

COLTS OF KENT.

Hop County's Second String Meet Norfolk on the Great Lines.

TWO CENTURIES.

Successful from every standpoint the cricket match between Kent second eleven and Norfolk on the R.N. and R.M. Ground, Great Lines, on Monday, and again on Tuesday, ended in a draw. In reply to Norfolk's 224, Kent made 159. The visitors declared their second innings closed at 252 for 4 wickets, the Hop County compiling 209 for 2 wickets when stumps were finally drawn. The outstanding performance was that of M. Falcon, Norfolk's skipper and England player. In his side's first knock, he collected 56 runs, was not out 107 in the second, and had bowling figures of 5 for 52. Hubble, of Kent, also had the distinction of making a century, after scoring 53 in the opening innings. Ames, his confidante, was responsible for the usual batting totals of 67 and 50. There were good attendances on both days, and the atmosphere and playing conditions were of the best. Among the spectators were many civic, military and naval celebrities.

THE PLAY DESCRIBED.

Norfolk won the toss and batted first on a plumb wicket, Nichols and H. F. Low opening to the bowling of Phillips and Haver respectively. Off his third bowl, Nichols got the ball way to the off boundary. Haver's opening over was a maiden, so was his second, third, fourth, and fifth. Longfield, a medium-paced trundler, superseded Phillips when the score stood at 15, and emulated Haver with another maiden. His next was the same. Low hit the first run off Haver's bowling from the fifth ball of his sixth over. Nichols obtained a boundary from Haver's last ball. Lieut. E. S. de Brett arrived late, his place for the time being being taken by Everett, considered to be Norfolk's best fielder. Haver's seventh and ninth overs were also of the maiden variety. Nichols attracted marked attention by a hit to leg for six off Longfield, who gave way to Fenner.

With 48 on the board—fifty minutes batting—Bull displaced Haver at the Memorial end. Bull is on the small side, and is not yet eighteen. He has good recommendations. The rate of scoring increased, and at 84 de Brett was brought on to bowl from the Memorial end. With his third ball he had the satisfaction of seeing Nichols caught at cover by Watson, who covered some ground before making the catch. It was a smart achievement and in keeping with Watson's high standard of fielding. Nichols made 48, which included a 6 and seven 4's. Covill, the next man in, sent up the 100 in about 90 minutes.

With only 23 added, Low was out to a catch at second slip by de Brett, off Fenner's bowling. In his 49 the amateur had five 4's. Falcon had only scored a single when he lost Covill, who gave a catch at second slip to Longfield. 104 for 3. Stevens and Falcon carried the score to 113, when the luncheon interval was taken. Falcon wasted no time, and soon set about the bowling in his usual whole-hearted and vigorous way. He saw Stevens go down to Phillips off a rising ball, Ames making no mistake. 139 for 4.

Haver maintained an admirable length, and often had the batsmen guessing. The fifth wicket fell at 177, Coldham playing on to Fenner. Falcon achieved the half-century off Fenner's next ball with a lashing hit for four. He repeated the feat twice more from successive balls, and in attempting another big effort skied the ball, and was caught by the bowler for a bright 56. Thus the fifth wicket went down at 198. Falcon hit nine 4's. After his departure the scoring slackened. Ultimately, Haver tempted Everett, who was brilliantly caught at square leg by Hubble, with his left hand. The score-board now read 198 for 7. Only two more runs were added when another wicket was captured. Beadsmoore being clean bowled by Haver for a duck. 200 for 8. Haver was given a rest, Bull taking over. Mower claimed two four's off successive deliveries from the little man.

At the other end, Phillips went on for Fenner, and his first ball brought about Dougill's departure, a confident and general appeal for "caught behind wicket" being upheld. 220 for 9. Haver was recalled. Mower directed the first of the over to fine leg boundary, but had his balls upset the second ball in an effort to drive. Norfolk were all out for 224, shortly before four. G. Watson and Ames started Kent's batting. Watson faced Falcon, and soon broke his duck, scoring three off the famous amateur's third ball. There was a change in the weather about this time. It became dull, cold and showery. The conditions, however, brightened in a short space of time. Early disasters befel the Hop County. Off his first ball, Beadsmoore disturbed Watson's leg stump, and in his fifth sent back Moseley. Beadsmoore was making the ball turn a lot, and a slight wind helped him. The first and second wickets fell for 3 runs.

