CORNWALL v. DEVON.

Cornwall and Devon met at Penance on Friday morning in connection with the Minor Counties championship. The weather had given great cause for apprehension. On the previous night a complete change had come. The sky was black and threatening and a thunder-storm seemed imminent. Rain held off during the night, but the morning was by no means promising. At eleven o'clock black clouds had obliterated the blue sky and golden sunshine which had prevailed so long, and rain began to fall most ominously. Luckily it lasted only a short time, and the sun again shone forth, whilst the temperature rose to summer warmth, and the match started at the appointed time.

Devon won the toss, sending in Ford and Carter to oppose the bowling of Whiting and Beecher Williams. Runs came steadily. Ford played cautiously, but Carter hit fairly freely, scoring 39 out of the first 50. Hawken relieved Whiting, but no separation was effected, and the Penance men resumed. The first hour yielded 60 runs without any wicket having been taken. The first wicket fell when 67 runs had been scored. Ford being caught by Hawken off Whiting for 19. Gillespy had bowled vice Williams, who again took the bowling. Wright had a short stay, being bowled by Whiting for four. Carter, who had just completed his half-century was beautifully bowled by Williams in the next over, the total then being 88. Aspinall and Light sent up the century after an hour and a half's play. Light drove one from Whiting through the Pavilion window and the succeeding ball to the boundary.

Immediately after lunch a change came over the game. Light was dismissed with only an addition of six to his score, and Spalding only put on 4, and Shelley 5, so that five wickets were down for 106. A shower now drove the men to the pavilion, and then Carroll, on the resumption was dismissed for the only "duck" of the innings so far. Mills was finely caught by Tressawna off Whiting, this making the latter's fifth wicket. Eight wickets were now down for 226. Aspinall's fine innings was brought to a conclusion when he had scored 83, Gillespy taking his wicket. The innings closed at 3.15. Jennings being caught by Bennett off Gillespy.

Cornwall sent in Com. Irwin and Blomfield. Amory took up the bowling, and dismissed Irwin with the last ball of his first over for a duck. Only one run had been scored. Mills bowled from the other end, and Ford dropped a catch from Blomfield off the first ball Mills delivered. Blomfield showed his appreciation of this by lifting the last ball of the over to the boundary. Trevarthen had joined Blomfield, but the latter's innings was brief, being bowled by Mills when he had scored 7. Paul was next man in. Trevarthen was bowled by Amory after a merry 20, and Gillespy was caught and bowled by the same Devonian for 2. Cornwall had now four wickets down for 49 runs. Monnett was the next to succumb to Amory, whose average was five wickets for 22 runs. Tressawna raised the home score to 50. Tressawna and Hawken made the best stand of the innings so far, the Cornish skipper playing sound cricket. With 67 on the board the first change in the bowling was made, Spalding relieving Amory, who had obviously tired. Light, the old Devon pro, relieved Mills. The partnership was ended by Spalding taking Hawken's wicket for a patient seven. At tea interval Cornwall had made 88 for 7 wickets.

On resuming Mills and Amory again took up the bowling, but changed ends. Williams sent up the century. From the next ball, Tressawna was smartly caught by Jennings off Mills in the slips, after compiling a magnificent 99. The end was not long delayed, the innings closing for 109.

Cornwall had to follow on soon after 5.30, the same order being taken, and Amory and Mills took up the attack. Blomfield and Irwin successfully withstood the bowling and when 28 had been scored, Light took the ball from Amory. Blomfield drove one back hard to Light, but it was so "hot" he had to drop it. Then the luck changed, Blomfield, Irwin and Paul being caught in the slips by Amory and Jennings off Mills in quick succession and three wickets were down for 43.

SATURDAY'S PLAY.

