COUNTY CRICKET MATCH.

BEDS. v. KENT II.

· Home County Beaten.

on Monday, was made eventful by the presentation, during the luncheon interval, of a gold watch and gold and platinum chain, together with an album, containing the names of 155 members of the Bedfordshire County Cricket Club, to Mr. W. W. Marks, in recognition of 25 years' devotion to the development of good cricket in Bedfordshire. An account of the proceedings appears on another rage of this issue.

Taylor, the Beds, groundsman, had overcome all the difficulties of the weather in remarkable fashion for the first County match of the Beds, season, and had prepared a beautiful wicket. Naturally, after the heavy rains, it was on the soft side, but at the commencement of the game with the Kent II, team, there was nothing in it to assist the howlers, and the winning of the toss by the visitors was likely to turn out an advantage. There was quie a nice attendance of spectators when the game commenced. The pace of the pitch was not considered likely to suit Dilley, and Redman was chosen in pit ference, this bring the only change from the advertised XI.

A. L. Hilder and J. A. Deed opened the Kent innings to the bowling of Childs and Redman. Run: came slowly at first, until Hilder got both bowlers away to the boundary. He rep sted the performance a little later. Deed tatted quietly, and the score gradually mounted to 40 before Wilfred King decided on a Louble change, S. V. Graham and E. D. Dyn's taking up the bowling. This was immediately effective, for Graham "yorked" Deed, and Dyn's easily caught and bowled Hinder. The last-named had played free and attractive cricket for his 31 runs, Fawcus, who followed, gathered eight before he feli to a marvellous catch by Dynes, off his own towling. The ball was travelling fast and low away from the bowler when he euddenly shot out his right hand and held the ball a foot or so from the ground. Hearn started shakily, and was twice nearly caught off Pynes, but when Childs took the hall from Graham Hearn twice hit him to the squareleg boundary. His partner, Fenner, was bat-ting steadily, but, with the score at 87, Childs whilst completely beat and bowled him, Evans, who followed was neatly taken in the same over by Pacey. Wilfred King went on to bowl just before the luncheon interval, but no lurther wickets fell, and the adjournment came with Kent having lost half their wickets for 100 runs. The hall was by this time popping about awkwardly, and the batsmen had several narrow escapes. It was evident the wicket was getting more difficult and that runs would be hard to get later in the day.

Hearn and Hever opened very cautiously after luncheon, to the bowling of King and Childs. At 117 Hearn was clean bowled for a hard-hit 33. Weigall, the captain, followed in, but soon lost his partner, caught at the wicket off Childs. Todd was quickly sent back, falling to a fine catch by Maxey, off Childs, who caused a sensation by Lowling Cole with his next ball, and getting Cope well caught by Maxey off the second ball he received, thus closing the Kent innings for 123, five wickeds having falter for 20 runs since the resumption.

Bedfordshire soon found that runs would be difficult to get, for Graham fell to a low catch in the slips off Hearn's first over, and Sutherland, who joined Burke at the wickets, opened very shakily. He survived to hit Hover over the ropes for six before he was caught at mid-off. Burke was playing sound cricket until he was snapped at the wicket for a capital 16. This left Maxey and Dynes together, but the former returned a ball to the bowler before he could get going, and Dynes was clean bowled at 39 by Hearn. W. E. King and Pacey improved matters, the captain making a glorious hit which sailed over the pavilion, but he was bowled with his score at 14. The others failed to do much against some steady bowling and magnificent fielding, and the innings closed for 76.

Deed and Told commenced the second venturn of Kent, and ran up 23 before Redman beat and bowled the first-named, and the first day's play finished with Kent having scored 33 for one wicket.

Wickets fell quickly on Tuesday morning, the bowlers being able to make the tall turn appreciably on the fast drying wicket. Dynes bowled Hearn, caught and bowled Hilder, and got Deed taken at the wicket for a well-played 18, so that four wickets were down for 42. Then Childs came on at the Avenue end, and got Faweus and Fenner caught, and with King bowling at the other end, the Kent men were very much subdued, Childs bowling six maiden overs and King five out of 17 overs. Eventually King bowled Weigall with a ball which kept very low, and in the next over completely beat and howled Hever, who had played very steadily for 15. A pretty catch by Dynes disposed of Evans, and nine wickets were down for 78. Cope was stumped by Burke, and the innings closed for 84, leaving Beds. 131 to get to win.

The Eedfordshire bowling in beth the Kent

The Pedfordshire bowling in both the Kent innings had been very good, and Childs especially compelled respect from all the butsmen. His analysis of 10 wickets for 79 speaks eloquently of his work. King and Dynes also bowled exceedingly well.

