Leicester II. v. Cambs.

MATCH ABANDONED.

Rain saved Cambs. from a trouncing at Loughborough on Saturday, for when play was abandoned they required 174 runs, with six wickets to go down, to avoid the innings' defeat.

Play throughout was hampered by rain. Cambs., winning the toss, batted first, but poor scoring was witnessed on a sticky wicket, and the whole side was dismissed for 82, Lilley and Leek being the only batsmen to reach double figures.

Leicester batted erratically, but Coulson played steadily. He received good support from the "tail," and scored 142 of the home county's 262. He was twice missed, at 17 and 103. Christmas was Cambs.' most successful bowler, taking four wickets for 86 runs. Taylor got three for 68, Leek two for 61, and Williams one for 6. Lilley and Leek bowled without success.

Cambs. fared even worse at their second venture, four wickets being down for six runs, when rain caused the match to be abandoned.

JUNIOR CUP.

Old Chesterton qualified for the second round of the Cambs. Junior Cup on Saturday, when they defeated Y.M.C.A. by 21 runs. Y.M. had first use of the wicket, but the opening batsmen fared badly against the bowling of Papworth. Thoday, who went in at the fall of the fourth wicket, made a good attempt to stop the rot, but he was accorded little support, and his effort of 23 only made the ultimate total 54. Old Chesterton made only a fair start, but Brett, going in at the fall of the second wicket, put a different complexion on affairs. He did most of the scoring, and was 41 when caught. The innings was played out, the total reaching 77.

St. Giles' "A" went a stage further by trouncing Cambridge Instrument Co. on St. John's Ground. The "Saints" batted first, a feature of the opening being a good stand by Fuller and Grandison. The latter scored 31 before being bowled, and Fromant, who went in at the fall of the fourth wicket, also made a useful contribution, being undefeated for 27 when the innings closed at 108. On going in to bat the Instrument Company found runs difficult to get, and were all out for 26, Doig taking six wickets for 11 runs. Abbotts was the highest scorer with 11.

JUNIOR LEAGUE.

Twenty-two batsmen at Six-Mile-Bottom scored 36 runs between them. The visitors were the L. and N.E.R., who after skittling out the home team for 20, were themselves disposed of for 16. The highest individual score was seven—C. Hulyer, of the home team, and J. Hobbs, of the Railwaymen, each reaching this figure. Altogether there were ten ducks, the Railwaymen having the longer tail. George took four wickets for nine runs, and Newling five for eight for the Railwaymen. H. Buck got seven for six for the home team.

Some fine batting, followed by some good bowling, on the part of Dr. Higgins enabled Willingham to defeat Newnham Institute by 46 runs. Willingham, batting first, made a shaky start, but the doctor, who went in at the fall of the third wicket, stopped the rot, Raven being a useful partner. The total reached 96, Dr. Higgins' share being 38. None of the Newnham batsmen was able to stay long, Hunt, who went in first, being top scorer with 12. Dr. Higgins took five wickets for 13 runs, the total being 50.

Playing on Trinity New Ground, Cambridge P.O. defeated Old Cherryhinton by five wickets. The villagers batted first, but could do little against the bowling of Prime and Dawkins. Noble, one of the opening pair, got 16, but none of the other batsmen reached double figures. The innings closed at 51, Prime taking six wickets for 29 runs and Dawkins four for 21. The Post Office made a steady start, Lewington and Jaggard making a useful stand. Then two wickets fell cheaply, but when Stearn came in the rot was stopped. The villagers' total was soon passed, and 78 runs had been scored for the loss of five wickets when Stearns were drawn. Stearns was then not out for 39.

Swaffham Hulbeck defeated Cherryhinton Constitutionals by 17 runs on Parker's Piece. The villagers batted first, and after Miller had been dismissed without scoring Baryford and Pratt made a good stand, each reaching the 20 mark. Cook also got 21 before being bowled. Subsequently a rot set in, and Brochie got four of the remaining wickets cheaply, the innings closing at 90. The Constitutionals batted unevenly. Senior, one of the opening pair, batted well, but only Brochie and Wright of the other batsmen offered real opposition, and the innings closed at 73.

St. Andrew's-the-Great went under at Over, the villagers winning by 55 runs. Over, batting first, made a poor start, two wickets going down very cheaply, but then Burton and Culpin stopped the rot. King, who went in at the fall of the fourth wicket, batted strongly, after being missed on his second ball. He received good support from the tail, and was not out for 36 when the innings closed at 100. Pettit was the most successful bowler, taking six wickets. St. Andrew's made a shaky start, Culpin taking the first three wickets cheaply, but then A. C. Taylor and F. Horn became associated. A useful stand resulted, but after a separation had been effected the end soon came, and the innings closed at 45.

