CORNWALL COLLAPSE AGAINST DEVON

FAILURE AFTER GOOD START

Cornwall opened in promising fashion in their Minor Counties match with Devon at Camborne on Friday, scoring 279 runs, and at the close of the first day's play Devon had lost seven wickets for 175 runs. Continuing their innings on Saturday morning Devon took the score to 223, being 56 behind Cornwall's total. When the home county entered upon their second venture they collapsed in remarkable fashion. Wickets fell cheaply, the ninth wicket fell for 88. A fine last wicket stand by Whiting and Bickford raised the total to 127. Devon were set to get 184 runs to win with about four hours remaining for play, and they accomplished their task, losing only three wickets.

A remarkable feature of the game was the failure of Whiting, the veteran county pro, to obtain a wicket. It was the second time since Whiting's connection with the Cornish team during 20 years that he has had a similar experience, the previous occasion being at Liskeard against Monmouth four years ago. His record for the county is a highly creditable one, he having played in 108 out of 109 county games since 1906, bowled 3,590 overs, of which 740 were maiden, and took 638 wickets at a cost of 9,611 runs, being an average of 15 runs per wicket. C. Shaw Baker, the ex-Warwickshire pro, carried off honours in the Cornish side, scoring 105 runs in the first innings and taking five wickets for 63 runs.

Winning the toss, Cornwall batted first on a wicket which was certainly in favour of the batsmen. C. Shaw Baker and Cory were the opening pair, and Amory's first over yielded 10 runs. Afterwards runs came at a slow pace, and Cory was bowled by Jennings after having been batting for 20 minutes, his contribution being 13 out of 27. The Truro pro. (G. Rogers) joined Baker and hit strongly, staying with Baker for 25 minutes to carry the score to 70 before he succumbed to a catch by Fulcher off Jennings. Rogers's contribution of 21 included four boundaries. Rust joined Baker, and after hitting Jennings for six he gave a chance to Midgley, which proved to be an expensive "let off," for he collected 62 runs before he fell a victim to Amory. The partnership between Baker and Rust produced 102 runs, the score at the fall of the third wicket being 172. Baker reached his half-century in 20 minutes, and hit three successive boundaries off Midgley.

Runs Come Rapidly.

Runs were coming at a rapid pace, and Amory tried frequent changes in the bowling. Addicoat played himself in steadily and Cornwall's double century was telegraphed soon after the luncheon interval. Baker completed his century in just over two hours, but after adding five he was caught by Midgley off Carter. It was a faultless innings, his hits including 13 boundaries and a six, made by delightful strokes all round the wicket. With the score at 226 for the loss of four wickets, Cornwall were in a strong position, but the remaining batsmen failed substantially to add to the score. Tresawna fell to a catch in the slips by Fulcher, and Addicoat was stumped by Carroll. The last four wickets were captured by Light, whose slow leg breaks gave the batsmen an uneasy time. He had the splendid analysis of four for 25. Cornwall's innings closed for 279.

Devon's first wicket fell at 16, but Capt. Buller and Whitting took the score to 61 before the latter was bowled by Rogers. Capt. Buller continued to score freely, in partnership with Amory, and the century was hoisted in 80 minutes. At 118, Amory the Devon skipper, was smartly caught by Baker off Williams, and one run later Capt. Buller was clean bowled by Williams after compiling 63 in that under an hour. Half the side were out for 143, and when stumps were drawn for the day seven wickets had fallen for 175. On Saturday morning Falding and Potts put on 50 runs before Falding was sent back by Baker in his first over on relieving Whiting. Potts next hit Baker for a six, and off the following ball he was caught by Rust almost on the boundary line. The innings closed for 223.

Early Disaster.

Cornwall had a lead of 56 runs when they started their second innings, just before noon. Early disaster overtook them, Cory being out with the score at seven, and 16 runs later Tresawna was sent back. G. Rogers was the next victim, and things looked rather black when Baker was caught on the boundary line by Light. The home batsmen appeared to be faint-hearted and treated the bowling with great respect. Six wickets had fallen for 50 runs, and W. Rogers and Addicoat made a stand, but runs were scarce, 10 being put on in 15 minutes. Both these batsmen were caught behind the wicket the 81. Just when having made a valuable 27. At the lunch interval eight wickets were down for 87 and on the

resumption one run was added before the ninth wicket fell. Then the partnership of Bickford and Whiting produced the needed cricket of the innings, Bickford hitting Jennings out of the field, and the score was taken to 127 when Bickford was beaten by Midgley.