Ames and Hubble now became associated. Hubble had rather a close shave off Falcon's bowling, Stevens just failing to make a catch at slip. Both batsmen were sometimes beaten by Falcon for pace. Hubble survived an appeal by Williamson behind the wicket. Beadsmoore was giving a great deal of trouble to the Kent pair. He had four men fielding at close leg. A rather lucky boundary snick through the slips and a four to fine leg in successive balls off Falcon by Hubble was refreshing, from Kent's point of view. Ames then obtained a four (all run) at Falcon's expense. Owing to leg trouble, Hubble had had to leave the field, coming back within a few minutes. Ames off drove Beadsmoore for four, and the tea interval was taken. Hubble was not out 21 and Ames 16.

Falcon took himself off for Mower with the score 48 for 2. Covill took charge of the bowling, at the opposite end. The new-comer nearly caused Hubble being stumped off Williamson's pads. The score mounted steadily, both Hubble and Ames bringing off excellent shots. A cut by Hubble hoisted the hundred, and a three off a no ball from Mower gave him his fifty. Haverbents Nichols took over from Covill, and Dougill was given a turn. Nichols' slow kept the batsmen comparatively quiet. The score had been taken from 3 to 108 when Hubble was beaten by the first ball of Dougill's second over. He had made 53 (five 4's) by competent all-round stroke play. E. S. de Brett came next. His stay was brief. He survived the remainder of Dougill's over, but succumbed to Nichols in his first ball, making the mistake of playing back. The fourth wicket fell at 109. Falcon returned at Dougill's end, and had Fenner caught at mid-on for 1. 117 for 5. With a four off Nichols, Ames attained the half-century.

A smart catch by Covill at third slip dismissed Longfield, Falcon being the successful bowler. 125 for 6. Longfield made 3. Three wickets had fallen for the addition of but 17 runs. Captain Weigall, who is nearing the sixties, then joined Ames, and took the score to 152, at which total play for the day ceased, Ames being undefeated with 67 and Weigall 9.

YESTERDAY'S PLAY.

Ames was out in Falcon's first over without adding to his score of over-night. Weigall did most of the scoring after this. Bull stayed for an over or two, but before he could open his account he was bowled middle-stump by Falcon. Haver shaped well, and Phillips knocked three off Falcon, only to be clean bowled shortly afterwards. Falcon took 3 of the 4 wickets that fell. Kent finished 35 runs behind. Nichols and Low looked pretty well set in the commencement of Norfolk's second innings, but when de Brett was put on he broke up the partnership in his first over. Falcon was missed in the slips before scoring. To show his appreciation he went for the bowling, and gathered runs apace. He kept the fielders busy leather chasing all over the field. He was loudly cheered when he completed a glorious century in 83 minutes by a four to the on off Hubble. Watson received an ovation for a brilliant stop near the boundary. He covered a lot of ground to gather the ball on the ground with the left hand. Watson, by his agility and sureness, saved innumerable runs. Chatham copied the hitting habit of his captain, and Norfolk were able to declare at 3.45 with 252 for 4 wickets. Falcon was not out 107 and Coldham 43. The former hit a 6 and sixteen 4's, Coldham a 6 and five 4's. Kent were left with 288 to get for victory in less than three hours.

Ames and Moseley opened to Beadsmoore and Covill. Moseley had two lives in an over from Mower, being dropped by Covill and behind the wicket. Runs came slowly at 'he start against accurate bowling. The first half-hour produced but twenty runs. The score was 28 for no wicket at the tea interval. Moseley and Ames carried the score on, resuming to 65, when the former got in front of a straight ball off Falcon, who had put himself on for the first time. Moseley made 31. Nichols caused some amusement by exploiting the lob theory. He had four men on the boundary, but despite this Ames and Hubble found loopholes in the human barrier. Hubble gave two chances off Fenner, the first being a lucky flick to the backward boundary and in the second square leg dropped a hard catch. A neat deflection through the slips by Ames hoisted the hundred at 5.35, and off Beadsmoore's next ball the same batsman scored a boundary. Falcon several times prostrated Ames' defence without finding the stumps. Frequent bowling changes failed to dislodge the batting party until 132, when Ames was caught off Covill's bowling by Stevens at first slip. He had just completed his 50, in which was seven 4's. Hubble shortly afterwards attained the half-century, having just taken two successive fours off Covill. He went on to attain three figures, Falcon sportingly allowing an extra over to be played to enable the feat. Hubble again gave a sparkling display, and obtained his score at the rate of more than a run a minute. He received a hearty reception on leaving the field shortly after 6.30. He had 13 boundaries.

