## CRICKET.

## CORNWALL v. DEVON.

Cornwall began their Minor Counties engagements on Friday, when Devon visited Penzance. The day was almost unbearably hot, and the spectators were glad to seek whatever shelter was afforded from the sun's rays. Notable absentees from the Cornish side were the Bickford-Smiths and Walter Coad.

Winning the toss, Devon batted first, Capt. Bazalgette and Lieut. Allenby being opposed to Hawken and Whiting. The first over from Hawken yielded two runs, although Allenby was completely beaten by the third ball. Whiting, who bowled from the higher end, was cut beautifully for three by Allenby, and Bazalgette cut Hawken hard to the boundary in his next over. Runs came slowly, the home county's fielding being very keen, and the twenty was sent up without loss. Nine runs later Trevarthen took the ball from Hawken and Escott relieved Whiting. The Helston pro. kept an excellent length, and with the first ball of his third over clean bowled Allenby, the batsman making no attempt to play the ball—one wicket for 34 runs. Escott, too, was bowling well and was supported by smart fielding, both Whiting and Guy being applauded for excellent ground work. Carroll was not long in opening, early lifting Trevarthen away to leg for three, but Hawken did not care much for a terrific drive by the same batsman off Escott which came very low to him at mid-off. Carroll sent up the half century by driving Trevarthen straight over the bowler's head for four and then lifting him into the deep field for a couple. Bazalgette was playing pretty cricket, but when he had made 25 he sent one through the slips which Whiting should have got to. With his next ball Escott completely beat the captain, but the ball swung just wide of the wickets and went for four extras. Trevarthen was the next to get the captain in difficulties, Vibart making a great but unsuccessful effort to take a ball which the batsman cocked up in front of him. Runs came faster now, Carroll playing free cricket, and with 70 up Guy came on vice Escott. Four runs later Whiting relieved Trevarthen at the pavilion end, Carroll getting him away for two successive fours. Point was moved close in for Bazalgette, who cocked several balls up in that direction, and Guy just failed to reach one off Whiting. Carroll sent 90 up by smashing Whiting to the deep field boundary and then placed him nicely to leg. The century soon appeared, Carroll sending it up by luckily snicking Whiting off his stumps for four. This batsman reached his 50 in half an hour, his clean hitting greatly pleasing the spectators. At 110 another double bowling change was tried, Guy, who had had only eight runs knocked off him in six overs, with two maidens, giving way to Escott, and Whiting to Hawken. At 128 the second wicket fell, Whiting catching Carroll at mid-on from a tremendous drive. The retiring batsman had made 61 by fine cricket, and hit nine 4's and five 3's. Bazalgette reached his 50 in an hour and twenty-five minutes, and had played most careful cricket. At 142 Escott got past his defence with a beauty which knocked the middle stump out of the ground. The captain's innings contained seven fours.

Stuart and Shelley were row together, but the former was never comfortable with Hawken, who was making the ball come across a lot. Stuart, unfortunately, was struck by Escott and had to retire, his place being taken by Light. Shelley and Light made things lively, both batting with great power. The 160 score appeared and Trevarthen came on vice Escott. At the luncheon interval the score was 170 for three wickets.

When play was resumed there was a large and continually growing number of spectators present. Whiting came on at the pavilion end, and Trevarthen resumed

at the other. Shelley did not stay long for after he had presented Vibart with a chance of stumping him, Trevarthen finely caught and bowled him—4 for 175. Light was then joined by Major Garratt and made a great hit off Whiting into the deep field, where Whitworth, standing on the boundary line, failed rather badly at a by no means impossible catch. Prompted by this let off the pro soon sent the second

century up and hooked Whiting twice to the leg boundary beautifully. Following one of these leg hooks he lifted the Penzance pro. into the pavilion enclosure. This brought on Escott, and Light was again given another life, Bennett missing him in the long field off a skieg. This mis take gave the pro. his 50. Escott proved rather expensive and soon gave way to Guy. Light again received a life, Godrich this time misjudging a lofty hit. The major scored steadily, his runs coming principally from the leg side, and with Light hitting with great vigour the score jumped up rapidly.

