Both bats, men continued to score fast, and Herringshaw hit Hever over the ropes, and Maxey sent the century up with another leg glide. Fenner soon gave way to another left hander, Hearn, and went on the other end. Her-ringshaw completed his 50 with a pretty late cut for 4 at Hearn's expense. when the two latsmen had put on exactly a hundred runs, Herringshaw was leat and bewled by Fenner for useful 57. Dynes poined Maxey, and shortly afterwards the latter completed his 50, and then Dynes twice late cut Hever to the boundary. Cope relieved Fenner when the score stood at 137, but after having two overs was taken off in favour of Beslee. These two remained at the wicket until lunch, when 137 runs were on the board.

Dynes was, however, immediately bowled on resumption by Beslee. Turnbull followed, and quickly hit Hearn to the ropes. He soon lost his partner, Maxey, who was brilliantly caught and bowled by Hever after obtaining an attractive 57. Childs joined Turnbull, but soon saw his partner go, who fell to a catch at short leg, off Hearn. The County captain, King, went to the wicket. and he hit his first ball to the off boundary, and again two balls later. Cope went on at Hearn's end, and Childs placed his third ball to the leg boundary. Hever went on at the other end and met with early success, getting Childs caught at third man. King was joined by Lane, but after playing two balls from Hever, cocked one up into midoff's hands. Difley, the last man, went out and brilliantly cut one to the ropes. In attempping to run a short one. King was run out, the innings closing with 186 to the home County's credit.

Hackney and Hearn opened the Kent inn ings to the bowling of Dilley and Childs. Play opened quietly, until Hearn hit Dilley to the topes in his third over and nicely placed a ball from Childs to the screen. Two overa later the same player obtained another 4 at the expense of Dilley, a pretty shot past point and again off Childs to the leg boundary. This caused a change of bowling, Dynes going on in place of billey. Hearn quickly obtained a 4 at Dynes' expense, this player doing practically all the scoring, his partner only claiming 4 of the first 40 runs registered. Another boundary at Child's expense caused Graham to relieve him. Hackney began to hit a little more and drove Dynes twice to the boundary, Wilfred King went on himself at Dynes' end, and Hackney drove his fifth ball to the pavilion, and Hearn reached his half-century by late cutting a ball from Graham for 4. Hackney again put King to the ropes with a beautiful drive. Childs resumed bowling in place of Graham, and Hearn survived from two appeals for catches at the wicket in his first over. The tea interval came with the two batamen still at the wicket, the score-board

reading 91 runs for no wicket.

On resumption, Dilley went on in place of King. In Child's second over, Hearn hit him over the ropes for a 6, which put the hundred up, and then sent one over his head to the screen. A few overs later Hearn bit a 6 at Childs' expense. With a beautiful leg drive Hackney reached his 50. Dynes again went on to bowl in place of Diiley, and Pacey relieved Childs. Pacey had hard luck in not lowling Hearn, the ball narrowly naissing his off stump, but the next fall he sent to the boundary. Dynes then gave way to Dilley, and Hearn, bitting a bril limit 4 to the pavilion, reached his century, but Dilley's next fall saw him out lib.w. Ames joined Hackney, and a fine drive past mid on by the former saw the home County's total passed for the loss of a single wicket. Both batsmen continued to play attractive clicket, and Ames sent the second century up with another fine drive. A double change of bowling was again made, Childs for Pacey and King for Dilley, but neither gave much trouble, the batsmen scoring pretty freely, Ames bitting King for a 6. Ames again got King twice to the boundary, and Hackney bit one to the paylion off Childs. Dilley again took the ball from King and Paccy went on at the top end. Immediately after wards Ames completed his half-century, and the close of the first day's play came with the visitors in a strong position.

Second Day's Play.

The game was resumed, in beautiful weather, and before a good attendance, on Tuesday, Hackney and Ames, taking risks against the steady bowling and safe fielding, sent the third hundred up after an hour's play. Hackney completed his century, amidst applause, but before he could add to his score Dynes beat and bowled him with a good ball. He had made his runs by sure and steady cricket, and on the preceding evening had done much to wear the keen edge off the bowling. Only a single had been added when Dynes bowled Ames for a dashing and clean-hit contribution of 82. Fenner, by sound cricket, contributed 38, being finely caught by Dilley off his own bowling. Meanwhile, Childs, who had for over 30 overs been com-pelling respect from the batsmen, and had bowled really well, obtained his first wicket, clean bowling Collins, and a minute later a clever catch by Capt, Turnbull got him his second success, which Childs clinched in the next over by taking a return from Beslee. Thus seven wickets were down for 365, and Dynes again took the ball from Dilley, but Hever twice drove him for 4, and placing him to leg for 3 sent up the fourth hundred, and

the luncheon interval arrived with the score at 408 for reven wickets. The innings was declared closed at this stee, leaving leds, to get 222 runs to save a single immigs' defeat.

