robbed Hertfordshire of two points in the return match with Norfolk this week, play being much shortened owing to rain. But against this one must in fairness set Norfolk's ill-luck in losing the toss, which resulted in their having to bat on a soft wicket, which became more difficult as the game went on. On Monday Herts., scoring freely on a wicket easy after rain, scored 183 for three wickets, White being not out 48 at the close. The West Herts. professional increased his score by 31 on Tuesday and, as at Hitchin, saw the whole side out. The visiting county owed much to the two professionals, who between them made 133 of the total of 213 from the bat. Norfolk made a fair beginning, but the substitution of March for Coleman, and later of Dumbolton for White, proved their undoing, and after the fall of the fourth wicket little resistance was offered to the bowling of these two amateurs, who each took four wickets, Marsh for 30 and Dumbolton for 10 runs. White secured four of the seven wickets which fell in Norfolk's second innings at a cost of 35 runs, and in the whole match bowled as many as 19 maiden overs. Brown, of Hitchin, had seven overs, from which only 14 runs were hit, but although bowling well failed to take a wicket.

Despite their defeat by Lincolnshire last week and by Suffolk early in the season, Hertfordshire nevertheless occupied second place in the Minor Counties Championship, table, as corrected up to July 31. Lincolnshire were first with a percentage of 72 points for five games played, while Hertfordshire's was 66 for one game more. With championship games in progress during the whole of the present week, the figures and the order of the clubs will necessarily bewaried before the week-end, but it may be of interest to print the record for the eastern division. Five points are counted for a win, and three for a win on the first innings:—

CRICKET TOPICS

THE NORWICH WEEK NORFOLK PROS-PECTS AGAINST HERTS. ANOTHER "CENTURY" BY COLLINSON. AN AP-PEAL SAVES OVERSTRAND.

It is pleasent to be able to congratulate the Norfolk eleven upon a well deserved victory in the championship. Suffolk, now rapidly approaching the end of their programme, have found it difficult to sustain the note struck by them in defeating Herts at Watford, but our neighbours are not the weakest of the counties in the Eastern group, and a victory over Suffolk is not a thing to be accomplished easily. Bedfordshire and Norfolk claimed that distinction last year, and Norfolk is the first county to lower Suffolk's colours this season. Twelve months ago the foundation of an eight wickots' triumph was laid by the fine bowling of Gibson, and in the subsequent proceedings Geoffrey Stevens played a big part. Curiously enough the same men were largely responsible for the satisfactory position in which Norfolk found themselves last Tueeday morning. Gibson has been bowling exceptionally well this season, and he accomplished his best piece of work on Monday in taking seven Suffolk wickets for 36 runs. If Geoffrey Stevens had been snapped up at third man, Norfolk might not have found it easy to have passed the Suffolk total, but as it was he put Norfolk safe, playing his second innings of over 80 against Suffolk this season. Some admirable bowling by Stevens of Lynn, who has never done anything better for Norfolk than his figures in the Suffolk second innings, and Smith put Norfolk on the right road, and the match was brought to a brilliant conclusion by the free batting of the brothers Stevens and the Rev. F. Meyrick-Jones. The clergyman made a highly successful first appearance for Norfolk. He is a fearless hitter, and the spectators who enjoyed the spectacle of the clergyman going for the Suffolk bowling will be sorry to learn that his absence in the North of Scotland will prevent him from playing in any of the remaining matches this season.

The fielding of the Norfolk eleven in the Suffolk match was full of sparkle and life, and the players are also entitled to be contratulated upon their smart catching. Both Gibson and Allsopp supported their own bowling by really splendid fielding, and one of the titbits of the match was Allsopp's stopping of a fast return from H. L. Wilson with his left hand, and the promptness and accuracy with which he threw the striker's wicket down in an attempt to effect a run out. The ball was driven back with such speed that it split the fleshy part of Allsopp's thumb. On the two following days the fielding honours were secured by the visiting team, and all round the display of the Harrow Wanderers was worthy of much admiration. There was much graceful ease and power in their batting, and the bowling was both difficult and effective. The amount of swerve produced by E. W. Mann was so remarkable that one of the batsmen described it as "uncanny." Geoffrey Stevens informed the writer that it was the most puzzling bowling he had played against since he had been in the Norfolk eleven. He was in a long time on Thureday morning, but he did not create the impression that he had mastered the bowling, which was always good enough to account for the dismissal of the side for a small total. Apropos of small Norfolk totals, Cambridgeshire dismissed Norfolk for 40 at Norwich in 1905, the principal factor being the bowling of the Rev. H. Gray, and in the late ninctics Arnold of Worcester, and an England bowler, tock seven Norfolk wickets for 9 runs at Worcester, the side being out for 28, of which 9 were extras. We have some recollection of a very small score at Lakenham, in which the bowling of Wootton for the M.C.C. was the dominant feature, but we cannot at the moment trace the particulars. Harry White of Herts has also been associated with some Norfolk breakdowns, and if the sun does any work at all during the next few days he will be in his element after the soakings the wickets have had recently.

