

A WEST AUSTRALIAN TEAM FOR CEYLON.

The following cable was received by the *Times of Ceylon* from their correspondent at Perth on Thursday last:—

"The West Australian Cricket Team will visit Ceylon at Christmas if their board and travelling expenses in Ceylon for 11 days are guaranteed."

Mr. W. E. M. Paterson, the captain of the C.C.C.,* who has received a letter on the subject from Mr. F. J. Wayman, of Western Australia, is calling a meeting of the C.C.C. Committee to put the matter before them.

The following letter from Mr. Jos. Gardiner, president of the West Australian Cricket Association, received on Thursday is interesting:—

"When in Ceylon, eighteen months ago, I was much struck with the interest taken in the national game, and I saw some very good cricketers there. If anything, the natives seemed to me to be the better all-round men. I then thought it would be a very good idea, and a very educational one for the West-ralians, if a visit could be arranged. The turf pleases them immensely, and anyone who has partaken of the hospitality of the Island can never forget it. I shall be delighted to do all in my power to assist in bringing the visit about."—*The Ceylon Sportsman* (31/7/09).

It is impossible to say to what extent Hertfordshire's severe beating at Cambridge last week was the effect of Coleman's breakdown early on Friday. The fast bowler sent down twelve overs and took two wickets for 30 runs—an average of 18, whereas the average for the innings was 42 runs per wicket. But the other bowlers were so severely treated that it is probable the home county would have made big enough score to defeat Hertfordshire in a single innings even had Coleman not been attacked by lumbago. While reluctant to criticise the visiting captain without further knowledge of the game than what can be gleaned from the score and analysis, one may fairly remark on the fact that White bowled 34 overs and Shelford nine only, although the former took three wickets at an average cost of 51, while the Stevenage man took four for only 13 runs each. It was Marsh who broke up the long partnership between Reid and C. A. Pigg, but his slows were so mercilessly treated by the Cambridgeshire batsmen that this one wicket seems hardly sufficient reason why the Harpenden amateur should have bowled twice as long as Shelford.

With the wicket showing signs of wear and with Coleman absent, Hertfordshire's first innings response to the big opposition total was a very fair one, although it left them in a minority of 233, but their second venture was rather a poor spirited affair, only E. L. Wright, of Hitchin, batting with any confidence. A remarkable feature of the match was the high rate of scoring maintained, the aggregate of 713 runs being made before two o'clock on the second day.

SPORTING NOTES.

THURSDAY.

When things are going smoothly the public are apt to think little of the benefits bestowed upon the community by Parker's Piece. But when a committee of the Town Council even suggest clipping off a slice to make way for a 40 foot road there is a storm of indignant remonstrance, and our local legislators get a glimpse of the deep-seated affection citizens have for this magnificent open space. In the minutes submitted for the approval of the Council at its last meeting was a recommendation of the paving, Drainage and Lighting Committee, which looked comparatively harmless, since details of the plan proposed were not given in the report. Nine out of ten people reading the report did not realise its full significance. But the tenth did, and one of the tenths was a well known local cricketer, to whom the thanks of the public and especially of cricketers and footballers, are due, for the vigorous opposition he was instrumental in stirring up against the proposal.

The Corporation want to widen Park-terrace at the Regent-street end. That is very readable, but the committee proposed that it should be done by driving a broad road through the premises now used as Mr Leavis' music shop, over the "pump" cricket pitch, to join Park-terrace in its widest part. A view of the plan prepared by the Borough Surveyor showed clearly enough that the "pump" pitch must be sacrificed, and in all probability the middle pitch would be interfered with. In any case a substantial slice of the Piece must be given up. Opposition, vigorous and emphatic, was carried into the Council Chamber, and the proposition was hastily withdrawn. For the present Parker's Piece is safe from interference. The general feeling of those who have an affection for Parker's Piece is expressed in something like the following terms: "Once they begin interfering with the Piece you never know where they are going to stop." But there is an alternative plan; the acquisition of a strip of land along the existing road, and one, perhaps a couple, of buildings at the corner, and Park-terrace may be widened without cutting into the open space which is such a boon to the community.