Trevarthen and Gillespy resumed Cornwall's second innings on Saturday morning, and Mills and Amory took up the attack. Only one came from Mills' first over. Then Gillespy fell a victim to Mills without adding to his score. The home captain then went to the wickets, and gave a hard chance at the leg. The batsmen played with the utmost caution, runs coming very slowly. Both bowlers got a couple of maiden overs in succession. Runs came steadily, however, and the total was taken to 78 before a separation was effected, Trevarthen then being taken behind the wickets by Aspinall off Amory—Amory's first wicket for the innings. Tressawna was dismissed in the next over. Hawken was sent back with a "yorker" from Amory. Bennett and Williams became associated, and put up the century, and evoked a round of applause. Jennings took the ball from Amory, and Bennett greeted his appearance by lifting him out of the ground for 6. The game had now brightened up a bit, and both men hit more vigorously than any of their predecessors. Then Williams averted an innings defeat by putting Jennings to the leg for a couple. Soon after Bennett was smartly stumped. Williams was next to go. His innings of 41 was a remarkable achievement under the circumstances, and he fully deserved the applause accorded him. When Whiting went in as last man, Spalding relieved Mills. The changed bowling proved expensive. Nicholls drove him for four, and Whiting did ditto, and then lifted him out of the field for six. This over yielded 19 runs. Whiting next drove Amory to the boundary, but the next ball caded the innings, Amory taking Whiting's stump. Cornwall's second venture produced 183, leaving Devon 54 to get to win.

Ford and Carter again faced Whiting and Gillespy. The first over only produced two singles. The men played with a caution which could not be exceeded if the winning of the match depended upon them. The luncheon interval arrived, but there remained over 20 to wipe off the deficit, and the home captain consented to play on rather than adjourn. Still runs were just as slow in coming, and Whiting, whose average was five, dismissed Carter. Shelley came into the breach, and the runs were soon wiped out, Devon winning by nine wickets.

THE SUMMER SPORT

DEVON BEAT CORNWALL BY NINE WICKETS

Meeting Devon in a Minor Counties' Championship match, at Penzance, on Friday and Saturday, Cornwall were outplayed by nine wickets.

Devon, winning the toss, sent in Ford and Carter first. Whiting, who caused the Devonians some anxiety, and Beecher Williams, opened the Cornish bowling. After slow scoring, Williams, at mid-on missed a half-chance from Carter, who later put a ball from Gilhephy slightly over cover's head, and another almost into the hands of slips. After the score had reached 65 in an hour, Hawken caught Ford off Whiting for 19. Carter's 50, completed with a single to leg, brought the score to 85, and without any increase Whiting bowled a tight first and, releasing Gilhephy, Williams took Carter's balls. The Exmoorians' cricket, which was beautifully free, included seven 4's.

Aspinall and Light took the score to 100. Light put a ball from Whiting through the pavilion window for 6, and the ball was so badly cut that another had to be procured.

Resuming after lunch, Aspinall completed his 50 off a ball from Gilhephy, the Navy bowler later taking Light's wicket after a useful stand for 38. The same bowler later dismissed Aspinall after a splendid innings of 83, which included thirteen 4's. Devon's total for the first innings was 239.

Cornwall opened badly, Irwin being bowled before scoring, and Blomfield returned with a total of 11 up. Trevanthen's wicket, which cost 20, then fell, showing 3 for 31. Paull and Gilhephy were dismissed at a total of 41, and Bennett was dismissed for a single. Tresawna, the Cornish captain, made a stand with Hawken, and Spalding relieved Amory with the ball. Hawken, however, fell to Spalding at 7 for 80, and Tresawna, after taking the score over 100, gave a catch to Jennings in the slips. He had made 39 - Cornwall's highest score. The innings soon closed, B. Williams adding 17, and W. E. Nicholls 2 not out. The total score was 109. Following on, Blomfield and Irwin did much better, securing 23 and 18 respectively. Trevanthen, who was not out overnight, resumed for 23 on Saturday. Bennett and Williams, with more confidence than the other batsmen, stood well for 28 and 41 respectively, and Nicholls 16 not out, and Whiting 14, ended well. The total was 189.