At three o'clock Devon took their second knock requiring 184 runs to win, but they found this a difficult matter, only 30 being collected in 45 minutes. In the first few minutes a bad blunder on the part of Bickford spoiled a glorious chance of obtaining a wicket. Whitting and Fulcher were in a dilemma in attempting a run, both batsmen hesitating to complete the run after leaving the crease, and Bickford made the mistake of returning the ball to the bowling end when he could easily have run out Whitting at his own end. Not long afterwards Whitting was missed and an hour elapsed before a separation took place, Fulcher being caught out. Capt. Buller had a short stay, and Whitting, after batting for two hours for 41 runs, was sent back. Carroll and Falding knocked up the necessary runs without further loss, the former registering the winning hit with a six off Whiting. Scores:—

CORNWALL V. DEVON.

BAKER'S CENTURY.

Cornwall met Devon in a minor counties championship match at Camborne on Friday and Saturday. Delightful weather prevailed and the wicket was in excellent condition. Cornwall played the same side as originally selected.

Tresawna won the toss and elected to bat. C. S. Baker and Cory faced the deliveries of Amory and Jennings. In the former's first over the Redruth pro. got a boundary and a brace. Baker also got in some delightful shots, but every run had to be earned as the fielding was particularly keen. After fifteen minutes play 22 was registered. Five minutes later with his score at the unlucky 13, Cory was beaten to the wicket by Jennings with a fine leg-break ball. The telegraph read 27 for 1. Rogers (G.) formerly of Camborne, and now the Truro Club's pro., partnered the Penzance man and got Jennings for 4. After forty minutes' play Midgley bowled in the place of Amory at the town end, but runs came at a merry pace and after three-quarters of an hour 50 was registered. Rogers got a couple of boundaries off Midgley and Baker another off Jennings. Both players gave delightful exhibitions of strokes, and Amory took Jennings' place at the pavilion end, whilst Jennings' bowled down the hill vice Midgley. The change proved effective. With the total at 70 and after an hour's play Rogers was caught mid-off by Fulcher after making 21. The partnership yielded 43 runs. Rust, of Penzance, was the next to go in and in the second over sent Jennings out of the field for six. The batsman had a "life" off Midgley, who failed to hold what was apparently a simple catch. Baker never gave a chance. There was another change in the bowling, but this made no difference and the century was hoisted after eighty minutes' play. Baker with a boundary reached 50. Scoring was very fast. Baker getting 14 off Midgley in one over. Rust was also in the picture, with several fine hits. Baker sent Amory into the vicarage field for six, and a boundary by Rust saw this batsman reach 50. Just after a brilliant partnership which yielded 102 runs, Rust was bowled by Amory after a fine contribution of 52. The telegraph read 172 for 3. Rust's innings included a six and seven 4's. Addicoot, of St. Just, followed on and at the luncheon interval the total was 173 with Baker at 77 not out.

Twenty minutes after lunch, the two hundred mark was reached. Addicoot and Baker both scoring freely. Baker, five minutes later, reached his century amid loud cheering; after making five more, he was caught by Midgley, off Carter, his innings of faultless cricket including thirteen fours, and one six.

The total now stood at 226 for 4. H. Tresawna (skipper) partnered Addicoot, who had a lucky escape in not being run out. A minute later, he was stumped by Carroll, after notching 29.

The telegraph read 232 for 5. With only 10 added to the total, Tresawna was caught off Fulcher, after contributing 10; Matthews and Rogers (W.) had a short partnership, the latter being beautifully caught by Carroll for 12. Seven wickets had now fallen for 263. Matthews knocked Light out into the Jonesfield. But he was caught by Falding, after contributing 17.

Whiting was run out without having a ball; Beecher Williams and Bickford brought the score to 279, when the latter was caught. The last five wickets fell for 47.