Hertfordshire are the attraction for the opening of the 29th Norwich Week, and they have a strong side. G. G. Dumbleton and C. T. Rudd have not, we believe, played previously for their county this eegeon, and they bring strength to the batting, and are above the average of change bowlers. Since their easy victory over Norfolk at St. Alban's Herts have boaten Bedfordshire, whom they dismissed for 58 and 80; but they have gone down before Lincolnshire, who look like carrying off the divisional championship. E. T. Garnier and H. C. Dunell make welcome reappearances in the Norfolk team, and the side also includes

A. K. Watson and R. H. Fowler. The latter made a successful debut as wicketkeeper in the third match of the previous Norwich festival. He was in the Winchester XI. of 1908, and proceeded to Trinity College, Cambridge. The wicket keeping of R. W. Thurgar in the two matches last week was most praesworthy and full of promise, and Norfolk is fortunate in having three keepers of the class of S. D. Page, Fowler, and Thurgar. There is a prospect of the Norfolk batting being stronger for the remaining matchee, and a glance at the names below should convince the Herts men that they are meeting a better eide than that which they defeated at S. Albans last month. T. H. Horsfall's promising batting against the Harrow Wanderers has induced the committee to give a trial in a more important match, and his success would be keeniv appreciated. The comparative failure of Smith on recent wickets has led to his being rested, and the risk of being short of bowking has been lessened by the bad weather.

The Rev. J. G. At Overstrand, where C.E.Y.M.S. were the visitore, a sea fog, drenching showers, and hot sun of a few moments' duration alternated, and it was past four o'clock before a start could be made. He gave no chance until he was in the nineties, and he reached three figures by hitting a sizer. Carrow allowed themselves about two hours in which to get Thetford out, and Tyrrell again rose to the occasion; but Thetford could have been asved from defeat if they had chosen to plead bad weather, as it was raining when their eleventh bataman went to the wickets. NORFOLK v. HERTFORDSHIRE

HOME COUNTY'S NARROW ESCAPE,

There was sunshine at Lakenham yesterday, and after lunch the wind dropped, and the weather conditions were extremely pleasant. A sun dried wicket after rain is, however, not good for batting, and anticipations that the pitch would get more difficult were amply verified. The bowlers had much the best of it, and in the course of the day twenty-four wickets fell for an aggregate of 303 runs. Play began earlier than usual, as it was arranged to draw stumps at six o'clock in order to allow the Herts team to proceed to l'elizatowe for their match with Suffolk, and after five and a half hours' keen and interesting play Norfolk, with seven wickets gone in their second innings, were still 22 runs behind. The draw was therefore greatly in favour of the visitors, and with a little more time at their disposal they would probably have obtained a comfortable win. As it was, Norfolk deserve credit for playing an uphill game in the face of much ill-fortune, and

Gibson bowied extremely well yesterday morning, and it was largely que to his work that the seven outstanding ligts wickets were captured for so little as 55 runs. White carried his but right through the innings, and aithough not wholly free from blemish it was a splendid example of his skill as a batsman. If White had followed this up with a fine bowling performance we should not have been surprised. It seemed to be his wicket, although perhaps a little too slow, but although he bowled very finely and kept the batsmen in tenterhooks, his success was not phenomenal. The first five Norfolk batsmen did quite well, considering all things, and with 110 on the board for three wickets, and Norman Stevens and A. K. Watson taking root, there was even a possibility of Norfolk heading the Herts total of 230, but from this point G. G. Dumbalton and W. H. Marsh carried everything before them, and in half an hour the remaining eeven wickets fell for the addition of 15 runs. Norfolk were put in again with the task of lasting out nearly an hour and a half, and in saving the game they owed much to H. C. Dunell and Geoffrey Stevens.

