**BERKSHIRE START WELL.
DISAPPOINTING RESPONSE OF
CARMARTHENSHIRE.**

With seven wickets in hand, Carmarthenshire were 137 runs behind Berkshire in their first innings at Llanelly. The visitors, batting first on Friday, compiled 200 runs. H. Brougham, going in first wicket down, played attractive cricket for 54 out of 84 in a little over half-an-hour. He secured eight fours and a six. Hugh Howell was the most successful bowler, taking five wickets for 39 runs, while C. S. Trubshaw captured three for 76. Carmarthenshire's rate of scoring was painfully slow. Having batted for nearly an hour and a half, during which time they only obtained 63 runs for the loss of three wickets, rain came on, making further play impossible. The game was not resumed on Saturday owing to rain. Scores:—

**BERKSHIRE AT LLANELLY.
CARMARTHENSHIRE'S REPLY.**

These counties met at Llanelly on Friday in connection with the minor counties competition. The progress of the game was towards the evening hindered by rain. Berkshire, who went to the wickets first, compiled 200 runs. Four only of their number got into double figures. H. Brougham, who before having contributed ten runs gave the home stumper a chance, was top scorer with 54 runs. The catch by Ike Evans in the long field, which was responsible for Brougham's dismissal, was a beauty. Brougham's score included hits for a six and eight 4's. The best innings, however, was that of Shoosmith, who, without giving a single chance until he was caught by Davies off C. S. Trubshaw, scored 42 runs. Hugh Howell, the most effective bowler on the Carmarthenshire side, took five wickets for 39 runs, whilst C. S. Trubshaw captured three for 76.

Carmarthenshire's innings opened in promising fashion by Ike Evans and Percy Rees, but before the separation an adjournment had to be made owing to the rain, three wickets had fallen for 63 runs.

COUNTY CRICKET.

MATCH SPOILED BY RAIN.

THE RETURN TO BERKS.

For the first time in two seasons the Berkshire eleven have had to leave a match in an unfinished condition. Friday and Saturday's game at Lissoy with Carmarthenshire was spoiled by the rain, and to such a degree that it was impossible for each side to finish an innings. The match will, therefore, not be counted in the working out of the championship places. This seems to be more to the advantage of Berkshire than if the innings of the home team had been completed—had Berks won on the first innings a couple of points would have been dropped, and if they had lost they would have had only one point. As it is the match does not count at all, and Berkshire have their full percentage of points.

THE BERKSHIRE INNINGS.

To reach a total of 200 Berkshire were almost entirely indebted to Shoosmith, H. Brougham, Whichelow, and Captain Rowe, who obtained valuable scores of 42, 54, 51, and 27 respectively. Shoosmith is admirable this season, Mr. Brougham is rendering excellent service for his county, and Whichelow, the young local professional, deserved his inclusion in the team this season, and is developing into a fine player. Captain Rowe made his second appearance in the team this season, and made a contribution of 21—his score against Bucks was 32. Carmarthenshire had obtained 63 for the loss of three wickets, when the game was brought to an untimely end. The scores were:

Club Cricket.

One of the largest individual innings of the present season is the 268 not out made by H. Harrison on the 2nd inst. for Broughton Wednesday against Swinton and Pendlebury on the Clifton ground. He hit four 6's and fifty-five 4's, and contributed his runs to a total of 363 for three wickets. Swinton and Pendlebury were all out for 101.

Lord Harris, playing for Band of Brothers v. Royal Artillery, at Woolwich on Friday and Saturday, scored 31 not out in his first innings and 76 in his second. He was the heaviest run-getter for either side, and had a great deal to do with the B. B.'s success by three wickets.

Some fast run-getting was recorded in Saturday's match between Dulwich and Charlton Park on the latter's ground. The Park, for whom William McCaulis made 55 not out, declared with eight wickets down for 217, and then saw Dulwich run up 231 for four in 95 minutes. S. J. Goodall, going in first, scored 129 and carried out his bat.

The Beddington C.C., whose Week concluded on Saturday last, has for several years been recognized as one of the strongest in Surrey. The date of its formation is uncertain, but it is believed that it was evolved from a club formed by the choristers of Beddington Church. At that time—about fifty years ago—the Rector of Beddington was Canon Bridges, a great enthusiast of the game, and the father of Mr. J. H. Bridges, who was for four years in the Winchester Eleven, and is the President of the Club. The early records of the Beddington C.C. have not been preserved, and the oldest score available seems to be of the match against West Kent at Chislehurst in August, 1863—a game, curiously enough, not mentioned by Mr. Philip Norman in his *Annals of the West Kent C.C.* It is not surprising to find that Beddington were defeated on that occasion, for among their opponents were several Normans and Lubbocks, Herbert Jenner and the Hon. Spencer Ponsonby. The home of the Beddington Club has always been Beddington Park, thanks to the generosity first of Canon Bridges and, afterwards, of his son, Mr. J. H. Bridges. It was there that, in 1876, was played a match which is often referred to by old players. It was against Marlborough Nomads, and Beddington stayed at the wickets the whole of the day, scoring 536 for nine wickets—a very large total in those times. Many well-known men appeared for Beddington that day, among them being F. H. Birley (68), the late H. R. Webbe (23), Vernon Royle (136), J. H. Bridges (51), W. Lindsay (116), H. A. Hodgson (45 not out), the present Rector and for several seasons captain of the club, and the Rev. R. E. Lee, whose lobs frequently played havoc among opposing batsmen. Mr. Bridges led the side for a dozen years and Mr. Hodgson for an even longer period. The present captain is Mr. L. W. S. Rostron, another Old Wykehamist, who was a contemporary of Mr. H. D. G. Leveson-Gower. Undoubtedly the best-known cricketer the club has produced is Robert Henderson, who played for Surrey for many seasons and has been for more than thirty years a member of the Beddington Church Choir, but there have also been other players—such as the brothers Gilbert and Wilfred Reay—who needed only experience of first-class cricket to make a name for themselves.

A remarkable performance has been accomplished by J. C. Davies, a member of the Towyn School team. Playing against Aberystwyth, Davies dismissed the first four batsmen for a few runs, and later, in one over, took the remaining six wickets with consecutive balls, thus securing all ten in the innings. He is the son of Mr. Walter Davies, of London House, Lampeter, South Wales.

A match was played at South Croydon on Monday between the ten brothers Parris, whose ages range from 20 to 47, and the Brighton Road C.C. The match resulted in a win for the brothers by 54 runs. Percy Parris and Walter Parris obtained 40 of their runs in a quarter of an hour. This is the fourth annual match between the two sides, the Family having won all the three games which have been finished.
