

DEVON V. MONMOUTHSHIRE.

REPRESENTATIVES OF GWENT SECURE THREE POINTS.

Monmouth took a comfortable three points from Devon on Tuesday at Exeter on the best first innings. Owing to continuous rain no play was possible on the first day, and it was nearly twelve o'clock before a start was possible yesterday.

The visitors were fortunate in winning the toss, as the wicket was hardly likely to improve and there was an advantage in having first innings. Monmouth did not

get started too well, and with three wickets falling rapidly with the score at 65, and half the side out for 10 runs more, matters were anything but promising. C. N. and F. G. Phillips made an invaluable stand for the sixth wicket partnership, which realised 71 runs, and the side were not dismissed until 171 had been made.

Devon, on a crumbling wicket, had an uphill task against the attack of K. G. Raikes and Harris, the latter of whom was bowling remarkably well. Wickets fell cheaply and none of the batsmen managed to stay long, the venture concluding after an hour and a half's play for 89. Set to follow-on with nearly an hour and a half left for play, Devon played with great confidence, and only one wicket had fallen for 57, when at a quarter past six it was agreed to draw stumps, Monmouth having the advantage on the first knock.

In Devon's second innings Sherlock hit a 6—all run from a full pitch by Raikes. The Monmouthshire wicket-keeper was excellent, Wilcox not giving away a single bye. The 3 extras were two leg-byes and a wide, the latter bowled by Raikes. Complete scores:—

BRILLIANT CENTURY BY K. C. RAIKES.

Monmouthshire made a poor start on what appeared a fast scoring wicket against Surrey Seconds at Kennington Oval on Monday, losing four wickets for 37. K. C. Raikes and G. C. Phillips, by sound batting against accurate length bowling and keen fielding, added 65 in just under an hour. Raikes, who throughout his brilliant innings was never in difficulties with the frequently changed bowling, found another useful partner in Harris, and 55 runs resulted from the sixth wicket partnership. Harris played delightful cricket on the leg side. Lock, who brought about his dismissal, enjoyed a remarkable brief spell of success, capturing three wickets in a couple of overs for 20 runs. Scoulding stayed long enough to enable Raikes to reach a faultless 100, the result of two hours and a quarter's batting. Ninth out, Raikes had one 6 and eleven 4's in his splendid effort. He made runs all round the wicket, driving with great power in the later stages of the innings.

MEN OF GWENT DEATEN BY NINE WICKETS.

Surrey II. gained an easy victory over Monmouthshire in the Minor Counties match at Kennington Oval on Tuesday by nine wickets. Surrey, who were only 56 runs behind with seven wickets to fall when the game was resumed, treated the Monmouthshire bowling with scant respect, scoring 198 in two hours before the innings was declared with nine wickets down.

Monmouthshire, batting a second time in a minority of 142, adopted wrong tactics on a run-getting wicket, and lost six men for 122. Williams alone showing enterprise. He had seven 4's in a merry innings lasting forty-five minutes, his effort contrasting strongly with that of Webb, who batted an hour and three-quarters. G. C. Phillips and Jenkins saved the innings defeat by a sound display, the pair adding 50 before Phillips was snapped at the wicket. With the last three batsmen adding 43, Monmouthshire's total reached 217, the same score as in the first innings.

23 WICKETS FALL AT PANTEG FOR 256 RUNS.

Bowlers reaped a rich harvest at Panteg on Friday, where Monmouthshire met Cornwall, no fewer than 23 wickets falling during the day for a paltry 256 runs, or an average of 11 runs each. Monmouthshire, who have yet to record their first victory of the season, did well to dispose of the Cornishmen (who at lunch time had scored 75 runs for the loss of two wickets) for 153. One remarkable feature of the cricket was that Whiting and Mill for Cornwall, and F. G. Phillips for Monmouthshire, each took two wickets with successive balls, the Monmouthshire captain accomplishing the feat when Cornwall went in to bat a second time. Considering Monmouthshire were in the hopeless position of being 125 runs behind with only one wicket to fall when time was called at Panteg on Saturday evening, it would appear that Cornwall were entitled to every sympathy for being thwarted by victory. Wilcox and Harris caused the visitors more trouble, but when the first-named returned the ball to Smith the Cornishmen appeared to have the game in hand as ten minutes still remained when Spary, the last man, joined Harris. The professional monopolised the bowling skilfully and succeeded in frustrating the visitors. It was a really fine achievement on the part of Monmouthshire in saving the game.

Earlier in the day Cornwall, who had lost three of their best run-getters for only 14, made an excellent recovery, mainly as the result of superb batsmanship by Scholefield, who during a stay of over three hours, contributed a faultless 82. The Histon amateur was at considerable pains to play himself in, but afterwards drove finely and hit nine 4's. CRICKET IN WALES

EVIL OF LATE STARTS IN CLUB MATCHES.

GLAMORGAN ADVISED TO PLAY A. E. FREETHY.

