At 24 the first wicket fell. Hope being held by Common, off Milam. After 16 more had been added, a change in houring was made at both ends, Burroweliff, and Turner relieving Milam and Smith, but Morris and Anthony continued to bat steadily until 63 was reached, when the former, who made a neeful 26, was clean bowled by Turner Clunic took the ball from Turner and got Hodgson cleverly caught in the slips by Burroweliff, the score standing at 65.