Devon compiled 57. Ford 24 not out, Carter 23, and Shelley 8 not out, for one wicket, thus securing an easy win. Scores:—

WILTSHIRE AT CAMBORNE.

VISITORS DISMISSED FOR 85.

Cornwall entertained Wiltshire at Camborne in a two days' game, which commenced on Friday. Owing to the visitors' kitbags going astray at Plymouth, the match did not commence until after luncheon.

Cornwall had four changes in the side, from which Wilt suffered such a disastrous defeat at Troorbridge last week. Escott, Yeale, Gilhepy and Trounson, being unable to play, Adams, W. Cory, Humphreys, and Dr. Tresawna played in their stead. Ideal weather prevailed, and there was a fairly dry wicket. Wiltshire won the toss and A. A. Bankier and R. W. Awdrey faced the bowling of Whiting and B. Williams. Awdrey, after making 2, was caught in fine style by Adams in deep field, and a minute later Taunton retired before a deadly ball from Whiting. The register read: 10-2-1. Newman partnered Bankier, but when the telegraph read 31, Newman was beautifully caught by Scholefield, and two minutes later Bankier's wicket was captured by B. Williams after making 16, 31-4-16, four wickets having fallen after twenty-five minutes' play. Sellick and Major Henslow both had "lives," and should have been caught just after they went in, but B. Williams got Henslow's leg sharp after he had made six. The telegraph read 46-5-6. Runs came rather slowly now, both players being more than usually cautious. Ensor, however, was beautifully beaten by Whiting after just saving a blob. After 50 minutes' play seven wickets had fallen for 54. Davenport was bowled by B. Williams without opening his score. Lieut.-Col. Darrell met with a similar fate after a knock for 2. Smart fielding on the part of Cory was responsible for Sellick being run out when the score stood at 69. Overton was caught by B. Williams, off Whiting, after making 11. The innings closed at 85.

Within an hour and half of the start of the game, Cornwall commenced to bat, Scholefield and C. Paull facing Overton and Newman. After twenty minutes, twenty were registered, but the Wiltshire fielding was keen, and Scholefield had a "live" in the deep field where he should have been caught. This player sent the next two balls out of the field for sixes, and in the same over he was lbw, when he had made 25. The telegraph read: 33-1-25. Paull hit out nicely, but when he had made 20 he was caught by Kirkpatrick. Dr. Tresawna and Irwin took no risks, and 50 only was registered after an hour's play. Taunton bowled vice Overton, and Wiltshire's total was passed after 80 minutes' play. Tresawna got two boundaries and one two off Taunton.

With four wickets down for 116, Wiltshire resumed their second innings on Saturday. Bankier and Sellick opened and the score was brought to 132, when Sellick was fairly caught by B. Williams after making 9. When seven had been added, Ensor retired before a terrific delivery from Williams. Bankier, who had a nice innings of 61, was smartly caught by Whiting. The register read 143-7-61. Bankier's innings included six 4's. The side was dismissed for 161.

Cornwall was faced with 100 to win when Scholefield and Paull started. The former was missed mid-on in his first ball, and in the same over Paull retired without opening his score from a beautiful delivery by Newman. Irwin and Scholefield brought the score to 83 before the latter was lbw., after making 32. Dr. Tresawna was run out after making 21, and within 9 of the number of runs required for victory. It was left to Humphreys to make the winning hit to boundary.