Nothing strikes one so much nowadays as the casual and indifferent way in which club cricket is played. Particularly is this so in the way players turn up for the start. Practically never does a club match start on time in these days. This is a post-war feature, entirely indefensible. The Newport-Neath fixture on Saturday, which started half-an-hour or so after advertised time, was no exception, and it is notorious that for lack of punctuality—which is said to be the politeness of kings—the Neath club have this year earned an unenviable reputation.

Dr. Reason and Mr. A. E. Freethy made a good start on a dead, easy wicket. The bowling was certainly indifferent, though it would be hard to imagine a wicket on which it would be more difficult, to bowl. Dr. Reason was not by any means convincing, and was completely overshadowed by Mr. Freethy in the rapidity of scoring and attractiveness of strokes. The latter has had the reputation of being somewhat of a "stonewaller," but on Saturday he scored all round the wicket, and playing extremely good cricket.

A READY-MADE FIRST-WICKET BATSMAN FOR GLAMORGAN.

One may easily wonder why Mr. Freethy is not playing for Glamorgan. As a schoolmaster, he is free and available in August and with the exception of Mr. Riches there is no one in Wales to-day equally capable of opening an innings. It is well known that in the field he has an extremely safe pair of hands.

Everyone is well aware that Mr. Clay is positively incommensurate by the number of his bowlers in the present side—they are as the sands of the sea-shore—whilst two really sound bats to open the innings would be a heaven-sent blessing. It may be argued—and it undoubtedly is a fact—that the improved form of this year is due to the ability to play the same eleven almost regularly. Still, room can be found for Mr. Pinch, and very wisely. Why not also for Mr. Freethy? Not only has he previously done well in first-class cricket, but he is, with the exception mentioned, the best first-wicket batsman we have to-day.

CYRIL WALTERS COMPARED WITH THE LATE J. H. BRAIN.

Nothing good can be said of the Newport batting, except that Monmouthshire were playing Cornwall. It was sad to see Mr. Cyril Walters run out—due entirely to his own fault. Though he had made only 13 his innings was sheer delight. His footwork, on which all batting is based, was admirable and his timing perfect. Not since the late Mr. J. H. Brain has Glamorgan possessed a cricketer who in entirely irreproachable and classic style plays the ball to the boundary with such minimum of effort. His running between the wickets leaves room for much improvement, but that his play is first-class is indubitable. From this point of view in Glamorgan he is to-day in a class by himself.

Neath were trying a youngster from Derbyshire, recommended by Bestwick. He bowled quite well, though he sent down an excessive number of balls on the leg side. Whilst the gloss was on the new ball he swung it both ways, but one doubts if he spins it. However, on the extremely dead and easy Neath wicket, it is hardly fair to judge. It is said he is to have a trial at Cardiff.

Monmouthshire v. Cornwall.

EXCITING FINISH AT PANTEG.

What threatened to be a tame match, with a sound thrashing in the bargain for the men of Gwent, turned out to be exciting and brimful of interest, when the Panteg cricket ground staged its first minor Counties match, that of Monmouthshire v. Cornwall, on Friday and Saturday. Brilliant summer weather favoured this match, which was the reunion meeting between these counties, and which was of particular interest to Eastern Valley enthusiasts, inasmuch that the Monmouthshire XI. included three local players, viz. H. G. Spary, Rez. Fawdry (Pontypool) and S. Wilcox (Panteg). Fawdry, though he did not "come off" as a batsman, made amends in the field. His fielding was brilliant and one of the features of the match. Spary bowled well, and the "keeping" of Wilcox was beyond reproach.

Considering Monmouthshire were in the hopeless position of being 125 runs behind with only one wicket to fall when time was called on Saturday evening, it would appear that Cornwall were entitled to every sympathy for being thwarted by victory. As a matter of fact, however, they were not. Tresawna, the visiting captain, did not allow his bowlers sufficient time in which to rout their opponents. Instead of declaring his second innings, as he might reasonably have done, Tresawna kept Monmouthshire in the field until nearly 4.30 p.m., with the result the home county were confronted with the impossible task of getting 323 runs to win in just three hours. Naturally, the men of Gwent made no attempt to force the game, but, notwithstanding this, the Cornish bowlers, and particularly Smith, who made the ball swing appreciably, made such headway that six wickets fell for 59 runs. Then, however, H. Jenkins and Gordon Phillips indulged in a delightful seventh wicket partnership, which yielded 85 runs in under an hour before Phillips, who played a real captain's innings, fell to a well-judged catch on the edge of the boundary. Nineteen runs later Jenkins, who played his highest and best innings for Monmouthshire, fell to a beautiful catch by Scholefield. Wilcox and Harris caused the visitors more trouble, but when the first-named returned the ball to Smith the Cornishmen appeared to have the game in hand as ten minutes still remained when Spary, the last man, joined Harris. The professional monopolised the bowling skilfully and succeeded in frustrating the visitors. It was a really fine achievement on the part of Monmouthshire in saving the game.