Trevarthen was having a long spell of bowling at the higher end, but he was keeping an admirable length, both batsmen finding him difficult to get away. With the score at 253 Trevarthen removed Light's middle peg. The pro. had played exhilarating cricket, marred, however, by several chances. His 67 included eleven 4's. Garratt was the next to go, Tresawna making a brilliant left-handed catch high up at extra cover, point—6 for 245. Davies and Robinson were together when 260 was sent up, but the latter only made one, Guy bowling him. Freeman, the next man in, survived an appeal for a catch behind the wicket, and then placed Guy prettily on the on for three. The score gradually crept up and Whiting relieved Guy. Off the third ball he received Freeman pushed one up to Guy at mid-off, but the fielder unaccountably dropped the ball. Whiting scoured his wicket next over, Trevarthen snapping him in the slips—8 for 294. Wreford stayed until the 300 was hoisted and was then caught at cover point by Tresawna. Sturt did not come out again, and the innings thus closed at that total. Trevarthen was the most successful of the Cornish bowlers, his four wickets costing 75 runs.

Tresawna and Whitworth opened for Cornwall to the bowling of Wreford and Freeman. Runs were hard to get, but both batsmen played with confidence. Tresawna sent Freeman through the slips for four and then got him round to leg for a couple. The 20 appeared as the result of as many minutes' batting. Ten runs later a fast one from Wreford went high through the slips off Tresawna, Shelley just failing to get his fingers to it. The first wicket fell at 40, at which total Wreford knocked Tresawna's middle stump yards out of the ground. Whitworth left at the same total, Rogers, who was fielding as substitute for Sturt, holding him at point. Vibart and Godrich now came together, the pro. opening his account by getting Freeman to leg for three. Godrich only obtained a single when his middle peg was dislodged by Wreford—3 for 46. Trevarthen sent the half century up by cutting Freeman for four. Light now came on at the pavilion end in place of Freeman, and "yorked" Vibart, who had a age at one of his slows. Further disaster was in store for Cornwall, Bennett being bowled by Wreford at 53. Trevarthen was playing capital cricket, being especially strong on the off side, most of his runs coming from crisp cuts or powerful drives. The 70 went up without further loss, but three runs later Trevarthen was snapped at the wicket by Davies off Light. Escott did not give much trouble, falling a victim to Light, whom he jumped put at to hit—7 for 81. Maunsell then joined Hawken and immediately lifted Light to the leg boundary. Following this he daringly pulled the fast bowler for three, whereat the crowd cheered. Hawken, after a somewhat shaky opening, played confidently,

getting several nice shots through the slips. Maunsell had a period of inactivity through Hawken getting the bowling, but on the next occasion on which he faced Light he delighted the crowd by hitting him powerfully to the boundary and then lifting him out of the field—the latter hit being a great stroke clean over the bowling screen. This sent the century up and five over. Hawken left at this total, Wreford just hitting the balls. Guy left in the same over after making four. When Whiting came in Cornwall had 109 up. Maunsell again faced Light. The first ball he drove finely for 4, the next went sailing over the pavilion for six, but with the fourth ball of the over Light hit his leg stump. Maunsell's 27 was made up of two 6's, three 4's and a three. The Cornish innings closed at 119, or 181 behind. Wreford and Light shared the bowling honours, the former having five for 42 and the latter four for 40.

Cornwall followed on with forty minutes left for play, Tresawna and Whitworth again being the first pair, Wreford and Light sharing the attack. Runs came quickly, Whitworth scoring freely off Wreford, who, despite the fact that he had bowled unchanged through Cornwall's first innings, still maintained a fine pace and length. Light could not tempt either batsman to hit, and at 24 Freeman relieved Wreford. Tresawna showed his appreciation of the new bowler by cutting him squarely for two fours. With the score at 40 Tresawna was out to a ball which he should have left alone. The ball was off the wicket and the batsman poked it up at point, where he was easily held. Light meeting with no success, Wreford came on at the pavilion end and with his first ball dismissed Whitworth—2 for 44. With his next delivery Hawken was out, caught behind the wicket off a ball which rose sharply. Yet another wicket fell in this over, Guy being caught at mid-on by Allenby. With the fall of this wicket play finished for the day. These three wickets were secured by Wreford without a run being scored from him. Cornwall were thus 137 behind with five wickets to fall.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

