CRICKET.

CORNWALL v. KENT II.

... Cornwall, on Friday, began their third match in the Minor Counties Championship, having as opponents Kent second eleven, who the previous day defeated Devon at Exeter. The game, which was played at St. Clare, Penzance, was marred with fine, but dull weather, and a part of the second team of the Minor Counties first class county attracted a large gate. Cornwall had out their best available eleven, while Kent fielded upon identically the same team as which inflicted the second successive defeat upon the Dumpings. The visitors won the toss and sent the Cornishmen in to bat. W. N. Bickford-Smith and Whitworth were the first pair, Morfee and Preston having charge of the attack. Whitworth got a single off Morfee's first ball, but the Helstonian was faulty in his handling of the bowler's deliveries at the start. Preston's first over yielded only a single, the last ball completely beating both bats and wickets and going for four runs. Bickford-Smith sent up double figures by finely driving Morfee to the million rails and later got him away to deep field boundary. Scoring was slow after this, but Bickford-Smith opened matters up by lifting Preston out of the field. With 30 runs up, Hickmott displaced Morfee and was got beautifully on leg by both batsmen for singles. Preston was again banged into the long field for a run by Bickford-Smith and was then relieved by Tuff. After a couple of overs Hickmott gave way to Preston at the million end, and Bickford-Smith got one dangerously near square leg. The wicket fell at 40, Bickford-Smith being held at point off Tuff for an admirable 28. Trevarthen, the new comer, got off past point for a couple, following which Whitworth narrowly escaped being caught at mid-off off Preston. The half-century appeared as the result of as many minutes' batting, but at this total Whitworth was bowled in playing forward to second. Tresauna, the next man in, failed to open his account, Preston clean bowling him second ball—3 for 50. Vibart partnering Trevarthen the pace of scoring improved, the Helston prodigal lifting Tuff to the on for a couple and then driving him strongly for four. Vibart, however, was never comfortable with Preston, and was eventually bowled leg stump. J. C. Bickford-Smith followed and scored the 60 by cutting Tuff for three, but six runs later Trevarthen was bowled by Tuff—5 for 66. Further disaster was in store for Cornwall, Bickford-Smith being caught at forward short leg off Preston. This bowler the batsmen had found almost unplayable, the ball breaking back a lot and coming off the pitch very sharply. Maunsell, who succeeded Bickford-Smith, showed little respect for the bowler, for he lifted Preston into the air for a couple and then daringly bowled him to the leg boundary. In Preston's next over Maunsell got him to 100 for a couple, and then hit him clean off the field, the ball pitching among the trees of York House grounds—a truly audacious stroke. Such fierce hitting—two overs—had sadly spoiled Preston's innings. The score jumped along merrily, Tuff sending up 90 by turning Tuff to square leg boundary. Four men were out for Maunsell when he next faced Preston, but there was no slackening in vigour of his hitting. The century appeared, Maunsell getting runs off Preston by a series of powerful off