In a low scoring game at Lode the home team defeated Bottisham by 14 runs. Some useful all-round play by H. Golding was mainly responsible. He scored 18 of the home team's total of 45, and then took six Bottisham wickets for 10 runs out of a total of 31.

BOWLING FEATS.

To capture all the wickets in the course of an innings is a remarkable performance, but this was accomplished at Fordham on Thursday, when W. Wells, bowling for Isleham, took the ten home wickets. Fordham were dismissed for 26. Wells' wickets costing him but eleven runs. He hit the stumps eight times. However, 26 proved too much for Isleham, and they were disposed of by R. Gamble and G. Webb for 11. This match was in the British Legion Cup, and in the same competition there was another good performance. This was at Meldreth, where Babraham were the visitors. Meldreth could score only 35. J. Poulter taking half the wickets—all clean bowled—for one run. Babraham replied with 80.

MORE RECORDS.

Records were broken in a Shepreth and District League match at Wimpole Park, where Melbourn and Meldreth defeated the home team by 162. This was mainly owing to some good bowling by B. Cooper, who took six wickets for four runs, and some good batting by Hale and Chamberlain, who scored 76 and 44 respectively out of a total of 194. Hale hit three 6's and nine 4's. I notice that at Lillington, Russell, of the home team, took all the Melbourn and Meldreth second team wickets. The full analysis has not been sent me.

HOBBS' MATCH AT CAMBRIDGE.

Mr Jack Hobbs proposes to bring a team to Cambridge on Thursday, August 5th, to play a team selected by the Cambs. Cricket Association, which body will take the responsibility of arranging details connected with the match. In another column will be found the second list of subscribers to the Pavilion Fund. There are many old cricketers in Cambridge whose names do not yet appear in the list. It is hoped they will soon send their donations along. A number of collecting cards have been distributed among all the clubs in the town and county, and I trust that there will be a good response in this direction, as it is the players themselves who will derive the greatest benefit from the pavilion. Let us hope that we in the town and county of Cambridge shall be able to erect a pavilion worthy of the name of our great Cambridge cricketer. Further particulars of the match will be announced in this column later.

WELCOME TO JACK.

Hobbs' XI. at Cambridge: Match
With Local XVIII.RATTLING OUT CAMBS.: FENDER
IN THE PICTURE.

Thousands of eager spectators encircled Parker's Piece yesterday (Thursday) afternoon to witness the long-awaited match between Jack Hobbs' XI. and a side consisting of 18 of Cambridgeshire's best cricketers. Prior to the commencement of the match, Hobbs' eleven were entertained to lunch at the Lion Hotel, where Mr. Varney Webb (Chief Constable of the County) extended them a hearty welcome on behalf of the Cambs. Cricket Association.

Responding, "Jack" said it was always a pleasure to come to Cambridge, especially for the purpose they had paid their visit that day. "Our Jack," as the crowd called him, and his merry men were given a rapturous reception upon their arrival on the Piece. And the local men were not forgotten. Autograph hunters were not by any means in the background. Indeed, they were as busy as ever. It was a red letter day for them, as well as for Cambridge, and a profitable one, it is trusted, for the Hobbs' Pavilion Fund, in aid of which the match was organised. As is well known, it is proposed to erect a pavilion in his honour on the Piece, presumably near the rear of the University Arms, and the Cambs. Cricket Association are doing their utmost to augment the fund to the necessary limits.

Beautiful weather prevailed, and so splendidly had the ground been prepared by Mr. F. Rule and helpers, that it resembled one huge green carpet. The wicket was in capital condition and was ideal for run-getting. Both sides made one change from the advertised sides, Baldwin coming into the visiting side for Ducat, and Gray taking Bellamy's place in the Cambs. side.

"Captain" H. Coulson won the toss for Cambridge and decided to bat, Manning and Richardson opening the venture, the former facing Peach's first over. He opened his account with a neat glance to fine leg off the last ball, and opposed by Baldwin at the other end, snicked a three off the little man's second delivery in the same direction, Richardson following up with a single. Each batsman turned Peach past third man in the next over. Baldwin met with early success, for at 1.40 p.m.—10 minutes after the start—Manning mishit a badly pitched ball from Baldwin and was magnificently caught at square leg by Fenley, who held the ball when on the turn: 7-1-6. Fred Lilley, the next man in, soon got going, and scored the first boundary of the match by cutting Peach to the off. With another characteristic stroke he obtained a two. A late out by Richardson caused the 20 to be hoisted at 1.50 p.m. Of these, four accrued from byes. The visitors' fielding to begin with was not quite what one expected of such players, there being a certain amount of faulty groundwork.