Escott (not out) and Godrich continued Cornwall's second innings on Saturday, Light and Wreford bowling. Escott fell a victim to the last ball of Light's over, being smartly taken at the wicket—5 for 44. Godrich left at the same total, being caught at their man off Wreford's first ball. Vibart and Trevarthen improved matters a little, the latter getting the fast bowler through the slips beautifully on several

occasions. With 14 runs added Vibart lost his wicket, Light getting him caught at the wicket. The quality of Cornwall's batting may be judged from the fact that since the fall of the first wicket six batsmen had been able to add 18 runs to the total only. Maunsell's new runs in, and Light remembering his caught treatment in the first innings, had four men out on the boundary. This set upon a stay of short duration, for after getting Light to leg for a couple, Wreford, with his first ball, knocked his off wicket out of the ground. Bennett opened with considerably more confidence than in the first innings and helped Trevarthen, who was playing sound cricket, to improve the home county's position. Wreford's length claimed Bennett's wicket, the score then being 77. Whiting, the last man in, played out the remainder of the over and then Trevarthen was bowled by Light, for an admirable innings of 22. Devon thus winning by an innings and 104. DEVON EARLY DEFEAT CORNWALL.

Requiring 125 runs to save a single innings defeat, Cornwall returned at Penzance, Kemt being partnered by Godrich. Scott was quickly taken at the wicket, and Godrich was caught first ball from Wretford. Trevarthen followed. Five wickets, including the overcast batsmen, had now fallen without increasing the score, but the spell being broken. Vibart and Trevarthen made a few runs before Vibart was also caught at the wicket. Mansuelli, who had shown fine hitting powers on Friday, joined Trevarthen, who played a maiden from Wretford. Mansuelli was not so fortunate, returning first ball from that bowler, having added but two. Trevarthen, assisted Light, hit 4 and again for 3, and batted Wretford in like manner. Bennett opened with 2 and a single off Light. After a few maidens Bennett was bowled by Wretford (nine for 77), and Whiting brought up the rear. MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

CORNWALL v. DEVON.

Winning the test at Penzance, yesterday, Devon elected to bat, Alenby and Bannister opening. Alenby was bowled by Trevarthen at 34. Carroll showed his form, and when the hundred was registered his proportion was 40. Carroll was eventually caught by Whiting for 61, in which he hit nine 4's and five 5's without giving a chance (two for 125). Next followed, and Capt. Bannister missed 50. Bannister with the 8th ball clean bowled the captain, whose very useful 55 contained seven 4's (three for 142). J. F. Shelley succeeded, and Sturt was wended by a fast one from Carroll, and Light took his place at the wicket. At the adjournment the score was 170. Bannister, in Trevarthen's second over, Shelley returned run to him (four for 175). Major Garrett heard Light look playing brilliantly. Light was bowled by Trevarthen after a good display of hard hitting (five for 251). The outstanding feature of the day brought the downfall of Major Garrett, Treasman making an inconvertible catch at point (42 for 264). Robinson and Treasman now partnered. In the end Cornwall were set a severe task in progress on the good total of 300. Whitworth and Treasman opened to Wretford and Freeman. Bannister brought up 40, when Wretford removed Treasman's wicket. A. J. Godrich joined Whitworth only to witness his departure after a good catch at point. When now partnered Godrich, but the latter's stay was not prolonged (three for 60). Trevarthen followed. Light now bowled two Freeman, and with his fourth ball yorked (four for 52). Bennett fell to the same bowler, and wickets did not look near for Cornwall (five for 58). Hawken joined Trevarthen, who was caught by Davies at the wicket (42 for 115). Faves, and added 5 when Light removed his limbs (seven for 61). Mansuelli brought changes up by some hard hitting, scoring 17 in four balls, when he hit Hawken, who had added 12. Gay had a short 11s, and Whiting brought up the rear. Mansuelli lifted Light out of the ground, but was bowled the next ball for a quickly got 27. Scores:
