WILTSHIRE'S GREAT VICTORY AT READING.

The Minor Counties' match between Berks and Wilts, played at the Kensington Road Ground on Monday and Tuesday, will live for ever in the memories of those who had the good fortune to be present. Though Berkshire partisans were undoubtedly keenly disappointed they will not grudge Wilts the credit of a glorious victory. Briefly, the story of the game is as I will here set forth. Wiltshire batted first and after a good start collapsed rather weakly and returned a total of 176. Against this Berkshire hit up runs confidently and when, early on the second day, their innings closed for 311, the result seemed a foregone conclusion. Such anticipations were further justified when Wilts started their second venture, for no less than six wickets fell for a total of 106, and with only four more to save the innings defeat. Some of the spectators did not trouble to return after lunch, others only did so out of ennui, and even Berkshire's bowlers carried on their work with a kind of "Sorry, but can't help it" condensation. The fall of the sixth wicket had brought together a rather crude looking pair of batsmen. There was a youth named Dunn, hardly out of his teens, who had caused some comment by his stone-walling methods in the first innings, and he was partnered by a left-hander, Ensor, and left-handers are always an awkward proposition. Dunn, slight and diminutive, played a defensive game with the orthodox straight bat, while Ensor was a little less cautious, occasionally hitting a good ball for four. Presently Dunn began to score as well and the bored spectators sat up and took notice. Runs soon came freely and a hearty cheer greeted the hoisting of 200. It had turned half-past three when the great partnership ended, Ensor being caught by Ryland at extra cover. The two batsmen had added 126 in an hour and thirty-five minutes. Worse was to come, however. After the Wilts wicket-keeper had been dismissed for 15 and Dunn had been caught in the slips for an excellent 60, the ninth and last wickets added 104 runs between them. Overton batted with skill and freedom for his 74, although he gave one difficult chance in the slips. Finally a great fighting innings closed for 353, and with two hours left for play Berkshire were set the task of making 219 to win. This, of course, was almost out of the question, but that Berks would fail to play out time hardly entered into anyone's calculations. Wiltshire, however, scored a great triumph and with two minutes to spare. With only eight on the board Bennett's leg stump was removed by Newman and after 11 had been added Nicholl was caught at mid-on. Croom and Gregson-Ellis then kept things going for a bit, Croom making some nice shots to leg. After scoring 37, however, he was caught by Taunton. The newcomer, Norris, was taken at point without scoring, and Dr. Woodburn fell to Henslow from a mishit at 76. The situation now became critical, with half the side out and nearly an hour left for play. Gregson-Ellis was playing commendable cricket, not attempting to hit anything, but Morris was bowled second ball. There was considerable enthusiasm when Stevens hit Knight for four, but he played on at 84 and with the very next ball Ryland was lbw. Only two wickets to fall and twenty minutes to go. Gregson-Ellis kept his bat straight and steady and was heartily cheered when he squeezed a run off the last ball of the over so as to retain the bowling. The move had been anticipated by the fieldsmen and Baines was almost run out. An appeal against the latter for caught at the wicket was unsuccessful and meanwhile the clock ticked on. Hereabouts Newman had bowled twelve successive maiden overs and excitement reached fever pitch. At last Gregson-Ellis's plucky innings came to a close. For over an hour he had defied the bowling, but Newman's clean bowled him with an unplayable one. Hawksworth went in at seven minutes to seven and Newman bowled another maiden. Four minutes to seven and Overton began to bowl the last but one over of the match. Baines blocked the first and then hit at a ball he should have left alone. It sailed straight and true into the hands of Darell at point and the match was over. Wiltshire received many congratulations on their splendid victory.

BERKSHIRE'S RECORD SCORE AGAINST DEVON.