Lilley won applause for hitting nine off the first over sent down by Fenley, who relieved Baldwin at 28, the first of his shots being past cover and the second a nice cut through the slips. Fenley exacted revenge off his fifth ball by bowling the Borough Police man off his pass at 38. Lilley had 18 to his name and during his short stay had played bright cricket. Fenley, who was getting plenty of turn on the ball, disposed of Richardson with only three added, the St. Giles' man presenting Peach, in the slips, with a dolly catch: 41-3-7. Fender, taking Peach's place at the Regent-street end, pegged back Parfitt's middle and off stumps at 42 with his third ball. The Surrey captain, however, was unable to tempt Fender with two temptations, but in Fenley's next over he took a brilliant one-handed catch at first slip to dismiss Biggs: 42-5-3. Carnegie-Brown, the next man at the wickets, cut two of Fenley's swerves with good judgment for two and one respectively. He had a narrow escape when edging Fender through the slips, the ball dropping inches out of the reach of a fieldman. He richly deserved the applause he was accorded when he glided Fenley to deep-leg for four—it was a rare stroke—but narrowly escaped being stumped by Kempston. Undaunted, he improved considerably and sent Fender through the slips for three, then Fenley to the on for six, and later pulled Fender to deep square leg for four. In 15 minutes he reached his 25 by means of convincing strokes all round the wicket. He had added one more run to his total when he was beaten and bowled by Fenley: 72-6-26. This happened after just over an hour's play. Fender was "mixing 'em up"—he blended top-spinners with loose 'uns and other kinds—but he bowled with little pace. Still we don't know Mr. Fender like the Surrey crowd!

After sending down some simple stuff, off which Collier and Ridgeon hit three boundaries, he had the former guessing to the wide with a top-spinner at 87-7-9. Pratt sent up the 100 with a hit to square leg for four at 2.50 p.m., and Ridgeon gliding Gregory (who had taken the ball from Fenley), into one of the marquees a minute later for four. At 106, a straight but hard return to Fender by Ridgeon (21) was held with consummate ease. Ridgeon hit three 4's

Another brilliant catch, held high up by the Surrey skipper at first slip, off Gregory, sent back Gordon Pratt (9). How the crowd applauded!

"Cap." Coulson gave little trouble; neither did Kern, being well-held at cover by Jack Hobbs off Fender. Thus the tall right-hander claimed two victims in one over. For a spell the fieldsmen were not being kept anything like so busy as the collectors were amongst the crowd. Cash came along like rain. Full boxes came in to the chief marquee as victims came to Fender.

Three things occurred at 110. Fender secured his sixth wicket by bowling Edwards (1). "Struddy" changed places with Kempston, who had been keeping wicket, and Shepherd relieved Gregory at the Melbourne-place end. Presumably Jack Hobbs decided that Fender had done enough damage for the present, for at 111 he put on Sandham in his place.

We soon saw something of the ability of England's wonderful little wicket-keeper, for at 119, Gordon, after late-cutting Shepherd for two, fell to the prowess of "Struddy." Gray (8) followed him out at 126, bowled by Shepherd, and to continue the procession, Golding (of Lode) was out to a smart catch by Fenley at mid-off at 131. "Struddy" running several yards to make it. It was a case of a stumper being almost stumped when Cockell, who was only just in time to avoid following Gordon's example. Cockell likes leg balls and he appreciated a gift from Shepherd by despatching it to the ring. Fender displaced Sandham at 138, while at 140 Fenley came on vice Shepherd. Christmas and Cockell indulged in a little free scoring that came in the nature of a surprise, as they are played respectively for their abilities as a bowler and wicket-keeper respectively. But the runs were needed badly. The pair had added 24 for the 16th wicket when the Borough policeman, after scoring 11, skied a ball from Fenley for Strudwick to hold. Sergeant, the last man in, did not stay long, stepping out and missing a ball from Fenley, "Struddy" promptly whipping off the balls. Cockell, who was unbeaten with 16 to his credit, obtained two 4's. The innings closed at 3.45 p.m. for 155, having lasted 21 hours. Fenley bowled very consistently and kept a good length, taking 6 wkts. for 34. Fender's analysis was 6 for 51.

