## TO-DAY'S MATCHES.

### COUNTY MATCH IN NEWCASTLE

The first County match in Newcastle since August, 1914, will take place at the Northumberland County Ground, Osborne Avenue, to-day, when Northumberland and Durham will provide the opposition. There is every indication that there will be a record attendance, and the fact that the match is under friendly auspices should not detract from its interest or the keenness of play. Only fine weather is needed to make the function a great success. In past years both teams have always played

a close game, and on this occasion a match reminiscent of old times is confidently expected. A melancholy interest attaches to the game, because of the absence of some of the stalwarts of county cricket who have lost their lives in the "greater game". The familiar figures of C. M. Skinner, C. Y. Adamson, and T. Coulson—to mention only three—will not be seen again. As a mark of respect to the players of both counties who have fallen in the war, the game will be stopped at four o'clock this afternoon for two minutes, and the flag lowered half mast.

Both teams are taking the opportunity of trying new players, and C. F. Stanger-Leathes, the new captain, who will have as the strong foundation of his side such well-tried and reliable players as J. S. Nesbitt, G. E. Wilkinson, H. Arkle, J. L. Towler, Milne, Wingham and Richardson, will have with him F. W. Tennant, L. J. Couves and T. A. Caughy, three new comers to the County eleven. Much is expected of all three men. Tennant has been showing very useful form of late, and has hit up some very good scores. The County captain, of course, knows the value of L. J. Couves, who is his first wicket partner on the St. George's eleven. A stylish and confident batsman, he should prove an acquisition to the county team. In T. A. Caughy, the County have a player who has shown capital form with both bat and ball, and who has done some very good work for the Benwell Hill team.

It had been hoped that A. L. D. Skinner, of St. George's, would have been able to play, for he has been a prominent member of the Jesmond team this season, but unfortunately his services are not available for the match. The County will also be without J. S. F. Morrison, the Cambridge captain, whose appearance is prevented through a bereavement.

On the Durham side no less than four men are new to County cricket, namely Goodrich, Akers, Dobson, and Milson. Their recent performances in the Durham Senior League, however, justify their selection, and much is expected of them. In Turner, Durham have a player new to the County, but not to County cricket, he having played for Leicestershire. Durham have been compelled to make an eleventh hour change in their side, as, owing to illness, R. P. M. Hudson (Sunderland) will not be able to play. His place will be taken by Lieut. H. Brooks who is home on leave from Salonika.

Wickets will be pitched at 11 o'clock to-day and to-morrow, and the lunch interval is at 1.30. Lunch and tea will be obtainable on the ground. During the course of to-day's play a collection will be made on this ground in aid of the Fleming Memorial Hospital for Children, Newcastle.

## CRICKET.

### NORTHUMBERLAND v. DURHAM.

#### REVIVAL OF COUNTY CRICKET IN NEWCASTLE.

Much interest has been shown in the renewal of County cricket in Newcastle, and the match between Northumberland and Durham, favoured by fine weather, attracted a large crowd to the County enclosure, Osborne Avenue, Newcastle, yesterday. All during the day's play the weather was bright, and the spectators, who up to four o'clock numbered close on 4,500, showed considerable enthusiasm in the cricket, which was generally most interesting. Both sides fielded the teams which had been selected.

The rain which fell during the night had no appreciable effect upon the pitch, which seemed to be in perfect batting order. Durham won the toss, and, of course, E. B. Proud, the captain, took the advantage of first innings. There seemed to be every prospect of a good score, but the Dunclemines' first experiences were disastrous. In less than 20 minutes three wickets were down with only six runs on the board. Lieut. Brooks and W. Akers opened to the bowling of Milne and Towler, and with the score at 4, Akers was caught in the slips by Arkle. Joined by T. Kinch, Lieut. Brooks only stayed while a single was added, being out to a fine catch by Wingham at third slip. When E. L. Squire was clean bowled by Milne with the latter's first ball of the over the teams indeed looked most unpromising for Durham.