Berkshire put up a brilliant batting performance in the Minor Counties game with Devon on Wednesday and Thursday, and the total of 537 is a record for the County side and a record for the ground. We should think it is also close to the record for a two days' match. Devon made by no means a poor show, yet they were beaten by an innings and eleven runs. Bating first, they scored the useful total of 279, thanks chiefly to a great stand by Light and Sturt. Five wickets had fallen for 101 when these two became associated and they raised the score to 232 before they were parted. The Berks innings included two centuries, both Mindless displays with the exception of a difficult chance in the slips given by Remnant. Exactly a hundred was on the board before Croom gave the bowler an easy return. At the close of play on Wednesday the score had been taken to 237 without further loss and 396 was up before Remnant and Nicholl were parted. The former hit 19 fours and Nicholl one six and 17 fours. Three wickets fell quickly at 382, but Stevens kept things going merrily and hit one five and 11 fours in his clever innings. The visitors employed no less than eight bowlers. Devon were set to get 255 to save the innings defeat and Carroll and Hoare gave them a good start, sending up 90 for the first wicket. Their captain, Mr. Carroll, made yet another stand with the assistance of Aspinall, but after that something of a collapse set in and only Jennings gave any trouble. The catches which dismissed Light and Carroll were brilliant ones on the extreme boundary. Stevens kept wicket magnificently for Berks.

BERKS v. STAFFORD.

Cricket Championship Result.

Rain on Wednesday caused the abandonment of the deciding match between Staffordshire and Berkshire in connection with the Minor Counties championship, and according to rule Staffordshire, the challenged side, retain the title.

The position of affairs at the time the match was brought to a close, was that Staffordshire, with 115 runs scored for five wickets in their second innings, were only 88 runs ahead.

The position is certainly very extraordinary for Berkshire finished level on points with Staffordshire. How the latter can therefore be regarded as champions when the deciding match was unfinished, Berkshire leading on the first innings, passes comprehension.

The match to decide the Minor Counties Championship opened between Berkshire and Staffordshire at Porthill Park on Monday. In spite of the heavy rains the pitch was firm enough to permit of rolling before the start, and Staffordshire winning the toss, they decided to go in while there was a probability of run-getting. Still, it only needed a spell of sunshine to put the bowler in a good humour.

E. W. Page and A. A. Bickerton were the first pair in to the bowling of A. P. F. Chapman and W. Y. Woodburn, the Berkshire captain. Runs came fairly freely at the start, and 30 was put up at the end of 25 minutes' play. Page narrowly escaped being stamped with the score at 14, and again at 17 he gave a difficult catch to Major Nicholl, which he was unable to hold, although he made a praiseworthy effort. Page batted confidently and reached the boundary four times, being applauded for one lofty drive which put the ball out of the ground altogether. When the pair had reached 40 a change in the bowling was tried, Captain H. M. Hinde and Hawksworth taking on. The change steadied the run-getting, but 50 was reached in about three-quarters of an hour. The partnership came to an end at 56, Page being smartly caught by wicketkeeper S. H. Stevens. He tried to cut one of Captain Hinde's deliveries. C. Ridgway joined Bickerton, and at the fifth ball of Captain Hinde's first over to him he suffered the fate of Page, Stevens again effecting a clever catch. Ridgway had not scored a run, so that the second Staffordshire wicket was down for 56. Meakin went in next, and signalled his arrival with an early boundary. The total was carried past the 65 figure, and then G. H. Ryland relieved Captain Hinde. Neither batsman could do much with Hawksworth's bowling, and maiden overs were frequent.

With the assistance of the sun the bowlers appeared to be getting the whip hand. The weather was now genial. At 71 Bickerton gave a chance to Dr. Woodburn. The Staffordshire captain was also experiencing some trouble in placing, and eventually he gave a chance to A. P. F. Chapman from G. H. Ryland's bowling, which the former took. His score was then 13. E. H. Bennett joined A. A. Bickerton, and after scoring two was clean bowled by G. H. Ryland. A. A. Bickerton was now partnered by W. H. Twigg, and shortly after his arrival at the wicket Capt. H. M. Hinde resumed bowling in place of G. H. Ryland. Runs still came very sparingly, and five more to the total brought about the fall of the fifth wicket. W. H. Twigg being given out l.b.w. to Hawksworth after scoring three. Lunch time had now arrived, and Staffordshire had scored 85. The sun had been shining now for some time, and it was obviously a bowlers' wicket.