People were expecting something by way of a few lost balls from Jack Hobbs, who walked to the wicket appropriately enough with his son, who was done a lot of run-getting in and around London. Still, why wonder. Thirteen cricket balls were lost at Sharnbrook, Essex, on Wednesday during the innings of Percy Fender's Surrey XI. against the Portland Sports Club in a one-day match. Jack, who scored 159, was responsible for the loss of five of them. He has a sports equipment shop in Fleet-street, London, though, and we must expect him to have an eye to business!

Christmas opened the Cambs. attack against the Surrey master. Jack, after merely "cutting" the first ball, broke his duck with a single to mid-off, and opposed by Golding in the next over, quietly glided the Lode bowler to deep leg for four and took a three in the same direction off the next delivery. It does not take long to realise why Jack is so popular. Just a deft touch and the ball was speeding all along the carpet every time. Hobbs flashed one beauty past Lilley at mid-off off Cover, for two, and his every stroke was a model of execution. Hobbs, junr., showed much of his father's calm demeanour, but he was not destined to stay long, for at 17, he played on to Christmas.

Fenley Fender was next in! This was just what the crowd wanted. A smart piece of fielding by Parfitt and an equally smart return saw Fender in his ground just in time. Hobbs, who by the way, was wearing his England cap, made a number of pretty and perfectly executed glances on the leg side, while Fender with a refined out scored his first four. Hobbs' initial boundary came at 29, when he hooked Golding to the on. This effort was applauded, but a flashing off-drive for six, clear of the ring, off Christmas by Fender, brought fourth rounds of cheers. F. G. Lilley was substituted for Golding at 46, and Hobbs, catching his first ball, a full toss, in the middle of the bat, sent it to the ring. Fender with a straight drive for four completed the half century, but when 17 he was missed in the slips. He had added only two to his score, however, when in making a curious attempt to run a single, he was run out: 58-2-19. Hobbs was then joined by Sandham.

A sensation was provided when at 71 Jack Hobbs in driving Lilley, was well caught by Gordon at mid-on. He had scored 41 in 35 minutes and had hit five fours. We had expected a century from the visiting skipper, and though we were disappointed, there remained the satisfaction of seeing some of the real Jack Hobbs, brief as the pleasure was.

Shepherd and Sandham proceeded to score steadily all round the wicket, and bowling changes had no appreciable effect for a time, even if the fielding was of the keenest character. Gordon, with one delivery, had Sandham beaten, but the ball travelled for four byes. Shepherd sent up the hundred with a boundary at 6.15 p.m.—55 minutes after the visitors' innings had commenced.

After being dismissed Jack Hobbs was not by any means idle, but like Mrs. Hobbs indulged in collecting money, while Sandham and Shepherd collected runs.

Shepherd crashed a "loose 'un" from Gordon into the crowd, and Sandham found the boundary past third man off the same over. The last of the bowling, but against batsmen of the headway of the Surrey pair they could not make much of successive balls. Shepherd completed his 50 in 40 minutes amid applause. His late-cutting and driving were the notable features of his batting. With a straight drive for two, Shepherd assured the visitors of victory. Soon afterwards he drove Coulson for six.

In the meanwhile, Jack Hobbs was being photographed near the boundary with a collecting box in his hand.

At 177, Sandham (32) was caught by Carnegie Brown off Sergeant. His stand with Shepherd had realised 106. Peach was "c and b," by Sergeant before he had scored at 185.

Gregory scored the 200th run, but a little later Shepherd's fine innings came to a close. Fred Lilley holding a catch at mid-off: 204-6-89. During a stay of 67 minutes, he hit three 6's and eleven 4's.

Gregory made light of the Cambs. attack, and knocked up his runs at more than one a minute. Albeit, considering its accepted grade, the home bowling had been surprisingly effective. Christmas keeping a consistent length and being the pick of the attack. Flaws could be seen in the fielding—there were eleven men in the field. Runs were saved where they could be saved in the vast majority of cases, due in no small degree to the extra bit of keenness infused into the fielding.

Missed in the slips by Horn at 42—this was rather a sharp chance—Gregory exceeded the half hundred in 52 minutes. His strokes were confident and full of life. At 270, in driving Christmas, he was caught in the country by Collier, his contribution being 59, which included a six and ten fours. Another success was encountered by the home men at 273, when Golding bowled Baldwin (13) with a ball that kept low. Strudwick met with a hearty reception on going in to bat, and he quickly opened his account with a single. He did not stay long, however, being clean bowled by Golding. This was at 283-9-5. The match then terminated, the visitors being 128 runs on, with a wicket still intact.