#### A FINE PARTNERSHIP.

The partnership of Kinch and Common, who was next man in, however, proved to be the feature of the innings, and the pair took the Durham score to a considerable total. Opening a trifle cautiously, both men settled well to the bowling, and reached their respective 50's within a short time of each other. Runs came briskly, and the score was rapidly taken past the century. With the total at 165 Common was stumped by Wilkinson off Richardson's bowling, having scored 60 in an hour and twenty minutes. The partnership altogether yielded 159 runs. Joined by Turner, Kinch continued to bat freely, and reached his century in an hour and 35 minutes without having given a chance. With the total at 193, and his own score at 107, the West Hartlepool batsman was smartly caught by Wingham. He was at the wicket an hour and three-quarters, and his innings was marked by clever and judicious batting, and included 17 fours and one three.

No great resistance was offered by the remainder of the side, the five wickets falling for the addition of but 40 more runs. Milne was the chief of the scorers, knocking up 20 very quickly, including four boundaries. The Durham innings occupied two and a half hours, and beyond the very fine stand by Kinch and Common there was little of outstanding merit. Of the Northumberland bowlers the most successful were Milne and J. L. Towler, the former having five for 57 and the latter four for 73.

C. F. Stanger-Leathes and L. J. Couves opened the home innings, to the bowling of Smith and Goodrich. Runs came very slowly and in singles, for, in the first place, the Durham bowling was very good, the bowlers maintaining an excellent length, and in the second, the fielding was most keen. The home captain batted very carefully, though when 11 he gave a chance—a very hard one—to Milne in the slips, the latter failing to hold a very fast ball. Couves batted nicely, but never seemed to be thoroughly at home. After scoring 17 in about an hour he was caught out by Akers. Milne and Turner then went on to bowl, and J. S. Nesbitt, who partnered the Northumberland captain after Couves' departure, was caught at the wicket by Common after scoring 13. When Stanger-Leathes and Wingham became associated runs came more briskly, and the home captain reached his 50 with a glance to the boundary.

#### CAPITAL SCORING.

Further fine catches at the wicket by Common disposed of Wingham and Richardson, the fourth wicket falling at 142. Arkle then joined the home captain, who was building up a fine score by good all-round cricket. Stanger-Leathes reached his century when the score was taken to 155, having been at the wicket two hours and twenty minutes. The partnership with Arkle added 31 runs. With Milne at the wicket the score was rapidly carried forward and another 50 runs were added to the total, the Bonwell Hill man then being bowled by Turner with 10 as his contribution. Soon after this another round of applause came for Stanger-Leathes, who completed his 150, and after F. W. Tennant was dismissed by Turner, stumps were drawn with the home captain and T. A. Caughey not out, the former with the very fine score of 157. Northumberland will complete their innings this forenoon, their present total being the same as that of their opponents, with three wickets in hand.

A very impressive moment during yesterday's game was when, at four o'clock, the game was stopped for two minutes and the flag on the pavilion lowered half-mast as a token of respect for the players of both counties who have fallen in the war. During this interval the spectators stood with uncovered heads, paying a silent tribute to those who had played the game both on the cricket fields at home and the field of honour abroad.

A collection taken at the ground yesterday, in aid of the Flaming Memorial Hospital for Sick Children—a deserving Newcastle institution which is supported solely by voluntary contributions—amounted to £23 18s 5d. Play will be resumed at 1.30 this morning. Yesterday's score:—

### NORTHUMBERLAND v. DURHAM.

#### HOME COUNTY WINS BY TWO WICKETS.

The County match between Northumberland and Durham was resumed at the County Ground, Osborne Avenue, Newcastle, yesterday. Again the weather was beautifully fine, and the resumption of play was witnessed by a crowd which was very good for the second day, and which became appreciably augmented in the afternoon. The wicket did not appear to be greatly affected by the overnight rain.

Northumberland resumed with their score the same as their opponents' first innings total, 235, and with three wickets to fall. The batsmen who were not out on Monday evening were C. F. Stanger-Leathes and T. A. Caughey, the former with 157 and the latter not having opened his account. The partnership yielded 18 runs when the Northumberland captain was nicely bowled by Smith. He had only added a single to his overnight total of 157. The fact that his fine score came as the result of careful cricket may be judged from the fact that his innings occupied three and a half hours. The only chance he gave was when 11, a fast ball going to Milne in the slips, which the fieldsmen could only stop, and not hold. Stanger-Leathes' hits included one 6 and twenty-three 4's.

The remainder of the innings occupied half-an-hour. Caughey and Towler gave a bright display, putting on 32 runs in 25 minutes. Then Caughey, who had previously given a chance to Akers, the Durham man having the sun in his eyes and failing to take a high dropping ball, was caught at the wicket by Common. This was the Durham wicket-keeper's fifth success in the innings. Wilkinson joined Towler with the score at 283, and was bowled by Smith with 5 added to the aggregate. After batting four hours, Northumberland concluded their first innings with a lead of 55.

With three-quarters of an hour's play before the luncheon interval, Durham started none too well. Lieut. Brooks and Akers opened against the bowling of Towler and Milne, and with the total at 13, the former batsman was well bowled by Towler, his own score being 3. Akers was joined by Kinch, and with a further 6 runs telegraphed the former went out to a catch by Towler. The partnership of Kinch and Squire lasted twenty minutes, and with 35 runs added, his own contribution being 32, Kinch went out to a good catch by Wingham off the last ball before the interval.

#### DURHAM'S BEST BATSMAN.

Squire resumed with Common, but the latter only scored five before he went out leg before to Towler. With the score at 73 Squire and Turner became associated, and the pair brightened the game considerably with vigorous hitting. In 25 minutes the score was advanced by 45 runs, and then, after having got 53 runs very cleverly in fifty minutes, Squire was caught by Richardson at mid-off. His hits included nine 4's.

Another good partnership was that of Turner and Dobson, the latter being heartily applauded for one fine drive over the cemetery wall for six. The latter had 25 to his credit out of 37 scored in twenty minutes, and then was caught by Wingham at point. When Turner was joined by Proud, the Durham captain, the hitting was more cautious, and the former, who had been puzzled by several of Milne's deliveries, was at length bowled by the Bonwell Hill man. He was at the wicket just short of an hour for his 45.

When joined by Milne, Proud and the Durham City batsman went all out for scoring, and the pair hit out briskly. The partnership with Milne produced 49 runs in twenty minutes, and then the captain was caught by Wingham off Milne. Goodrich came in with the score at 223, and only three runs were added when he was clean bowled by Arkle. The last wicket fell after the score had been taken to 235—the same as Durham's total for the first innings—Smith being bowled by Milne.

Milne bowled very consistently right through the innings, and his analysis showed the fine figures of six wickets for 97.

Northumberland were faced with the task of making 179 runs to win in about two hours and a quarter. The start of the innings was by no means promising, for in addition to losing Couves to a smart catch by Milne with the score at seven, the succeeding batsmen found the fielding so keen that it was no easy task to get runs. Stanger-Leathes and Nesbitt made a better show for the second wicket, taking the score to 45, when the captain was clean bowled by Smith for 22. With Nesbitt and Wingham associated, the game had rather more life, and the score was carried to 71, when Wingham fell to a fine catch in the slips by Squire.

#### AN INTERESTING FINISH.

Then came the partnership which laid the foundations of victory for the home county. Richardson and Nesbitt became partners and scored runs by careful cricket. Captain Proud had rearranged his field, and in consequence the batsmen had to exercise great caution for a while. When the aggregate reached 100, runs came more freely. Nesbitt made one fine hit for 6, and when his score was 71, and the total 141, he was smartly caught by Milne. In addition to his 6 hit, the St. George's batsman recorded eleven 4's. Richardson followed him shortly afterwards, being bowled by Smith with a capital 31 to his credit.

The fifth wicket fell at 162, and Northumberland needed 17 runs to win in 35 minutes. Two more wickets fell, however, for the addition of two runs, and Caughey was caught out by Squire with three runs still needed for victory. Milne, who was not out with two boundaries to his credit, made the winning hit amidst applause, and the game ended in favour of Northumberland by two wickets and two runs. ## CRICKET NOTES.

The feature of a very enjoyable game at Jeumont Towers was the capital innings of C. F. Stranger-Leathes, who, by good, all-round cricket, scored 113 out of St. George's total of 241 for three wickets. The County Club, who provided the opposition, would have fared much better had two chances which were presented early in the game, been taken. One of these would have disposed of the St. George's captain before he scored a run, and the other would have dismissed Couves, who put on 47. As it was, the County Club innings totalled 192, and bade fair to reach a moderate figure before G. E. Wilkinson went in and infused life into a flagging tail. It is very pleasing to note that the junior members of the local clubs are showing good promise, and their performance at Jeumont augurs well for the future of the game in the district.

