

PROMISING COLTS

Early Successes Against Council.

Thrum Hall Attraction.

Although the sun came out spasmodically the weather was none too warm for the game between Yorkshire Colts and Council at Thrum Hall this afternoon.

Another change was made in the Council team, R. Lord, Halifax, coming in for T. Birtles. There were only a few spectators present when J. M. Crossley and H. Hutchinson opened the Council innings against Douglas and Reader. The wicket was on the soft side.

The opening over produced two runs, but it was not long before the Colts gained their first success, J. Crossley being caught by Malleliou at second slip, off the bowling of Reader. The total was only four and without any addition to the score Douglas clean bowled Hutchinson.

This brought together D. Westwood, Halifax, and J. Ward Birstall. Gradually the position was improved, both batsmen showing a bold front to some good length bowling. Ten was signalled after 20 minutes' play. This was followed by a capital shot on the leg side by Westwood, which realised three.

The Halifax player was shaping very well against both trundlers, and he narrowly missed reaching the boundary on another occasion by driving Douglas past covers. At 22 C. Turner replaced Reader at the Hanson-lane end, and the new bowler was successful in disposing of Ward by taking a smart return off the fifth delivery of his first over. Spink the Halifax pro., was the new comer.

SPINK SHOWS FREEDOM.

The latter did not have Westwood long as partner, for Douglas, the Bradford left-hander, clean bowled the Halifax player with a swinger when the total had reached 26. A. H. Booth next joined Spink, and both batsmen were badly missed in the thirties, one at cover point and the other at square leg.

With the score at 45 Booth was dismissed, Chichester-Constable taking a catch at mid-on, off Turner. Verity had, in the meantime, relieved Douglas at the pavilion end. Spink, who was showing refreshing freedom, was next joined by G. W. Hirst.

TO-DAY'S CRICKET

Colts v. Council.

Brilliant Batting by Turner.

The weather was a little warmer to-day when the game between the Yorkshire Colts and the Council was continued at Thrum Hall. The former, when play commenced, were in a commanding position with only three wickets down and 24 runs in front.

Barber and Turner opened against Jacques and Spink. Both batsmen commenced cautiously. Turner, however, quickly reached his individual 50, and 23 were added to the overnight total when a separation was effected, Barber being given out lbw to Jacques, the fourth wicket having produced 53.

W. R. Allen, who filled the vacancy was unusually subdued for him, but Turner continued to score freely off both bowlers. At 58 Slater relieved Jacques and Allen quickly got the new bowler to leg for a couple, but Turner put one perilously near to Lord at cover point a little later.

At 71 Spink clean bowled Allen. This brought H. Verity as partner to Turner, but without any addition to the score the latter was dismissed as a result of a brilliant one-handed catch by Slater off his own bowling. The outgoing batsman had played capital cricket for two and a quarter hours, and his total of 73 included eight fours. Major Chichester-Constable followed.

Neither Verity or the Colts' captain gave a great deal of trouble, the former in pulling Spink to leg boundary had the misfortune to step on his wicket, when Slater clean bowled Chichester-Constable at the same total of 187.

Rawlin and Douglas, the next in partnership went along merrily until the combination of Spink and Lord resulted in the latter effecting a clever catch at short leg to dispose of Rawlin.

The innings was concluded at five minutes past three for 207, Spink, the Halifax professional taking four wickets for 71.

The Council commenced their second venture in promising style, Crossley getting both bowlers to the boundary, but with the total 11 Crossley, in attempting to hit Douglas off the ground was well caught by Mitchell in the country for nine.

YORKSHIRE COLTS' FIRST MATCH.

SLOW BATTING BY COUNCIL XI. AT HALIFAX.

(From Our Special Representative.)

Halifax, Wednesday.

A chilling wind and a wicket which for the greater part of the day gave some help to the bowlers combined to make the usual opening fixture of the Yorkshire Colts against a Yorkshire Council XI. at Thrum Hall rather dull and cheerless as a spectacle.

Unfortunately for the representative team, they were without their two best batsmen, Tyson and Birtles, Tyson having now severed his connection with the Whitwood Club, whilst Birtles was unable to play. As events proved, their help was sadly missed.

The Colts, of whom the new captain, Major R. C. Chichester-Constable, took charge for the first time, were a strong side, including the East Riding amateur, A. E. Malleliou, and two new bowlers, Verity, of Horsforth, a tall left-hander of quite good pace, who is also a sound bat, and Rawlin, a medium to fast right-arm bowler, the son of the old County player, J. T. Rawlin. Once having found a length, Verity bowled quite well; but Rawlin appeared to waste effort by exaggerated action. Although not making many runs, Malleliou has a free, graceful style, which is very pleasing to watch, and gives promise of many attractive innings. If he can play regularly, he will be an undoubted asset to the County's resources.

The Council, winning the toss and batting first, were always fighting against an attack which under the conditions was too strong for them. Almost unrelieved by any bright period, the innings produced a laboured total of 85 in two hours and ten minutes. Two Halifax batsmen, R. Lord, who made several attractive hits, and H. W. Spink, who defended with good judgment, were the highest contributors. The Colts' bowling was well varied, and Douglas, of Bradford, enhanced his reputation by his consistently good length. He often made the ball come across very disconcertingly and claimed four wickets for 30 runs. Two apparently simple catches were dropped during the Council innings; but otherwise the fielding of the Colts was commendable. Mitchell in the long field particularly distinguished himself, whilst Allen was smart behind the wicket.

By far the most interesting cricketer of the day was seen when two of the principal batting hopes of the County, Mitchell and C. Turner, were associated for the Colts' third wicket. The bowling of Jacques, Spink and Slater, the last named a slow left-hander of Barbours was keen and accurate; but Mitchell made some delightful strokes, and Turner brought off some perfectly timed pulls, which usually found the boundary. Despite the slow outfield the pair put on 60 runs in fifty-five minutes, and at the close of play the Colts, with seven wickets in hand, had a lead of 26 runs. Present score:—

JUNIOR ROSES AT OLD TRAFFORD

DOUGLAS AND TURNER BOWL FINELY.

The Yorkshire Second Eleven secured the advantage over Lancashire Second, at Old Trafford yesterday. They dismissed the home team for 154, and then scored 85 for 2 wickets, and are thus only 69 behind with eight wickets left.

There was nothing particularly brilliant about the Lancashire batting. The earlier batsmen experienced some difficulties on a rather soft pitch, and the swinging left arm deliveries of Douglas. Half the side were out for 63, and the best stand was that of Farrimond and J. T. Tyldesley immediately after lunch, which increased the total by 48 runs. The veteran Lancastrian showed many of his old strokes before being taken at the wicket off Douglas, who bowled exceptionally well during his two spells. The innings lasted altogether for three hours and ten minutes, during which Yorkshire held well and gave nothing away.

Yorkshire lost Taylor at 11, but A. E. Mallalieu and Mitchell defied the Lancashire bowling to put on 40 runs for the second wicket. Rain caused a stoppage for 40 minutes, and the Lancashire bowlers were subsequently hampered by the wet ball. Mitchell played clever and free cricket, but Mallalieu was very stubborn. Still he played a great game for his side, and has so far been at the wicket an hour and three-quarters for his incompleting innings of 32. He and Barber put on 34 for the third partnership. LANCASHIRE COLTS WIN FIRST INNINGS POINT.

DEADLY BOWLING BY HOLROYD.

A start could not be made in the second day's play at Old Trafford yesterday until after luncheon, and then the wicket so favoured the bowlers that Yorkshire's prospect of securing a useful lead on the first innings quickly vanished.

Overnight they had got to within 69 of the Lancashire total, and had eight wickets in hand, but they found Holroyd almost unplayable, and in an hour and 20 minutes the side had been dismissed for the addition of but 23 runs. Holroyd, who has been described as a second edition of Johnny Briggs, and upon whom Lancashire have high hopes, kept such a fine length with his slow left-hand bowling that at one time he had sent down five overs for one run and claimed five wickets. He finished with the excellent figures of 7 wickets for 23 runs, and was mainly responsible for Lancashire being able to claim the first innings lead of 41 runs. Another satisfactory feature of the game from the Lancashire point of view was the excellence of the fielding, the juniors in this respect setting an example of keenness that unfortunately is not always present when the seniors are at Old Trafford.

