

CRICKETERS AND THE BUDGET.

The following correspondence has been issued in connection with the Marylebone Club and the Budget :-

" Aug. 16, 1909.

" Sir—I am not in a position at present to publish the correspondence that has passed between the Chancellor of the Exchequer and myself with reference to the petition sent to the M.C.C. asking for exemption for cricket and other recreation clubs from the operations of the proposed Finance Act.

" Lest, however, cricketers, football players, and other athletes have been lulled into a feeling of false security by an amendment published in the Press which may appear to exempt cricket and other recreation grounds from taxation under Clause 10 (undeveloped land duty), I should like to point out that unless exemption is also secured for such grounds from Clauses 1 and 2 (increment value duty), they must inevitably in most cases cease to exist.

" In order to provide recreation for those who live in towns, recreation grounds must of necessity be within reasonable distance of those who desire to use them. But this proximity to towns will, in the ordinary course of events, entail an increasing value. The charge on this increment is to be a tax of 20 per cent. on the increased value, to be levied at intervals.

" As the State has not yet accepted the responsibility of providing adequate opportunities for the physical training of the youth of the country, a result of this tax will be to remove such opportunities as are now provided by those who believe in physical training as being a valuable factor in the formation of national character.

" It cannot be expected that the owners of the freehold, even if they could afford it, would pay the tax without some return from their tenants. In many cases the tenants, i.e., the agents using the grounds, can afford but little more than their 'bus or train fare, and so the grounds will be sacrificed to the builder—a doubtful advantage to the community. Clauses 1 and 2, as they stand, seem to be ambiguous, and, in order to ascertain the exact position of cricket and other recreation grounds, I have ventured to send the accompanying letter to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.—Yours, &c.,

(Copy of letter sent to Mr. W. H. Clark, Secretary to the Chancellor of the Exchequer.)

" Dear Sir,—I have to thank you for your letter of August 13. I am left, however, in a difficulty as to the position of cricket and recreation grounds, and am uncertain whether I should advise the owners and occupiers thereof that their anxiety is unnecessary. I do not know of any ground that is carried on at a profit or 'with a view to the payment of a dividend or profits.'

" It seems to me that all such grounds are carried on for 'public purposes,' and nearly all for 'charitable purposes,' seeing that they meet a public demand and are supported in a great measure by those who recognise such demand and contribute towards its expense, without looking to any personal return.

" I am not sure, however, that this interpretation would be placed upon Clause 25 by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and I should be very grateful if the meaning could be made clear to us.

" I have received up to the present time

resolutions of support from clubs, mostly in two English counties, representing nearly 100,000 members. There are about thirty more counties in England with which I am in touch, the returns from which will in some cases be delayed.

" The athletic grounds in Scotland and Ireland have asked to be allowed to throw in their support. You will, in these circumstances, I am sure, understand my desire to allay an anxiety which covers so large an area.

" I am without, I hope, any breach of confidence giving this letter to the Press, so that the owners and occupiers of cricket and recreation grounds may realise that their position is at present insecure.

The excessive heat of the sun necessitated retiring the bowlers frequently, but the soldiers, notwithstanding the discomfort, were ever at the start.

The home team went to the wickets first, and when the score had been carried to 66, Vibart, who acted as stumper, had to leave his post owing to an injury to his hand; his place being taken by Rogers. At luncheon the score stood at 112, and on re-opening Vibart again took his place behind the wicket, and the home team's innings was closed for 255. Cornwall went to bat, and opened in a very confident manner, putting on 129 for five wickets before stumps were drawn. The match was continued on Tuesday in ideal weather. Cornwall now fell to pieces, the whole side being dismissed for 222, Carmarthen leading by 33 on the first innings, Jack Davies being almost unplayable. Carmarthenshire felt somewhat exuberant when they opened their second innings. They, however, played cautiously, and for awhile there was a monotonous sequence of maiden overs. The excessive heat necessitated relieving the bowlers frequently. After the third wicket had fallen the batsmen played with more confidence, and declared at 271, when Gee was still defying all the bowlers. Cornwall's second innings was opened by Bickford-Smith and Tressawna. The former batted magnificently, and treated the bowlers with scant courtesy. CARMARTHEN DO WELL.