The County Club finished their engagements in the Minor Counties' Championship on Tuesday, and after an interesting struggle find themselves at the bottom of the table with fifteen points. In spite of this apparent want of success there are distinctly encouraging signs. When the Selection Committee are able to put their strongest eleven in the field Cambs. is a formidable side, though still liable to great fluctuations of form. With a strengthening of the attack we might confidently look forward to the county occupying a high place among the shires of the Eastern part of England, always supposing we can retain the services of the several young batsmen who have shown they have a lot of runs in them: H. C. Tebbutt, C. H. and B. W. Pigg, L. J. Reid, F. E. Collier, and of course A. S. Ling. A very useful fast bowler has been found in G. Rose.

The win against Hertfordshire on Friday and Saturday, the third in the Championship this season, registered a record, as far as recent years are concerned, for the county. Even in 1904, when Cambs. turned out a hot batting side, when Jack Hobbs was still qualifying for Surrey, when the Rev. R. S. Swann Mason and George Watts were at the top of their form, and when H. C. Tebbutt was following up his public school record by making many runs in county cricket, Cambridgeshire only won two matches right out. There have been a few lean years to put up with while the Selection Committee were waiting patiently for young players to "come on," and it is confidently expected that the county is now on the up grade. What is wanted is more support from the public, or that section of it which congregates on Parker's Piece to see a Senior League match, and steadfastly turns a cold shoulder to the County Club at Finner's. It will scarcely be credited, but it is a fact, that while L. J. Reid was playing his delightful innings of 221 against Herts there were exactly 25 spectators. The fact is far from creditable, and it certainly is not encouraging.

That individual innings practically decided the issue. Reid's first four partners could do little or nothing with the bowlers, but he was batting as confidently as if he had had ten years' first class experience behind him. Then C. H. Pigg joined him, and the bowling was collared. Hertfordshire are entitled to sympathy in respect of the breakdown of Coleman, whose absence weakened the attack very materially, but as a member quaintly observed, it was "time Cambs. had a bit of luck." Friday's batting was worth going far to see. A total of 424, which is the second highest total, I believe, Cambs. has ever made in championship cricket, practically put them out of the wood. It was followed by some remarkably good bowling. G. Rose, the Ebbw Vale express, demonstrated his usefulness as a fast bowler. In the first innings he captured three wickets for 31 runs, and in the second he and Reid shelled the Hertsmen out for 98. To dispose of a good side as Herts is for under a hundred is an achievement of which any bowlers may be proud. Reid's share in the victory was 221 out of 424 runs and six wickets (in the two innings) and some smart fielding, a record of all round usefulness which will take a lot of beating.

But for dropped catches, Cambs. might possibly have kept Bedfordshire at the bottom of the table. In the first innings the home side scored 251. Though they were smart enough galloping across the wicket to save runs, a sufficient number of catches were dropped to give Bedfordshire the three points for leading on the first innings, and the moral effect of the lead is considerable, as past experience of the County has demonstrated. For instance, H. L. Peel and W. E. King, who heartened the Bedfordshire batsmen by a prolonged first wicket stand, were both missed before they reached double figures. Peel, always a dangerous bat, made 84, when he might have been disposed of for half-a-dozen. Aphorpe, who scored 37, was missed when he had made 12; Leventhorpe, the Jessop of the team, lost several lives given him, while Morcom's contribution might have been reduced by 10. That innings was a sorry tale of dropped catches.

In a minority of 57 on the first innings, Cambs., it is conceivable, might still have made a draw by stonewalling, but they played the sporting game, and hit out. It did not pay, except in two instances, those of F. E. Collier and F. Roberson. Both played a fine forcing game, especially Collier, whose success was very popular. He has not had the best of luck this season, and the ran of ill-fortune seemed to have shaken his confidence, which his 63 of Tuesday afternoon should restore. He hit all round the wicket in most attractive style. G. Rose, B. W. Pigg, and Coulson bowled very well indeed in the last desperate attempt to save the game, but could get no more than four wickets, and Beds. gained the full points by a margin of six wickets.

The destination of the Cambs. Senior Cup is now practically decided. Barring accidents, the Rodney who have 15 points as the result of 10 matches, will take care of the trophy for 12 months. The Albert lost all pretension to Senior League honours after their big kicking by Camden last Thursday. For Camden, Collier and F. King sent the 100 up in 50 minutes. The first wicket fell at 195, and the innings was declared at 293 for three, of which Collier's share was 96. He gave no chance until 57 and hit a six and 10 fours. Upon going in at 430 the Albert had no hope of getting the runs, but had what seemed an easy draw in hand, but Gray's slows found out their weakness. Half the side were out for 36, and although Cowling and J. Hugh made a stand, the end came just before 6.30, Camden winning by 224 runs. Gray took eight wickets for 32. The Camden fielding was excellent.