To the surprise and disappointment of a small crowd Lancashire, quite safe from defeat, made no attempt to declare and try to force a victory, but contented themselves with playing patiently until half-past six. Full score and analysis:—

MINOR COUNTIES ASSOCIATION.

RETIREMENT OF DR. J. EARL NORMAN.

Dr. J. Earl Norman, who has been honorary secretary of the Minor Counties Cricket Association for 23 years, is retiring from that position at the end of the present season.

Mr. R. C. Cumberlege, who has been appointed in his place, was in the Durham School eleven in 1897-8-9, but, although elected captain for 1900, left school before the summer term of that year. He played for Durham County from 1900 to 1904, and again in 1907, and assisted Northumberland in 1910. For some years now he has lived in India, where he played a lot of cricket, especially in the Northern part, and he appeared for the Punjab in 1908 and 1909. Returning to England he took up his residence at Whitchampstead, in Hertfordshire.

YORKSHIRE II. V. LINCOLNSHIRE.

SPLENDID BOWLING BY DOUGLAS.

(By Our Special Representative.)

Scunthorpe, Friday. Lincolnshire, who have never beaten the Yorkshire Colts in their Minor Counties Championship matches since the war, have an increased batting strength this season, and they opened their match with the young Yorkshiremen on the Brumby Hall ground this morning with hopes that they would set themselves well on the way to victory.

The home side started well enough on a wicket that had been protected from the rain of Wednesday night, and, thanks largely to the whole-hearted batting of H. A. Bashforth, they were in a very satisfactory position by lunch-time. Then they had exactly 100 on the board, and with eight wicket in hand seemed set for a useful total, for the wicket was fairly fast and the wind was troubling the bowlers. Major Chichester-Constable, the Colts captain, tried five of his bowlers, including Turner and Douglas, who bowled against the Australians at Bradford, and Capt. Mark Sykes, a relative of the Sykes of Sledmere, who is making his first appearance with the Colts, but Bashforth was not worried a great deal, and he claimed 65 of the first 100, which were scored in two hours. Bashforth is one of the chief engineers at Frodingham and Appleby Steelworks, and as this match is being played on the ground of the works club, his success was popular.

He did not stay long after the interval, however, but for that matter none of the home county men did. Douglas, who had not done too well before lunch, profited by a rest at the interval, and afterwards he was practically unplayable. He had half-an-hour's bowling before rain came to interfere with the game for over an hour, and in that time he took two wickets in five overs without a run being scored off his spinning deliveries. After the rain he was even more deadly, and he quickly ended the Lincolnshire innings. In the 15 overs he sent down after lunch he had 10 maidens, and his 8 wickets cost 13 runs. His analysis for the innings was eight wickets for 32 runs, and at one point he bowled eight successive maidens. The young Bradfordian kept his length all the time and his breaks back had the home batsmen in constant trouble. Turner bowled well at the other end when Douglas was doing the damage, and Allen, who kept wicket finely, catching three men and stumping a fourth, had a share in the collapse of Lincolnshire, whose last seven wickets cored less than 40 out of a total of 143.

The Colts have every reason to be satisfied with their work. Their fielding at the start was a trifle patchy, but it improved considerably, and in the end very little was given away. T. A. Mallalieu, who plays with Slaithwaite in the Huddersfield League, distinguished himself with some fine fieldwork, and Barber (Spen Victoria) made the brilliant catch which dismissed J. B. Allen.

Mitchell, the young Saltaire batsmen, who did so well against the Australians, and Mallalieu opened the Yorkshire innings, and they scored steadily and well. The home captain bowled, and tried Harley, Billings, and Ure, but the batsmen were unbeaten when stumps were drawn. Their partnership has produced 46 so far, and with all their wickets in hand the Colts are very well placed. Present score and analysis:—

COLTS' EASY VICTORY OVER LINCOLNSHIRE.

Scunthorpe, Friday. Sound batting, a timely declaration, and brilliant bowling by Stanley Douglas, of the York Road Park Avenue Club, and Cyril Turner, of the Sheffield colts, gave Yorkshire a second 100 and a fine victory over Lincolnshire by six wickets and 29 runs on the Brumby Hall ground here to-day. Yorkshire declared at 3.15, when they were 72 on, and the attack at the start of the Lincolnshire innings was entrusted to Turner and Douglas. They shared 34 runs in the match.

Douglas, bowling the "spinner," and occasionally swinging the ball, had the home batsmen hopelessly puzzled. His first over was a maiden, and in his second he had a run scored off him, and he got the wicket of Bashforth with a ball that turned in at least half a yard. His next two overs were maidens, and produced a wicket each. Then three runs were scored off him and he got two more wickets, and had five wickets for five runs to his account. Turner had taken the wicket of Bashforth for four runs, and Lincolnshire had six down with only nine on the board. Wilson, the home batsman, and Tomlinson, who went in at the fall of the fourth wicket, put a stop to the run for a time, but the bowlers were irresistible, and the innings ended at 4.3. Douglas claimed seven wickets for 13 runs, and Turner three for 21. Altogether Douglas took 15 wickets in the match for 49 runs, and 21 of these were scored off him in the first innings before he got his first wicket.

The Colts were 97 behind and had all their wickets in hand when play was resumed this morning. Mitchell and Mallalieu took their partnership to 56, when the Lincolnshire amateur, who had an average of over 40 in the North Wales League last season, was "yorked" by Ure, the most successful of the Lincolnshire bowlers. He had scored 22 against a keen attack—the home bowling was of a consistently good length, and the bowling was quick and accurate—and had managed to give his side a splendid start. Mitchell, the quality of whose batting is already recognized, seemed set for a big score when he was stumped. He played at a swinging ball from Ure, slipped, and could not recover in time to beat the wicket-keeper. He hit 3 fours in his 39.

There was much promise in the batting of the other young Yorkshiremen. Barber, who scored close upon 1,000 runs with Spen Victoria last season, made the highest score of the innings—51—and he hit the only six of the match. He was confident and aggressive, and had the outfield been quicker would have had more than 5 fours in his account. His display suggests that more will be heard of him. The same may be said of Heybirt, from Tadcaster, who impressed good judgment with his batting last season. To-day he played equally for 26, and had several really pretty catches—Turner, with 22, Allen, with a characteristic 14—3 fours and a two—and Verity, who was unbeaten, all had a hand in taking the total to 215, when, with eight wickets down, Major Chichester Constable declared.

BOWLERS' HARVEST ON FIERY WICKET.

YORKSHIRE COLTS' TASK.

(From Our Own Representative.)

The Minor Counties fixtures between the Yorkshire Colts and Northumberland have frequently been marked by cricket out of the ordinary, with honours usually resting with those destructive bowlers, Hetherington and Milne. The match which began at Castleford yesterday maintained the reputation of these encounters, for it was as full of incident as any one could wish. In the course of five and a quarter hours actual play, thirty-one wickets fell for an aggregate of 322 runs. Yorkshire were set the task of making 101 runs in the fourth innings to win, and of these they had got twenty for the loss of one wicket before stumps were drawn; but under the conditions the 81 still required may prove too many.

This abject struggle for runs between teams which include a number of thoroughly capable batsmen was attributable partly, perhaps, in Northumberland's case, to some loss of confidence following a collapse for 45 against Lancashire, while the bowling on both sides was very good, but the principal cause was the lory state of the wicket. In a desire to make the wicket perfect, rather too much mair had been used, and under a baking sun the surface began to flake and crumble. The ball, besides coming off the pitch very fast, often had the batsmen completely at a loss by the way it got up or turned. C. Turner, the Yorkshire Colt, made the ball rear more awkwardly than any other bowler, and in the Northumberland first innings he took four wickets for 14 runs, despite two catches being missed off him. In the second innings, Douglas, who kept an excellent length, proved very difficult, his deliveries swinging in disconcertingly, and his figures were seven for 48.

A STRUGGLE FOR THE LEAD.

But though Northumberland were out for 83 in their first innings, six wickets at one period falling for the addition of eight runs, there was a keen tussle for the lead, Yorkshire requiring two runs when the last man went in; but eventually finishing with an advantage of 18. The best batting for the Colts was by Barber, who played a very attractive and resolute little innings, whilst H. W. Barratt, a young Skipton amateur, made a successful first appearance with the team, and was actually top scorer for his side. He defended steadily with a good, straight bat at a very trying time, and displayed some free-scoring strokes on both sides of the wicket, though occasionally he showed an awkwardness which detracted from his otherwise highly commendable effort. A. E. Mallalieu had a distinctly unfortunate experience. In the first innings he was caught when simply defending himself against a ball which got up dangerously, and in the second he was dismissed by a brilliant one-handed catch in the slips.

The outstanding feature of the day was the two admirable innings of Northumberland's opening batsman W. G. Mackay, who was the only man on either side really to master the bowling. His judgment was splendid, and he made his runs—32 and 29—most attractively.

Craig, the smart little Northumberland wicket-keeper, caused some liveliness in his second innings by hitting 4 fours and 3 twos in his 23; but just before the close of play, when Yorkshire were again at the wicket, he was unfortunately struck on the nose by a ball from Milne, and had to retire, Bruce taking the gloves.

Apart from the over-zealous preparation of the wicket, the Castleford club had made excellent arrangements for the match, the new pavilion being a very great improvement to the ground. In spite of the mining dispute, the attendance numbered over 2,000, miners being admitted at half-price.

CRICKET NOTES.

Pontefract's home game with Hull, on Thursday week, may be described, from the Pontefract point of view, as "Horner's match." What the town team would have done without him can only be surmised. As it was, they were handsomely beaten, but were unlucky, in that half of their wickets fell to run-out and lbw. decisions. Hull had their strongest possible side, with the exception of Horsefield for Walker, and as the substitute had easily the best bowling average of the day, he can be said to have merited inclusion. The sporting spirit of Wordsworth and his men in playing persistently week after week against full Council sides is something to be admired. Hull had first use of a very fast wicket. With Horner as the only regular bowler on his side, Wordsworth naturally expected a long spell of fielding. Hull played bright cricket all through, and were aided by dropped catches. They scored at the rate of 90 runs an hour, and declared with the total at 231, for nine wickets. When Crawford came out to bat he had a warm reception, in honour of his fine work for Yorkshire against the Australians and Surrey. The wicket did not suit Horner's style of bowling, but he had the batsmen in difficulties frequently. Runs were scored rather freely from him once the batsmen settled down, but he had the satisfaction of taking seven of the nine wickets which fell, for 103 runs, in 25 overs. W. Beaumont had 53 runs scored from his bowling without taking a wicket. Tonks, who had four overs only, took one wicket for 15 runs, and might have been given an extended trial. Sgt. Jones, took one wicket for 43 runs. James bowled seven overs for 16 runs without taking a wicket. It was the first match in which the Thursday eleven have had a really fast wicket, but they did not get very far. Wordsworth batted well, but with the score at 11 he lost Ollivierre, who was out to a doubtful lbw. decision. Four wickets were down for 34 runs only, and then Horner came in. His style is unorthodox, but he "gets there," and he certainly succeeded in knocking off both Crawford and Shaw, Hull's regular bowlers. Crawford had a very lean time, his only wicket costing 41 runs. Horner continued to hold the fort while other wickets fell. He pulled to the boundary several balls pitched on the middle wicket, and promised to reach his fifty, but the last wicket fell with the score at 103. Horner's share was 44 (not out), and included in the contribution were seven boundary strokes. Wordsworth (11) was the only other Pontefract player to reach double figures, so that the match almost resolved itself into Horner v. Hull.

Pontefract were not expected to win at Barnsley, on Saturday, for they had their weakest side of the season opposed to a very strong combination. Crofts was on holiday, and Horner also was an absentee. The result was that the bowling, on a wicket which delighted the heart of a batsman, received very severe treatment. Reynolds did his side a good turn by dismissing Hesketh, from Pickup's bowling, when the player had made two runs only, but Pontefract's success stopped here. There was a big stand for the second wicket, and, with the exception of Howarth, all the other Barnsley batsmen scored freely. The home team declared at 241, having lost only five wickets. Percy Burton, who rejoined the side after a long illness, had a turn with the ball, and took one wicket. Pontefract again failed to "get off the mark" with the bat. Blackburn was bowled before he had scored, Lovatt was run out, and Ollivierre caught before he reached double figures. Norman Mason (25) showed good form, and he and Pickles (16) made a fair stand for the fourth wicket. Twigger (13) showed that he is worth a regular place in the first team, and Pickup (13) had a short but merry innings. Guest (12) was batting well, when he was given out "hit wicket," and Smithies, who was included at the last minute to make up the side, was not out with eight runs to his credit. All told, the side totalled 114, leaving Barnsley very easy winners.