CYRIL MORGAN'S FINE HITTING AGAINST CORNWALL.

Result of corresponding match last year:—Cornwall, 145 and 268 for two wickets; Carmarthenshire, 118 and 91 for eight wickets. A drawn game, but Cornwall gained three points on the first innings.

The return match between Carmarthenshire and Cornwall in connection with the Minor Counties' Competition was opened at Llanelly on Monday in beautiful weather. Percy Rees and Ike Evans opened favourably for the home team against the bowling of Hawken and Whiting. Both men kept well together until 66 runs were recorded, when Percy Rees fell a victim to Harvey, leaving the score at 66-1-33. He had, however, given three previous chances to the visitors, two to the stumper and one in mid-field. Will Davies, who succeeded him, had a very short life being disposed of within a couple of overs by Harvey—76-2-2. In the next over Ike Evans was bowled by Tresauna without further addition to the score. The visitors had up to now put on four different bowlers. Cyril Morgan was in fine fettle, hitting up the grand score of 74, which included nine 4's. He was highly praised by the Cornwall men at the close of the game.

Tresauna and Bickford-Smith, who opened for Cornwall, did not fare badly, both men playing good cricket against the bowling of Gee and Davies. Tresauna hit freely round the wicket, but was eventually bowled by C. Morgan, who had in the mean time temporarily substituted Gee. The succeeding players were being rapidly disposed of, and between 4.30 and 6.30, when the stumps were drawn, five wickets were down. Scores:—

CARMARTHEN DRAW.

SPLENDID BATTING IN MATCH WITH CORNWALL.

Result of corresponding match last year:—Cornwall, 145 and 268 for two wickets; Carmarthenshire, 118 and 91 for eight wickets. A drawn game, but Cornwall gained three points on the first innings.

On resuming their first innings at Llanelly on Tuesday the Cornwall men gave a very indifferent exhibition for within an hour's play—through the capital bowling of Gee and J. Davies—the six remaining players were disposed of for 33 runs, thus enabling Carmarthenshire to commence their second innings with a lead of 33 runs. Vibart and Meyrick resumed the second day's play, the former recording an additional 16 runs to his score of the previous day before he was bowled off Gee.

Carmarthenshire, also, did not open their second innings auspiciously, the first three bats being disposed of for 37 runs. Cliff Bowen, however, gave a good exhibition, his total of 48 including ten 4's. Gee was also a good bat, and would possibly have secured his century had the innings not been declared. He hit out in divers directions, and on one occasion, with a vigorous effort, the ball was hurled into the old foot-ball field.

Bedford Smith and H. Tresauna, who opened Cornwall's second innings, treated the attack from J. Davies and Gee with scant ceremony, and their play offered a striking contrast to the indifferent display given by their colleagues on resuming their first innings earlier in the day, when six wickets were disposed of within an hour. They went to the wickets about 4.30, and up to six o'clock, when the game was declared drawn, Smith had exceeded his century, which included nineteen 4's. Scores:—

CORNWALL v. CARMARTHENSHIRE.

CYRIL MORGAN'S FINE BATTING.

Recall of corresponding match last year:—
Cornwall, 145 and 268 for two wickets; Carmarthenshire, 118 and 92 for eight wickets. A drawn game, but Cornwall gained three points on the first innings.