The local "Derby" at Old Benwell, resulted in an easy win for Benwell Hill. Materially assisted by a fine innings by Hardisty, who put on 100 not out, the Hill-men were able to declare for 244 for six wickets. Benwell did not have any chance of playing for a win, so they played as carefully as possible for a draw. Despite all efforts, however, the Hill bowling prevailed, and the innings closed for 182. Great praise is due to Middleton for the fine attempt he made to save the game. His 62, not out, was compiled by sound cricket, and was one of the features of the game.

### A SPORTING FINISH.

Although time had expired, the rival captains at the match between Old Norcrossians and Tynemouth on the Grammar School ground, decided that, since the scores were so nearly level, the game should be played to a definite issue. As a result we had a very sporting finish. Tynemouth scored 204 for their total, and after an early stand in the home innings, wickets began to fall in a manner that belokened a Tynemouth victory. A fine partnership by Chambers and McFadyen, however, put a fresh complexion on the case, and brought a win within measurable distance. It was then decided to play the match to a finish. When the ninth wicket fell there were still 18 runs wanted to win, but Chambers reproduced a little of his old fine form, and, aided by a steady bat in F. Adamson, carried the match to a successful end.

At Wallsend the match was drawn, and South Northumberland could hardly be said to have had the better of matters when stumps were drawn. Although the programme at Preston Avenue between Tynemouth and Gateshead Fell was only for second strings, the tune played was very interesting. The visitors, who won the toss, gave much of a "one down the other come on" display, and after four wickets had been down for 10, the innings closed for 67. The Tynemouth second responded with confidence, winning comfortably by scoring 107 for six wickets. Savory the Tynemouth wicket keeper gave a bright batting display, his 60 including two sixes, seven fours and two threes.

### HEAVY SCORING AT SHIELDS.

South Shields played two games at home during the week-end, Hendon being their visitors on Saturday and Philadelphia on Monday. With the former they drew, while in the case of Philadelphia they had an easy victory. The feature of the Hendon game was the batting, in which both sides gave a pleasing and attractive display. Charlton, of Hendon, was only three runs short of a century when he was bowled by McAndrew, his performance being a very fine one. W. Harrison also mastered the bowling well, and made 67. Three hours were occupied by the visitors when they declared with a total of 292, leaving Shields a couple of hours to bat. A capital response was made by the latter, who played out time with the loss of five wickets for 165. W. Foster and N. A. Clive batted in good style, making 73 and 25 respectively.

In the Philadelphia match, the Shields bowlers—Birkett, McAndrew and Hindson—were in good form, only J. Kirtley being able to do anything very effective against them. Kirtley made the biggest individual score on the Philadelphia side, hitting out freely, and securing 30 runs out of his side's total of 99. The Shields batsmen started well, and, with the loss of only one wicket the total of their opponents was passed, 129 being scored before the second fell. Clive, who made 58, has a most satisfactory batting record for this season. In his last three matches he has scored just two runs short of 200, and once being not out.

Eppleton cut a sorry figure at Ashbrooke against Sunderland. Their creditable performance the previous week against the Weariders led one to expect a much more close contest than was actually witnessed. On such a beautiful wicket it was most surprising to see Eppleton dismissed for a paltry 72 runs. A. Newsome, son, and T. Milburn alone being able to put up any show against Sunderland's attack. Perhaps the most sensational feature of the game was that J. M. Russell should take six wickets at a cost of 15 runs. He has never been looked upon as a bowler. In one over Russell was punished to the extent of nine runs off three balls; yet he finished up with the remarkably good figures of 5.5 overs, one maiden, 15 runs, 6 wickets.

Hubert Brooks, despite lack of practice, batted brilliantly for his 100, and Russell also got going to the extent of 57, the pair putting on 176 without losing their wickets. For style and grace, few players in Durham County can compare with Brooks. But was he not trained by that splendid professional of E. W. Elliott's days, Butler?