Haver was Kent's most successful bowler with an analysis of 24 overs, 15 maidens, 47 runs, 3 wickets in Norfolk's first innings. In the same innings, Fenner had 4 for 73; Phillips, 2 for 63; de Brett 1 for 5; Bull, 0 for 33; and Longfield, 0 for 16.

The wicket, in the opinion of Mr. Weigall, is the best in Kent—a big compliment to the energetic and capable groundsmen (Mr. Williams). Scores—

KENT II. v. NORFOLK

FALCON'S FIREWORKS: HUBBLE'S HUNDRED.

Two brilliant centuries were recorded in the Minor Counties game between Kent II. and Norfolk, which was concluded on the R.N. and R.M. ground on Tuesday. These were credited to Michael Falcon, the Norfolk captain, and Jack Hubble, the young Kentish batsman. Falcon's 107, not out, was a hurricane affair, compiled in a little over 80 minutes, and with his two partners, Stevens (37) and Coldham (43, not) scoring at the same rapid rate, a run-getting pace of over two a minute was being maintained. Needless to say, Falcon's fireworks were greatly appreciated by the spectators. Hubble's 102, not out, compiled in about 85 minutes, was not quite so thrilling, but once he had passed the half-way stage the batsman galloped along to three figures at a rollicking pace. As was the case last year, the game ended in a draw, with Norfolk taking three points for a first-innings lead.

The match did not attract more than 4,000 spectators on both days, and probably came a little too soon after the first-class game with Derbyshire.

Norfolk's Capital Start

Nichols and H. F. Low opened the Norfolk innings, Phillips taking up the attack at the most end. Everett, the best Norfolk field, turned out as substitute for E. S. de Brett. Hever was the bowler at the Memorial end, and he opened with three maiden overs, the first ten runs coming off the bowling of Phillips. At 15, Longfield relieved Phillips. Hever was bowling an immaculate length and frequently had the batsmen guessing. The calibre of his bowling can be estimated by the fact that his first five overs failed to produce a run. Longfield also pegged the batsmen down, and several minutes passed without the scorers being troubled. His sixth over, however, saw Nichols cut him beautifully through the covers for 4. De Brett arrived and relieved Everett of his substitution duties. Nichols obtained two fine ate cuts off Longfield, and then lifted the same bowler over the square-leg boundary for 6. This brought on Fenner, but the batsmen continued to score at a steady pace. The half-hundred was hoisted in a like number of minutes, and this brought on Bull for Hever.

PARTNERSHIP BROKEN.

At 84 de Brett relieved Bull, and with his third ball got Nichols well caught at cover by Watson, who had to run several yards to make the catch (84-1-48). The outgoing batsman had hit one 6 and seven 4's. His mission fulfilled, de Brett retired in favour of Hever. Covill sent the 100 up with a four to leg off Fenner, when the innings had been in progress 85 minutes. With 23 runs added Low was dismissed when within one of his half-hundred, de Brett taking him at second slip off Fenner (107-2-49). Low hit five 4's, three 3's and six 2's. Falcon, the Norfolk captain, joined Covill, who promptly fell a second victim to Fenner, Longfield holding an easy chance at first slip (106-3-6). G. A. Stevens, who played so well in the corresponding game last season, was the new batsman. Lunch was taken with the total at 113 for three wickets.

Phillips took over at Fenner's end on resuming, de Brett continuing at the Memorial wicket, but was soon relieved by Hever. Falcon hit merrily, but in stealing a short single he narrowly escaped running his partner out. Stevens did not survive long, however, Ames taking him behind the wicket off a rising ball from Phillips (139-4-8). Falcon was severe on Phillips and straight drove the fast bowler for two boundaries and two 2's. This brought on Fenner, but the Norfolk captain showed his impartiality by treating the new bowler in the same manner. Coldham was beginning to launch out as a smiter, but somewhat unluckily played on to Fenner (177-5-17).

FALCON'S SMASHING DRIVES.

With Everett in, Falcon reached his individual 50 with three smashing boundary drives off successive balls from Fenner, but in attempting a fourth big hit was caught and bowled (190-6-56). Falcon obtained 36 of his 66 runs from boundary strokes, and his innings was a delightful one to watch, his straight driving being both brilliant and forceful. With Everett and Dougill together the scoring slackened down perceptibly, and maiden overs were not infrequent. Attempting one big hit off Hever, Everett was nicely caught at square leg by Hubble, who took the ball with one hand (198-7-7). A lucky snip through the slips by Dougill, now joined by Beadsmore, sent up the 200 in 177 minutes. Hever took advantage of the new ball to beat and bowl Beadsmore before that player had opened his account (200-8-0). Mower came in and quickly enlivened things with some big hitting. This brought Phillips on, and off his first ball to Dougill there was little doubt when the field appealed for a catch behind the wicket (220-9-4). Mower made one more big hit and was then clean bowled by Hever. His 22 was obtained in six strokes—five 4's and one 2. The innings thus closed for 224.

