

CAMBRIDGESHIRE CRICKET. No Senior Competition to be Held This Season.

MATCHES WITH OUTSIDE CLUBS. Seniors Debarred from Playing in Junior Competitions.

Good progress towards the re-starting of cricket on Parker's Piece was made at the annual meeting of the Cambridgeshire Cricket Association, held at Hayward's, Regent-street, on Wednesday evening. It was decided that a Senior League competition should not be held this year, but that senior matches should be arranged with clubs outside the town. It was agreed to hold a junior competition, and a motion was unanimously passed debarring from this competition for this year any member of a club who has at any time played in a senior competition.

Mr. A. R. Hill, as senior vice-president, was in the chair, and others present were: Major Oliver Papworth, Messrs. A. B. Diver, P. French, P. W. Gray, A. J. Rich, F. W. French, E. H. Church, T. P. Gray).

WHAT THE COMMONS COMMITTEE HAS DONE.

The Chairman, in his opening remarks, explained what the Council of the Association had done to get cricket re-commenced. One of the first things they did, he said, was to approach the Commons Committee of the Town Council to see if it were possible to restore Parker's Piece to its old splendid condition. He was happy to say that with the great help of that Committee they had got the match ground on the Piece looking something like its former self. Everything was not yet quite satisfactory, but he would like to express the thanks of the Association in the first instance, and of all cricketers in the second, for what the Commons Committee had done. It had not been satisfactory to see the match ground cut up by boys playing football and cricket on it, and he had written to the Town Clerk about it. The Town Clerk had sent a very satisfactory reply, stating that the question of the supervision of Parker's Piece had been raised at the last meeting of the Commons Committee, and the Chairman and Borough Surveyor were authorised to obtain the services of a man to attend to the Piece. He (the Town Clerk) had seen the Borough Surveyor, and had asked him to do what he could to prevent boys playing on the match ground.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The Treasurer submitted his financial statement. There had been practically no receipts and no payments since 1915. They stood with a balance on the deposit account of £15, and on the current account of £1 17s. 1d., making a total balance in hand of £16 17s. 1d.

A SENIOR ELEVEN.

The Secretary reported that there had been no cricket since the last meeting in 1915. The question now arose as to what competitions should take place in the coming season. That was for the meeting to decide. The Council felt that as far as the senior competition was concerned, there seemed little prospect of it being held. In that event they suggested that there should be formed a senior eleven to take its place, and that they should arrange matches on Parker's Piece with clubs from outside the town on days other than Thursday and Saturday. As far as the junior competition was concerned, the matter was left in abeyance to see what the opinion of the various junior clubs was. He pointed out that under the rules anyone who had taken part in the senior competition could not enter for a junior competition until after two years, and that as no cricket had been played since 1915, that period had lapsed, and all were free for the latter competition. The question of the qualification of a junior club should be left to the Council to determine.

As to whether it was possible or desirable to run a senior competition, the Chairman said the Council thought there should be selected teams from the affiliated clubs who could play against class teams from outside, and thus they might get better cricketers than they might otherwise obtain.

Mr. P. W. Gray thought the proposition which came from the Council a very wise one.

Mr. Manning (St. Giles') agreed with Mr. Gray. He thought it was hardly worth while running a senior competition this year for one or two clubs.

Mr. P. W. French also fell in with the suggestion of the Council. There was no reason why they should not start some representative matches on the lines proposed, and play on Thursday and Saturday as well.

Mr. Gray moved that there be no Senior League competition this year, and that the Council take into consideration the question of friendly senior matches with clubs outside the town.

Mr. Manning seconded, and the proposition was unanimously carried.

THE JUNIOR COMPETITION.

With regard to the junior competition, discussion was invited, and on behalf of New Chesterton Institute, Bottisham, St. Giles', and the Y.M.C.A. clubs, it was stated that they would favour the starting of such a competition.

Mr. Rich moved, and Mr. Melbourn seconded, that the junior club competition be started, and this was unanimously agreed to.

