**BERKS v. BUCKS.**

Before making any remarks on the match which took place on Bank Holiday and Tuesday, let me first say how pleased I am that there was a much better attendance than is customary at the Reading Amateur Sports Club ground for the county cricket matches. The opening day was a splendid one and the attendance numbered over 500, the takings amounting to nearly £10, which small figures constitute a record! However, the club is thankful that its really excellent cricket is being appreciated by the sport-loving public of Reading. My own opinion is that the cricket match on Monday was the best item of Bank Holiday's long list of local entertainments.

**BUCKS BAT FIRST.**

Buckinghamshire batted first, and Mr. Belcher and Mr. Lockhart supplied the bowling. With the score at 13, Mr. Le Gros was caught by Mr. Morris—an old stager—and then after Dr. Weaver Adams's departure Mr. Jennison and Mr. Shaw made a third-wicket stand. Some delightful batting was witnessed, although at times it seemed slow. Sir C. Y. Nepean tried several changes in attack, but the two batsmen were very safe. During the stand the Berkshire fielding showed up prominently by reason of its excellence, some splendid stops being made. At length, with Hawksworth going on at St. Andrew's Home and Mr. Lockhart at the pavilion end, things altered amazingly. The partnership commenced just after noon and shortly before one Mr. Lockhart sent down the simplest-looking ball imaginable, and it caught Mr. Shaw in two minds and clean bowled him. It was a really fine ball. The partnership had added 96 runs, the outgoing batsman's contribution being 57. He hit eight fours and a six. Then with the next ball but one the googly bowler took Mr. Franklin's wicket, and in the next over Hawksworth and the score was 118 for 5—a quarter of an hour since it was 118 for 2! Things went well for the home county, as two more wickets fell before luncheon. The first two wickets took two hours to obtain, and the next five fell in half an hour—a remarkable change. After lunch another stand was made, Mr. Leat, the Slough footballer, scoring an invaluable 51 not out—securing four sixes and five fours—an Mr. Hiatt a 21, which was worth as much again, and the total stood at 214.

**BERKSHIRE COLLAPSE.**

This total should have proved easy for Berkshire to have passed. The wicket—thanks to Mr. Croom—was perfect, and the home county should have been full value for 250. But it was not so—they collapsed inexplicably; methinks they were too cocksure. The side were out for the poor total of 169. And if it had not been for a timely stand by the two bowlers, Mr. Lockhart and Hawksworth, it would not have been so many as that. Berkshire, on their own ground, before their record gathering, thodily brought there by reason of their excellent away record, had scored 103 for the loss of nine wickets, and were over a hundred behind! Then it was that Mr. Lockhart and Hawksworth came to the rescue. By careful play and hitting, all loose balls they added the much-needed runs, and they had increased the total by 66 when Hawksworth fell to a catch by Franklin off Mr. Wright. The stand was one of the best things of the season! Bucks has been responsible for the Berkshire Club has been thankful Mr. Wright (4 for 24) and Mr. Hiatt (5 for 31) for their old opponents' cheap dismissal. Berkshire's bowling honours fell to Mr. Lockhart (6 for 104) and Hawksworth (3 for 22).

**THE SECOND INNINGS.**

Buckinghamshire on going to the wickets for the second time fared badly, and at the close of play had scored only 106 for 6. This total was brought to 154 on Tuesday morning, when the innings came to an end at twelve o'clock. Berkshire were thus left 210 to win. They started very well, and at lunch had obtained 124 of the necessary runs for the loss of three wickets only. On returning, though, things went none too

well for the home county. Mr. Brougham ought to have been caught when at sixty, and the mistake proved costly to Bucks, as the batsman took the opportunity of adding another sixty afterwards. Had the catch been made—it was in the long field, low down, and the fielder had the rays of the sun in his eyes—Bucks would probably have won. As it was, Berkshire had many misgivings as to the ultimate result.