Devon opened none too well. When the total was 17, Fulcher, who partnered Whitten, was cleverly stumped by Bickford, with only 40 scored. Buller hit out freely, and, he being well supported by Whitten, the scoring became very fast.

Whiting and Rogers (W.) bowled vice Beecher Williams and Baker, and, within forty minutes, 50 was registered. With 61 on the board, Whitten retired before Rogers for a nice innings of 27. Amory and Buller soon got going, and punished the bowling very severely.

The century was telegraphed in seventy minutes. The batsmen frequently got boundaries, and indulged in many beautiful shots. When at 61, Buller had a "life," Bickford failing to hold the ball when he had a chance to stump the batsman. Amory was caught in the slips by Baker, off Williams, after notching 21. The partnership had realized 57, and the total was 118 for 3.

Buller only made two after his "life," as he fell a victim to a stinging delivery from Williams. Carroll and Falding followed on, and, before the former had opened his score, he was misaid by Rust in the slips. After contributing 15, however, he was sent to the pavilion by Williams. Five wickets had now fallen for 143. Falding and Light took the scoring to 168, when the latter was stumped, and Carter, who had followed on, was caught by Bickford off Baker.

With seven wickets down for 175, and 104 behind Cornwall's score, stumps were drawn.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

When play was resumed on Saturday morning in the match between Cornwall and Devon at Camborne, there remained three wickets to fall to complete Devon's first innings. However, the remaining four batsmen contributed a further 49, which made the visitors' first innings total, 223. Thus Cornwall had the advantage of a first innings lead, their score being 56 in excess of Devon's.

In their second venture Cornwall fared none too well. Their wickets fell rapidly and cheaply and the stand they made compared with that of the first innings, was very poor indeed.

Though the batting of Cornwall was attended by ill-luck, the one thing noticeable was that they were unenterprising. The whole of the 4 hours they occupied the wickets the only players who showed any effort to increase the rate of scoring were Whiting and Bickford. These players, the last wicket pair, showed that the bowling could be hit if the batsmen were sufficiently courageous. This stand produced 39 runs, whilst all the other players were disposed of for 33 runs.

When Cornwall's second innings terminated there remained three and half hours for play and in this time Devon had to secure 124 runs to win.

Fulcher and Whitten opened for Devon, and the former should have been given out before a run was scored. Owing to a misunderstanding between Bickford and G. Rogers, Fulcher avoided being run out.

These batsmen immediately adopted defensive tactics, and as a consequence runs were not quickly forthcoming. They made respective scores of 23 and 41. When Carroll joined Whitten the rate of scoring increased. These players put on 58 for the third wicket. Carroll's innings was characteristic of a quick and forceful batsman. Though the bowling was frequently changed it had no effect on this batsman and his strokes, which were varied, were well timed and the ball well placed. During his innings of 73, he hit three 6's. The hit which obtained the required number of runs to pass the Cornish total, was a 6 by Falding. Scores:—

CRICKET.

CORNWALL v. MONMOUTH.

Cornwall opened their match at Penzance, on Friday morning against Monmouth in the Minor Counties Championship series. The weather was glorious, the heat of the preceding day being tempered by a fresh breeze from the S.E. Monmouth won the toss, and to the surprise of the spectators, sent Cornwall to the wickets. The home county relied on the same team that opened so gloriously and finished so ingloriously against Devon at Camborne. Tresawna, the Cornwall captain, and Cory opened the innings to the bowling of Raikes and Pickthall, and Tresawna was dismissed by Pickthall with the last ball in the first over of the match, without having scored, and Cornwall had thus lost a wicket with only one run on the board. Baker joined Cory, and runs came steadily, till Cory was lbw to Pickthall, after having made 23, the total then being 42. Rogers (G.) joined Baker, but was caught by Pickthall off Raikes, when he had made 1, and three wickets were down for 43. Rust was next in, but succumbed to Pickthall when he had made 12, which included a 6, the only one of that ilk so far in the game, the total having mounted to 68 for four. Addicoot joined Baker, and steady play followed, but, when 75 had been scored, Baker was caught by Arthur off Pickthall for a well-played 31. Matthews joined Addicoot, the latter soon after being bowled off his pad by Pickthall, after having made 14, the telegraph reading 86-6-14.