QUALIFICATION AS JUNIORS.

With regard to the rule debarring senior players from entering junior competitions for two years, the Secretary thought the matter of qualification should be left to the Council to decide.

Mr. P. W. Gray did not agree. He thought the matter might be left to the sporting instinct of the cricketers of Cambridge.

The Secretary said his opinion was that the junior competition should be run by juniors. They might as well run a senior competition if they were going to have senior men in again.

Mr. Diver urged that a decision should be arrived at as to what was a junior club and what was not.

The Chairman said they must be guided by their rules, and these held good unless they were amended at a special meeting called for that purpose.

Mr. Diver pointed out that as the rule at present stood, owing to the war, any senior man could play in a junior club competition, and no one could stop him.

Major Papworth said that notice must be given before January 31st to alter the rules, so that they could not possibly be altered this year.

Mr. Percy French said it should be laid down definitely who should and who should not be allowed to play in junior competitions, so that the senior members might know where they stood.

After some further discussion, Major Papworth said he thought they wanted to re-associate into the Association and get as much cricket this year as they could. He thought they could very well decide that night that every club should be allowed to enter for the competition, and that they tacitly ignore the rule for the present moment. They could say that any club who was affiliated could enter, but no member of that club who had at any time played in a senior competition should be eligible during the present year to play for the club in the junior competition. He did not think the senior men would feel aggrieved at such a decision, and he moved a resolution to that effect.

Mr. Church seconded:

The motion was unanimously carried.

It was agreed, on the motion of Mr. F. French, to run the competition on the "knock-out" in preference to the league system.

PRESIDENT'S RESIGNATION.

A letter was read from Mr. Charles Pigg, President of the Association, resigning his position, as he was away from Cambridge.

On the motion of Major Papworth, seconded by Mr. P. W. Gray, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Pigg for his very great and valuable services to cricket in the past.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

The Chairman moved that Capt. R. S. Hicks, of Wilbraham, be elected president in place of Mr. Pigg.

Mr. F. French seconded, and this was unanimously agreed to.

All the vice-presidents were re-elected, it being left to the various clubs to bring forward fresh names. It was also agreed, on the motion of Major Papworth, to ask the local Members of Parliament who are not already occupying that position to become vice-presidents.

Mr. Richford was re-elected secretary, with Mr. Percy French assistant secretary. Mr. Gray was re-elected treasurer, and Messrs. F. G. Morgan and Gordon Pratt were appointed auditors.

CAMBRIDGE "BLUE" VINDICATED.

The Story of a Drowning Boy.

Mr. S. M. J. Woods, better known as "Sammy" Woods, the famous Cambridge Blue and International cricketer, was one of the witnesses at an inquest held at Bath on Saturday on a 13-year-old boy who was drowned at Burnham-on-Sea under remarkable circumstances. The boy, Percy Martin, who was one of a party of 37 boys of the Sutcliffe Industrial School, Bath, became stuck in the mud whilst the tide was flowing and was carried away. Frank James, the son of the Superintendent of the school, who was in charge of the lads, said that he heard one of the boys shout that he was stuck in the mud. He seized hold of him, and also of another boy who was in a similar predicament, and got them both to the shore. Meanwhile, he heard that the boy Martin was drowning. He sent one of the boys to Martin's assistance, and "called a gentleman who was bathing 50 yards away, but the latter did not come to the lad's aid before he (witness) had reached shore with the two other boys."

Continuing, witness heard shouts, "Martin is gone!" The sea was rough, but the water, witness admitted, was not more than two feet deep. Witness added that he did not go into the water after Martin.

"Why not?" asked the Deputy-Coroner. James said the boy had already been gone some minutes.

The Coroner: That didn't matter; you should have tried.

Witness: I am not a swimmer. The tide was coming in, and I should have had to go under water to get him out. Witness added that he was at Mons, and also had been gassed.

The Coroner: You suggest it was dangerous to go to the boy's rescue, and yet you had already sent the boy in.

