## Surrey II. v. Cambs.

SURREY II. WON BY EIGHT WICKETS.  
CENTURY BY A. S. LING.

In their second County match at the Oval, Cambs. started in a disastrous manner, as in the first over of the game H. B. Hart and G. Carnegie Brown were dismissed with the fourth and fifth balls from Geary, and with W. Manning, F. G. Lilley, and E. C. Marchant following in quick succession, half the side were out for 26 runs, and it looked as if Cambs. would be dismissed for a ridiculously small total, but then E. H. Leek came to the rescue, and he stayed with A. S. Ling, who batted confidently from the start. Leek hit hard in his characteristic light-hearted manner, and, with luck on his side, he quickly hit up 17 runs, when he fell to a good catch near the boundary line by Summers. Ling played the right game under the circumstances. He took but few liberties, showing a fine defence and getting his runs slowly. His innings probably saved the side from a complete collapse. The Rev. A. D. Taylor stayed at the wicket some time, and, in partnership with Ling, the score mounted up steadily. Taylor was dismissed by a brilliant catch at first slip by Cole, and the side were eventually dismissed for 112, which, although it was quite good after such a dreadful start, was really a poor score on such a good wicket.

Geary bowled extremely well at the commencement, but was not so dangerous after his first six or seven overs. He took 5 wickets for 22. The Surrey fielding was very smart, except for one or two occasional lapses when catches were dropped, but they did not prove expensive. The dismissal of Marchant was the result of a wonderful quick return by Gregory.

Surrey scored fairly freely, but were dismissed just before six o'clock for 252, which was more than they were really worth. The Cambs. fielding was uncertain, and in several instances runs were given away by erratic throw-ins, resulting in several runs being scored from overthrows. Baldwin just failed to reach his century by six runs. He went in at the fall of the first wicket, and ought to have been caught before he had scored. He was last man out. He batted very cautiously, and was extremely slow until he had passed 50. Smith and Coxall bowled well for Cambs., the former taking 3 wickets for 61 and Coxall 4 wickets for 76.

Surrey secured a lead of 140 on the first innings. Cambs. had half an hour's batting before the close, and knocked off 32 of the runs without loss. Hart batted in a very attractive style, and scored 27, making some excellent strokes to the leg. Thus, with all their wickets in hand, Cambs. commenced play on Tuesday wanting 108 runs to avoid the innings defeat.

They ran up the unexpected large score of 300 in the second innings, and thus not only avoided the innings defeat, but set Surrey 161 to win. This, however, did not prove a formidable task, and the home county scored these for the loss of only two wickets. Ling again batted splendidly, and scored a century by patient cricket under difficulties, as he had a badly damaged finger, which troubled him. He again showed a very fine defence, and played all the bowlers with confidence. G. Carnegie Brown knocked up a quick 45, hitting nine 4's and two 3's. With the tail end scoring well, the county thus reached 300, which is the largest total they have compiled for many years. Profiting by missed catches, Surrey scored very freely, and due to a fine effort of Bullock, they won comfortably by eight wickets.

After being 140 runs in arrears on the first innings, Cambs. did very well to put up a fight against Surrey 2nd XI. at the Oval in their second Minor Counties' Championship match. They were eventually beaten by eight wickets, but they might have made it a closer finish if only they had a little luck and the chances behind the stumps had been taken.

In view of their failure in the first innings when Cambs. were dismissed for 112, the arrears of 149 looked very formidable, and an innings defeat appeared quite possible, but then the team surprised everybody and ran up the large total of 300. This set Surrey 2nd 160 to win, and they accomplished this with the loss of only two wickets. The Surrey side was quite a strong one, and included nine professionals, and under the circumstances the County team did really quite well, considering the cricket they are accustomed to play in.