Hodges relieved Raikes, and Rogers (W.), joined Matthews, the latter of whom opened confidently, and by forceful hitting, the century was raised. He did not stay long, however, being smartly taken by Wilcox behind the wickets after scoring 75. Bickford filled the vacancy, with the total at 109 for seven wickets.

Only a short time after lunch was needed to finish off the Cornwall innings. Bickford was out without adding to his score, but Whiting and Rogers (W.) hit out, Whiting making 16, and Rogers 22, the latter being caught on the boundary at the third attempt. The innings closed for 150, a better total than was at most periods of the game anticipated.

Monmouth opened with Hodges and Abraham. With the total at 17, Hodges "played on" to Whiting, his contribution being 8.

Abraham and Jones played confidently and Jones was applauded for a fine drive for 6 off B. Williams, who with Whiting had taken up the attack.

With the score at 48 for the loss of one wicket, Baker relieved Whiting, and in his first over he clean bowled Abraham. Arthur stayed only a short time, having the misfortune to hit his wicket when he had scored a single, and three wickets were down for 51 runs.

Jones was nicely beaten by Williams when he had made 27, the batsman apparently playing on. Whiting relieved Baker, and in his first over caught and bowled Raikes. Curiously enough, Monmouth had now lost five wickets for 75 runs—precisely the same as Cornwall. T. B. Williams, who joined Rust, drove Beecher Williams to the boundary twice in succession. Rust and Jenkins put up the century for Monmouth.

Rogers had a short turn at bowling, but proved rather expensive, and Baker resumed at the top end, meeting with almost immediate success.

The innings closed soon after tea for 145, Addicoot bringing the innings to a close with a fine catch.

Cornwall opened their second innings at 5.30, with Tresawna and Cory. Raikes and Pickthall sharing the bowling. Cory seemed to be shaping with confidence, but when he had made 7, he smacked a rising ball, which Wilcox smartly caught behind the wickets, the Cornwall score being 15. The clear sky and the bright sunshine which prevailed on Friday, gave place to cloudy skies and a threat of rain on Saturday morning, when the match between Cornwall and Monmouth was resumed at Penzance. Baker and Rogers continued their over-night's innings, the former being 43 not out, and the latter 6 not out, the over-night total being 67 for the loss of two wickets. Tresawna and Cory having been dismissed. These two batsmen took the score to 99, Rogers having taken his contribution to 18, when he was dismissed by Pickthall. Rust joined Baker, who was beaten with a long hop by Jenkins for a splendidly and carefully compiled 62—121—4—62. Baker's innings included eight 4's.

THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL'S RECOVERY IN MONMOUTH MATCH

Although Monmouth were not the Mounmouth of old, Cornwall achieved a creditable performance at Penzance on Friday and Saturday, by beating the Welshmen by 85.

Cornwall made 150 and 181 and Monmouth, 147 and 101. The chief contributors to the victory were Shaw Baker and Frank Whiting. In batting, Baker was the bulwark of the Cornish side, being top scorer in both innings with 31 and then 62. Moreover, his bowling was no mean performance. Baker stayed on to see Cory, George Rogers and Rust go out in quick succession, and then was himself sent back. Half the side were out for 75. The batting continued to fall. CORNWALL V. BERKSHIRE

A DRAWN GAME.

The two days' match in the Minor Counties Championship between Cornwall and Berkshire opened at the Truro College ground on Friday. The weather was fine and there was a good attendance.

Berkshire won the toss and went first to the wickets. Bell, the Berkshire bowler, was absent from the visiting side and his place was taken by J. W. Stokes.

The opening was almost sensational, McKenzie catching Bennett, off Whiting, without a run being scored. Lewis, who had opened the innings with Bennett was lbw. to Whiting when he had made 5, and only 9 were on the board. Nash, who had taken Bennett's place, was caught by W. Rogers off Whiting when he had scored 9 and thus three wickets were down for only 30 runs. Cornwall had thus every reason to congratulate themselves. Luther and Palmer became associated, and improved the visitors' position, taking the score to 43 before a separation was effected, Luther being caught by Baker off Whiting when his individual score was 14.

