## THE "NORWICH WEEK."

### NORFOLK V. LINCOLNSHIRE

#### GREAT BOWLING FEATS AT LAKENHAM.

##### LINCOLNSHIRE'S BRILLIANT WIN.

The advantage which Norfolk obtained during Wednesday's play in this match at Lakenham, was swept away in extraordinary fashion yesterday morning by some superb bowling by E. T. Cooke. The old Belle Vue boy, and a brother of Mr. John Cooke, the Master of the Norwich Staghoude, enjoyed a great personal triumph, and there was a touch of irony about the wrecking of the hopes of the Norfolk eleven by a fast bowler possessing a birth qualification for their own county. It is possible the wicket may not have been so good as the players imagined, and the amount of break which Smith was able to employ, which incidentally contributed to the importance of "Mr. Extras," seemed to point to a something which helped the bowlers. The change from the recent slow wicket to a fast one may also have contributed to the downfall of the side, but these things, taken singly or in combination, could scarcely have produced such startling effects if the bowling had not been exceptionally good. Expert evidence is strong in support of the superior quality of Cooke's bowling. The Lincoln amateur attributed much of his success to the masterly way in which he disguised a change of pace, and on the testimony of the umpire and those batsmen whose stay at the wickets was sufficiently long to enable them to form an opinion, the swerve from the off was particularly puzzling, whilst more than one batsman was beaten by the ball coming "the other way"—breaking from leg with no perceptible change of action on the part of the bowler. A few weeks back Cooke defeated five of the best Herts batsmen in a similarly easy and cheap manner, and there can be no question that in his day he is capable of putting up a big performance. Yesterday was Cooke's day, and in an hour the Norfolk side were dismissed for a paltry 33 runs. Cooke's performance quite overshadowed the splendid achievement of Smith, who took nine Lincoln wickets for 63 runs. The home side gained nothing by Smith's fine work, for Lincoln pulled the game round in magnificent style, and though they were a little anxious when their second, third, and fourth wickets all fell at the same figure, they won the match early in the afternoon in brilliant style.

Williams and Geeson went on with the Lincolnshire innings, in which 112 runs had been scored overnight for eight wickets, in reply to Norfolk's first innings of 175. Williams had shown such good defence on Wednesday afternoon that the visitors had some hope that with the assistance of Geeson and Allen the Norfolk total would be passed. Smith, however, settled the question by capturing the last two wickets in less than half an hour for the addition of 22 runs. Williams claimed 9 of the 13 runs which had been scored when Smith broke through his defence, and with Smith appealing successfully against Geeson for leg before, the innings closed at twenty-three minutes to twelve for 134. Lincolnshire were batting altogether eight minutes under three hours, the runs being made off eighty-one overs. Half of these were bowled from the pavilion end by Smith, and he captured all but one of the ten wickets. It was a splendid achievement, and we cannot recall an important match in which his bag of victims was so large. At one time he had taken six wickets for 28, and at the close of the innings, his nine wickets, of which six were clean bowled, had cost him no more than 7 runs apiece. Gibson's steadiness at the other end can be realised from the fact that he bowled 33 overs, more than half of which were maidens, for 31 runs.

Going in shortly before 12 with a useful lead of 41 Norfolk had a very bad half-hour against the bowling of E. T. Cooke, the Norfolk born man, who now lives at Spalding, taking the first five wickets very cheaply. The position would have been even worse if Williams had accepted a chance of catching the Rev. J. G. McCormick off a bigish hit in the country off his first scoring stroke. The total was only 10, however, when Cooke started on his wicket-taking mission by yorking E. T. Garnier. H. C. Dunell joined the clergyman, and 15 valuable runs were added before McCormick was smartly caught low down at third man. From this point the bowlers carried everything before them, as with one run added Cooke bowled the two brothers Stevens and Allsopp in one over. Dunell drove Cooke grandly to the off, and then with the total at 35 Cooke caught and bowled Dunell and bowled B. K. Wilson in the same over. The 8th wicket also fell at the same

total, R. H. Fowler being bowled by Broughton, who 3 runs later appealed successfully against Stevens for leg before wicket. Smith stopped the first ball he received, but left his crease in an attempt to hit the next ball and was smartly stumped. The last eight wickets went down for 13 runs, and the innings, which lasted exactly an hour, closed before one o'clock for 38 runs. Broughton polished off the innings by taking the last three wickets in nine balls for 3 runs, but the chief factor in the collapse was the fine bowling of Cooke. Bowling a quick pace from the top end and with a cross breeze helping his swerve he proved very deadly, and in the course of eight overs he took the first seven wickets for 16 runs. Many fine bowling feats have been recorded this season, but this achievement of the old Belle Vue boy on a plumb wicket is especially noteworthy. The Norfolk total of 38 is one less than the side made when the batting broke down at St. Alban's and Newmarket last month.