A. S. Ling made a welcome re-appearance for the County side, and it is to be hoped that he will be able to assist in the other matches. He saved the side from a serious collapse in the first innings by his patient batting and splendid defence. No bowling appeared to trouble him at all, and he played each bowler confidently. His century in the second innings was really a very fine knock, as he was playing with a damaged finger, which troubled him, and undoubtedly prevented him from scoring very fast.

G. Carnegie Brown played bright cricket for his 45 in the second innings, and hit no less than nine 4's and two 3's. F. G. Lilley was one of the disappointing batsmen. He looked like getting runs each time he went to the wicket, but he was dismissed cheaply. It was a pity that Lilley was not called upon to bowl more, as he was the only left-hander on the side, and yet only bowled three overs in the whole match.

The fielding of the Cambs. side was not up to the standard of the Surrey XI., and one of the chief weaknesses was behind the wicket. Rolfe did not give away many byes, but he stood too far back, which allowed the batsmen to take liberties, and he also failed to hold some catches, which proved costly. Standing so far back, it was also difficult for him to get to the stumps to stop a quick throw-in when there was a possible chance of stumping.

## Lincolnshire v. Cambridgeshire.

Lincs. win by 5 wickets.

ANOTHER CENTURY BY A. S. LING.

This two-day fixture commenced at Lincoln on Tuesday. In view of Lincolnshire's previous record this season—they had played four matches and had yet to register a win—it was expected, even by home supporters, that Cambs. would have a fairly easy task, but such are the uncertainties of cricket that the reverse proved to be the case. The Lincolnshire players showed remarkable improvement, and eight batsmen got into double figures, whilst "Mr. Extras" was responsible for the formidable total of 36, only one run short of the highest individual score on the Cambs. side.

Owing to the late arrival of the visitors, the start was delayed. Lincs. won the toss, and batted first on a dry wicket. After losing Stamp's wicket in the first over, Thompson and Frankson laid the foundation of a good score, and later G. Shaw and the Rev. G. Ure made a splendid stand, the former batting brilliantly for 84, and the rev. gentleman contributing a very useful 43. Shaw's score included one six and seven 4's. When Hawley, the last man, joined Major Wilson, the total stood at 270, and it appeared extremely unlikely that a third century would be reached. The score gradually mounted, however, and the innings, which had lasted three and a half hours, realised 309 runs.

Cambs. put up a plucky fight against heavy odds, but found runs rather hard to get. Mr. Bellamy and H. B. Hart proved the most successful with the willow, the former being bowled by Richardson with 37 to his credit, while Hart, succumbed to a clever delivery by Smith when his score stood at 34. The same two bowlers also accounted for W. Manning and A. S. Ling, who compiled 28 and 25 respectively.

For Cambridgeshire, Marchant took five wickets for 72 runs and Coxall three for 74. For Lincolnshire, Hawley secured three for 42, Wilson one for seven, Richardson four for 57, and Smith two for 42.

Lincolnshire, with an advantage of 151 runs in the first innings, put Cambridgeshire in to bat again. The visitors made a poor start, Manning being bowled by Richardson with only six runs on the board. Ling and Hart, however, made a splendid stand, and not until the score read 79 was the latter caught at the wicket. Gravesstock, by purely defensive methods, rendered Ling admirable assistance, and the pair between them put on another 61 runs. Then Gravesstock was smartly taken in the slips, and Bellamy and Marchant both left just previous to the luncheon interval.

Cambridgeshire were eventually all dismissed for 183, and had it not been for the splendid innings of Ling, who carried on his bat for 105, the score would have been very mean indeed.

Lincolnshire soon obtained the required runs for the loss of only two wickets.

## CAMBS. FINE RECOVERY AFTER BAD START

## Herts v Cambs - Cheshunt.

The Cambs. batting in the first innings in their match with Herts., at Cheshunt last week was woefully weak, and one can only conjecture what would have happened had not Ling and Staples been in the side. The fact that of the Cambs. total of 119, these two batsmen scored 91 speaks for itself. The last eight wickets added eleven runs to the score, and four of the batsmen failed to get a run.