Whiting had thus taken the four wickets, and continued his success by bowling Palmer for 15, and five wickets were down for 65 runs. Still Whiting continued his usefulness by catching Woodburn off Cory, Woodburn having made 30. Seven wickets were down for 101. Another success came to Whiting when he bowled Stokes for 4. Cave was stumped by Whiting for 11, and eight wickets were down for 125 runs.

This was the position at lunch, with J. G. Rowland and G. E. Palmer at the wickets.

Unfortunately for Cornwall, Rowland was missed by McKenzie when he had made only 3, and took advantage of this to go on and make the biggest score of his side.

Resuming after lunch Rowland and Palmer played confidently, and then when 145 had been scored, McKenzie was given another chance but dropped a catch from Palmer, off Whiting, when Palmer had made 8. McKenzie, however, should be given credit for a really magnificent catch, which sent Bennett, the first batsman back.

Whiting and Cory took the bowling after lunch. The latter gave way to Williams, but still no separation could be effected. Then Baker was given another turn, and in his first over he got Rowland stumped by Bickford. Hawksworth was last man on, and shared the same fate in the last ball of Baker's over.

Rowland had proved the saviour of his side, making 57 out of a total of 174.

The Berkshire innings closed at 3 p.m. Whiting had the splendid average of seven wickets for 77 runs, taking the first six wickets. Baker took two wickets for 18 runs, and Cory one for 24 runs.

Cornwall opened with W. Tressawna and Cory. Tressawna sent Nash to the boundary in the first over, which yielded 6 runs, all scored by Tressawna. Cory's first stroke might have proved disastrous, a snick going dangerously near a fielder. In Cave's first over, Tressawna was caught behind the wickets, after making 12 by Palmer, and one wicket was down for 15 runs. Baker joined Cory, who was dismissed for a similar score to that of his captain, and two wickets were down for 44. Rust joined Baker, and was bowled by Hawksworth before he had scored. G. Rogers joined Baker. Woodburn and Hawksworth had taken the bowling from Cave and Nash, and the batsmen treated them with respect. At 4 o'clock Cornwall had hoisted the half-century. Addicoat joined Baker, who soon after was dismissed with a fine catch by Bennett off Woodburn for 41.

With McKenzie joining Addicoat, there were two St. Just men together. Bad as Berkshire's start had been, Cornwall were doing very little better, as four wickets were down for 66, with Cornwall's two best wickets gone, and the fifth wicket falling at 71. Addicoat did not last long, being caught by Palmer off Hawksworth, and six wickets were down for 77. Rogers (W.) joined McKenzie.

After ten Rogers was soon out lbw. to Woodburn for 2, and seven wickets were down for 80. Cornwall had thus dropped behind the Berkshire average.

Bickford joined McKenzie and off his first hit, Stokes dropped a catch from him on the boundary. Strangely enough, McKenzie hit the next ball in precisely the same manner, and this time Stokes made no mistake. Eight wickets were down for 88.

Whiting now partnered Bickford, and was run out after scoring 1. B. Williams was last man in. When 100 had been hoisted Bickford hit out, and survived a comparatively easy catch, but the innings soon ended. Bickford asked his next ball and Nash made no mistake, the innings closing for 108. The innings lasted about an hour and three-quarters. Stokes and Lewis opened Berkshire's second innings, Whiting and Cory taking up the attack. The latter was relieved after a couple of overs. The separation came when 24 was on the board, Whiting bowling Lewis when he had made 18. Nash joined Stokes.

Cory retired through straining his leg, and Lewis, of the Berkshire side, fielded in his place. When Stokes had scored 10, he was missed by "sub." Williams relieved Baker, and the latter gave place to McKenzie, but the batsmen defied the bowling, and McKenzie was taken off for W. Rogers. Still there was no success for the bowlers. Baker came on again, and the century went up. Runs were coming very rapidly and when stumps were drawn Stokes had remained unbeaten from the start for 44, and Nash was not out 48. The only "5" for the day was scored by Nash off Baker.