Earlier in the day Cornwall, who had lost three of their best run-getters for only 14, made an excellent recovery, mainly as the result of superb batsmanship by Scholefield, who during a stay of over three hours, contributed a faultless 82. The Histon amateur was at considerable pains to play himself in, but afterwards drove finely and hit nine 4's. Panteg batted first and on a wicket that was none too good a fair start was made. The batting continued even, but in the later stages several wickets fell cheaply, and the total reached was 83. Hugh Jones was top scorer with 16, but five batsmen succeeded in getting double figures. The home side were unable to do anything with the trundling of Snell and Rowlands, the latter in particular causing havoc. The whole side were out for 33, the analysis being four for 12 and six for 21 respectively.

To-morrow, at Panteg the match v. Aber-gavenny is set aside for the benefit of Smith and Wilcox, and it is hoped there will be a bumper gate. Pontypool v. Glamorgan XI.

This match was witnessed by nearly five thousand spectators. Though Pontypool were so easily beaten they certainly put up a fine performance in dismissing the Glamorgan eleven for the comparatively low score of 167. Arnott, who has scored a century for Glamorgan in a first-class representative county match this season, was the only visiting batsman who appeared to master the home attack, which, on the whole, was very good. Martin, Ford, Spary and Heap were by no means easy to play. Arnott's half-century was the outstanding feature of the match. He hit out all round the wicket and gave a polished display. His dismissal was greeted with great cheers from the crowd—an equally enthusiastic ovation being accorded both the batsman and the bowler (Heap). The other batsmen handled the bowling more cautiously and did not meet with anything like the success of Arnott.

The Pontypool batsmen seemed to suffer from "nerves." Confidence was lacking, and although they were opposed to far superior bowling than they have hitherto had, they would certainly have put up a better show had they displayed more confidence in themselves. The only Pontypool man to meet with anything like success was Martin, who in two innings compiled a valuable 36 (12 and 24 not out). "Mr Extras" was top scorer in the second innings with 25. It was superior experience that "told the tale." Nevertheless, it was by no means a disgrace to be beaten by an innings by a fairly strong representative Glamorgan side. Taking all things into consideration, Pontypool did extremely well.

COUNTY CRICKET.

MONMOUTHSHIRE'S WORK IN THE DISTRICT.

THE GAME ON THE UP GRADE.

From a playing standpoint Monmouthshire county cricket has not been the success one would have wished. However, notwithstanding the apparent failures from a match-winning point of view, the county have done a vast amount of good work in stimulating cricket in the district, and the outlook, as far as young cricketers are concerned, is very encouraging.

The bad weather has done much harm to cricket generally, but Monmouthshire have an added grievance in this respect, for they have some claim to being a hard-wicket side. Given a fine summer, Monmouthshire, with such a galaxy of fast bowlers at their command, would undoubtedly have had a much better record to look back upon.

There were a few striking performances by individual players. K. C. Raikes again topped the batting averages (details were given in the *South Wales Argus* on Tuesday), and was also second in the bowling. He showed consistent and valuable form in all departments. In H. G. Spary, who headed the bowling averages, Monmouthshire have found a useful bowler, and, in addition to his bowling abilities, he has proved an excellent fieldman. Harris maintained his form in a remarkable manner. He bore the brunt of the bowling, and played one masterly innings, namely, that against Cornwall at Panteg, when he virtually saved the game. The feature of the season, however, was Raikes's brilliant century at the Oval, obtained against the fine array of varied bowling utilised by Surrey Seconds.

T. B. Williams and G. A. Webb were a successful first-wicket pair, though Webb did not quite realise the expectations formed of him last year. However, these two almost invariably gave the side a good start.

Young Players Tried.

Several new players were tried, and these, with perseverance and experience, should develop into players of considerable value to the county. Notable among these were N. Royston Jones, the Cambridge University full-back; Dr. Griffiths' (Abercarn) son, who is now at Oxford; H. Jenkins (Pontymister) and E. C. Dolman (Newport).

The vital position of wicket-keeper caused considerable trouble. Wilcox did fairly well in the opening matches, but his subsequent unaccountable loss of form forced the Committee to search for a capable successor. He was found in Williams (Tredegar), a young player with a good reputation, and he thoroughly justified his selection in the Dorset match.

The brothers N. C. and G. C. Phillips, both home from abroad, were available for only a few matches, but in these they showed of what value they would be to Monmouthshire cricket if they were able to play regularly. The 52 that N. C. Phillips took against Devon in the first match was reminiscent of his pre-war cricket, while the steady batting of G. C. Phillips was very valuable.

The side were ably skippered by F. Gordon Phillips, who, on occasions, bowled exceedingly well, but has not yet regained that batting form which one usually associated with him. The secretarial duties were in the capable hands of K. C. Raikes.

Disappointing though the playing record was, the season showed that cricket in Monmouthshire is definitely on the up grade, and the future of the great English game is in good hands in the county.