Wanting eighty runs to win Lincolnshire commenced the last innings of the match at twelve minutes past one, the Rev. C. G. Ward and Day batting to the bowling of Gibson and Smith. Runs came steadily, the clergyman making one fine drive from Smith, and with 20 up the latter gave way to Stevens. Gibson occasionally got the ball past the bat, but at lunch the pair were together with the total at 24.

After the interval Lincolnshire went steadily forward to victory. Ward and Day occasionally hit powerfully in front of the wicket. Day, when 18, was missed by the Lynn professional at mid-on off Gibson, but shortly afterwards the clergyman was finely caught by the Norfolk cleric at mid-off, McCormick reaching forward and taking the ball so close to the ground that the batsman appealed to the umpire before retiring. The total was 47, and Broughton came in to collect 8 before being bowled at 60 by Smith. T. Hedworth was Day's next partner but without a run being added Day was magnificently caught at mid-off by McCormick off a beefy drive. It was the last ball of an over by Gibson, and the next ball delivered by Smith from the opposite wicket bowled Hedworth, the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th wickets thus falling at the same total—60. With Thompson and Williams together the cricket became very slow, both batsmen adopting cautious methods. Thompson was once beaten by a ball from Smith, which just missed the wicket, but the pair obtained the necessary runs without further loss and at twenty minutes past three Lincolnshire had secured a brilliant victory by six wickets.

THE NORWICH WEEK.

NORFOLK v. LINCOLNSHIRE

FINE BOWLING BY SMITH.

The revival of the meetings between these counties, after a lapse of thirteen years, was associated with warm, sunny weather, and the attendance at Lakenham yesterday was, so far, the best of the Week. Lincolnshire have done extremely well since they made a successful application to be transferred from the Northern to the Eastern group, and it was doubtless a feeling of confidence in the strength of their bowling and the probability of the wicket playing better and faster in the afternoon, which induced the Lincolnshire captain to put Norfolk in, the home county having once again lost the toss. It is customary to regard a procedure of that kind in the nature of a risky experiment, and despite the fact that Norfolk scored 50 runs without losing a wicket, they were forty minutes later in a bad position, half the side being out for 68. Misjudgment in running had brought about the undoing of two good batsmen—the brothers Stevens—but at this stage the visitors were doubtless well satisfied with the result of their policy. Two other wickets were captured before 100 runs had been made, and then the game underwent a marked change, R. H. Fowler and Stevens coming to the rescue of the side, and putting on 70 runs for the eighth wicket. Both played excellent cricket, Fowler especially hitting well, and with great freedom. Thanks to this pair, and the batting of the Rev. J. G. McCormick and E. T. Garner at the beginning of the innings, and B. K. Wilson's useful knock, Norfolk completed 175. It was a much better total than at one time seemed probable, and but for the three unfortunate run outs it might have been bigger. As it was, the visitors were probably disappointed with the way in which things had turned out, and half an hour afterwards they were in a worse position, Smith bowling down their first three wickets for 29 runs. Smith continued to carry everything before him, notwithstanding the wearing down tactics pursued by the later batsmen. He kept an excellent length, and made the ball turn a good deal from the off, and the first seven wickets all fell to his skill, the wicket being hit on five occasions. Smith bowled unchanged for nearly two hours and a-half, and it was largely due to his fine work that Norfolk secured such a good position, Lincolnshire, with only two wickets upstanding, being still 63 runs behind.

At the outset the wicket did not appear to present any special difficulties to the batsmen, and the Rev. J. G. McCormick, who was making his first appearance of the season for Norfolk, and E. T. Garner made excellent progress, runs being scored at a steady pace off some good bowling, and against keen fielding. E. T. Cooke, an old Belle Vue boy who was born at Litcham, bowled fast from the top end, but his swerve was not so pronounced as usual. The veteran, Geeson, operated from the other wicket, and with 20 on the board Geeson crossed over, and Broughton, a slow leg break bowler, who plays League cricket in Lancashire, took up the attack at the pavilion end. Shortly afterwards Riley, who bowled so well against Cambridgeshire and Suffolk, was brought on at the top end. A few overs later the fielding side captured their first wicket, the clergyman being well caught at long off by Williams off a good hit. The score was exactly 50, and the clergyman, who made one fine drive from Geeson, the ball pitching over the seats by the screen, also cut with skill and neatness both square and late, and played an admirable innings of 27. The first wicket partnership had lasted five minutes under the hour, and during the latter part of it the fielding side were probably doubting the wisdom of their captain's decision not to bat. The good start certainly promised well for Norfolk, but after the departure of McCormick everything for a time went against the home county. Nine runs later E. T. Garner was beaten and bowled by a good ball from Riley. The Quadenham player had batted for seventy minutes in his best style, and his 26 was a most valuable knock. Shortly afterwards H. C. Duncell was bowled by another good ball from Riley. Worse misfortune followed, for in the course of a few minutes the brothers Stevens lost their wickets through mistakes in running. Backing up well, "N.W." was half way down the pitch for a risky short run, which his brother declined to attempt, the ball having been played in front of short leg, who picked it up smartly and returned it to

the bowler's wicket before "N.W." could get back. B. K. Wilson came in, and calling G. A. Stevens for a stroke towards mid-off the "hope of the side" was just beaten by a smart return which was well gathered by Allen, and the wicket was lost by a narrow margin. Norfolk were going through a really bad time, and it seemed that their luck was quite out, but just before the interval Wilson could congratulate himself upon a let off near the wicket, and at the adjournment the score stood at 75 for five wickets.