Jack Hobbs was besieged by admirers on leaving the ground.

COUNTY MATCH AT WISBECH.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE WIN BY
FOUR WICKETS.LEICESTERSHIRE 2nd's FIRST DEFEAT
IN THE
MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.BRILLIANT BATTING BY
CARNEGIE BROWN.

On Monday and Tuesday the Harecroft road ground was the venue of a Minor Counties Championship match between Cambs. and Leicestershire 2nd XI. The first day was gloriously fine, and a large number of people availed themselves of the opportunity of seeing some excellent cricket. On Tuesday, however, it was quite cold, and there were occasional showers which at times stopped play, and consequently the attendance was very small. Winning the toss, Cambridge went in first, and started in a very businesslike manner, 76 runs being put on for the first wicket, after 45 minutes' play, and the century followed 10 minutes later. At lunch the score had progressed to 204 for the loss of 2 wickets. The score went on to 243 for 4 wickets, when a collapse occurred, and the innings closed at 264. The outstanding feature was a brilliant innings by Carnegie Brown, who scored a faultless 111 before he was dismissed by a magnificent catch by Broughton. His knock included two 6's and eighteen 4's. The next best effort was that of F. G. Lilley, who scored a clever 52, while F. A. Ridgson supplied 23, and, last but not least, "Mr. Extras" came along with 40! Leicestershire made a disastrous start, losing their first wicket for 6 runs. A stand by E. A. Broughton, which produced 37, pulled the game round somewhat, but when the last wicket fell only 139 runs were registered. Being 125 runs behind the Cambs. total, they had to follow on, and when play ended for the day they were 16 for no wicket.

Leicestershire resumed on Tuesday, and, after a shaky start, they went on to score freely, and at 12.45 the arrears had been wiped off, and, when the inning closed, the score had reached 247. Bradshaw 80, and Coleman 64. Cambs. went to the crease wanting 123 runs for victory, and opened by losing a wicket for 1 run. When 11 were showing number two went down, and the third fell at 15. A fine stand by Carnegie Brown and F. W. Parfitt gave the innings a different complexion, and at the fall of the sixth wicket 113 were on. Ten runs were then wanted to win, and they were obtained without further loss, stumps being drawn with the score 125 for 6 wickets. Both teams were exceptionally smart in the field, nothing whatever being given away. Especial mention must, however, be made of Carnegie Brown, whose picking up was magnificent.

THE GAME.

Cambridgeshire won the toss, and F. A. Lilley and A. S. Ling went out to open at 11.50. Ling taking first over from Hutchinson, while Smith took charge of the ball at the other end. Both batsmen opened carefully, but it was not long before they settled down, and then runs began to accumulate at a rapid pace. A bowling change was called when 44 runs were showing, Coleman relieving Hutchinson. Runs still came merrily, and after half-an-hour's play 50 runs were on the board. Another change was called at 67. C. L. M. Brown displacing Smith. Lilley sent his first delivery to the ropes, but the last saw the dismissal of Ling, who played the ball on, and went back to the pavilion with 12, the board showing 76 runs, which had been put on in 45 minutes. Carnegie Brown joined Lilley, and flicked off with a single. He quickly got going, and hit out with such vim that the 100 went up after 55 minutes' play. Directly after, Lilley, in scoring his eighth boundary, reached his 50. He had increased his score by two runs when he was bowled by Coleman, and the score was 106-2. F. A. Ridgson was next man in, and Dixie Smith took over the ball from C. L. M. Brown. The fifth ball of his first over was driven out of the ground by Carnegie Brown for 6. The score steadily progressed, and had reached 129 when Coleman came off in favour of Hayes. With a straight drive off Hayes for 6, Carnegie Brown reached his

half-century, and incidentally sent 150 up. Hutchinson then took another turn with the ball in place of Dixie Smith, and with 7 more runs on, Smith went back in place of Hayes. The pace of the scoring slackened somewhat at this stage, Ridgson batting very carefully, and scoring but slowly. Carnegie Brown was, however, in a very happy mood, and treated the bowling with very little respect. After an hour and 40 minutes' play 209 went up, and at lunch the score was 204-2, Carnegie Brown 94, Ridgson 11.

