## BRILLIANT INNINGS VICTORY OF

Norfolk followed up the great advantage they secured at Lynn on the first day of this match, and by a quarter to four yesterday afternoon the home eleven had obtained a brilliant victory by an innings and 67 runs. Ererything depended upon the Norfolk bowlers yesterday, as the wicket was fast and true, and it is pleasing to record that they rese to the occasion in great stylo. In less than two hours before lunch Cambridgeshire's first innings was finished ofl for tho addition of 49 runs, and the viaitore also lost the first four batsmen in their second innings, eight men in all being got rid of for 145 runs. After the interval eeventy-eight minutes sufficel to bring tho match to a happy conclusion, the six remaining wickets going down for 115 runs. L. J. Reid made a eplendid eflort to avert defeat, batting nearly an hour and a half in admimble style. After ho left F. Roberson took up the task, but begond come hitting by B. W. Pigg, and some help from II. Barker, he received very littlo support. The Rev. G. 1. Raikes was punished rather freely in this inniligs, but, ne the game stood, wickets wero of moro inportance to Norfolk than runa,
and he sicured four, thus bringing up his total and he secured four, thus bringing up his total baif to eleven, flye being taken on Monday and

When the two sides had met at Newmarket in July Cambridgeshire had been victorious. For the winners, Raikes took 11 wickets in the match for 172 runs, including 7 for 63 in the Cambridgeshire first innings. There were 11 fours, 6 threes and 2 twos in G A Stevens's 104, an innings of $21 / 4$ hours. Watson's 66 included 8 fours, and Beresford's 63 contained 9 fours. In the Norfolk innings, Watson and G A Stevens added 116 runs for the second wicket, and Stevens and Beresford 102 for the third. For Cambridgeshire, Reid scored 57 and Roberson 54 not out. This was the first Championship match played at the ground.