Burke and Paccy commenced Bedfordshire's final venture at 1.15 p.m., and Burke pulled the second ball he received to the boundary. He had, however, only scored two more when in reaching forward he missed the ball, stepped out of his ground, and was somewhat unluckily stumped, the ball bounding on to the wicket off the wicket-keeper's pads After luncheon Hearn and Hever kept Graham and Pacey strictly on the defensive, and of the first 10 overs Lowled nine were maidens. Eventually Pacey jumped in to drive Hearn, missed it, and was stumped, whilst Sutherland, who fellowed, was clean bowled by Hever for a single. Dynes opened his account with a lovely late cut for four, and Graham lifted Hearn clean out of the ground for aix, bringing up 30. Hever, however, got Dynes in the next over with a splendid hall, and the game at this point was decidedly in Kent's favour. The outlook was still less in Kent's favour. The outlook was still less hopeful from a home point of view when Craham, who had scored 19 in excellent style, was stumped in trying to drive, and half the Maxey and King together, Maxey having gathered seven. King litted a ball from Hearn over the screen, but lost Maxey, easily taken at point from a mis-hit, and when the captain had carried his score to 11 he was

bowled by Hover. Childs next got his leg in front of a straight one, and Field was badly run out. Keech made one or two good strokes, but Redman failed to open his account, and the match ended at 3 o'ctock in a victory for Kent II, by 71 runs. The Kent left-handers, Hearn and Hever, were very difficult to play, and never gave the home batsmen a chance to settle down. Told, a boy of 16, also bowled remarkably well.

BEDFORD CRICKET WEEK.

INTERESTING MATCHES AND A BOWLER'S WICKET.

An Ideal Ground.

Beds, played their last competition match Jast Friday and Saturday, on Mr. Anthony de Rothschild's magnificent private ground at Ascott, near Leighton Buzzard. The ground itself was ideal, the equipment was first class, and the hospitality of the owner was perfect in every way. During this hour's play Edwards had wrought havee amongst the Beds. men, for the pitch was only soft on the surface, and this fact made the slow bowler come very fast off the pitch. Burke was bowled playing forward when he should have played back; Newman was out the very first time he went out to meet Edwards; Childs and Robinson were only given time to look at the pitch, and then came the long wait to think things over.

Spectators' Comfort.

Several old friends of Bods, came to see the match, amongst them being Mr. and Mrs. Wharmby, Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Arnold, W. Brown, and several of the Leighton Buzzard team. All were received with the same spirit of generosity of the owner of the beautiful park, and had the weather been different, cricket could not have been played under better conditions.

Rain Helpful.

Rain certainly made the pitch more favourable for the hatsmen, and 63 runs were added for the loss of three wickets, Ireland being bowled by the last ball of the day. Twenty minutes the next morning was sufficient to close Beds.' innings, Pacey carrying his bat for 26, which was as valuable as any score he has made this season, and under ordinary conditions was worth a hundred. Bucks., reaping the benefit of the ciller, put together 52 very quickly before Burks caught his opposing wicket-keeper, "feeling about" for Dynes, and they passed the visitors' score with only four wickets down. Had Newman taken Le Gros in the country before he reached double fourses. Eads, wight easily have taken three figures, Beds, might easily have taken three points instead of one, for the pitch became a real, "sticky dog" before the end, and it was only the resolute hitting of Carlton which enabled Bucks, to command a lead of 48.

Order Changed.

With the idea of getting as many runs as possible while the wicket remained easy after the effects of the roller, King changed the order of batting, taking Redman in with himself. This move worked well, for Edwards could only tuen the ball slowly at first. A score of 128 was quite good, under the prevailing conditions. To get 80 runs in the fourth innings on such a wicket would not have been such an easy task as it looked on paper, but rain settled the question in no uncertain manner, and Bucks, were forced to be content with three points. The final record of Beds., then, is as follows :- Played 12, won 2, won on 1st innings 2, lost on 1st innings 3, lost 5, points 19, out of possible 60, percentage 31.6.

A Bad Season.

To be frank, Beds, have had a very bad season. In playing 12 matches it was thought that more support would be forthcoming, both from members and spectators, but two ac-tors have upset this theory entirely. First, the terrible weather has killed all enjoyment in watching and playing the game, and in consequence matches have not lasted their full time. Luton, from whom was expected even greater patronage than last year, has failed badly, and the gates have not reached 25 per cent, of last year's total. In addition to the bad weather, the team itself has shown extremely poor form in batting, bowling, and especially fielding. The latter branch of the game has been at times really wicked; at least sixty catches must have been put down during the scason—an average of five per match. Such exhibitions sicken supporters, especially when the opponents have shown such excellent form in catching and fielding.