A SENSATIONAL START.

G. S. Watson and Ames opened the Kent innings, Falcon bowling with the breeze behind him. Beadsmore came on at the opposite end, and with his first ball disturbed Watson's leg stump (3-1-1). Moseley joined Ames, but could not time Beadsmore, and the fifth ball swung in to take the leg stump again (3-2-0). Thus in his first over Beadsmore had taken two wickets without having a run scored off him. Beadsmore was bowling on to the leg stump and he had four men close in and one deep on that side of the field. Hubble and Ames played steadily, but the former had a narrow escape from being caught at backward point by Coldham off Falcon. The latter was bowling at his fastest, and Hubble was fortunate to see a snick pass safely through "the gully." The same batsman, however, scored a second boundary off the Norfolk skipper with a grand forcing shot to leg.

With the arrival of the tea interval the pair had carried the total to 40. Mower took over at Falcon's end with the total at 48. The Kentish batsmen continued to hit with great freedom, Hubble, in particular, scoring at a rapid rate. Covill was put on at 70, and in his first over Ames survived an appeal for stumped by Williamson. Although becoming a trifle more subdued, the batsmen still obtained runs steadily, and the century was hoisted without a separation being effected. Hubble reached 50, and both he and Ames (40) looked well set. A double bowling change brought on Nichols and Dougill, and some good-length bowling kept the batsmen tied down. The first ball of Dougill's second over beat and bowled Hubble, who had batted for 80 minutes for 53, which included five 4's. His partnership with Ames had realised 105 badly-needed runs (106-3-53). De Brett did not survive long, for in playing back to one of Nichols' slows he was bowled for a duck (109-4-0). Fenner joined Ames, but on Falcon relieving Dougill the newcomer was well taken at mid-on by Everett (117-5-1). With Longfield in, Ames reached 50 out of 120. Falcon soon met with a further success by inducing Longfield to edge one into the slips, where Covill brought off a fine catch low down at third man (125-6-3). Weigall was Ames' new partner, and the pair played out time, which arrived with the score at 152 for 6. Ames being 67 and Weigall 9, but not out.

Tuesday's Play

Ames failed to add to his overnight score on resuming on Tuesday, being smartly taken by Stevens at second slip off the last ball of Falcon's opening over. The latter was bowling with rare pace, and Beadsmore's in-swingers also kept the batsmen almost entirely on the defensive. Bull bowled round one from Falcon and was bowled middle stump, two wickets then having fallen for the addition of only eight runs (153-8-0). Weigall, the veteran Kent captain, gave an excellent

display subsequently and obtained 27 by a nice variety of strokes until he was well taken behind the wicket by Williamson off Mower (178-9-27). Falcon closed the innings at 189 by clean bowling Phillips, Hever being not out 15. Falcon, who bowled really well, came out with the excellent analysis of 5 for 52.

Norfolk started their second innings with a lead of 35. Fenner, in the slips, just touched a hot one from Low and hurt his hand so badly that he had to change his position in the field. As in the first innings, de Brett was brought on when Low and Nichols appeared set for a big first-wicket stand, and his fifth ball of his first over was mis-hit by Nichols for Weigall to take an easy chance at mid-on (26-1-15). Low and Covill carried the score along briskly, but at 60 Low turned a ball from Fenner into his wicket, and at the same total Covill fell an lbw victim to Phillips when 17. Falcon, missed in the slips before he had scored, and Stevens indulged in a free and easy partnership bristling with scintillating boundary shots. Stevens overhauled his captain, and so powerfully and accurately did he "punch" the ball that his first 50 was contained in seven boundary hits. He had only added 7, however, when he was caught brilliantly at first man off Fenner (132-4-37). Stevens hit no fewer than eight 4's.

FALCON'S FIERCE HITTING.