After the interval B. K. Wilson made some good hits, and the score was taken to 96 when Broughton beat Allsopp with a slow ball which turned a good deal, and 2 runs later the Norfolk captain was caught at slip. Coming when it did Wilson's contribution of 20 was very valuable. R. H. Fowler sent up the 100 by a fine straight drive off Riley, and continuing to hit splendidly all round the wicket he was associated with Stevens in an extremely useful partnership. Runs came very freely on the faster ground, and Geeson and Cooke took up the bowling. Riley re-appeared at the top end just before Fowler sent up 150, the third 50 having been added inside half an hour. With 3 men on the boundary many of Fowler's powerful strokes only produced singles. Several other bowling changes were made, and the eighth wicket partnership had realised 70 runs in fifty-two minutes when Stevens was finely thrown out by Broughton in attempting a short single to cover-point. It was an unfortunate ending to a splendid stand, and the sound batting of Stevens at a critical stage was most praiseworthy. Gibson came in, and Fowler completed his 50 out of 76 in an hour. Gibson's career was cut short by a brilliant catch at point, the Rev. C. G. Ward jumping up and securing the ball with his right hand. The end was near, for soon after the arrival of Smith Fowler failed to get well hold of a ball from Cooke, and Crookes, running back from mid-on, brought off a good catch. Fowler's confident and successful batting at a time when the fortunes of his side were under a cloud was deserving of the highest praise. He played a forceful and bright innings, putting a lot of power into his strokes, and generally kept the ball on the ground. The majority of his 53 runs were made in front of the wicket, although he occasionally hit cleanly to leg. In at the fall of the sixth wicket at 96 Fowler was last out at 175, having batted sixty-nine minutes, hitting three 4s, one 3, and nine 2s. The innings, which closed at thirteen minutes to four, lasted three hours and eleven minutes. Riley was the only one of the four bowlers tried who captured more than two wickets, and Riley obtained his three at an average cost of 15 runs.

The visitors went in at five minutes past four, the Rev. C. G. Ward, who took a century off the Herts bowlers, and Day, who has played for Notts, opening the innings to the bowling of Gibson and Smith. The start was very encouraging for the home county, as in his third over Smith bowled the clergyman when the score was only 3, and 9 runs later Smith bowled Day. Broughton and T. Hedworth then came together, and the former, when 5, made a lofty stroke to the on, where N. W. Stevens failed to make the proffered catch. Smith was the bowler, and the Wigan professional showed his appreciation of the let off by hitting two spanking fours, but Smith had his revenge in the same over by bowling Broughton, the third wicket falling at 29. W. E. Thompson went in, and the captain helped Hedworth to check the success of the fielding side. Cautious methods were adopted, and the score rose very slowly to 59, at which stage Smith secured his fourth wicket, Thompson being caught at mid-off. Five runs later Smith bagged another victim by bowling Hedworth. No one seemed comfortable at the wickets, and Smith frequently beat batsman and wicketkeeper by the width of his break, and eventually Fowler stood back to him. Gibson, who was relieved for a time by Stevens and Allsopp, also just missed hitting the wicket on a few occasions. Smith, however, continued to go through the side, and when he bowled E. T. Cooke at 69 he had taken six wickets for 28 runs. Riley and R. E. Williams, a small player still in his teens, then made a really good effort to put Lincolnshire in a better position. Williams early on had a life at mid-off, and the pair remained together for three-quarters of an hour, in which time they added 31 runs by sound play. It was Smith who broke up the partnership by the aid of Allsopp, who made a good catch at mid-on. Riley's place was taken by J. E. Crookes, the board showing seven wickets for 100, of which 42 had been scored from Smith. A quarter of an hour remained for play, and barely ten minutes after the fall of the seventh wicket a smart piece of stumping got rid of Crookes, and credited Gibson with his first wicket. Geeson and Williams played over the few remaining minutes, although just before the time for drawing stumps there was a confident and general appeal against Williams for a catch at the wicket, Smith being the bowler. The umpire decided in favour of the bat, and at the close the score was 112 for eight wickets as the outcome of two hours and twenty-five minutes' play, Williams having been in fifty minutes for 17.