Overnight, White had got within two of his half-century, having gone in at the beginning of the 'hminge, and yesterday he completed his fifty in the course of the over and a half, which had been bowled when a shower sent the players to shelter for a quarter of an hour. Turning out again shortly after eleven Norfolk had every reason to be satisfied with the way in which the game want during the next half hour, Gibson getting rid of four batsen for the addition of thirty runs. Hootained his first victim by knocking back the leg stump of R. B. Cowley's wicket, the old llarrovian having been at the wickets nearly forty minutes for a very useful 24. D. J. Cassavetti came i

the first occuring when he had made only five runs, and the occord when he had been in nearly two hours. Overnight Stevens had taken three wickets for 45, and safer catching would have made his figures very much better. He failed to add to his crop of victims yesterday, and Gibson, who had bowled 18 overs on Monday for 41 runs without getting a wicket, improved his natch record tremendously by taking six of the last seven wickets yesterday in 16.3 overs (7 maidens) for 32 runs—a very good performance indeed.

Norfolk commenced bitting at ivenity minutes to one, E. T. Garnier and II. C. Dunell geing in the face the bowling of White and Coleman. Bulling from the top end, and against the wind, White required most careful watching. The ball turned a good deal from the off, but did it rather slowly. Dunell made three lovely straight drives, the ball on two occasions pitching over the seats. With twenty on the board Coleman gave way to W. H. Marsh, another slow break bowler, and with the lotal at 31 Garnier, who made one fine off drive, was bowled by White. Two runs later, and five minutes before the luncheon interval. Norfolk lost Dunell's wicket, the Garboldishom player being dismissed by a catch at the wicket, for which there was a general appeal. The brothers Stevens were together at the adjournment when the score was 38 for two wickets.

After the interval the brothers Stevens stayed together for half an hour, in which time they nearly doubled the score, runs coming chiefly from the younger player, and at 54 Coleman came on again at the pavilion end. "G. A." was in danger of being run out through a smart piece of fielding by Titebmarsh, and a little later he was nearly bowled by a ball from White, which beat the bat and the wicket feeper and went for 2 byes. The 3rd wicket partnership had added 40 in thirty-six minutes when Geoffrey Stevens had the mislortune to the total of 73 was a valuable 25, which had taken him over 40 minutes to collect. A. K. Watson followed in, and the headmaster of Inswich School, who w

brillant catch with his back to the striker. Allsopp crossed over to be bowled next ball, and a piece of stumping dismissed Stevens, the innings closing at twelve minutes past four for 125, the last seven wickets having fallen in half an hour for 13 runs. Following on at twenty-five minutes to five, 114 runs in arrears, and with eighty-five minutes to play. Norfolk made a bad start, Dumbelton getting Garnier leg before with his second ball with only 2 runs scored. Geoffrey Stevens then helped H. C. Dunnell to add 32 for the second wicket, both players making some admirable shots. Stevens hit especially well to leg, and he fell to a catch at mid on off a ball from White, which he tried to get round. With the advent of Norman Stevens the bowlers, White and Dumbelton, changed ends, and from this stagethings went ill with the home county. Norman Stevens was well caught at deep mid on, and A. K. Watson, after one good drive to the off, was bowled by White, who followed this up by dismissing Fowler and Dunell. The latter was sixth out at 69, and his stay of seventy minutes went a long way towards saving the game. Run-making was only of secondary importance, but there was much to appreciate in Dunell's entting and driving, whilst he also played well

to leg. Coleman came on at the top end to bowl his fastest in the hope of capturing the four remaining wickets. (Horsfall hit him splendidly to leg, and was bowled next ball, and Allsopp joined his captain with ten minutes still to play. Happily this pair succeeded in averting the impending disaster, and in the last over of the match Wilson cracked Coleman twice to the on boundary, and when stumps and the match were drawn the score was 92 for seven wickets.

NORFOLK v. HERTFORDSHIRE

ONLY 21 HOURS' PLAY.