After lunch Brown came off in favour of Hayes, while Smith took another turn at the other end. Hutchinson then went on next over in place of Hayes. Runs still came at a lively pace, and within 10 minutes of the resumption Carnegie Brown attained his century. He had scored 11 more when his career came to an end, when Broughton ran several yards to bring off a brilliant catch in the country, the board indicating 251-3, the wicket having put on 125 runs. Carnegie Brown's brilliant innings of 111 included two 6's and eighteen 4's. F. W. Parfitt followed, but had not opened his account when he was bowled by Smith. The score had gone on to 243 when Smith, who had followed Parfitt, was caught by Bradshaw, and he left with 5. A collapse followed, and at the fall of the eighth wicket the board registered 264. The tail wagged not at all, the last two batsmen, P. S. Morton and W. H. Cockell being dismissed by Hutchinson for "ducks," and the innings closed at 264.

The Leicester live innings opened with C. L. M. Brown and Coulson, against the bowling of V. J. Covill and P. S. Morton. A disastrous start was made, there being but 6 runs on when the first wicket fell, Brown being the victim with 4. Broughton then joined Coulson, and runs came at a fairly fast rate, 25 being on when C. J. Smith relieved Morton of the ball. Another wicket fell with 32 on the board, when Coulson departed, lb.w. to Covill, his contribution being 20. Brown followed, and had gathered 7, when he departed with the score at 42-3. Bradshaw then went to the crease, and began batting in a very brisk manner, and the 50 quickly went up. When the tea interval arrived the score was 54-3.

After tea Morton went on again, and the score had progressed to 72 when Bradshaw, at 12, departed lb.w. to Covill. E. Hayes was next man in, and opened with a single. At 77 Leek displaced Morton. Hayes at 2 gave a very difficult chance to Carnegie Brown, and escaped, but had only scored one more run when he played on to his wickets. The score board then indicated 94-5, and when the ninth wicket fell the score had gone on to 129. Pearson was last man in, and had had scored 9 when the innings came to a sudden termination, he being run out as the result of a brilliant piece of fielding by Carnegie Brown, the total being 139. Leicester were 125 runs behind, so they had to follow on.

The second innings opened with Coulson and Broughton, V. J. Covill bowling the first over, with Leek at the other end. Both batsmen were very cautious, and runs came slowly, and when 15 were on Leek was relieved by Morton. At the close of play for the day, the score was 16 for no wickets, scored in about 30 minutes.

Leicestershire resumed their second innings at 11 o'clock on Tuesday, and the evening score had been increased by 8 runs when Broughton was bowled by Smith with 11. Scoring was still not very brisk, a fact that was mainly due to the fine bowling of Covill, who at one stage sent down 6 successive maiden overs. With the batsmen gaining confidence, however, runs came more quickly, and when Coulson fell at 15, the score had gone on to 35. At this time Coulson, and run began to accumulate at a steady pace, 50 going up after 35 minutes' play, Bradshaw doing most of the scoring. When he had made 6, Hayes played back to Covill, and the

board showed 55-3. At 60 Smith went off in favour of Leek, and with 4 more on Ridgson took a turn in place of Covill. Brown had scraped together 11, when he made a hard drive to mid-on, to be brilliantly caught by P. Williams, who took the ball with one hand. The score had then reached 77-4. Bradshaw then laid Hutchinson on as his next partner, and at 90 Morton took over the ball from Leek. The 100 went up after an hour and 25 minutes' play, and directly afterwards Bradshaw reached his 50. Smith followed, and had collected 11 very quickly, when he skied the ball and was caught by Morton, the score-board showing 123-6. Brown then

went in and at 12.45 the arrears had been wiped off. The score had gone on to 140, when C. J. Ling took a turn with the ball, and 152 the seventh wicket fell, Brown making way for Coleman. A drizzle set in at this stage, making saw dust necessary, and at 1.20 it rained so fast that an adjournment for lunch was made, the score being 168-7. Bradshaw 66, Coleman 11. The rain had ceased after lunch, and when Bradshaw departed with a bright 80 to his credit, the score had reached 215-9. Pearson followed, but he was clean bowled by Smith before he had opened his account, and his place was taken by Dixie Smith. The score went on to 247, when Carnegie Brown, by catching a hot shot from Coleman, brought the innings to a close.