... Morfee now came on vice Preston, Maunsell landed the first one from him against the pavilion rails, and a couple of men dropped out. Romer was batting readily and was quite content to allow his partner to do the hitting. The 120 soon appeared, Maunsell driving Tuff past cover and reaching his individual 50 after just over a quarter of an hour's batting. Romer hit up the 140 by hitting Morfee clear away to the long leg boundary. Hickmott came on in place of Tuff, and was quickly pulled to the leg boundary by Maunsell. With the score at 150 Preston came on again in place of Morfee, but the pace of scoring if anything became faster. Maunsell was coming across everything freely and sent the 160 up by lifting Hickmott over the rails in the deep field. For this partnership had put on 100 runs in space at which Maunsell had been scoring. It may be judged from the fact that Maunsell had scored 70 Romer's contribution was 10. Maunsell now had to go at Preston, and after getting off the first two balls, presented the batsman with an easy chance of slipping, which was not accepted. At the next interval the score stood at 181 for six wickets. Resuming after lunch Maunsell and Romer soon got to work, both getting runs off Tuff. Capt. Sarel was given a turn with the ball at the pavilion end, and by driving him away to the leg boundary sent up 190. The second century man appeared, Maunsell hooking Sarel early to leg. The players were crowding in around Romer, but the batsman kept the ball down well. Maunsell got down four of his century by hitting Tuff out of the field. With the score at 200 Morfee came on at the pavilion end and Smith at the other. Maunsell got a couple and was then bowled by Morfee, but only three short of his century. The new batsman had hit three 6's and ten 4's and his partnership with Romer had raised the scores from 66 to 233. Wilson opened his account and off a no-ball Morfee got him away nicely to the leg boundary. At 242 Wilson was clean bowled by Preston in attempting to hit, but six runs later Prideaux fell to the same bowler. Whiting was bowled by Morfee, his innings closing at 249. Romer carried on for 40, an innings of inestimable value to Cornwall. Preston was the most successful bowler, taking six wickets for 66 runs. Troughton and Sarel were the first pair, bowling being in the hands of Trevarthen and Whiting. Troughton was missed by Trevarthen before he had scored, Prideaux failing to hold a lofty hit into the deep field. The score was carried to 30 by the cricket, at which total Trevarthen bowled Sarel's middle stump out of the ground. Barlow, the new comer, received his off the first ball, J. C. Bickford-Smith badly missing the ball at second stump. Troughton played delightful cricket, getting Whiting away splendidly on several occasions. With the score at 100, however, he fell to a magnificent catch by W. N. Bickford-Smith—taking a long travelling ball low down. Collins, who came next, drove Trevarthen for a single and was then lucky to escape Whiting off his stumps. This batsman subsequently hit with great power, sending Trevarthen out of the field, following a hard drive to the boundary. The 60 man appeared, and one run later W. N. Bickford-Smith held Barlow in the slips off the ball getting up awkwardly off the pitch. In the same over Collins presented Maunsell with a possible chance at the million end, but the ball was travelling too fast for the fielder to get hold of

it. With the score at 67 Collins was out in a curious manner. He jumped out to Trevarthen and missing him the ball struck Vibart's pads and rebounded on to the wickets. With Hosié and Tuff together the score was run along rapidly, the former in particular scoring with great freedom, and at 90 Wilson relieved Whiting. The Portcurnow man's first over proved rather expensive, both batsmen getting several short pitched balls away to leg. The century appeared without further loss, but two runs later Whiting caught Tuff at mid-off—5 for 102. Hosié continued to play attractive cricket and was especially severe on Wilson, who gave way to W. N. Bickford-Smith after a couple of overs. Trevarthen was bowling a splendid length, and next claimed Hosié's wicket, whose middle peg he dislodged—six for 125. With Morfee and Roberts together the pace of run getting was much slower, both exercising considerable caution. The score gradually crept up and at 140 Whiting came on again. For a time the cricket was painfully slow, and after Morfee had sent up the 160 by driving Trevarthen over the rails, Whiting bowled Roberts. Morfee scored rapidly with Preston in, but the latter had only made a single when Trevarthen got past his defence—8 for 181. Morfee reached his 50 by lifting Trevarthen into the deep field, where Whitworth badly missed him. Next ball, however, with the score at 196, Trevarthen clean bowled him for 51, which included one 6 and five 4's. The last wicket gave some trouble, it looking extremely probable that Hickmott and Smith would bring Kent's total up to Cornwall's, but when 25 short, Whiting bowled Hickmott. Trevarthen, who bowled unchanged, had the fine analysis of 7 for 92.

Cornwall resumed with just over half an hour left for play, Whitworth and Tresauna facing the bowling of Morfee and Preston. The light was none too good, but runs came steadily. At 20 Tresauna survived an appeal for lbw off Morfee, and seven runs later Hickmott displaced the fast bowler. Runs continued to come at a good pace and the 40 soon appeared. These batsmen played out time, the score being 51, or 76 ahead.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

The light rain overnight failed to affect the wicket, and when play was resumed on Saturday morning the sun came out strongly. There was not a large attendance at the start, but it was steadily growing.