Ideal weather prevailed on Monday and Tuesday, when the return match between Carmarthenshire and Cornwall, in connection with the Minor Counties Championship, was played at Stradey. The visitors fielded a representative side, but there were two notable absentees—Dr. Tressawna, who was selected to play against the Australians but failed to turn out, and Baker Smith. Carmarthenshire went to the wicket, which was a very fast one, the batsmen who opened the innings being Percy Rees and Ike Evans. Hawken and Whiting bowled with a splendid length, but the batsmen kept together well, the score being steadily carried ahead. At 35 a change was made in the bowlers, Harvey relieving Whiting, and at 60 H. Tressawna, the captain of the Cornwall team, took Hawken's place. Six more runs were secured before Percy Rees fell a victim to Harvey, leaving the score at 66-1-35. Percy Rees had however given a couple of previous chances to the visitors, Will Davies, who succeeded him, had a very short life, being disposed of within a couple of overs by Harvey for two runs. In the next over Ike Evans, who had been batting exceedingly well, was bowled by Cornwall's captain without further addition to the score. Conway Rees, the old Welsh international centre three-quarter, and Ernie Gee, got together and without taking undue risks they hit up the score, contributing 24 and 38 respectively. They were disposed of after luncheon, the former, who eventually was tempted to make a "slam" at a delivery from Tressawna, being stumped out by Vibart. Cyril Morgan, who soon afterwards took his stand at the wicket, is a brother of Capt. Hughes-Morgan. He wielded the bat so scientifically that everyone was impressed by his style. He treated the bowling with contempt, bringing about several hard drives and some pretty "cuts." Cyril Morgan, the captain of Blundell's School C.C., was the means of carrying Carmarthenshire's score to a creditable total, and Jack Bevan, who partnered him at the close should also be commended for keeping his end up so splendidly. Eventually Cyril Morgan succumbed to a ball from Major Williams, when his score, which included no less than nine 4's, stood at 74. He was enthusiastically cheered on his way to the pavilion, where the Cornwall players complimented him upon his excellent batting. This young player is certain to prove an acquisition to a first-class team. Carmarthenshire's total stood at 255 when the last wicket fell. The most successful bowler on the visiting side was Tressawna, who took four wickets for 62 runs. Harvey and Williams coming next with two wickets for 32 runs, and one for 7 respectively.

Cornwall opened their innings at 4.30, and runs were soon coming at a rattling pace, Bickford Smith in particular being very successful. He scored 64 off his own bat, and the total was carried to 189 for five wickets before 6.30, when the game was adjourned over-night.

Brilliant sunshine again favoured the second day's play, and Cornwall, who had scored 189 runs for five wickets overnight continued their innings. Contrary to expectations the remaining five wickets were captured for 33 runs, the total being 222. It is a somewhat singular coincidence that the margin between the scores of the opposing teams should be precisely the same as the score made by Cornwall in their first innings on Tuesday. With an uninterrupted sequence Carmarthenshire have been beaten in the past, oft-times ignominiously beaten, and it was not surprising under the circumstances that the players felt elated with the success they had attained. Jack Davies, who on the previous day was completely off the wicket, bowled with deadly effect on Tuesday morning, and along with E. Gee, accounted for the five wickets, as already stated, for comparatively few runs.

Carmarthenshire opened their second innings at about mid-day with considerable caution, but notwithstanding this fact two wickets had fallen at about 35. Runs came at long intervals, there being a monotonous sequence of maiden overs. When Percy Rees and Cliff Bowen, however, partnered each other, things livened up, the latter in a short but merry innings hitting up a score of 48,

which included no less than ten 4's. His performance, good as it undoubtedly was, was eclipsed by that of E. Gee, who defied all the bowlers. The lanelly left-hand batsman hit out in all directions, some of his drives being right into the centre of the old football field. When his score stood at 77 the innings was declared, Carmarthenshire's score being 271 runs for seven wickets.

Cornwall went to the wicket a second time at about 4.30, and if they failed to acquit themselves well in the first innings they made no mistake about it this time. The bowling was treated with unconcern by Bickford Smith and H. Tressawna at the outset, with the result that boundaries came frequently, and the score went up by leaps and bounds. Bickford Smith opened out his shoulders and drove the ball with all his might in all directions. In about 70 minutes his century, which included nineteen 4's, was reached, and at 6 o'clock the game, which ended in a draw, was brought to a close, Cornwall's score at the time being 161 for no wickets.

The return match between Carmarthenshire and Cornwall in connection with the Minor Counties' Competition was opened at Llanelly on Monday in beautiful weather. Percy Rees and Ike Evans opened favourably for the home team against the bowling of Hawken and Whiting. Both men kept well together until 66 runs were recorded, when P. Rees fell a victim to Harvey, leaving the score at 66-1-33. He had, however, given three previous chances to the visitors—two to the stumper, and one in mid-field. Will Davies, who succeeded him, had a very short life, being disposed of within a couple of overs by Harvey—76 2 2. In the next over I. Evans was bowled by Tresawna without further addition to the score. The visitors had up to now put on four different bowlers. C. Morgan was in fine fettle, hitting up the grand score of 74, which included nine fours. He was highly praised by the Cornwall men at the close of the game.

Tresawna and Bickford-Smith, who opened the Cornwall innings, did not fare badly, both men playing good cricket against the bowling of Gee and Davies. Tresawna hit freely all round the wicket, but was eventually bowled by C. Morgan, who had in the meantime temporarily substituted Gee. The succeeding players were rapidly disposed of.

On resuming their first innings on Tuesday the Cornishmen gave a very indifferent exhibition, for within an hour's play—through the destructive bowling of Gee and J. Davies—six players were disposed of for 33 runs, thus enabling Carmarthenshire to commence their second innings with a lead of 33 runs. Vibart and Meyrick resumed the second day's play, the former recording an additional six teen runs to his score of the previous day before he was bowled by Gee. Carmarthenshire did not open their second innings very auspiciously, the first three batsmen being disposed of for 33 runs. Cliff Bowen, however, gave a good exhibition, his total of 49 including ten fours. Gee was also a good bat, and would possibly have secured his century had the innings not been declared. He hit out in divers directions, and on one occasion, with a vigorous effort, the ball was hurled into the old football field.

Bedford Smith and H. Tresawna, who opened Cornwall's second innings, treated the bowling of Gee and J. VISIT OF CORNWALL TO STRADEY.

A strong Cornish XI. visited Stradey on Monday when a two days match was commenced, this being the last of the season. The day was beautifully fine, but must have been very trying for the fielders. Carmarthenshire were fortunate in winning the toss. Percy Rees and Isaac Evans were sent in first to face the attack of Whiting and Hawken. Both men opened cautiously, and on account of the smartness of the field, could not get many runs. After the first quarter of an hour, they played with more freedom, and both men hit a few boundaries. With the score at 40, each of the men having scored an equal number of runs, a change was made in the bowling. Up to luncheon time the attendance had been most disappointing, but improved as the game advanced.

Just before luncheon time, Percy Rees and Isaac Evans played the bowling with more confidence, and the pair were not dismissed until their joint contribution to the total reached 73. W. Davies disappointed his supporters, only making 2 before Harvey bowled him. Conway Rees and E. Gee only had a few overs before luncheon. Gee played the bowling with confidence, and did not waste much time before settling down, and he quickly got into double figures. The pair were together on the adjournment for luncheon, and the score stood at 112 for 3 wickets.

There was some vigorous hitting after luncheon, when the visiting bowlers appeared to getting tired. Seven changes were made altogether, but runs continued to come steadily, and an hour after the resumption, the score stood at 230. Conway Rees (24), Ernie Gee (35), and J. Vibant (20) was the only man to get into double figures, and the tall end unexpectedly collapsed, being all dismissed within an hour. The total, including 17 extras, amounted to 222, or 33 less than the score of the home men.

Carmarthenshire opened their second venture badly, three wickets being down for less than 40 runs. Percy Rees and Cliff Bowen then got together, and soon made things decidedly warm for the fielders, both men hitting out vigorously. The partnership meant 86 runs, Cliff Bowen being the first to go, after making a contribution of 48.

Percy Rees and Cyril Morgan made a useful stand, and then Ernie Gee gave a brilliant exhibition, contributing 78 (not out), Hubert John also scoring 16 (not out). The innings was then declared, leaving the Cornishmen 302 runs to make in their second venture. Scores:—