### "OLD STAGERS."

It is worthy of note that Isaac Robinson, the Sunderland wicket keeper, is in his 20th year with the club. Robinson is a better bat now than at any stage in his career. There was a time when he was of the "hit all or get out" type, but now he plays a really good bat, and for the past few weeks has been one of the opening pair for Sunderland. Eppleton, too, have an old stager, for A. Newsome has played 26 seasons for the club, and has, in fact, been more than anyone else responsible for the interest and enthusiasm of the club being maintained.

Baldon, though they knocked up 187, found that their attack made little impression on Durham City's chief batsmen, and the Duncinians ran out easy winners by eight wickets. Gibson, Scott and A. P. Ashley gave really good exhibitions, and Baldon had plenty of leather hunting. Charlie Buchan got both of the City wickets which fell, and might have collected more than 24 runs when he was at the wicket had he not been so eager to get runs quickly.

## NOTES ON THE GAME.

(By "Umpire.")

The long-looked-for rain made its appearance on Saturday, and interfered to a great extent with the progress of the cricket on Tyneside. As it happened, however, a definite result was reached in most of the games played, and in one game at least the rain had quite a decided effect on the result. This was the match at Jesmond Towers, where Old Novocastrians entertained Benwell, the Grammar School ground being occupied by the School eleven. The Old Novos, opened on a good batting pitch, and fared so well against the bowling that by 4.30 they had 170 runs telegraphed and four wickets in hand. Then came the deluge, and play was stopped for nearly an hour and a half. When conditions were favourable again, the Old Novos captain declared, leaving Benwell an hour and a half to play and 171 runs to get to win. The Benwell team started well by sending in two good scoring bats in Tennant and Scott, and they put on runs at a merry pace. They set a good example by scoring between them 95 runs, and the two succeeding batsmen followed it so well that they passed their opponents' total without being separated. The Old Novos are to be admired for making such a sporting declaration, and the Benwell men for scoring so quickly.

Chambers, with 43 runs to his credit not out, shared the batting honours of the home side with McFadden. The Grammar School coach proved himself to be as efficient as ever, and gave an exhibition of unorthodox batting that was greatly admired by both sides. Not only did he master the bowling, but he scored freely with a number of quite original strokes, and spent a large portion of the time while the rain had the field to itself explaining to a number of players "how it is done."

### Milne's Fine Bowling.

At the County ground, Benwell Hill had an easy win over the County Club, chiefly through the instrumentality of Milne's effective bowling. The Hill bowler took seven of the County wickets for 23 runs, a capital performance, and he was well supported by Nicholls, who got the remaining three for 33 runs. The batting honours went to Hardisty, who, by stylish cricket, scored 76 without being beaten by the County attack. His best partner was R. Whitfield, who added 49 before he fell to a catch by A. K. Wardrop. With their total at 205 for seven wickets, Benwell Hill declared, and subsequently dismissed their opponents for the modest aggregate of 70. Only two of the County Club batsmen showed any resistance to the Hill bowling, namely, J. C. P. Thompson, 25, and R. S. Watson, 14.

Bowling for Elswick Works in their match with Gateshead Fell, at Gateshead, Lambert proved to be in deadly form, taking seven wickets for 48 runs. Partnered by Reding, who got three wickets, he caused the Gateshead batsmen so much trouble that the whole side was out for 119, of which F. Hymers and J. Swinburne contributed 25 and 22 respectively. Elswick were not a comparatively easy task, and passed the home team's total with only three wickets down. After Hammon was out with only two runs to his credit, Richardson and Wingham gave the side a good set-off taking the score to 59, when they were both out. The partnership of J. O. Preston and J. B. Bruce then defied the Gateshead attack, and the pair took the total past the home team's total without being separated, the former having knocked up 20 and the latter 52. Elswick have an interesting list of fixtures for the holidays, but the principal match is on Saturday, when they will entertain the cricket team of the Openshaw (Manchester) works of Messrs Armstrong, Whitworth and Co., on the South Northumberland ground, Gosforth.