For their home match with Allerton Bywater, Featherstone were without Williams, their clever stumper, and one of their best batsmen. Yet they won by a very substantial margin, after scoring only 139 on a perfect run-getting wicket. The start was bad from Featherstone's point of view, Bradbury being dismissed before a run had been scored. James Denton batted with all his old freedom, and he and Thompson added 46 for the

second wicket, of which Denton's share was 28. With the score unaltered, Thompson, who had batted well for 17 runs, was out lbw. Harry Mann made an excellent defence against very good bowling, and S. Denton was showing his best form of the season when, on appeal from the fieldman, he was given as caught in the slips. Mason, who has had a lean time, batted for ten minutes without scoring. Hartington joined Mann, and the pair batted excellently. Hartington's clean, well-timed drives, and his general batting delighted the spectators. The pair added 32 for the sixth wicket, and then Mann was run out through a misunderstanding. He had made 27, and had rendered excellent service at a time when things were going none too well. Hartington's delightful innings was ended shortly afterwards by a catch by Robinson, and his 31 was the highest score on the Featherstone side. The innings closed for 139 runs—a small total on a wicket worth hundreds of runs. Crossland, who bowled much better than his figures would suggest, took three wickets for 43 runs. The veteran Buxton had four wickets for 37 runs, and Stead had one wicket for 15 runs. Small as was Featherstone's total, Allerton Bywater never looked like reaching it. From the start they were up against an excellent attack, skilfully used. Hartington bowled even better than he had batted, his length being almost perfect. With the exception of Marsh, not one of the visitors played him with confidence. He secured Barker's wicket with the score at 12, and claimed another victim in Nicholls with 14 runs added. Twelve runs later he took his third wicket. Meanwhile Marsh, who had opened the innings, had been playing very well. He lost Stead when 49 runs had been scored, saw Wall well bowled by Jim Denton five runs later, and was still batting well when Miller was sent back with the score at 61. A smart catch at the wicket ended Marsh's very valuable innings. He had made 36 runs in 78, and his performance stood out in bold relief against the meagre performance of the rest of the side. Hepworth hit up a lucky 13, but the end came with the total at 82, Featherstone winning by 57 runs. Hartington, who had two or three chances dropped, finished with the excellent figures of five wickets for 28 runs. James Denton's share of the spoils was three for 28, and H. Mann took two for 23 runs.

A full afternoon's cricket took place at Whitwood on Saturday, when Allotts West Riding Colliery provided the opposition. The visitors batted for two and a half hours in totalling 196. The best effort was made by Taylor, who, going in at the fall of the fourth wicket, was undefeated at the close with 66. I. Newton also played well, being only six short of the half century when he was given out for obstruction. The later batsmen were puzzled by Dunn's slow deliveries, and he bowled the last three. These were his only successes, however, and he had 53 runs scored off him. Tordoff took three wickets for 15 runs each, and Eavors and Eastland had one each for 25 and 26 runs respectively. Whitwood started disastrously, Tordoff being clean bowled by Abson with the first ball sent down. Rollins and Hind improved matters with a stand realising 33 runs for the second wicket, but after they left things went badly, half the side being out for 40. When the seventh man was out at 82, Whitwood's position appeared to be hopeless. Nodder and Baker surprised even their best friends by staying together for well over an hour and saving the game. They declined to take any risks until the last over, when Nodder wanted two to complete his second half century of the season. He attempted to drive Holmes to the boundary, but failed to get hold of the ball properly, and he presented White with the easiest of catches. It was a very hard luck, but he had the satisfaction of saving his side from defeat. When stumps were drawn Whitwood were 53 runs behind and they had two wickets in hand.