Tresauna (15 not out) and Whitworth (24 not out) continued Cornwall's innings, the homesters being 76 runs on with all their wickets in hand. Preston, bowling from the pavilion end secured Whitworth's wicket with the fifth ball of his first over without any addition to the overnight total. Morfee bowled from the top end and was placed nicely to the square-leg boundary by Tresauna off a no-ball. W. N. Bickford-Smith was now at the wickets and opened his account by punishing Preston for three, but in Morfee's next over an express flashed just past the stumps. With the score at 59 Bickford-Smith was beaten with a beauty from Preston, who was getting great assistance from the pitch. Tresauna left at the same total, getting his leg in front of a straight one from Morfee—3 for 59. Romer and Trevarthen were together and Morfee was no-balled twice in succession. Trevarthen was never comfortable with Preston, being eventually magnificently caught in the long field by Hosié, who held him off a lofty hit which he took right-handed in front of the bowling screen. Maunsell

followed and Romer was given a life off Morfee, Collins missing him badly behind the wickets. Maunsell drove Morfee past mid-off and then lifted him round to leg for a couple. Facing Preston's next over, the player promptly dispatched the first ball to the square leg boundary, but off the third ball was caught at the wicket—5 for 78. J. C. Bickford-Smith sent up the 80 by cutting Morfee high through the slips, but Romer was missed at second man in the same over. Cricket was very slow, the only incident being the frequent no-balling of Morfee. With the score at 80 he was displaced by Hickmott, who was out past point by Bickford-Smith for a couple. The quality of Preston's bowling may be judged from the fact that of twelve overs sent down by him, ten were maidens, eight runs were scored and four wickets were taken. Romer, after being almost caught at silly point, sent up the 90 with an uppish stroke in the slips. Preston had no fewer than three men fielding at short square leg, and on one occasion an overpitched ball was banged between them for four by Bickford-Smith. The same player followed this up by placing Preston to the on for a couple, and Romer sent up the century by getting a single off Hickmott. With the help of several extras the score considerably improved. Bickford-Smith was now playing with great freedom, and after hooking Hickmott cleverly to the pavilion rails, cut him hard for four. Romer, too, was playing a capital game, and as in the first innings was showing the face of his bat to everything. At 118 Tuff came on for Hickmott, and Bickford-Smith at once sent up the 120 by getting him away to the leg boundary. Off the next ball Romer was out in a most extraordinary fashion. His partner drove Tuff back hard and it struck the umpire. Romer was already half way down the pitch and had no chance to get back. It was distinctly hard lines on Romer as the ball was travelling rapidly and had given mid-on no chance of stopping it. This partnership had been most fruitful and had carried the score from 78 to 122. With Vibart in the role of scoring improved, both batsmen being severe on Tuff. The pro. drove him for two fours and also cut him with terrific force to the boundary, although Tuff missed a hard return in this over. Both batsmen continued to hit out, and Vibart sent the 150 up by lifting Preston over the boundary line in the long field. This brought Morfee on again in place of Hickmott and Bickford-Smith placed him strongly to the on boundary. Vibart sent up the 160 by smashing Preston to the square-leg boundary and in the same over pulled him for another four. Preston's next over yielded two more fours to Vibart, both hard pulls to the leg boundary, and Bickford-Smith, by driving Morfee for four, placed Cornwall 200 runs to the good as the game stood. The same player turned the bowler prettily to leg for three and Vibart reached his 40 in the same over by hitting Morfee to the deep field boundary, which stroke he repeated two balls later. Preston was taken off and Smith put on. Bickford-Smith got a couple of fours off the two first balls and reached his 50. By driving the third ball for four, the second century was sent up, the crowd being delighted at Cornwall's fine recovery.

Numerous bowling changes were tried and Vibart when only two short of the half century, was caught at third man off Tuff—7 for 205. The vigour of Vibart's batting may be judged from the fact that his 48 included one 6 and ten 4's. While he was at the wickets the score had been

advanced from 122 to 205. Wilson came next and opened by getting Tuff prettily to leg for a single, following which he sent him past point for four. Preston was now brought on at the pavilion end, and by turning him to leg for three, Bickford-Smith sent up the 220. This change and the desired effect, Wilson being bowled with the total at 224. Two runs later Bickford-Smith was lbw to Tuff for a splendid innings of 72, which included seven fours. Coming as it did at such a crucial time it was a really great display, and, moreover, was without a chance. The end came soon after, Pridaux, after Whiting had had a couple of hits, being bowled by Preston. The innings closed at 230, leaving Kent 256 to get to win. Preston came out with the fine analysis of 6 for 62, and of the 27 overs sent down by him no fewer than 16 were maidens.

Kent had a bare quarter of an hour's batting before lunch, Capt. Sarel and Tuff opening to Trevarthen and Whiting. With the score at four Sarel was dismissed, being caught in the slips off Trevarthen. Collins, who came next, got the first ball up dangerously near W. N. Bickford-Smith in the slips, but the fielder was unable to get to it. When the interval was taken the score stood at 15.