Berkshire were thus 157 ahead with nine wickets in hand.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

After being in a very sorry position, Cornwall on Saturday managed to avert defeat.

The problem which faced the Berkshire captain on Saturday morning was a by no means easy one. If he declared without putting his batsmen in, the lead, though a commanding one, might prove insufficient, and though Cornwall had failed in their first venture, they had proved against Devon that they were capable of hitting up a big score.

The problem was still further complicated by the fact that a drizzly rain was falling on Saturday when the game should have been resumed, and a start was impossible till after lunch.

In order to make a defeat reasonably impossible, the visitors again went to the wickets, and took their score from 118 to 222 for the loss of three wickets. Nash, who was not out on Friday for 48, was soon dismissed, being stumped by Bickford off Whiting, for 47, but Stokes took his score to 67 before succumbing to a catch by Addicoat off Baker. Palmer hit a couple of 6's off Whiting, after having been given a "life" in the outfield, and with Luther (who made 28) he was not out.

Cornwall were thus left with 228 to win, and about 3½ hours left for play. Tressawna and Cory opened the innings, and at first ran came fairly steadily, but with 26 on the board, Cory was caught by Rowland off Woodburn for 10. Baker joined Tressawna, and the Cornish skipper played a very patient game. His total of 57 and his steadiness had a very great influence on the game, and seemed to have set the seal of a draw upon it, but after he had left, and G. CORNWALL COUNTY CRICKET

DORSET MET AT LISKEARD.

FINE BOWLING PERFORMANCE BY WHITING.

Dorset visited Liskeard over the week-end for a two days' match with Cornwall in the Minor Counties' Championship, but owing to rain not a ball was bowled on Friday, as stated in our last issue.

On Saturday, however, the weather was brilliantly fine, and a full day's cricket was thoroughly enjoyed by a large crowd. It was undoubtedly a bowlers' wicket, each side being skittled out for small totals, and after obtaining a first-innings lead of 27, Dorset played out time, their second venture yielding 119 runs for the loss of 7 wickets.

THE DORSET INNINGS.

The visitors were the toss, and promptly at 11 a.m. R. M. Chadwick and Knight opened Dorset's innings, Whiting and Beecher Williams leading off Cornwall's attack. Both commenced with a maiden, and then Knight got two 4's in succession off Williams, the first being a nice leg glide, and the second a lucky snick behind the wicket. Both batsmen scored steadily, and Chadwick sent up the 20 in 20 minutes with a big off drive that reached the boundary. Beecher Williams, who had had twelve runs knocked off him in four overs, was then relieved by C. Shaw Baker, who met with immediate success, bowling Knight with his first ball, which broke in sharply from the leg. The first wicket had fallen for 21 runs, but when M. B. Elderton (the captain) came in he pulled Baker to the boundary three times in succession. After the score had been carried to 34, however, Baker got his second wicket, Chadwick giving a simple catch to Williams in first slip in trying to hit to leg. All this time the Dorset batsmen could do little with Whiting, whom they treated with marked respect, the Liskeard professional giving away only seven runs in seven overs. R. D. Busk then joined the captain, and despite several bowling changes, backed up by keen fielding, both men hit freely, and the partnership yielded exactly 50 runs before Busk, who was batting an hour for his 38, was clean bowled by Shaw Baker. Another good stand followed between the captain and M. B. S. Bower, the latter sending up the 100 after the Dorset innings had lasted 1½ hours. At 113 Bower was dismissed by a fine catch at mid-on by H. Tresawna, the Cornish captain holding the ball within an inch of the ground.

With only four wickets down, and Elderton apparently well set, Dorset looked like hitting up a big score, but the captain went at the same total, after contributing a patient 30, being out to as spectacular catch in the country by Lugg, who had to run several yards at top speed before he reached the ball. Some great bowling by Whiting then changed the situation completely, and the last six wickets fell for an additional twelve runs, the whole side being out at 1.10 p.m. for the comparatively modest total of 125. Whiting captured six wickets for only 25 runs, and received quite an ovation at the close of the innings.

CORNWALL'S BATTING FAILURE.

