Northern followers of cricket, and they Northern followers of cricket, and they were many, who prophesied that Durham would crumple up before the attack of the redoubtable Australians were agreeably surprised to find the Dunelmians able to put up quite a good show in the first stage of the match at Ashbrooke on Saturday. Although the Durham team was not, perhaps, the strongest which could have been put in the field, it was sound in every respect, and proved to be a well-balanced combination. The batsmen were plucky and enterprising, and in the field they were enthusiastic and tireless.

The Australians paid Durham the compliment of fielding a very strong side. Some little disappointment was expressed at the absence of J. M. Gregory, but as the chosen side included Bardsley, Macartney, Collins, Macdonald, and, of course, Armstrong, it was evident that the Colonials had on duty so strong a team as has played against

was evident that the Colonials had on duty as atrong a team as has played against most of the first-class counties. The run of the day's play naturally favoured the Australiaus, but they did not claim a tremendous advantage at the close, being only 32 runs on with five wickets to fall, and such batsmen as Collius, Bardsley, Armstrong, and Taylor out.

The stroke was loudly applauded, and the score was taken to 16 ere Brooks succumbed to a lightning ball from Macdonald.

J. R. Wake, who followed Brooks was very unfortunate. He opened his account by getting Armstrong away to legfor three but with the score at 29 he went forward to a ball from the Australian captain, missed, and was promptly stumped by Oldfield. In a desperate effort to get back to his crease he swung round awkwardly on one leg and fell heavily, displacing his knee-cap. He was immediately attended to by the Colonial fielders, and had to be carried off, taking no further part in the game.

Apparently the bowling had no tarrors for them, for they hit out frequently, and in the course of 30 minutes had added 39 runs to the total. Collins went on for Macdonald at 51, and eventually got Kinch's wicket, the Durham captain driving a hard rising ball to miden, right into Bardslev's hands. He had played really fine cricket for 45 minutes, cutting and driving well, and scored seven 4's. Scott Page did not stay long after Kinch left, for ten minutes later, with only sig added to the total, he was splendidly caught by Taylor well out in the long field.

Though the Durham County cloven, in their contest with the Australians, have been defeated by ten wickets, they can be congratulated upon having put up a good fight, and upon having given 24,000 people an interesting and thoroughly enjoyable display. They did creditable work with the bat as well as with the ball, and fielded smartly, well deserving the hearty applause, which their efforts called forth yesterday and on Saturday.

There was a crowd of considerable dimensions within the enclosure yesterday morning when the game was resumed, and the official return showed that the day's attendance came to close upon 12,000. Brilliant weather prevailed from start to finish.

As a result of Saturday's play, Australia had a lead of 32 runs with five wickets in hand.