Herts. was dismissed for 203, quite a moderate total for a county side, and if the batting of the Cambs. team was as strong as the bowling they would be a useful side. Smith bowled particularly well in the first innings, and took five wickets. The Trumpington youth had the satisfaction of dismissing C. H. Titchmarsh for a "duck," the only one on the side. Collis-Brown taking a catch behind the wicket.

The England batsman has in recent years shown a partiality for the Cambs. bowling, and last season in the two matches between the clubs he punished them to the extent of 350 runs. He hit up 146 against them at Fletchmore, and followed this by making 213 of a total of 511 on Fenner's, which is the highest score of his career in county cricket.

Considering that they were 84 behind on the first innings, Cambs. did better than might have been expected. The batting in the second innings was again very uneven, but they eventually set Herts. 96 to get to win, the home county obtaining this number for the loss of two wickets. Bland and Titchmarsh were together when the winning hit was made, and it is curious to note that the former's first scoring stroke was a 3, and the rest of his total of 19 was made up of singles.

Hart contributed nearly half of the Cambs. second innings total of 179, and he received considerable assistance from Gravestock in a fourth wicket stand, the latter batting steadily for three-quarters of an hour while scoring three. The partnership added 27. Hart compiled 83, his highest of the season, which included five 4's, eight 3's and eleven 2's. His fine effort occupied just over two hours.

Smith had a very successful match, particularly with the ball, taking five wickets for 63 runs in 18 overs in the Herts. first innings. Although he was a little more expensive in the second innings, his five overs yielding 23 runs for no wicket, his analysis for the match is a most useful one. In each of five overs during this innings he was only hit for a single, and although the batsmen generally took few liberties with his bowling, he was the only Cambs. bowler who was hit for six, Watson, Cowley and Clarkson taking one each off him in the match. Smith made a valuable 31 in the Cambs. second innings.

R. J. Meyer, the Cambridge Blue, shared the brunt of the Herts. attack with Burton, and Meyer was not particularly successful, his three wickets in the first innings costing 64 runs. He took two for 49 yesterday. Burton, who took 6 wickets for 37 in the Cambs. first innings, bowled 45 overs during the match, and his full analysis was 9 for 105. The hardest worked of the visiting bowlers was Coxall, who sent down 36.3 overs altogether, taking three wickets for 99 runs.

Cambs. have so far shown considerable improvement on their form of last season, particularly in the bowling department, but the batting is still much below standard.

Cambs. and Lines, the bottom dogs in the Minor Counties' Cricket Championship, each completed their season's fixture list, at Fenner's, on Monday and Tuesday, when they met each other. Neither team had much to boast about in the matter of points, Lincolnshire having only one victory to their credit, this being secured over Cambs. a short time ago. Cambs. had not won a match, but were hopeful of turning the tables on this occasion, indeed at one time they looked like doing so.

Despite the wet pitch, the wicket proved fairly fast, and a heavy scoring game resulted, 219 runs being registered in all, for the fall of 30 wickets. Although not at full strength, it was Cambs. best display of the season, and for the first time for many moons they were in a position to declare rather more than half-way through their second innings.

Winning the toss, the home county batted first, but the captain's wicket fell with only one run in the book. Afterwards the game underwent a complete transformation, Ling and Carnegie-Brown being concerned in a big partnership, Ling, who, it will be remembered, scored a century against Monday's visitors, when at Lincoln, never seemed to settle down completely, but nevertheless he proved a useful partner for the Leys School man.

Carnegie-Brown did most of the hitting, and he was in a merry mood. At one period of the game he scored over 40 whilst Ling was getting one, and altogether he obtained 104, whilst the first wicket man was compiling 26. The partnership was broken at 135, at which figure both men were dismissed by catches by Bashforth. Carnegie-Brown had then scored 104, this including three glorious 6's and fourteen 4's.