Apart from its bearing upon the League championship, the Rodney v. St. Giles' match was of great interest. The fact that the County match was concluded in sufficient time to enable G. Watts and A. S. Ling to play was very fortunate for the Rodney. St. Giles' sometimes make poor scores, and when they had got five wickets down for 47, everybody expected that they were going to eclipse their previous efforts in this direction, and that the match would be something of a farce. However, Barker and Richardson pulled the score up a bit, and although Brown got rid of the rest of the side the total reached 134. Brown's six wickets cost 58. St. Giles' were in an almost hopeless position, but if any side in the League could have got the Rodney out for less than 134 in such circumstances, they were the team to do it. So good was the St. Giles' bowling, that the Rodney had to struggle for the runs, losing six wickets before G. Watts and F. Hayward came together and passed the "Saints' total, which they did a few minutes before 6.30.

The Newmarket v. Albert match was chiefly remarkable for a good innings by Bellamy, who made 129 not out in a score of 263 for seven declared. At one time Newmarket had lost seven wickets for 120, but Bellamy placed them in a safe position. The Albert had not time to get the runs, and with the score at three for 102 stumps were drawn.

At the Norwich sports on Saturday a batch of Cambridge cyclists and one motorist competed with varying degrees of success. There were two special attractions, the race for the Vincennes hundred guinea gold cup, accompanied by medals generously presented by Messrs. Coleman; and the Five Miles Championship Eastern Counties Centre. In either event Cambridge competitors were placed, and if there had not been an unfortunate spill in the final of the Five Miles' Championship, it is possible the first, second and third prizes would have come to this town.

For the championship, E. Banks, Belmont C.C., R. L. Player, A. R. Skool, E. Baker and T. Baker, of the New Chesterton C.C., and F. Bear, of Wisbech, were among the competitors. The race was un-factory, inasmuch as the chances of more than half the competitors were destroyed by an unfortunate spill at the bend past the stand. The 13 competitors were fairly well together, when someone skidded and fell, bringing down two other riders, and as those following close behind were unable to clear the fallen machines, there was in a few seconds a confused heap of riders and machines. Happily no one was seriously hurt, though E. Baker, of New Chesterton, and H. Morgan, of Norwich, were cut and bruised. Player was one of the victims of the spill, for although he remounted with several others, and subsequently changed machines, he was never afterwards a serious rival to Skool, who ultimately beat Banks by a lap. The time was 12mins. 12.45 secs.

R. L. Player and E. Banks met in the second heat for the Vincennes Cup, and they finished in that order. In the final heat Banks had the ill-fortune to puncture. Player and Stokes set a very hot pace, and at the bell the New Chesterton cyclist was leading from A. J. Denny, 2 Stokes, 3 Player, and the time was 12mins. 35secs. Player and Stokes secured lap prizes. In the Half Mile Scratch Race R. L. Player, New Chesterton, T. W. Hobercraft, New Chesterton, T. Baker, New Chesterton, and E. Banks, Belmont, qualified for the final, in which Denny finished first, Stokes second, and Banks third. Player complained of foul riding on the part of Denny, but the protest was not sustained.

P. V. Wallis, of Cambridge, and R. O. Clark, of Norwich, were matched for two motor cycle races three miles and five miles. Clark won the former by half a lap in 4mins. 40secs. Before the five miles Wallis changed his tyres, and in that match beat Clark by a lap in 7mins. 14.35 secs.

Cambs. v. Herts.

FINE INNINGS BY L. J. REID.

On a hard, true wicket the return match Cambs. v. Herts. was commenced on Fenner's this morning. The first match, played at Bishop Stortford, Hertfordshire, won by 47 runs, in spite of the remarkable bowling feat by Coulson in the first innings, and they now brought a stronger eleven than did duty upon that occasion. There were four changes in the home team, H. C. Tebbutt, F. Roberts, H. R. Barker, and A. E. Bellars being replaced by C. H. Pigg, G. Rose, O. W. Bocock, and C. Sheldrick. Cambs. won the toss, and opened disastrously. Four wickets were lost for 31. L. J. Reid and Coulson were opposed by Coleman and White. Off Coleman's first over, delivered from the orchard end, seven runs were scored, while White opened with a maiden over. Coulson having got Coleman away to the on for a five, he skied one from White to mid-off, where Wright brought off a splendid catch. Collier was bowled first ball, Ling, after getting in one smack to the boundary, was beaten by White, and Watts, after scoring four singles, fell a victim to Coleman. Three-quarters of an hour after the start the 50 was signalled, Reid, who battled with customary steadiness, having scored 27 of that number. His partner, C. H. Pigg,