Cambridgeshire were then left to get 123 runs to win, with plenty of time in which to collect them. A. S. Ling and F. G. Lilley opened, and the first wicket fell with dramatic suddenness. Ling had not scored when he was beaten by a delivery from Smith, and left with one run on the board. His place was taken by Ridgson, and but 10 had been added, when Lilley sent the ball into the hands of C. L. M. Brown, and went back with 5. Further disaster followed. Carnegie Brown came along, and Ridgson had 5 to his credit when his stumps were disturbed by Hutchinson, the board showing 15 runs. F. W. Parfitt then joined Brown, and the rot was stopped, and 50 went up after a many minutes' play. Parfitt by careful play had compiled 4, when Coulson accepted a chance and he left with the score 35-4. C. J. Smith went to the crease, and at 5.50 a sharp shower sent the players under shelter. Play was resumed 4.5, and the score had progressed to 65, when Coleman relieved Smith, and at tea 75 runs were showing, Brown 30, Smith 29. The pair went out again at 4.45, when Hayes went on in the place of Hutchinson. The score had not increased when Smith was run out, his contribution being a useful 29, the partnership having produced 42 runs. The next man was E. H. Leek, who after making a shaky start, quickly settled down, and began to score at a rapid pace, and the score soon reached 95, when Hutchinson went on in place of Smith. At five minutes past 5 the 100 went up, without further loss. Shortly after, Carnegie Brown, who had scored 43, was smartly taken by Broughton in the slips, the board reading 113-6. When P. TOWN'S NARROW VICTORY OVER LYNN GRAMMAR SCHOOL PAST AND PRESENT.

A King's Lynn Grammar School Past and Present XI visited the Town ground on Saturday, when Wisbech gained a narrow victory by 8 runs. The home-sters had lost knock, and compiled 79 runs, the best individual contributions being H. Ward 25, and Johnson 20. The wickets were taken by C. Howes, 5 for 29, and C. M. Bayfield, 5 for 47, the former performing the "hat-trick." Lynn followed, and at the fall of the ninth wicket they required 9 runs for victory. Those runs, however, failed to arrive, and the innings closed at 71. G. H. Martin topped the batting with 15, the next best being R. A. Jones 11. Neville Wadley bowled splendidly for Wisbech, taking 3 wickets for 25 runs. The other two were secured by W. Rudd for 12.

The Town skipper was successful with the toss, and, electing to bat, sent P. Williams and C. Wright to open. Howes and Bayfield were in charge of the attack, which quickly found its way through the Wisbech defence. Bayfield clean bowled Wright with his third delivery, with 2 runs on the board. W. Jones then joined Williams, and had contributed 5 runs when a smart catch by Martin in the slips put an end to his career, and he made way for Johnson. The first ball the "pro" received he sent to the boundary, and shortly after he lost his partner, who was dismissed by a catch behind the wicket, with 7, the board indicating 23. Johnson had gathered 12 when he had a life, being missed by Bayfield in the slips, and had increased his score by 8 runs when his stumps were disturbed by Howes, the score being 33. 4. F. Leach followed, but Howes's next delivery sent him packing, and his place was taken by F. Hare, who shared a similar fate—and Howes had performed the "hat-trick." A stand followed by H. Ward and F. W. Wilson, and the total was taken to 48 before they were parted, Wilson playing back into the hands of Bayfield. At the fall of the ninth wicket only 68 runs were showing, and when E. H. Hickman joined Ward, a stand was made which produced 11 runs, when Ward was dismissed with a well-played innings of 25 to his credit, and Hickman, not out, 2.



A stand followed, and with 5 wickets to fall the visitors were within 27 runs of victory. At the fall of the sixth wicket 67 runs were on the board. The game had now reached a very exciting stage, and with 1 wicket to fall Lynn required 9 runs for victory. 

EASY WIN FOR DARK BLUES.

For their last Minor Counties' Championship match of the season, Cambs. entertained Oxfordshire on Parker's Piece, on Monday and Tuesday, and were able to put a good team into the field. Howell and Thomas had charge of the visitors' attack when play was resumed on a fast but good wicket on Tuesday. Both Ridgeon and Rose played the bowling with care, but took unnecessary risk in stealing short runs. This had its result at 93, when Rose was easily run out. With only two runs added Ridgeon, who was then in with Smith, played forward to Howells, but completely missed the ball and was bowled, two wickets having done down in about 10 minutes for six runs. Marchant joined Smith, and the latter with a forceful off drive off Howells sent the century up. Marchant, however, left without scoring, and a unanimous appeal for a catch behind the wicket saw Smith dismissed. Neither of the remaining batsmen offered any resistance, and the innings closed for 110. Thomas took four wickets for 35 runs, and Howells four for 40.

Requiring only 57 runs for victory, Oxfordshire opened with Walker and Sturges, who faced the bowling of Christmas and Smith. Walker played the bowling with ease, but Sturges was never at home, and was dismissed by a half-volley from Smith when the total was 19. After the dismissal of Phillips and Staples, Garner helped Nicholls in another useful partnership, during which the last named completed his half-century. With the total at 138 for five wickets, Cambridge declared, Garner being then unbeaten for 35. The Stratford men were soon in difficulties, and only two, Mitchell and Sparkes, reached double figures. When stumps were drawn the Londoners were 93 behind, with only two wickets standing.