The match between Tynemouth and St. George's always proves a great attraction at Preston Avenue, and a good attendance witnessed an even draw. Batting first Tynemouth knocked up the respectable total of 226. Of this St. George's contributed 45. Fulman 26, Richley 32, and A. E. Hill 33 not out. St. George's fielding was praiseworthy, and conspicuous among the fielders was L. J. Couves, who took four catches, dismissing players when getting well set. St. George's start was ominous, for after Stanger-Leather was bowled before reaching double figures, other four wickets fell with only trifling additions to the score. Couves, who had gone in first with his captain, was then joined by W. Seymour, and the pace quickened. Both men frequently found the boundary, and once Seymour lifted the ball out of the field for six. At a critical stage the Tynemouth fielding was found wanting, and chances were badly missed by usually safe hands. Seymour was ultimately caught out with 64 to his credit, and when time was called Couves was not out for 84. The game was left drawn, but there was no doubt that Tynemouth had their chance and missed it. So far as they were concerned it was truly "no catch."

### South Northumberland's Tour.

In pre-war days one of the most enjoyable events of the cricket season for the South Northumberland Club was the annual trip to Wiseton, at the invitation of their generous patron, Brigadier-General Laycock. With the resumption of cricket General Laycock has again invited the team to Wiseton for the Race Week holidays, and at present the club are enjoying a pleasant week's tour in that district. The list of fixtures was opened on Monday, when South Northumberland scored an easy win at the expense of the Gainsborough Club, the members of which side found the bowling of W. A. Taylor rather too much for them. The match against Workop was a much closer game, but again South Northumberland triumphed by 20 runs and once again were indebted to Taylor for a great bowling performance, he taking nine wickets for 62 runs.

An easy victory was gained at Retford, where the whole of the home side (12 batsmen) was dismissed for 131, South Northumberland having previously declared with 238 runs for four wickets, of which total Hammon, Richardson and Towler had scored 45, 54 and 50 respectively. Once again Towler's bowling was a deciding factor, accounting for six wickets at a cost of 51 runs. To-day the last match of the tour—a two-days' fixture—will be commenced at Wiseton, against the local club.

Sunderland's bowlers again had a bad time against the Durham City batsmen. The City men should have forced the pace more at Aehbrooke, where Squance tried nine bowlers, the City knocking up 257 for the loss of six wickets, and leaving the Weariders very little time either to get the runs or be got rid of. G. Gibson again showed his skill by compiling 63, and his brother also did good work with 48 not out. Brooks and J. M. Russell put Sunderland in a safe position, and Squance also seemed to be going well when stumps were drawn.

There was a good finish at Whitburn, chiefly through Philadelphia's "tail" wagging sufficiently well to pull "Phil" through by a wicket after the side had lost eight wickets when still 50 short of Whitburn's total of 131. Whitburn are not playing so strongly as they did in the opening weeks, and Ingram had a fairly good time against their batsmen.

### VISITORS LEAD ON FIRST INNINGS.

Northumberland finished up with a distinct advantage in the game at Ashbrooke, as Durham, 14 runs behind on the first venture, lost a couple of wickets in the bad light, and are still one run behind their neighbours' total. It was unfortunate that the weather should have been entirely out of season. It was cold, and practically all the time there was a light drizzling rain, which no doubt kept many spectators away after lunch. The gate was quite good, however, for there would be well on the road to 4,000 spectators present.

It cannot be said that they saw much good batting, however. The wicket looked good for any amount of runs, yet the batsmen, with the exception of one or two, showed little or no enterprise. Durham having first knock, started very badly, but Common and Kinch improved matters, and Buchan, Scott-Page, and Proud looked like staying a while, but the latter two "poked" when they might have hit. Milne bowled a good length ball throughout the innings, but Towler, though he obtained the most wickets, was very erratic. Indeed some of the deliveries he sent down were exceptionally poor, but the Durham men did not rise to the occasion.

Northumberland certainly had to face more varied and better bowling on the whole, and if their opponents got full value out of the wicket then they must be credited as having done exceptionally well. But this is a very debatable point. Stanger-Leathes and J. S. Nesbitt improved a bad start by putting on 52 runs for the partnership, but the best batting was undoubtedly shown by Arkle. His 59 was a fine contribution, placing all round the wicket with skill. It took him an hour and a half to get the runs, but he was very careful in his selection of the balls to hit. J. H. ## CRICKET NOTES.