Hodgkinson, who started steadily, was also responsible for a big figure's innings. Fifth in and fifth out, he saw 115 added to the total, of which he scored 90. When he became settled down he hit with refreshing freedom, and included in his score were three 6's and ten 4's. Leek was the only other remaining batsman to make anything of a score. The Cheveley man is a big hitter, and he was caught on the boundary off a drive that certainly appeared like a 4.

The first innings closed at 280, and Lines did not make a start that suggested that they would pass this total. Smith, who bowled extremely well on Monday, was mainly responsible for pegging the batsmen down. Two good wickets were lost for only 30 runs, and although the century had been passed before the fall of the fourth, eight were down for 134, the fifth, sixth and seventh going down for the addition of two runs.

It was necessary that the last two wickets should produce 47 runs if Lines were to avoid the follow-on, and when stumps were drawn for the day 30 runs were still required. Lines would probably have all been out overnight had a chance offered by Wilson, when he had only made a few, been taken. This miss probably lost Cambs. the full points, at any rate it would have had a great effect on being able to enforce the follow-on.

As it was, when play was resumed on Tuesday, Wilson stayed to make 46, the necessity of following on being avoided by a comfortable margin. This ninth wicket added 66 runs, the score standing at 209, when Wilson was deceived by one of the Cambs. captain's "slows." There were two rather remarkable catches during the Lines' innings, Bashforth and Searby were both taken by Ling at first slip, but in each instance Fromant, who was keeping wicket, was unable to catch the ball, and he tipped it on to the slip man.

Enjoying a first innings lead of 79, Cambs. opened their second venture in an unpromising fashion. Hart, Ling and Hodgkinson all being dismissed for only twelve runs. It was Carnegie-Brown who was responsible for pulling the game round, for after a rather shaky start he played another splendid innings. This time Leek was his confrere.

The pair became associated when the score stood at 44, and the partnership added over a hundred runs. Leek was missed when he had only scored a few, and this let-off proved expensive. Carnegie-Brown was the first to leave, the scoring then standing at 134, to which he had contributed 86. His best hits were a 6 and twelve 1's, obtained in about an hour and a half's batting.

Leek, who was hitting with his accustomed vigour, found Covill a useful partner, and they added 60 for the sixth wicket. On Covill's dismissal Leek's score stood at 99, and the Rev. A. D. Taylor joined him, so that his club-mate could complete his century before he declared.

A single gave Leek the coveted three figures, and an overthrow to the boundary augmented his score to 104, and the score then standing at 223, the home captain applied the cosure. Leek's best hits were two 6's, two 5's and twelve 1's, the boundaries being obtained from any bowler the Lines' captain cared to put on.

Lines, who were 302 runs in arrears, started their second venture in such a promising manner that the prospect of a definite finish soon became improbable. The Cambs. captain frequently changed the bowling, but the first wicket pair were not separated until 71 had been scored. Bashforth, one of the opening pair, stayed to make 63, ere he skied one of Leek's deliveries and he was caught by the bowler. Later Frearson, who was the top scorer in the Lines' first innings with 61, obtained a not out 72, in which were included nine boundaries.

When stumps were drawn, Lines required 88 runs to win, and they had six wickets in hand. Smith was the best of the Cambs. bowlers throughout the two days. He kept a splendid length, and in the first innings captured five wickets for 52 runs in the course of 17 overs, 10 of which were maidens. In the second innings his average was one for 89, but he bowled much better than his analysis would suggest. Leek also met with considerable success with the ball. In the first innings he obtained three wickets for 29 runs, and in the second got one for nine.

The other bowlers in the first innings and their analyses were as follows: Marchant 0 for 41, Covill 0 for 26, Hussey 1 for 22, and Taylor 1 for 1. Eight bowlers were employed by the Cambs. captain in the second innings, frequent changes being made. In addition to the analyses beforementioned, the analyses were as follows: Hussey 0 for 25, Taylor 0 for 12, Covill 0 for 25, Marchant 2 for 31, Ling 0 for 11, Carnegie-Brown 0 for 13.

