## OBITUARY.

## Mr. A. ('. Gumlemard.

Mr . Arthur George Guillemard, an old Rugbeian, died at Eltham on Saturday in his sixty-fourth year. He will be best remembered as co-founder (in 1862) with the late Mr. Arthur Wilson, of Derby, of the Butterflies, of which he was for many years the honorary secretary. As a player he did not gain fame, but he was a great lover of the game and in 1894 published Rugòy School Crickrt Scures, 1831-1893, under the auspices of the Old Rugbeian Society. When travelling in Australia in 1876 he saw in a Syduey publication the score of the match supposed to have been played during 1874-5 between Ulster and Macquarie, wherein the former were stated to have made 1,238 in an innings, and not knowing it was a hoax, caused it to be inserted in Lillywhite's Crick ters' Companion for 1877. Mr. Guillemard was very well known in the Rugby foothall world.

Mr. Cbarles Albert Stein died suddenly at Croydon on Monday in his tifty-ninth year

after a long period of ill-health. He was born at Tulse Hill and bad been a frequenter of the Oval for half-a-century. His convection with the Surrey County C.C. dated back to 1879 , and he had served on the committee without a break since 188\%. As a small boy he received hints from Griffith, Caffyn, Cæsar, Mortlock and others, aud in later years took part in a lot of club cricket, especially for Surrey Club and Ground and the Burlington Wanderers. During Mr. Alcock's serious illness six years ago he undertook the secretarial duties in an honorary capacity. A Chat with him was published in Cricket of August 20th, 1903.

Mr. R. Moncheiffe.
The death is announced at Durban, S.uth Africa, on Friday last of Mr. Ronald

Moncreiffe, fourth son of the late Sir T. Moncreiffe, Bart., in bis forty-fifth year. He was in the Harrow Eleven in 1881 and 1882. being contemporary with E. M. Hadow and H. T. Hewett. In the former year he made a pair of spectacles against Eton, but in the latter scored 4 and 44. He has been described as "A capital bat with a stubborn defence, and good cutting powers: a fastmedium bowler with a good length, and a fair field." In 1899 .1900 he served in the Boer War as Captain in the Worcestersbire Yeomanry, and was besieged in Mafeking. He was born in 18C4.