helped to stop the rot. They played good cricket, and did some smart running between the slips. Cover-point was standing rather deep, and many a single Reid and Pigg got in when a stroke was made to cover. At 68 Sheldrick relieved White at the pavilion end, but the run-getting was not checked. A stroke of bad luck befel Herts. in Coleman wrenching his side. Towards the end of one of his long runs to the crease the bowler was seen to pull up suddenly and sling the ball to the batsman awkwardly. A wicket was signalled, and it was then seen that Coleman had injured himself. Obviously in pain, he finished the over, gave way to Marsh, and retired to the pavilion. F. E. Collier fielded during Coleman's absence. Upon the stroke of one the hundred was hoisted, the batsmen having made the second fifty well under half an hour. The next event of note was the fact that Reid topped the fifty. When he had scored 39, Pigg made a lofty drive to the boundary, where Hartley dropped the catch that would have broken the useful partnership. It was still in effect at the luncheon interval, when the score stood at 154 for 4 wickets—Reid not out 72, Pigg not out 54.

After lunch Pigg hit freely, and drew level with Reid at 71, but did not pass him. He gave a very hard chance at mid-off when he reached 75, and having scored one run more was caught off Marsh, who with White had reopened the attack. Pigg's innings of 76, which occupied an hour and a half, came at a very opportune time for Cambs., and the value of the stand made in conjunction with Reid, productive of 152 runs, cannot be over-estimated. He hit seven 4's. "B. W." had a short stay. He laid on the wood, was missed "in the country," and retired for 18. Soon after the advent of Bocock, Reid completed the first century he has ever made for the county, and received the hearty applause of the handful of spectators who had witnessed his splendid batting. His luck still held good, mid-off giving him a life when he had reached 111. Bocock scored 27 at a good rate, and the captain joined Reid, who abandoned his quiet game for hitting. Successively he scored 4, 4, 3, 4, 4, 4, handling the bowling at either end unmercifully. Herts. sadly missed Coleman in the attack. Scoring continued at a remarkable rate. Reid could do nothing wrong. He soon beat the previous highest innings for the county this season—the 128 of A. S. Ling at Newmarket—and going merrily on, scored his second hundred in rather more than an hour. In his first hundred he hit 11 fours, and in the second one five and 16 fours. Meantime the captain was steadily augmenting the total, which in less than four hours' play came to 400—a remarkable recovery after a last start. The eighth wicket fell at 401, having put on 123 runs, and the tea interval was then taken. Apparently it unsettled Reid, who in playing forward to Sheldford was bowled. He had been at the wickets four hours and five minutes for his 221, and had hit five fives, 28 fours, and 12 threes. It was a magnificent innings, marred by only one chance at 111. The end came at 424.

EASY WIN FOR CAMBS.

In an impregnable position, Cambs. continued the last but one of this season's Minor Counties Championship matches on Fenner's this morning. Half-an-hour's play made a considerable difference to the chances of Hertfordshire saving an innings defeat. During that time four more wickets fell for the addition of 46 runs. Overnight the score stood at 106 for three wickets, and Golding and C. T. Rudd continued their innings to the bowling of L. J. Reid and C. Sheldrick. The fourth ball from Reid Rudd stopped with his pad, and was given out lbw. Then with the assistance of Watts at the wicket got rid of two more cheaply. Standing back, the wicket-keeper caught Golding, who had played a steady game, off Sheldrick, and the next over he stumped Marsh off Reid's bowling. Six wickets were down for 117. Hartford hit out well and the seventh wicket added 31, when another catch at the wicket disposed of Hartford. Hartley and White made an effort to turn the tide, but following a double change in the bowling at 185 White touched a rising ball from Coulson and was taken by Rose in the slips, while Sheldford was caught at the wicket off Rose without troubling the scorers. Coleman's attack of lumbago was too acute to permit him taking the field, and the innings concluded for 191, Herts. being in a minority of 233.