Witness: The boy was a swimmer.

After bringing the two boys ashore, James went home to change his clothes. Martin's body was recovered two hours later.

The "gentleman bather" referred to by the witness was Mr. S. M. J. Woods, who then gave evidence. He said he had been swimming about ten minutes when four little boys raised their arms and shouted for help. He went to them and told them to get ashore. He thought they were trying to fool him, and splashed water on them. They got ashore without difficulty. He heard no appeal for help from James, who was only ten yards away, neither did two ladies, Mrs. Holt and Miss Scott, who were there.

Mr. Woods said that the first he heard about the boy being drowned was a few hours before the inquest. Witness repudiated the suggestion that he did not go to the lad's aid. He said he had saved two people from shark-infested waters in Australia, and held a life-saving medal. He certainly should not run away from boys.

The Coroner said that the accusation made against Mr. Woods was extraordinary. The man who made the charge did not come out well on his own showing, and cast the blame on others.

The jury expressed cordial appreciation of the Coroner's reference to Mr. Woods, and returned a verdict of "Accidentally drowned."

At the jury's request, the Coroner severely censured Frank James, and asked the police to report to headquarters that James ought not to be permitted to have the care of boys when bathing.

BOTTISHAM WIN THE MATCH BY
54 RUNS.

GORDON'S FINE EFFORT FOR LAURELS.

Bottisham were in a strong position when the final of the Junior Cup was resumed on Parker's Piece last Friday, before a good attendance, for with two wickets to fall in their second innings they had established a lead of 133. In response to the total of 88 made by Bottisham, the Laurels were the previous day all disposed of for 37. They never batted in convincing style, as A. Jarvis (who has played for Bottisham for 20 years) was on the top of his form with the ball and secured 7 wickets for but 16 runs, hitting the stumps on six occasions.

Re-commencing, Pettitt (no out 31) was accompanied to the wicket by Newman. Gordon completed an over from the Regent-street end, and Mason took the opposite side, Pettitt turning his first ball to leg for four in good style. The game was then stopped for a few minutes owing to Pettitt being hit on the face by a rising ball from Gordon. Two balls later he was caught near the leg boundary, the total then being 87. Marsh was caught at mid-wicket without scoring, and the innings closed for one less than their first venture. Gordon followed up his bowling of the first innings by an even better performance, taking 6 wickets for 18 runs, and in the match capturing ten wickets at a shade over five runs each.

The Laurels, who were set 130 runs to get to win, opened with F. Baker and Kirkup. Jarvis and Marsh were the bowlers. The innings opened disastrously for the local side, Kirkup being out leg before to the first ball from Marsh, Jarvis having previously sent down a maiden over. Rose, who went in last in the first innings, and played Jarvis as confidently as anybody, went in first wicket, and turning the fourth ball of the fourth over to leg scored the first run for the Laurels. With but three runs scored Baker reached forward to Marsh, but the ball broke across and took his off stump. Gordon followed, and opened with a single. The wicket appeared to be breaking up somewhat, as the ball was doing some strange things. Both bowlers were getting enough work on to make the batsmen very careful. Rose was never as confident as on the previous day, and with nine up he was beaten by Jarvis, eleven overs having been sent down. Hagan followed, but only an occasional single was being scored. In this respect it should be stated that the Bottisham field was well set. As the result of half an hour's play but a dozen runs had been obtained—all singles. They went on by singles to 16, when Gordon, who appeared to be getting set, cut Jarvis for four and drove him to the off for two. Hagan then got Marsh round to the leg boundary. The pair had put on 23, and were just beginning to take liberties with the field when Hagan was well caught on the leg boundary. The next wicket fell without addition, Tyler being bowled off his second ball, and half the side were out for 32. Newman joined Gordon, and was nearly out leg before to his first ball from Marsh, surviving a very confident appeal. However, he had only made three when he was well beaten by Jarvis. Pettitt then took the opposite end, and his first over contained a four, three singles, and a wicket, Juby being smartly taken in the slips.

