SPORTS AND PASTIMES.

There was cricket on each of the six days, the County meeting successively Norfolk, Suffolk, and the M.C.C. In the first match Herts did well, and time alone prevented them from utterly defeating Norfolk. As it was, they finished up three points to the good.

But a different tale has to be told when we come to the match with suffolk. This County played better cricket than its neighbours in East Anglia, and a splendlid game was seen at Felixstowe on the first day; Suffolk made 218, and Herts lost seven whekets for 91 runs. Next morning the remaining batsmen were dismissed for 42 runs, so that Suffolk had a lead of 85. Their men did a little slogging, and soon put up 202 for the loss of five wickets. Herts were left with the task of getting 288 runs in two hours and a half. The earlier batsmen tried to force the pace, and soon succumbed to Penfold and Trudgett, and in the end—15 minutes before the time for drawing stumps—the last wicket fell at 170.

CRICKET.

Suffolk's chances of finishing top of the Eastern Counties' Division connected with the Minor Counties' Championship were dispelled last month, but it was hoped that, with strong rems at their command, they would have won both their matches last week, so that they would never be something approaching the position they hold last sea on. But their inability to hold their own against Lincolnshize last Monday and Tuesday, at Ipswich, has resulted in their remaining very low down in the table, in spite of their fine victory later in the week against Herttordshire, at Felixstowe. Lincolnarie are new to the Division this year, and they have been so ext.emely fortunate in their matches that they will in all probability come out top. They have not struck me as being superior to any of the other counties in the Division, and much of their success has been due to two men—the Rev. C. G. Ward, probably one of the finest forcing bate playing in the second-class counties, and E. T. Cooke, a fast lowler, who has the knack of sending down some nasty swerving yorkers, which gain for him many wickets. The others have not turned out to be over reliable, and they must be classed as an uneven side. Without wishing to belittle their doings, I would venture to assert that the side Suffolk had our against them last week, and with Penfold sound, would defeat them five times out of six.

Cold—in fact, almost wintry—weather on Bank Holiday doubtless kept many away from the match, but as it was, the attendance constituted in record for county cricket, about 400 people, paying for admission. The match had been well billed, and Mr William Kemp, one of the Executive, deserves the thanks of the Assacration for the work he did in making the best arrangements for any match ever held in the town. Had the weather been warm, there is not much doubt that his efforts would have been rewarded with a gate of close upon a thousand

As for the game, it was deadly dull. The wet weather was all against good cricket, but that is not sufficient excuse for Suffolk getting out for 82 runs. Some of the batsmen throw their wickets away by attempting to pull short pitched balls, and none of them really looked like getting runs. Like Suffolk, Lincolnshire made a fairly good first wicket start, and but for a piece of bad umpiring the visitors would only have been 21 runs on. Allen, the last man in, gave a palpable catch to C. S. Wilson at short slip, and the fieldsman walked towards the pavilion. The Lincolnshire captain, who was at the other end, appealed to the umpire, and that official gave it as his opinion that the ball went off Allen's pad. This was after Allen had laughingly remarked to the cut.

The mistake did not turn out so serious as it might have done had Suffolk been able to run up a respectable total in their second innings. They certainly showed a slight improvement on their initial display, but not much, only J. F. Ireland and O. II. Walters playing at all worthly, and Lincolnshire had the fairly easy task of making 66 to win. But for the Rev. C. G. Ward they would probably have had to fight hard, but the clergyman made runs so quickly that he made 41 of the required number, and his side won by seven wickets. Lincolnshire went on to Norwich, and after having all the worst of the opening day's play, got Norfolk out for 38 in their second innings, and pulled the game out of the fire.

Somehow or other Suffolk always manage to win against Hertfordshire, who last year were top of the division, and who this will probably be runners up to Lincolnshire. Last week's win was probably due to the mistaken policy of muting Suffolk in to bat, for the wicket up to lunch time on the first day played quite ensily, and a valuable 94 for the loss of one wicket was made by them. O. H. Walters and J. F. Ireland batted in fine style, and the former, who has already gained his authentic colours at Oxford, should stand a good chance of getting his blue next senson, should he maintain his form. Up to the present Walters has not been shle to devote a great deal of time to the same, but he knows how to play it and scores well all round the wicket without taking risks. Another very nice innings, and quite the prettiest to watch, was the 32 by S. Hill-Wood, whilst F. H. Mustard and A. H. Lang rendered useful service, so that the first innings realised 218. With the exception of White, Herts did badly, and were all disposed of for 133. White made only one stroke in his 51 not out which was in the nature of almose, that being a catch behind the wicket, although he had a frightful narrow escape of sharing the same fate as 4 tolding, who had the misfortune to be twice run out in the match.

Suffolk went the right way to work to win, for after the earlier batsmen had laid the foundation for a useful score, the Captain (F. H. Biustard) and S. Hill-Wood hit out with a will, so that Herts had no fower than 288 to get in just under two and a half nours in order to win. It should be noted that the seven Suffolk players who batted all reached double figures, and that in addition to the pair mentioned
