HEAVY SCORING NORFOLK MATCHES.

On the hard wickets the bat has been beating the ball. The Gentlemen fielded against the Players' record score at Lord's, Lancashire and Somerset have been record making, and Norsiok had the unusual experience of fielding against a total of 438. It is a long time since Norfolk had such a leather hunting as that on Wednesday, and even the Rev. B. Armstrong, who has a positively uncanny memory for Norfolk cricket statistics, was not sure about the date of the previous hig score against Norfolk, but he told the writer at Stevenage that he believed Cambridgeshire were connected with it. Subsequent reference to records shows that Cambridgeshire put together a total of 426 against Norfolk at Fenner's in 1911, and three works proviously Hertfordshire had scored 421 off the Norfolk bowling at St. Albans. In 1910 Norfolk had a worse experience when Essax II, swored 497 at Earlham Roud. 1908 was another year in which the Norfolk bowlers and fielders had a bad time, Suffolk scoring 450 for 6 wickets at Ipswich, Edifordshire 28 at Eddfund, and the Harrow Wanderers 561 for 5 wickets at Lakenham. The latter was not an inter-county fixture and it was decided beforehand that the match should not be reckoned in the averages. The 1830 match with Cambridge shire being dismissed for 39 in their first innings, but amassing 436 for 9 wickets in their second innings. F. Roberson scored 190 and Ranjitsinhij 81. This was the eally occasion on which Ranji made a good score nagainst Norfolk. The biggest score of which was Tampshire's 538 at Southampton in 1837, when F. E. 

NORFOLK'S FINE RECOVERY.

SPLENDID BOWLING BY BARNES

M. FALCON'S BRILLIANT CENTURY

Some remarkable cricket was seen at Lakenham yesterday in the concluding stage of the Norfolk and Stadordshire match. On the drying wicket the bowlers dominated the play up to lunch, and eleven Norfolk wickets fell for 108 runs. Eight of these wickets were captured Barnes, and his length was so deadly accurate that only 37 runs were hit from him. A strained muscle of the right arm prevented him from bowling in the atternoon, and Norfolk, who had been obliged to tollow on 159 runs in arrears, batted so well that 291 addiruns were made in just under tional three hours for the loss of only six more wickets. It was four o'clock betore the arrears were hit off, but G. A. Stevens and M. Falcon hit so brilliantly that by half-past five Norfolk were in a position to make a bid for victory. Staffordshire being sent in to get 146 runs. Two wickets were captured quickly, and then Stubbs and Lockett successfully resisted the attack, and the match was left drawn, Staffordshire taking 3 of the 4 points for a first innings lead. The contrast between the morning and afternoon cricket was very marked, and special tribute should be paid to the fine detensive cricket of M. Falcon, J. M. Coldham, and G. R. Colman at a time when the bowlers were on top and Norfolk were in danger of being deleated in a single innings. Coldham was unluckily run out when his first 50 for Norfolk seemed assured, and as a fitting recognition of his splendid performance against the strong Stafford-faire bowling he was awarded his county cap and given the vacant place in the team to meet the South Africans at Norwich on Wednesday. The Norfolk captain had the satisfaction of scoring his second century of the season, and the first three-agure innings played in County cricket at Lakenham this year. With four victories, one deleat, four drawn, and one match ahandoned through rain, Norfolk secured 26 points out of a possible 45 in the Minor Counties' competition, and finished with a percentage of 57.

Overnight Barnes had taken N. C. Tufnell's wicket, and with nine wickets left Norfolk required 254 runs to equal Staffordshire's total. The position was soon made worse by G. R. 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M. TALCON'S SPLENDID SEASON.

The publication of averages is often said to be harmful to the game, but we are quite certain that no member of the Nortolk team has ever put personal considerations of average above the best interests of the side. Not often this season have the early batsmen placed the captain in the happy position of being able to ask the rest of the side to make runs quickly regardless of risk of losing wickets, but under any and all circumstances the players have always done their best to bat to orders and done it willingly. Quite the feature of the Norfolk season has been the splendid all-round work of M. Falcon. The averages which we publish in another column show how much the side has depended upon him for both runs and wickets, and the bare figures express inadequately the magnificent way in which he has shouldered his responsibility and carried the side on his back. In 1911, 1922, and again last, year he scored more runs than during this season, but in each of those years he went oftener to hat. Only twice previously has Falcon's averaged here so high as this season. In 1920 the wear of his great innings of 205 at Che-hunt, he averaged 60 for eight completed innings, and in 1907, after leaving Harrow he played consecutive innings of 35, 25, 110, 3, 71, 102 not, and 112 to obtain an average of 76.