One of the surprises of the West Riding Senior League matches on Saturday was the victory of Pontefract over Knottingley. Pontefract certainly had ground advantage, but, considering that they had won only two matches in eight, and that Knottingley had won all the 11 matches played, the odds were on the visitors. "Billie" Ward, a Pontefract veteran, played the most prominent part. It was due to his splendid example and fine batting that Knottingley were beaten. Knottingley had first use of the wicket, and the Pontefract fielders had a broiling time in a hot sun, but they fielded excellently. The first wicket fell at 9, the second at 17, and the third at 20. A good stand by J. Collins (30) and E. Taylor (31) put on 34 runs, and Collins was unlucky in being run out. L. Wrightson (23) and W. Thompson (16)—whose luck turned at last—took further toll of the Pontefract bowling. The seventh wicket

saw the passing of the century, but the whole side was dismissed for 131. Shaw took 4 wickets for 52 runs, J. Garbutt (a new bowler) 3 for 19, and Burgoyne had 1 for 48. W. Ward and K. Hill opened the Pontefract innings, and the former won the honour of taking his bat out undefeated after compiling a well-hit 63. H. Ward (33) was the next highest scorer. The runs as the wickets fell were: 32, 71, 97, 102, and 144 for 5. Pontefract won comfortably by 5 wickets. J. Collins secured two wickets for 16 runs.

Fairburn had to meet a much stronger combination on Saturday in Methley, at Fairburn. Batting first, on a capital pitch, Fairburn scored only 73 runs, F. Ashton imposing the limitation by his effective bowling. He captured eight wickets for 22 runs only. K. E. Barker (3) headed the list of batsmen, and E. Main (16) ably seconded him. T. Main, who made his first appearance, played very creditably for his 11 runs before he was run out. Methley began strongly. Their first wicket fell at 16, and the second at 53, and the home total was passed with the loss of only these two wickets. Each of the four batsmen reached double figures. The match was Fairburn's fourth successive defeat.

With two wickets to spare, the Knottingley Second XI, playing on their own ground, beat Castleford "B." The visitors gained nothing by batting first. They put on 75 runs only, in small contributions, and after a great effort. Hepworth was in fine form with the ball, taking six wickets for 19 runs. Knottingley passed their opponents' total easily, although only three batsmen topped double figures. Arnold made 22—the highest individual score—before being run out. Only 5 extras were scored altogether.

Whitley Bridge are a tough handful on their own ground, as Crofton found to their cost on Saturday. Crofton occupy a much higher position in the League table than do their opponents, but their skill availed nothing. They began well, putting on 32 runs before losing a wicket. The second wicket fell at 44, but two more fell in quick succession for only two more runs. The fourth produced only 3 more runs. Toward the finish more spirit was shown, and 114 runs were made before the whole side was dismissed. Whitehead took four wickets at a little over 11 runs each, and James had 3 for 10 each. Whitley also opened well, and—what was more—they maintained a strong front. The 22 extras rather reflected upon the Crofton fieldsmen. Whitley ran out winners with the loss of six wickets only. Stead took five of the home wickets for 51, and Race one for 18.

The Aire and Calder club at Castleford continue to show good form. Yesterday week Fryston Colliery was visited and the Aire and Calder representatives won by 85 runs. They totalled 147, Tomlinson being top scorer with 33 and being well seconded by McNulty with 29. Apart from Butteridge and Farrant, Fryston fared badly before the bowling of Stead and Schofield and were all out for 62, 43 of which were contributed by the two batsmen named. Schofield took seven wickets for 33 runs, the other three falling to Stead for 26. On Saturday the Aire and Calder team accomplished a smart performance in defeating Ledston Luck Colliery at Ledston Luck. The homesters, who are in the top four in the Barkston Ash League, called on five bowlers and dismissed their visitors for 90, McNulty and Tomlinson again being the chief contributors. Ledston Luck made a poor response, being out for 57. E. Colly was the only double figurist. Stead dismissed seven opponents at a cost of 18 runs, and Schofield took three wickets for 32.

YORKSHIRE COLTS AT CASTLEFORD.