Beds, opened their second venture with Boxell Jones and Paccy, but with only eight to his credit the last-named was clean bowled by Cope. Graham joined Bovell Jones, and quickly settling down, scored boundaries with n smashing cut and leg glide. Beslee took the ball from Cope, but neither he nor Hearn, bowling at the other end, troubled the batsmen much. Twice Graham drove Hearn to the ropes in one over, and Hever relieved him, but Graham again found the boundary with splendid off drives from each bowler. the next over, however, Graham was a little late with his stroke, and played the ball on to his wicket. He had made 44 by attractive cricket. Jones had been very steady, but with Herringshaw as his partner, he twice drove Hever to the off boundary, and cut Beslee grandly to the hedge. Thus the contury was hoisted after about 75 minutes' play-Jones next reached his fifty with a lovely shot to square leg. Herringshaw, who was meanwhile batting quietly, hit one from Hover to the leg boundary. Neithe, bowler seemed to give trouble, both batsmen scoring with ease at every point, Bovell Jones' cut-ting and driving being delightful to watch. the Kent fielding however, was very keen, Hackney at third man being especially prominent. Todd went on at Heyer's end, and Cope relieved Fenner, but still runs came, both men scoring all round the wicket. This caused another change of bowling, Besleo taking the ball from Todd, and he soon met with success. Herringshaw being bowled in nis second over, for another well-played innings of 25, and the interval came with the score at 172 for three,

Maxey went out on resuming, but was taken at point, with only one to his credit. Dynes, who followed, was caught in the slips with his score at six. This let in Capt. D. Turnbull, and Jones, who had been very quiet approaching his "century," late cut Cope to the boundary, but from his next stroke Turnbull's wicket was most unfortunately lost. Jones made a beautiful drive to the off, which looked like a certain boundary, but Hearn took it splendidly with the left hand and returned to the wicket keeper's end. Jones was certain to be run out, but in the most sportsmanlike manner Turnbull crossed before Todd took the ball, and so sacrificed his own wicket to save that of his partner, He was loudly cheered on retiring. Childs was quickly lowled by Cope, letting in Wil-fred King, surprisingly low down in the bat-ting list. Bevell Jones signalled the partnership by putting Cope through the slips for a quartette, and the captain rent up the second hundred with a lovely shot to the hedge. Beslee was the bowler, and King repeated the stroke from his next delivery. Then with a single from Beslee, Bovell Jones, to the accompaniment of hearty applause, completed a faultless 100. The Kent fielding was an clean and keen as ever, and it was no easy matter to get the call past the well-placed field. A dozen runs were still wanted to save the single innings' defeat, and a wild throw in converted a his by Jones for 3 into 7, and a minute later the first innings score of Kent was passed. Poth batsmen now hit bard, the skipper's first 20 including four boundaries. He, however, lost Boyell Jones 230 at 239, caught by Todd in trying to drive a full-pitch. His innings of 116 included 12.4's and a 7. The end scon came, with Wilfred King not and 20, and the total 239, leaving Kent 18 to get to win.

Mr. Weigall and Hearn went in to get the ions, but Dynes got through the veteran's defence with 11 on the board, and it was left to Hearn to make the winning hit. Kent thus

A Sale and Steady Batsman,

One of the steadiest and most styli h firstwicket batsmen in the county at the moment is C. E. Dickens (Eddford Clarence), who has also played for the Bedr. Cho and Ground. In his last eight immags for these two child (three times not out) he has aggregated 213 runs, with an average of 42.3. With J. S. Denton bowling, he scored 51 against Deborough Wanderers, and with Mucdin, the county pro., bowling, he collected 28 against Northants, Club and Ground. In first League cricket he carried his bat through the innings for Clarence against Athletic (27), Everton (11), and Igranic (39), and scored 21 and 19 against Forder's and the Civil Service respechanced when the condition of some of the local wickers are taken into account.

Of the Right Temperament.

Unfortunately S. V. Graham, G. Heringshaw, and H. Mavey were unable to play, but Wilfred King, E. D. Dynes, W. Bovell-Jones, and E. C. L. Pavres returned to the team, and the places of the three absentees were taken by Mackay, Bal b, and Wintbread. Bedford enemed with Dynes and Holdbread. Bedford opened with Dynes and Hold-stock, to the bowling of Burton and Meyer.' Both batsmen scored at a nice pace, each finding the boundary, and 34 runs were scored in 30 minutes, before Holdstock was well taken in the tops of Burton for 21. Bedfordshire, batting on a wet wicket, took three and a half hours to score 189 runs by the tea interval in this match at Fenner's on Thursday. Heavy overnight rain delayed the start of the game for three-quarters of an hour, and it was 12.15 p.m. before the teams took the field. After tea Cumbs, managed to secure 89 before stumps were drawn, at 6.30, and so being 100 behind on

the day's play.

The lateman of the day, so far as Beds, were concerned, was Holdstock, who, batting steadily, with a number of partners, made a splendid 70.