CAMBS. COUNTY CRICKET.

Features and Improvements
of 1926 Season.

BATTING AND BOWLING AVERAGES.

The Cambridgeshire County Cricket Club concluded its season's list of fixtures in the Minor Counties' Championship on Monday and Tuesday last, when Oxfordshire, who finished second in the championship and have challenged Durham for the headship, was opposed on Parker's Piece. This is the first time for many years that a county match has been played on Parker's Piece, the chief reason for which being to show the Cambridge public, who have ever been reluctant to go to Fenner's, the difference between the best club cricket in Cambridge and County cricket, and that, with more practice in whole-day matches, there is not such a big difference between our county side and the leading sides in the Minor Counties' Championship. Though the wicket was far from being up to the standard required for a county match, it is to be hoped that the Common Council will bring it up to such a standard, and that the experiment may be repeated.

This year, as usual, eight matches were played, and of these one was won, one "won on the first innings," one "lost on the first innings," and five lost. The points possible were 40, and Cambs. secured 10, giving them a percentage of 25, as against 34.28 last year and 11.4 the previous year.

Although this season's percentage does not appear as favourable as last year's, it must not be assumed that the all-round improvement shown in 1925 has diminished. The reason is easily explained. Firstly, it has not been possible always to put the strongest team in the field, and secondly because the club has introduced more young blood, probably at the expense of better results. The outcome is that they now have at their disposal plenty of promising material, which, in the future, with the experience thus gained, should be the means of building up a strong county side—probably the strongest side in the history of the club.

Much of the improvement during the past two seasons is undoubtedly due to the captain (A. S. Ling), who has generally handled the side well, though I do not think that this season he put the good bowling at his command to quite such good use as he has done hitherto. If we anticipate his return to form next season it would appear that the prospects are indeed rosy.

There have been two outstanding features this season. The first is the number of club matches that have been played with a view to "bringing out" young players, to enable them to get a taste of better class cricket, and the other is the taking of matches to other parts of the county. That both ventures have been successful is undisputed.

This season, G. Carnegie-Brown, the Old Leysian left-hander, has been the outstanding player. He has scored two centuries, 137 against Oxfordshire at Oxford, and 111 against Leicester II, at Wisbech. He heads the averages with 47. A. S. Ling, who has again captained the side, and who topped the Minor Counties' averages during the past two seasons, has shown a marked falling away this year, and had to be content with second place in the list. F. G. Lilley, the Borough policeman, has not struck his best form in county matches, but comes next. One of the most promising youngsters is F. A. Ridgdon, who has been a fairly consistent run-getter as well as a useful change bowler.

Coming to the bowlers, H. Christmas, who has not been able to play in a number of matches, heads the averages by a fraction over E. H. Leek, who, too, has not found it possible to turn out regularly. V. J. Covill and C. J. Smith have been the bowlers most in demand, and the former, who has taken the greatest number of wickets during the season, and was at times almost unplayable, stands fourth in the averages. P. S. Morton, the Ely City fast bowler, has also been frequently called upon, but has proved rather expensive.

Of the other young players who have had an extended trial, D. Biggs (Histon) and F. W. Parfitt (Camden) hardly came up to expectations, though they will both benefit materially by the experience, and should do much better next season. The same applies to the brothers Morton (Ely), who are keen, but not yet quite up to the standard. P. Williams (Wisbech), who showed distinct promise last season, unfortunately fell away, but he, too, is young, and should get back into the team. A. J. Neaves (New Chesterton) would, if he could play more often, soon improve, and is perhaps the best all-rounder of the younger school. W. H. Cockell has kept wicket throughout the season, not perhaps with the same excellence he displays in club cricket, probably due to eagerness, but certainly with promise.

As regards fielding, this has probably been the outstanding feature, especially in away matches, and although there have been occasional lapses, showed marked improvement. It might seem invidious to mention names when this is the case, but the work of Carnegie-Brown, Parfitt and Ridgdon on the off-side has at times been brilliant.

Altogether, Cambs. have scored 2,349 runs for the loss of 138 wickets, an average of a fraction over 17, while their opponents have knocked up 2,736 for 115 wickets, an average of 23.79. Included in these figures are 165 extras on the credit side and 155 on the debit side.