Mason had made three when he was badly missed by mid-off to Pettitt. Gordon was batting very nicely, and glanced Jarvis neatly to the leg boundary, and shortly afterwards drove Pettitt to the leg for four, and reached his 50 after an hour and a quarter's play.

At 73 Arthur Arber relieved Pettitt, but runs continued to come at a fair pace. The pair had put on 34, before Mason was well caught at deep mid-on. The Laurels with two wickets to fall still required 60 runs to win, but their hopes fell when Gordon was at length tempted by Jarvis and was caught at point. Considering the circumstances, Gordon gave an excellent display, and made a great effort to pull the match out of the fire for his side.

Howlett, who had not given an extra in the two innings, stumped the last man, and Bottisham won by 54 runs. In the match Jarvis took 11 wickets for 59 runs.

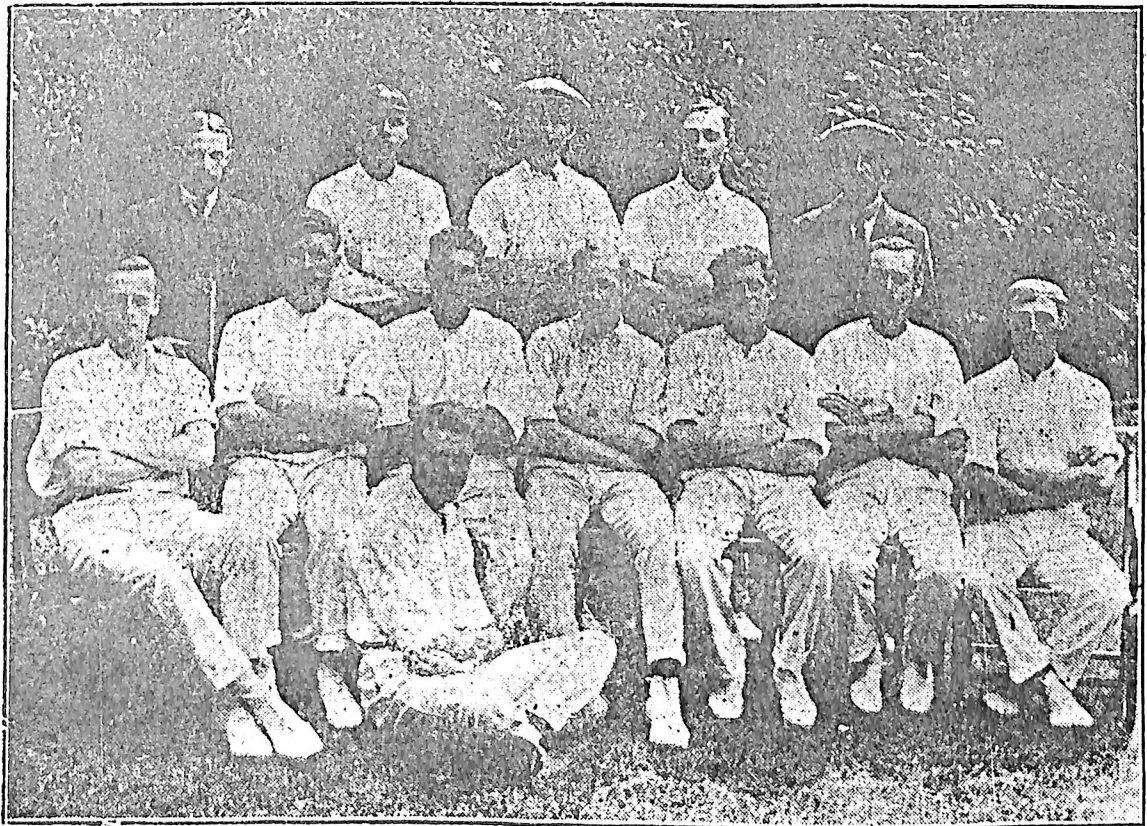