On Monday and Tuesday a Minor Counties' Cricket Championship was played on the Miners' Welfare ground, Castleford, between the Yorkshire Seconds and Northumberland. Excellent arrangements had been made by the local club, and there were between 2,000 and 3,000 spectators after lunch on Monday, miners being admitted at half price on production of their Union cards. The cricket was of an interesting nature, three innings being completed during the day, and when stumps were drawn Yorkshire required 81 runs for victory, and they had nine wickets in hand. Persistent rain on Tuesday delayed the resumption after tea, and then Larber and Turner knocked off the requisite runs in 65 minutes without being parted, the first-manned being the only player to exceed the half-century in the game. He carried out his bat for 52, and Turner was undefeated with 48. Yorkshire's victory was the first they have obtained over Northumberland for several years. The only local player taking part was Allen, of Castleford, who kept wicket in his usual good style for Yorkshire, but in batting he failed, being out in the first innings before he had opened an account, and he did not bat in the second innings.

Under the bright sun the wicket was exceptionally fast, and the pace of the ball beat many of the batsmen. Runs were thus never easy to get, and though Barber was compelled to play a large proportion of defensive strokes, and was badly missed at square-leg when five, he batted with a freedom which no one else showed, and obtained some mastery over the bowling. He made 56 in little over an hour, and altogether hit 7 fours in his invaluable 65.

Lincolnshire, who were rather weakly represented owing to several of their usual players being away on holiday tours, included a father and son in the team—J. N. Worman, head master of Donington Grammar School, and P. L. Worman. They won the toss, but Douglas and Rawlin, backed up by excellent fielding, bowled so well that in two hours and five minutes the whole side was out for 88. The Rev. H. Mack and G. Shaw attacked the bowling, but for the rest the innings was little more than a procession.

Except for the batting of Barber, and a spell of free scoring by Heyhirst, Yorkshire fared little better. E. H. Walker, of Pudsey Britannia, who batted very well at Driddington earlier in the week, was totally unable to time the ball, and Bowman, the Middlesbrough player, of whom local followers had high hopes, never settled down. Yorkshire gained a first innings lead of 60, but by careful cricket Lincolnshire going in a second time, put together 24 without loss, so that the visitors are now only 35 runs behind with all their wickets intact. A late start had been made owing to some of the Lincolnshire players being delayed, and it had been intended to play until seven o'clock, but bad light caused stumps to be drawn at half past six.

There was a notable change in the Yorkshire team. Allen, who has kept wicket regularly for the past six years, standing down to permit a further trial being given to Wood, the Bradford stumper, who has played for the Colts on several previous occasions when Allen has been engaged with the first eleven. Wood is quite young, and besides showing ability as a stumper has a good batting average, and much may depend upon his form up to the end of the season. YORKSHIRE COLTS WIN EASILY.

NOTEWORTHY BOWLING AND FIELDING.

(By Our Own Representative.)

Middlesbrough, Friday. Yorkshire Colts' success over Lincolnshire in the Minor Counties fixture on the North Ormesby ground was by the unexpectedly big margin of ten wickets, the task set them in the second innings being the merely formal one of making 17 runs.

Only 36 runs behind with all their wickets standing when play was resumed, Lincolnshire were expected to make a much braver show at their second attempt, particularly as the pace of the wicket had been eased by rain in the night; but again their batsmen proved no match for the Colts' attack. After the total had been taken to 71 for the loss of five wickets there was a complete collapse. Four more wickets fell without a run being scored and the innings closed for 76. All ten wickets went down in an hour and three quarters this morning for an addition of 52 runs.

Rawlin was not so effective as in the first innings, but confirmed the impression that he is the most promising fast bowler tried in the second eleven this season, while Douglas had a most successful time, his figures of six wickets for 27 runs in the second innings making his record for the match eleven wickets for 60 runs.

The fielding of the Colts was again excellent, Mallalieu at first slip taking four catches, one high up with hand outstretched being a specially noteworthy effort. Bowman, of Middlesbrough, was also very smart in the field and showed much better batting form when given an opportunity in the brief second innings.

The early finish was naturally a disappointment to Middlesbrough cricket officials, who still speak hopefully of the time when Tees-side will be included in the Yorkshire rota for First Class fixtures. The attendance on the present occasion has not been encouraging; but a keen interest in Yorkshire cricket undoubtedly exists, and ground improvement schemes are on foot which may bring local ambition nearer realisation.