### By "Umpire."

A capital performance was put up by South Northumberland, who defeated St. George's at Jesmond on Saturday. The Jesmond men have a very good record for their home games this season, and the standard of batting has generally been too good for the visiting bowlers. The Gosforth trundlers were therefore to be commended for disposing of the side for a total of 174 runs, and had it not been for splendid innings by O. F. Stanger-Leathes and N. R. E. Wilkinson, who between them were responsible for no less than 119 of the total, St. George's aggregate would have been very moderate indeed. South Northumberland, who had previously knocked out 222, thus won comfortably. The Gosforth batting honours were shared by A. R. Barlow 54, H. Brown 44, and R. W. Beall 36 not out. For the home team L. C. Cowen was very successful with the leather, capturing six wickets at a cost of 44 runs.

By the narrow margin of 18 runs, Old Novocastrians succeeded in defeating the County Club on the Grammar School ground. The scoring on the whole was moderate, and on the County side no less than four players were dismissed with ciphers to their account, while four, including J. G. F. Morrison, the Cambridge University captain 24, reached double figures. Old Novos replied to their opponents' total of 118 with 136, of which 51 was contributed by D. Macfadyen, a batsman who is displaying consistently good form, and who is undoubtedly one of the coming players in the district.

Tynemouth made a very poor show against the Elswick Works attack at Preston Avenue, and a total of only 68, with 15 as the highest score, indicates a lamentable lack of enterprise on the part of the batsmen at the coast. Ryding and Coombes shared the wickets, the former having five for 21 and the latter four for 37. Of the Elswick batsmen, W. Hampson himself scored more than the Tynemouth side, and it was a pity he could not find batsmen who were able to maintain their wicket while he got the dozen runs, which were all he required to reach three figures. Wingham, too, batted in fine style for 56, and a feature of the game was his three "lifts." When he reached his 50 he was so warmly applauded by the spectators that he had to acknowledge the compliment by lifting his cap. The next ball he lifted out of the ground for six, and then the next he lifted into the safe hands of Haswell, who had plenty of time to walk up to the wicket and wait till the leather dropped.

Two other teams who played havoc with the visitors' wickets were Ryton and Tynedale. At Ryton the Benwell batsmen were unable to withstand the deliveries of Crozier and Graham, the former taking six wickets for only 12 runs, a really remarkable feat, while Graham had three for 20. Altogether the Benwell innings yielded a mere 37 runs, 8, Warren and A. Walker being top scorers with 10 each. The Ryton men, too, were none too confident at the coast, and the total had reached 114 when the innings was declared with one wicket to fall. The only stand of the innings was made by J. Arkle and A. Macdonald, who scored 31 and 24 respectively. For Benwell Davis took five wickets for 23 runs.

Backworth Percy did better than Benwell, but only a single run gave them their advantage. At Prior's Flat they were all dismissed for 38, Hetherington had the splendid analysis of seven wickets for 18, while H. Arkle took the remaining three for 20. The only Backworth batsman to reach double figures was Mackay 16, and there were five ciphers in the side. As in the match at Ryton, the winners found runs none too easy to obtain, and the total for the innings was 119, of which H. Arkle contributed 24, being easily top scorer. J. The whole side was dismissed for 70 runs, Sunderland's task was an easy one, and they had knocked up the runs required for victory for the loss of only three wickets. The bowling of the Sunderland side was certainly good, but it was not totally responsible for the collapse of the Whithorn batsmen. The batting was weak, and some of the players displayed strokes that a novice would almost have been ashamed of.

Only 13 runs were wanted for victory by Boldon when stumps were drawn in their match at South Shields. The home team, thanks to a fine innings of 79 by I. Murray, and one of 39 by J. Peart, had put on a total of 108, and Boldon were within 12 of that number when the expiration of time brought the game to a close. Some good batting was seen on the Boldon side, the top scorers being A. Lowings 53 and C. M. Buchan 31. Buchan also showed considerable skill with the ball, claiming seven of the Shields wickets for 65 runs.

The home men displayed fine form in the field, and for a good while runs were hard to obtain. The City men knocked up 210, quite a respectable total, but not good enough to reap the honours. Although Burnmoor lost a wicket in the first over, the batsmen subsequently dealt confidently with the bowling, and passed the visitors' total with two wickets in hand. The batting honours went to M. Comboy with a stylishly played 71.