**THE MATCH WON.**

Mr. Brougham played freely, but nobody stayed with him long. Mr. Morris was caught in the long field before he had scored, and Mr. Belcher and Dr. Woodburn soon fell. Then Mr. Brougham was caught at the wicket, after having made 122. This score included twenty-two fours. It was then that Berkshire might have collapsed

and they narrowly missed doing so. Sir Charles Nepean and Mr. Lockhart came in, and after hitting about eight the Berkshire captain gave the easiest of catches to either the wicket-keeper (Mr. Franklin) or to Mr. Leat. Both went for the ball; the wicket-keeper said "Right!" and—missed it! It was a lucky thing for Berkshire. The two batsmen then slowly put on the necessary runs. The winning hit was curious. Mr. Leat delivered the ball, and the umpire called "No-ball." Mr. Lockhart hit out at it and just tipped the ball, which went up into point's hands. The catch did not count, but the no-ball counted for one run, and the match was won! I do not think I exaggerate when I say that had the Bucks fielding been as good as their opponents the points would have gone to the visitors. Full score and analysis:—

**BUCKS BEATEN.—A BRILLIANT OVERTHROW BY BROUGHAM.**

Things looked very ominous for Berkshire at one period of the match with Buckinghamshire on the Amateur Sports Ground on Monday and Tuesday, but eventually the home county won by three wickets. Bucks won the toss and ran up a total of 214. Berkshire's reply to this was rather feeble, the whole side being dismissed for 168, a total which would have been much smaller, but for a fine last wicket stand in which J. H. B. Lockhart and Hawksworth were concerned. Bucks' second venture realised 174, Berkshire thus being not to get 210 for victory. That reliable bat, Shoosmith, failed for once, but H. Brougham, who was dismissed for a cypher in the first innings, and G. G. M. Bennett came to the rescue. Included in Brougham's magnificent century were 22 fours, and apart from a chance given shortly after reaching his half century, his innings was faultless. It was left for Sir C. Y. Nepean and J. H. B. Lockhart to finish the good work started by Bennett and Brougham, and this they easily succeeded in doing. E. Hiatt, who batted so usefully for Bucks in both innings, is the Reading Amateur F.C. centre-forward. Score:—

Obituary.

Mr. J. H. ROBERTS.

Mr. James Harry Roberts died at Linden House, Bexhill, on the 11th inst, aged 46. He was in the Uppingham Eleven in 1882 and 1883, being a good bat, a useful field and a safe catch. In his first year he did little, but in 1883 he was second in the batting averages, with just under 20 runs an innings, and took fifteen wickets for 20-60 runs each. He proceeded to Cambridge, but did not obtain his Blue. In December, 1888, he assisted Major Warton's team against XXII. of Western Districts at Newlands—the first match ever played by an English side in South Africa—and scored 20 and 4: in his first innings he made a fine on-drive for six off Ashley. In 1889 he became a member of the M.C.C., and his name will occasionally be found in I Zingari and Uppingham Rovers matches. At one time he was a good Rugby footballer, and for some years was a follower of the Pytchley Hounds.

Mr. H. H. SECRETAN.

Mr. H. H. Secretan, an Old Marlburian, died at Fendalton, Canterbury (N.Z.), on June 16th. He learned his cricket at Marlborough, and was a stylish batsman, a useful bowler and an active and energetic field. He had been settled in New Zealand for almost forty years, and was for several seasons a member of the Canterbury team. In his last big match—against Auckland—he scored 75, but perhaps his best innings, taking into consideration the bowling against which it was played, was his 35 for Canterbury v. Murdoch's team of 1882.

T. MYCROFT.

Thomas Mycroft, for twenty-two years a much-respected member of the M.C.C.'s ground-staff at Lord's, and for several seasons a well-known umpire, died on Sunday at Derby. He was born at Birmingham on March 28th, 1848, and was therefore in his sixty-fourth year at the time of his death. A brother of the once famous bowler, William Mycroft, he never took a prominent position in the game, but he played occasionally for Derbyshire. He was of use chiefly as a wicket-keeper, but as he was contemporaneous with A. Smith and Disney, he did not appear regularly for the county. His benefit, at Lords, was favoured by fine weather and realised over a thousand pounds.