Cricket at Lakenham was only possible late in the afternoon of yesterday, and then only amid surroundings which rendered the game more of a hardship than a pleasure. Following upon the rains of Friday and Saturday the turf received a severe soaking on the eve of the twenty-ninth Norwich Cricket Week, and yesterday morning the rain was still falling pitilesely from leaden skies. By noontime the weather seemed shaping for improvement, but the ground was so saturated that few imagined it would be possible to make a start that day with the first of the holiday fixtures. The weather moreover, continued showery until after two o'clock; but aided by a strong breeze the ground made a surprisingly quick recovery, and by ten minutes pact four the match was in progress on a hastily prepared wicket some distance to the left of the soddened pitch originally got ready for the match. The wicket was, of course, too dead to promise any help to the bowlers, and W. H. Marsh, captaining the visiting team in the absence of H. M. Harford, who has suffered a sad bereavement in the loss of a daughter, rendered his side good service by winning the toss, a detail of the game in which the new Norfolk captain has been signally unfortunate. Only once this season has Norfolk had the opportunity of batting first, and as this happened at St. Alban's the Herts players did not consider themselves unduly favoured yesterday, but the Norfolk captain has more looway to make up in this direction than will be possible this The advantage of gaining first knock yesterday was not so pronounced as might have been expected, and if Norfolk had made the been expected, and if Norfolk had made the most of their chances Herts would not now be in such a good position, for the wicket is scarcely likely to improve, and if it be permitted to dry it may play queerly in the later stages of the game. The light roller had been run over the spot chosen for the new pitch, and judging from the amount of "gardening" done by the batsmen it was not wearing any better than could be expected. The baticame along at different paces and at varying heights, and Golding, who had ample opportunity of forming an opinion, told the writer that it was by no means an easy wicket. Golding had the good fortune to be missed in Stevens' first over when he had made only one run. He hit the ball round to fine leg and at a convenient height for an easy catch to the waiting fieldsman, but N. W. Stevens dropped the ball after having apparently secured it in both hands. The mistake proved costly, and in extenuation of this and subsequent errors it may be urged that the weather was very cold and the wind strong, conditions which do not make a mun yearn for catches. Shortly after Golding's let-off, Stevens had an opportunity of securing for himself the encouragement which is so valuable to a bowler, but to the general disappointment the Lynn man failed to hold an easy return from White. These mistakes occurred before 10 runs had been obtained, and no other opportunity of capturing a wicket presented itself before the 100 appeared. At the outset Golding and White showed a disposition to score freely, but on several occasions the ball dropped only just clear of the fieldsmen, and more caution was subsequently shown. Stevens, who had the wind behind him, was especially difficult to hit, but neither Gibson nor Allsopp could maintain a length against the wind, and Golding made some excellent forcing strokes on both sides of the wicket, and he and White both scored cleverly to leg. T. H. Horsfall was utilised early as a change from the left-handed bowling of the three professionals, but without success, and most of their chances Herts would not now be

with the total at 103, Golding hit a ball from Stevens in the direction of mid-off, and B. K. Wilson secured a hot catch at the second attempt. Golding's good innings included seven & and three 3s. From this point Norfolk made better progress, and Stevens captured two more good wickets in the last forty minutes. He missed taking White's wicket a second time through the failure of D. J. Cassaretti, who was fielding substitute for the absent A. K. Watson, failing to take a catch near the square-leg boundary, and off the next ball G. G. Dunibelton had a life at mid-off, but was bowled next ball. Altogether this was rather a sensational over. C. if. Titchmarsh came in, hit Stevens finely to leg, but shortly afterwards he mishit a ball from the Lynn man, and was cleverly caught by Allsopp running back from extra-cover. Tis third wicket fell at 133, and a quarter of an hour afterwards stumps were drawn with the total at 153, R. B. Cowley having collected 12 by some good hits, and White being not out 48 as the result of two hours and a quarter's play. White, who made one sweet cut and some good drives, played very steadily during the last half-he ir, but hitting out at the fifth ball of the last over of the day from Allsopp he had a narrow secape of being caught. B. K. Wilson jumping up and touching the ball with the fingers of his right hand. The wretched weather naturally spoiled whatever chance the club had of securing a good gate, and it is hoped the weather will be brighter during the rest of the week. Play will be resumed this morning at half-prest ten.