THE SUMMER SPORT

DISASTER FOR WILTS AT CAMBORNE

The Minor Counties match between Cornwall and Wiltshire, which commenced at Camborne on Friday, attracted a good gate. The start was delayed until after lunch owing to the visiting team's baggage not having arrived. There were four changes in the Cornish team from that which did duty on tour, Dr. W. Tresawna, Cory, Adams and Humphreys taking the place of Gilhespy, Escott, Veall, and Trounson. On tour, H. Tresawna was unable to play on account of an injured hand, and Commander Irwin captained the team in his stead. At Trowbridge the Cornishmen routed Wiltshire to the tune of an innings and 128 runs. The visitors batted first and made a disastrous start, two wickets falling for eight runs. The visitors found runs difficult to get, and half the side were out for 46 after 46 minutes play. The innings closed for 85 runs, after less than one and a half hour's play. Paul and Scholefield opened the batting for Cornwall. The latter hit out strongly. He was missed in deep field, and signalled his good fortune by hitting Newman out of the ground twice in succession. Two balls later Newman had Scholefield, having Scholefield out for obstruction. The score stood at 33, and Paul was next to leave at 46. Dr. Tresawna and Commander Irwin became associated, and the opposition figure was passed by a drive by Tresawna to the boundary. The pair played cautiously and Irwin sent up the century after 85 minutes. The visitors employed six bowlers, but a separation did not take place until the score reached 120. When play ceased for the day they had wiped out the arrears, and were 64 runs on with six wickets to fall. When play was resumed, on Saturday, no lengthy stand was made, and the best cricket was displayed by Bankier, who was finely caught and bowled by Whiting for a capital 61. Four more wickets fell before the 150 was reached, and the innings closed for 161, which left Cornwall with 100 to get to win. Scholefield and Paul again opened the batting for Cornwall, and the latter left in the first over. Irwin joined Scholefield, and the pair were content to play steadily. At the luncheon interval they were unseparated with the score standing at 66. On resuming the score was advanced to 63, when Scholefield was out l.b.w. to Newman, as in the first innings. Dr. Tresawna speedily knocked up 21 and was then run out by Newman. The necessary runs for victory were soon obtained, the winning hit being a six by Humphreys. Irwin carried out his bat for 37, and Cornwall won by seven wickets.

Owing to the soand condition of the wicket it was impossible to begin play at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, and by agreement it was arranged to prepare a fresh wicket. Play opened at 1.30. Monmouth overhauled led by 61 with nine wickets in hand. In the morning half the side were out for 35, and the innings closed for 77. CRICKET AVERAGES

RECORDS OF CORNWALL'S PLAYERS

The re-entry of Cornwall Cricket Club in the Minor Counties Cricket Championship, after a lapse of seven years, necessitated the formation of practically a new team. The brothers J. C. and W. N. Biöckford-Smith, who were formerly strong pillars of the team, dropped out. E. Hawken and Trevarthen, two old warriors, did not maintain their places after the first two matches, and W. Coad and Vibart, of the pre-war team, did not make an appearance.

For a time the constitution of the team was unsettled, and 26 players have been called into service during the season. In their first three engagements Cornwall fared disastrously, losing to Devon by nine wickets; Berkshire, an innings and 105 runs; and Devon, ten wickets and 12 runs. The tide turned at Trowbridge, when they won in decisive fashion over Wiltshire by an innings and 28 runs. At Abergavenny, Monmouth won by 66 runs, and, at Reading, Berkshire added to their defeats. In their last two home encounters at Camborne, Cornwall lowered the colours of Monmouth and Wiltshire, winning on each occasion by an easy margin of seven wickets.

Of the eight matches played, Cornwall won three and obtained 15 points out of a possible 40. In the Minor Counties Championship table, Cornwall precede Lancashire II, Bedford, Cambridgeshire, Dorset, and Monmouth, but the latter have a match in hand.

After the first three games, H. Tresawna, captain, was unable to take part owing to an injured hand. Commander Irwin heads the batting statistics with an average of 32, and is followed by R. H. Scholefield with an average of 28. Both rendered yeoman service to the county. The bowling of Whiting has again been remarkably good, and his best performance was at Trowbridge, when he took all 10 Wiltshire wickets for 26 runs. He took 67 wickets at an average of 11 runs apiece. During the series of matches Cornwall registered 2,056 runs, whilst 2,248 were scored against them. The following are the records of players:—