Falcon continued to smash the leather to all parts of the field, but when 49 was dropped in the long field by de Brett. Profiting by this, Falcon delighted the crowd with even fiercer hitting, and quickly entered the nineties with a mighty hit for 6 off de Brett. Hubble was given a turn with the ball for the first time at 214, but with a hit to the end for four off the new bowler, Falcon reached his century after batting only 80 minutes. This achievement was warmly acknowledged by the crowd and players alike. Coldham, who had been emulating his captain, hit de Brett into the pavilion for 6, and with the total at 252 (Falcon 107, Coldham 42), the Norfolk innings was declared closed for the loss of only four wickets. Falcon's hurricane innings, which lasted altogether 80 minutes, included one 6 and sixteen 4's. Coldham hit one 6 and five 4's.

GOOD START BY KENT.

Kent were set to get 288 to win in just under three hours. Moseley and Ames opened and played defensive cricket. In one over from Mower, Moseley had two "lives," being missed behind the wicket off successive balls by Covill and Stevens. Tea was taken with the score at 28. The batsmen opened out after the interval, and the half-hundred was quickly hoisted. Nichols came on and caused somewhat of a sensation by bowling lobs. Falcon also came on for the first time, and in his opening over Moseley paid the penalty of stepping in front of a straight one (65-1-31). Nichols' lob bowling was not proving successful, both Ames and Hubble getting him to the boundary, and Beadsmore soon relieved him. Hubble had two escapes, being badly dropped on the second occasion by Mower at square leg. The hundred was hoisted without further loss, but Falcon was again unfortunate to see Ames missed behind the wicket. In fact, the fast bowler was frequently beating the bat, but just failing to carry the wicket. Ames reached a very sound fifty for the second time during the match. The play was, on the whole, of a sedate character and brought cricket down to the easy-going plane from which Falcon's fireworks had temporarily raised it. Colvill eventually got Ames caught at first slip by Stevens at 132, the outgoing batsman having failed to add to his half-hundred. At this stage there seemed little prospect of a definite finish being arrived at, although Hubble was now opening his shoulders to anything loose and quickly reached his fifty. Hubble continue to bat attractively against some mediocre bowling, and when half-past six arrived wanted only one for his century. An extra over was played, and this enabled the young batsman to attain the coveted distinction after only 83 minutes' batting. The second fifty, during which Hubble had practically all the bowling, was scored much quicker than the first, and he hit altogether thirteen 4's. Time was called with the Kent total at 209 for two wickets. Scores:—

Frank is the brother of George and Alick Hearne, and played for the County from 1879 to 1889, when owing to ill-health he had to retire prematurely and to emigrate to South Africa, where his health improved and he was able to play with success. But he is now so seriously crippled with sciatica that he is unable to attend to his business and is dependent on his son. On retirement from county cricket he did not have a benefit match, but a sum of £144 9s 10d was collected for and presented to him. A bright bat and brilliant field, he contributed very much to the county elevens' success in the 'eighties, when we were forging our way to a prominent position, and materially to our victories over the Australian elevens of 1884 and 1886. In the following over Valentine fell to a catch by the same fielder, Ames and Fenner then came together and there followed some careful batting, as indeed the occasion demanded. The score was taken to 31, when Fenner was out to a smart piece of stumping by Mobery. He had contributed 15. Ames found a useful partner in Moseley, who helped him to carry the score to 90. It was the stand between Ames and Bull, however, which put the Kent side in a comparatively favourable position, after a somewhat sorry start. Bull's was a very valuable innings, although his score, 39, was not a large one. Sixth out at 228, Ames had batted splendidly, scoring most of his runs in front of the wicket.

None of the later batsmen gave much trouble, and the innings closed at tea-time for 255.

Surrey made the most of the time at their disposal before the close of play, and before stumps were drawn they had scored 136 for the loss of one wicket. Baldwin and Barling gave the side an excellent start, putting on 109 for the first wicket. With the score at that stage, Baldwin, who was eight short of his fifty, gave an easy catch to Longfield at cover point. Barling had just previously reached the fifty mark, and at the end of the day's play was not out with 76 to his credit. Daily's not out score was 15.

When play commenced again on Tuesday morning it was evident that the overnight rain, followed by the warm sunshine, had affected the wicket. Barling, who was not out the previous night with 76, without adding a run was bowled by Hearn. Daily, the other not out, added nine more runs and then was smartly stumped by Ames off Hearn's bowling. The remaining batsmen did not offer much resistance and the innings closed for 229, 26 runs behind Kent's total. A feature of the innings was the splendid bowling of Hearn, who sent down 29 overs and claimed 6 wickets for 62 runs.

Kent's batsmen upon going in a second time soon found themselves in difficulties, O'Gorman and Baldwin bowling with great success.