Resuming after lunch, A. A. Bickerton carried his score to 32, when he drew back to a ball by Captain Hinde, and was caught by S. H. Stevens, who thus accounted for his third man. There was one curious incident in his innings, the ball lodging in his right pad, and he, apparently, forgot that a ball in clothing is "dead," for he would not pick it out. Wickets now fell rapidly. Sedgwick was caught by Dr. Woodburn when he had scored two. J. S. Heath only got one before he was bowled by Captain Hinde, and H. Birch was caught by Major Nicholl without the consolation of even one. There seemed a likelihood of A. Lockett and Morgan lifting up the score. They both brightened matters by hitting out, but this liveliness proved short-lived. Morgan skied a fast ball by Captain Hinde and was caught by R. J. F. Remnant. Staffordshire's innings closed just after three o'clock for a total of 127.

Berkshire went in to bat at 3.20. R. J. F. Remnant and Croome being the first pair in, to the bowling of Sedgwick and Morgan. They did not make such a promising start as Staffordshire, the professional being given out l.b.w. in attempting to play a ball by Sedgwick when the score was only six. Then Major Nicholl was beautifully caught by J. S. Heath from Sedgwick's bowling when only 10 runs had been added. R. J. F. Remnant was now joined by A. P. F. Chapman, the 'Varsity bat, who has been piling up such good scores for Berkshire.

The pair settled down into a most serviceable partnership which lasted well over an hour. The previous two wickets had fallen for 16, but before A. P. F. Chapman was clean bowled by Sedgwick the score had been carried to 36—a rather disconcerting outlook for Staffordshire, having regard to their cheap dismissal. The 'Varsity player had knocked off 46, and in the process had played some masterly strokes. The fourth wicket fell two runs later, and then there was another useful stand until 121 was reached, when an entirely different complexion was put upon matters by a bowling feat by A. Lockett. He had sent down three balls of an over without having a run scored, and with the last three he successively clean bowled Capt. Gregson-Ellis, P. F. Remnant, and Dr. W. Y. Woodburn. In his next over he also clean bowled G. H. Ryland with the second ball, thus accounting for four wickets with five balls. Hawksworth and S. H. Stevens then put up a fight, but when the former was dismissed the partnership of the last two was speedily dissolved, Berkshire finishing 37 in front on the first innings.

Staffordshire went in to bat a second time, but there was only about seven minutes to go. It sufficed, however, to cost them a wicket. J. S. Heath went out with A. A. Bickerton, and, after scoring four, was bowled by G. H. Ryland when the score stood at eight. This concluded the play for the day.

Owing to the condition of the wicket, it was found impossible to make a start on Wednesday until 12.35. B. Meakin and C. R. Ridgway facing the bowling of Captain H. M. Hinde and Hawksworth. Three runs were added to the previous night's total, making 72, when C. R. Ridgway was given out l.b.w. to a ball sent down by the professional. B. H. Bennett now joined the Staffordshire captain, but after scoring seven he was caught by stumper S. H. Stevens from a ball by Captain Hinde.

His place was taken by W. Twigg. The pitch was in a very greasy condition, and Bernard Meakin particularly seemed to experience considerable difficulty in keeping his coat. He was batting well nevertheless, keeping down the fast deliveries of Captain Hinde in good style. He got three to the boundary before the 100 mark was reached.

A bowling change was tried when the score was 107. Dr. Woodburn relieving Captain Hinde. Both batsmen, however, shaped confidently, and there seemed a likelihood of a stand being made. Before the adjournment for lunch at 1.35, they had made 34 between them, and the score was 115 for five wickets. It started to rain during the luncheon interval, and although the teams waited until a quarter to three, the conditions were then so bad that stumps were drawn, and the match abandoned.

Staffordshire therefore retain the title of champions of the Minor Counties Competition.