With five and a quarter hours before them Herts. opened their second venture with C. H. Titchmarsh and Golding. Rose bowled from the pavilion end, and keeping a good length did considerable execution in his opening overs. First he was opposed by Titchmarsh, who by sending the two first balls for a couple each, looked as if he was going to break the spell of bad luck which has pursued him this season. A single brought Golding opposite to the Cambs. fast bowler, and he was clean bowled. The second over Titchmarsh fell to a very similar ball, and in the third over Rose also bowled G. C. Hartley—three of the best Hertfordshire wickets in three overs. Watts made a good attempt to catch White, but the ball fell just out of his reach, while Rudd pulled one straight and hard to C. Pigg at short leg and was left off. Wickets continued to fall with unexpected rapidity. White and Rudd were associated for a quarter of an hour, when Rose claimed his fourth victim. White, acting on the defensive, returned one in the direction of the bowler, and Rose running a few yards up the pitch, brought off a catch. Rudd left very soon after. He had several times run out at Reid's slow end, and came out once too often. He ran for a short pitched ball, missed, and was easily stumped by Watts. Five wickets were now down for 40. Twenty-one runs were added for the sixth wicket, and the seventh went with no addition to the score. A fine catch in the slips by Rose disposed of Marsh, and the innings closed for 98. Wright was the only Hertfordshire batsman to make 20 or over, and he had luck in doing so, having been missed no fewer than four times. Cambs. thus won by an innings and 135.

NOTES BY ENTHUSIAST.

The Cambs. Cricket Association has made arrangements for the semi-finals and final of the competition for the junior cup. The first of the semi-finals it is hoped to play tomorrow, and the other on Thursday of next week. The provisional dates for the final, approved at the Council meeting last Friday are Tuesday, August 31st, and Wednesday, September 1st. It is hoped to play the semi-finals on King's and Clare ground, and the final on the University ground.

Cambridgeshire played one of their best matches of the season on Friday and Saturday last, when they met Herts. on Fenner's in the Minor Counties Championship. The wicket was in splendid condition, and the local captain was fortunate in winning the toss. From the way the wickets fell at the commencement, it seemed as though Cambs. were in for another beating, but when L. J. Reid and C. H. Pigg were together, the rot was stopped, and cricket of the best description was witnessed. Fifty runs were registered after three quarters of an hour's play, Reid having been responsible for 27 of that number.

Herts. were unfortunate in losing Coleman, he, whilst bowling by some means or other wrenching his side. F. E. Collier fielded during his absence. Continuing to hit out with remarkable freedom, Reid and Pigg brought the score up to 100 close upon the stroke of one, and shortly afterwards Reid reached fifty. The players were now beautifully set, and at lunch time the score stood at 154 for four wickets, Reid not out 72, and Pigg not out 54.

On the resumption of play, Pigg played fine cricket, and hitting out freely drew level with Reid. With his score at 75, he gave a hard chance at mid off, but he was given another life. It was for a short time only, however, for at 76, he was caught by Goulding. B. W. Pigg was next in, and after a stay for 18, retired, beaten by a smart ball from White. Boccock joined Reid, who very shortly afterwards, completed the first century. At 111, Reid was missed at mid off, the mistake proving most expensive.

Boccock, who had been scoring at a good pace, was beaten by Shelford, when his score stood at 27. Reid was now joined by the Captain, C. Pigg, and another useful stand ensued. Reid began knocking the leather all over the field, and in succession he scored 4, 4, 3, 4, 4, 4—23 in six balls. He continued to hit out freely, and it was not until after the tea interval that he was bowled by Shelford, with his score standing at 221. That he played a splendid innings goes without sayings. His hits included five 6's, twenty-eight 4's, and twelve 3's. Bar the one chance at 111, Reid played perfect cricket. The innings concluded for 424.

Herts. were now set a somewhat formidable task, and they seemed doomed to disaster. Overnight they scored 106 for three wickets, but when play was continued on Saturday, the wickets fell very cheaply, the whole side being out for 191.

Left with 233 to get to save an innings defeat, Herts. opened their second innings with C. H. Titchmarsh and Goulding. Bad luck dogged the team, however, for the wickets fell quickly. Goulding was bowled for a duck, and none of the batsmen seemed to hit out with any confidence. At 98, all were out, and Cambridgeshire thus gained a splendid victory by an innings and 135 runs.