When play was resumed there was a capital attendance. Tuff soon got to work on Trevarthen, a fine shot going past cover for four, following which he turned the bowler to the leg boundary. Collins sent up 30 by driving Whiting for four and Tuff was rather severe on Trevarthen in his next over, getting a couple of fours through slips. The half century soon appeared, the batsmen displaying any amount of confidence. This brought Tresawna on for Trevarthen and Tuff got him twice to the leg boundary in succession. The total had reached 62 when Whiting upset Tuff's middle stump, the batsman's contribution being 42, which were obtained by attractive cricket.

Troughton, who came to the wickets next, at once lost Collins, who placed one from Tresawna tamely into Maunsell's hands at mid-off—3 for 62. Further success came Cornwall's way, Troughton foolishly running himself out five runs later; while at the same total Morfee cocked one up to Tresawna at cover off Whiting—5 for 67. No wonder the home county's supporters cheered! With every prospect of a victory the Cornishmen threw themselves into the game with redoubled energy, their fielding being exceptionally keen. Hosie got Whiting up dangerously in the slips and then the Penzance pro. secured Barlow's wicket, getting him lbw—6 for 69. Tresawna frequently had the batsmen in difficulties, and with Roberts and Hosie together a smart return by Whiting almost ran the latter out. The score went along by singles, Hosie sending the 80 up by lifting Whiting to the square leg boundary. Off the next ball, however, J. C. Bickford-Smith held him at mid-on off a tremendous drive—7 for 82. The way in which the game had gone all in Cornwall's favour since lunch was little short of phenomenal, six wickets advancing the score only 20 runs. At 87 Roberts was dismissed by a splendid catch at first man by W. N. Bickford-Smith, the fielder holding the ball at the second attempt.

Trevarthen now came back in place of Tresawna and was at once driven for four by Hickmott. With the score at 95 Whiting caught and bowled Hickmott, and Smith, the last man, got the Penzance pro. through the slips for a hard run three, but the ball came too near

W. N. Bickford-Smith to be altogether comfortable. Preston sent up the century by driving Trevarthen for a couple, but in this over Smith was caught, Cornwall thus winning by 153 runs, the game being all over by 3.30. The result was warmly applauded by the crowd, Whiting in particular receiving an ovation. The Penzance pro. had bowled magnificently throughout and had the fine analysis of six wickets for 36 runs. Full scores and analysis—

CORNWALL v. KENT II.

FINE INNINGS BY MOUNSELL.

This most exciting match opened at Penzance yesterday. Kent, on winning the toss, sent in Cornwall. A. S. Whitworth and W. N. Bickford-Smith faced the bowling of Morice and Preston. The batsmen opened with confidence, and after successive boundaries off Preston, Bickford-Smith hit him for six. H. W. Morice was supplanted by Hickmott, while Tuff, taking the place of Preston, in his second over, got rid of Bickford-Smith (1 for 60). Whitworth was bowled by Preston for 12, and the same bowler sent back Treasvna without addition (3 for 50). Vihart's wicket fell to Preston, and J. C. Bickford-Smith was now the batsman of the West to stop the net which had not in. He opened well with 2 and 3 off Tuff, but the latter had his revenge when Treasvna pulled and into the wicket, having scored 11, while J. C. Bickford-Smith put an easy one to forward short-leg, and was secured by Tuff, the hopes temporarily blighted. Mounsell, however, renewed the hopes, opening with a 2 and 4, and Homer kept on end up. Anything might now happen, and a late four drove grounds and 2 off Preston further rejoiced the crowd when supplemented by 1 off the same bowler. Homer played Tuff to the on boundary, bringing up 24. Mounsell still hit vigorously, getting Preston for two 3's and a pair of couples in his next over, having scored 21. A further 5 off Tuff brought on Morice as the partner end, and his first ball met a like fate to the boundary. Three 4's and two 4 byes, all off Tuff, brought Mounsell total to 62. Hickmott replaced Tuff, and 150 appeared on the board—a wonderful recovery from an unpromising start. Preston was again struck by Morice, and Mounsell on-drive Hickmott for 1 and missed him for 4. At the adjournment for lunch Mounsell was 71, Homer 10, and the total for six wickets 191. Resuming, Homer missed three off Tuff, which Mounsell repaid. Captain Barlow was now bowling, and Mounsell, not to show partiality, brought 200 as on the scoring board by playing him for a pair of 4's and a 1. He next hit Tuff clean out of the ground when Tuff bowled him (20), and then, running out to Morice, Mounsell was clean bowled, having contributed an excellent innings containing three 4's and ten 4's. H. W. Wilson opened by playing a scorching ball from Morice for 4, but shortly after was sent back by Preston (8 for 62). When joined by Frideaux, Homer put Morice nearly to bed for 4, but Frideaux surprised a few balls only (8 for 24). Whiting brought up the rear, and was bowled by Morice without addition, the innings closing for 240.

