THE LINCOLN WICKET-ITNN'S FIRST COUNTY MATCT-TEACHERS' GOOD FIGHT WFTH J\&JGUE CHAMPION\&ANOTHGR HOME DEFEAT FOR DERE HAM.


#### Abstract

A good deal has heen written, and much more suid, about the condition of the wicket on the Lindum ground at the top of Lincoln's steep hill for the return match between Norfolk and Jincolnshire. An inepection of tha wicket before the match started revealed a state of thinga which caused a general feeling of dis pleasure among the players, and the fact that the Lincoinshire captain should have considered it neceasary to apologise to the visitors for the condition of the pitoh seems to show that it wan not one that a team should expect during a spoll of hot weather. Somebody was to blame for the over-watering, but it was difficult to find tho right person. Singleton, who prepared tho wicket under the direction of Day, said no water had been put on since Monday, and Day's reply to inquiries was that Lincolnshire played him for his batting, and he was, therefore, as unxious as anyone for a good fast wicket. A heary dew could hardly have produced the effect that was visible for some hours after play comtuenced.


Norfolk have been blamed for protesting only ufter their wickets had tumbled down quickly but we have shown that dissatiffaction was ex pressed before the game started, and that they went in hoping the wicket would recover quickly. Mr. Ward, the Lincoln Captain, said he would have acted similarly if he had won the toss. The point at icsue does not depend upon the sucosse or pailure of the batting. ## LINCOLN COMMITIEF AND NORFOLK'S PROTEST.

MR. B. K. WILSON'S STATEMENT.
The folloving is a copy of a statement in connection with tha alloged over-watering of the wicket at Lincoln for the match between Norfo'k and Lincolnohire, which Mr. B. K. Wileon has forwarded to Mr. F. E. Lacey, the secretary of the Marylebone Crichet Club.
I am cap!ain of the Norfolk County cricket elsen, and was present at the above match, but did not play owing to an injury. My place was taken by the Rev. G. B. Raiken, who acted throughout after consultation with me, and I entirely approved of his action in the matters following:-
The match was played on the Lindum Ground a fast and true wicket provided. I'he attached report irom the "E'astern Daily Prees" is a correct report as far as it goos, and 1 wish to supplement it by the following observations. for.