Of the Lines' bowlers, Wilson was the most successful, his best figures being in the first innings, when he obtained five wickets for 97 runs. The Cambs. fielding was like the parson's egg, good in parts. An outstanding fieldman was Carnegie-Brown, who picked up and returned the ball smartly. Lines' might have saved several runs, particularly in the first innings, by a better arrangement of the field at times.

The feature of the play in the semi-final of the Senior Cup between the Cambridge Borough Police and New Chesterton Institute on Trinity Old Ground last Thursday was the brilliant batting of F. G. Lilley for the Police. The left-hander, has not done very well in County matches, but he found his form all right on this occasion. The Police won the toss, and Lilley, who opened the innings with Fell, immediately began to attack the bowling. He hit with power and when Fell departed at 81, "F. G." had reached his half-century.

The next wicket fell at 105, and then A. E. Lilley went in to take part in a great stand that added 216 runs. The latter did not reach the boundary very frequently, but his partner went out for the bowling in refreshing fashion. The County man required one run to complete his double century when the partnership was broken by his dismissal. One of the scorers signalled that he wanted two for the distinction, and in trying to obtain them he hit a ball to the on, where he was well caught by Porter holding deep.

F. G. Lilley had made his 100 out of a total of 321, when his innings came to an end, and he hit four 6s, twenty-five 4s, three 2s and ten 1s. A. E. Lilley also played a useful innings of 85, which included only three 1s and three 3s. He dealt chiefly in singles and twos, hitting 19 of the latter. The two brothers scored 284 of the total of 381 made by the Police in just over four hours.

In the short time available for batting, New Chesterton Institute lost two wickets cheaply, Williams and F. Varley being both bowled by Christmas, and the total was 19 for two wickets at the close. No date has been fixed for the continuation of the match, but the Borough Police are set for the final. I should not be surprised if they win the trophy on their first entry into the competition. They have a useful all-round side, with a strong attack, which includes, in Harry Christmas, one of the best bowlers in the county.

One feature of yesterday's play, which demands attention, was the very smart wicket-keeping of W. Cockell, jun., for New Chesterton Institute. He was keenness itself, as he is in anything he takes up, and in a total of 381 allowed only two byes. In such form he is worthy of a trial with the County Club, who cannot do better than encourage young blood.

## Batting and Bowling Averages for 1924 Season.

The Cambs. County Cricket Association concluded their season's fixture list on Monday and Tuesday last, when they met Lines, at Fenner's. This season they have played eight matches in the Minor Counties Championship, and for the third year in succession they have finished at the bottom of the table, their percentage this season being 11.4. None of the matches were won, but one was "won on the first innings," one "lost on the first innings," whilst in one game there was no result. The other five matches resulted in easy victories for their opponents. The points possible were thus 35, and Cambs. secured but four.

Although having such a sorry record, the play has been much above the standard of last year, in fact towards the end of the season the batting was certainly more reliable than at any time since the war. A. S. Ling has been the outstanding batsman, having scored three centuries, two, 118 and 105, both not out against Lines, and one, 106, against Surrey second eleven at the Oval. G. Carnegie-Brown, who turned out later in the season, also reached the century mark, and E. H. Leek, who has batted fairly consistently throughout, has also attained to three figures. Big scores have been made by N. J. Hodgkinson (90) and H. B. Hart (83), whilst in addition to his century Carnegie-Brown made 86 in one innings.

The Borough Police bowler, H. Christmas, heads the bowling averages, and it was unfortunate that he was unable to take part in the whole of the matches. Smith, one of the Association's professionals, secured the most wickets, and he has been the bowler most in demand. He has proved a useful all-round man, for in addition to a good bowling average, he has batted fairly evenly, and has been a valuable fielder.