Kent opened with Captain Barlow and L. H. Troughton to the bowlers of Treasvna and Whiting. In the second over Troughton should have been taken in the long field by Frideaux. Barlow drove Whiting to the boundary, while Troughton hit Treasvna to leg each for 4. The same batsman served Whiting in like manner, but at 26 Capt. Barlow was bowled by Treasvna for 18. Barlow followed, and was let off by J. Bickford-Smith, at slip, first ball. Troughton opened his shoulders to Whiting for a clean drive for 1, but in the next over was nearly caught by W. N. Bickford-Smith at second man (two for 43). Collins joined Barlow, and hit Treasvna out of the ground for 4. Immediately after Barlow was nearly caught by W. N. Bickford-Smith (three for 61). A little later Collins was out to a peculiar ball, which, bounding off Vihart's pads, removed a ball while the batsman was out of his wicket (four for 67). A. L. Hunt now partnered Tuff, the latter being mostly taken by Whiting at mid off (five for 182). Treasvna removed Homer's middle stump, he having contributed a useful 25 (six for 126). How cricket manner, until Morice, weary of waiting for some balls, hit the corner up to the adjoining meadow for 4, this being followed by Whiting clean bowling Roberts, who had added 14 (seven for 140). Morice, who had now got 80, continued to take advantage of any weakness, but lost his partner, who fell to a Yorker from Treasvna (eight for 126). While 10 Morice gave a chance in the long field to Whitworth, but the good ball from Treasvna, removed his wicket (nine for 126). Morice hit six 4 and five 3's in his very useful innings. Hickmott, now joined by Smith, brought up the total within appreciable distance of the Cornwall men, hitting out freely and losing no opportunity of short runs. Hickmott fell when the total was 224, leaving Kent 20 runs in arrears. Cornwall, 25 runs to the good, opened their second innings with Whitworth and Treasvna, who in the 40 minutes' play scored 61 without being parted. Score:—

CORNWALL v. KENT II.

BRIILLIANT WIN FOR THE CORNISHMEN.

Cornwall beat the strong Kent side at Penzance by 153 runs. The home county were in a strong position overnight, being 70 runs on with all their wickets in hand, and though they reposed clandestinely, sufficient runs collected to give them the victory. It was a satisfactory feature to find that good bowling was backed up by smart fielding, with the result that the visitors were dismissed in their second venture for 102. Whiting bowling so well that he came out with the fine analysis of six wickets for 36 runs. There had been a little rain in the morning, which seemed to help the bowlers, and four wickets went down quickly with only 10 runs added to the Cornwall score. The partnership between J. C. Bickford-Smith and Vihart proved the most valuable for the day. Treasvna the bowler with scanty respect, the latter hit so vigorously that his innings of 48 consisted of a 5 and ten 4's. The partnership realized 63. J. C. Bickford-Smith was ninth out for 72, which included eleven 4's. Cornwall were all out for 230 shortly before lunch, leaving Kent 206 to get to win. This did not seem too great a task, but the bowling and fielding were too good for them, and they collapsed. Though they lost a wicket with only four runs scored, Collins and Tuff improved the position by staying together to put on 56. The third wicket, however, did not produce a single, the fourth and fifth went down with only five runs added, and the sixth with an addition of two, six being down for 69. Whiting was bowling well, and the fielding was excellent. Roberts and Homer looked like stopping the run, but the latter fell with the score at 82, and the end soon came. Kent being all out for 102 in just over an hour and a half. Whiting came out with a fine analysis, and Treasvna bowled well, though his analysis did not show 8.