Cornwall, who batted for a quarter of an hour before lunch, made a disastrous start, losing their skipper in the first over before a run had been scored. Tresawna was out in playing a really wretched stroke, his middle stump being knocked down, and, unfortunately, this was only an omen of what was to follow, for with the exception of Rogers and Cory, who scored exactly 70 between them out of the paltry total of 88, none of the home batsmen reached double figures. Cory, who joined Rogers at the fall of the first wicket, early on survived a confident appeal for a catch at the wicket off Busk, the fast bowler, and Rogers had a life when Harrison dropped a hard return off his own bowling, but the two professionals played splendid, forcing cricket, and selected the right balls to hit. When 30 was telegraphed, Cummins relieved Busk, and the latter showed what a magnificent all-rounder he is by some dazzling fielding at silly mid-off. Cory gave a hard chance to Chadwick when 20, and he later celebrated his escape by hitting Cummins out of the field, but in attempting a similar shot in the same over was caught by Chadwick on the boundary. Cory's 29 did not contain one single, being made up of a six, four 4's, two 2's, and a 3. The second wicket partnership realised 43 runs, and the hopes of the crowd were raised when Shaw Baker joined Rogers, but he was soon caught in

the out field, and three wickets were down for 59. Rogers then played with great care, but the Dorset fielding was extremely smart, and many hits which might have been expected to reach the boundary, only yielded a single.

ONE BRIGHT EXCEPTION.

Lugg and Nicholas gave the professional little assistance, the latter being bowled by a ball he never attempted to play, but when young Tilly, a Clifton College cricketer, joined Rogers, the pace quickened, and the professional delighted the crowd by scoring 15 in one over off Cummins, made up of one 6, two 4's, and a single. Eventually Rogers was clean bowled by Harrison after a stay of 14 hours for an invaluable 41. Tilly, going in at the fall of the fifth wicket, alone of the remaining batsmen played the bowling with any confidence. He batted stylishly, and was undefeated at the close. Bickford got a "duck"; Whiting, after driving Cummins to the square leg boundary, had two "lives" in one over, and when the innings closed at 3.40 p.m., the impression was strong that Cornwall's batting needs strengthening.

BUSK THE TOP SCORER.

Going in 27 runs on, Dorset made no attempt to force the pace and declare, but gave a sound display of batting, playing out time (6.30) for the loss of 7 wickets. Cornwall tried no fewer than seven bowlers, and the most successful was Rogers, whose two wickets with the last balls of his second over cost only six runs. Dorset lost two good batsmen for 18, and Mill dismissed the skipper with a " Yorker," three wickets being down for 39, but any latent Cornish hopes of a Dorset collapse and a stirring home victory on the call of time—which would have been extended to 7 p.m. if any decision was thought possible—were quickly set at rest by Busk, who settled down to play steady cricket, reaching his half-century and his team's 100 with a straight drive to the boundary off Tilly. When 60 he gave a hard chance to Whiting, and five runs later fell to Rogers, his 55 including ten 4's. Jones and Cummins played out time.

Just before the tea interval Messrs. T. W. Ainge and J. A. Elliott made a collection for Whiting, £6 17s. 6d. being realised.

THE COUNTY ON TOUR.

MONMOUTH VISITED AT ABERCARRN.

Following on their match at Liskeard, the Cornwall County team commenced their annual tour by making the long journey to South Wales to meet Monmouth on Monday, in the return fixture. Earlier in the year, at Truro, Cornwall had won by 85 runs; but at the close of the first day's play, it seemed likely that the Welshmen would have their revenge.

Batting first on a rain sodden wicket the homesters did none too well, half the side being out for 90. Better results, however, came from the later batsmen, who put on 109, and so Cornwall had to face a total of 169.

The Cornish batsmen, with the exception of the captain, H. Tresawna, failed badly, two were run out, and Bickford had the misfortune to break his own wicket. At the close of play they had only reached half their opponents' total, with two wickets to fall.

Thanks to some better batting in their second innings, Cornwall just managed to stave off defeat, but lost the points on the first innings. The last two wickets fell in half an hour for an additional 20 runs, leaving Monmouth with the lead of 65. R. M.
