

CORNWALL'S COLLAPSE AT TRURO.

REMARKABLE BOWLING FEATS.

DEVON PLAYER INJURED.

The "glorious uncertainties" of cricket were once again demonstrated at Truro, on Friday, when Cornwall met Devon in a minor counties match. The day was fine with a strong breeze blowing across the pitch, following a night of heavy rain, and this caused a late start. Devon won the toss, and opened in a most careful manner. The spectators thought that Fulcher and Whitton were over-cautious, but either the pitch must have been tricky or the bowling was good. An hour was occupied in making 46 runs, and after lunch it took the same pair 25 minutes to add another dozen. Subsequent play, however, proved that the Devon batsmen were right, for when Fulcher, Whitton and Falding had been dismissed, and the other players took more liberties, the Devon side cracked up. For the loss of three wickets, Devon had scored 97 runs, but here something approaching a "rot" set in, and the whole side were out for another 33 runs.

CORNWALL'S INGLORIOUS DISPLAY

Cornwall's hopes ran high, but they were soon dashed. Bad as Devon's end had been, Cornwall's start was worse. It cannot be said that a "rot" set in, for the side never took root, and out of a miserable total of 53, Cory was responsible for 31, the whole side being dismissed in just over an hour. It was one of the most disappointing displays Cornwall has ever given against their near neighbours.

FROM THE BOWLERS' ANGLE.

There must be some explanation of this lamentable state of affairs, and the most feasible seems to be that it was a bowler's wicket. And surely the bowler is entitled to his fair share of credit! Too often the bowler is overlooked and almost the whole of the praise is lavished upon the batsmen. This is frequently done without thought, and not infrequently to the injustice of the bowler. The spectator loves spectacular cricket. He loves to see the batsman punishing the bowling, and he applauds with all his might when the batsman lifts the ball out of the field. But what about the feelings of the bowler when this sort of thing is taking place? Hence, it is, that when the bowler gets a pitch that really suits him and he triumphs over the batsmen, as was the case at Truro on Friday, the public should not go away disappointed, but should realise that they have witnessed an outstanding feat of prowess.

It is a long time since the bowlers on both sides have dominated the game to such an extent as they did on Friday—it may be a long time ere it will be repeated in county cricket in the Duchy.

HATS OFF TO THE BOWLERS!

All honour, then, to Jennings, Whitting, Kendall and Co. Jennings' analysis of 7 wickets for 7 runs, if not a record—no statistics are at present available—will take a lot of beating, and is one of which he may well be proud. Of Whitting, too much can hardly be said! Here is a man who has been playing in the county since most of the present generation can remember, and whose skill and vigour seem practically undiminished. Year after year, Whitting has proved not only the most reliable, but the most dangerous bowler that Cornwall has possessed. Rarely has he failed to take wickets—frequently the bulk of them, and to-day he remains the most useful bowler in the county side, and one who is practically indispensable. Friday's feat is one which should crown his declining years—declining, in a cricket sense. Five wickets for 37 runs is a good analysis, the merit of which is heightened by the further information that of the 39 overs he bowled, no fewer than 20 were maidens.

Kendall's name is not so well known in Cornwall county cricket circles. He hails from Liskeard, and his presence was more than useful to the side. He shared with Whitting the bowling honours, his average reading 5 wickets for 43 runs, with 9 maidens out of 26 overs. All the strength that Cornwall can obtain is to be welcomed.

Hats off! therefore, to the bowlers, whose day it undoubtedly was.

During the match, Amory, of Devon, had the misfortune to be struck with the ball. It is stated he has had his cheek bone broken, and there may be other injuries. He was taken to Truro Hospital, where he remains an in-patient.

FIRST DAY'S PLAY.

Tresawna did not play, as he was ill, and his place was taken by Rogers, of Camborne.

Play did not commence until 12.30, owing to the rain overnight. Devon won the toss, and Fulcher and Whitton were the first players in, Whitting and Beecher Williams taking up the bowling for Cornwall.

Play was slow, the batsmen being careful. When 21 runs had been scored, Kendall relieved Williams, and Baker relieved Whitting when the total had been taken to 35.

Whitting had bowled 12 overs, 5 of which were maidens; only 11 runs had been scored off him. An hour's play provided only 40 runs, and, at the luncheon interval, Devon had scored 48 without loss.

After lunch, the Devon batsmen again played very carefully, only 12 runs being added in twenty-five minutes. Cornwall's first success came when Devon's score was 66, Whitting being stumped by Bickford, off Whitting, after he had scored 30. Falding joined Fulcher, and, at 3 o'clock, Devon had scored 73 runs without further loss. Here Cory relieved Williams, and at 4.10, Fulcher was caught by Kendall, off Whitting, for 35. Fulcher had been batting for 2 hours and five minutes for his 35, which showed the careful nature of his play, more particularly when it is pointed out that, in his total, he had five 4's.

Whitting at this period had bowled 26 overs, 14 of which were maidens, and his two wickets had only cost him 21 runs. Major French now joined Falding, and the latter soon after sent a ball almost straight up in the air, and it was a lucky thing that no one was close, Beecher Williams just failing to "get there" in time. Falding gave another difficult chance off Whitting a few overs later. He atoned for this in the next over, when he drove Kendall to the boundary, bringing Devon's total to 90. In the next over, he repeated this, and then Kendall clean bowled Falding. Devon's total was now 97 for 3 wickets, and Falding's contribution was 25, scored much more rapidly than his predecessors; his 23 included three 4's. The century was got soon after, having occupied 2 hrs. 20 mins.

In the next over, Major French succumbed to a catch by Baker off Whitting. The total was 101, Major French now having added 5. Whitting's average was now 31 overs, 14 maidens, 24 runs, 3 wickets.

In the next over, Organ beautifully stopped a hot shot from Carroll, off Kendall, and Carroll was dismissed without falling. The total read 101 for 5 having scored. The game had then taken a sudden twist in Cornwall's favour. Light and G. B. Knapman now became associated.

The game continued to run strongly in favour of the home county. Knapman was caught and bowled by Kendall

without scoring, and Light was dismissed with a splendid catch by Cory at deep point off Kendall. Cory's effort was a fine one and was loudly applauded. Amory and Butcher were now partners, and the batting brightened. Here a most unfortunate incident occurred. Gardener threw in the ball at the moment Amory happened to be passing the wicket, and the ball struck him on the head, knocking him down. He resumed after a little time, but was out lbw. Jennings came in, but was stumped by Bickford off Whitting, and the innings ended at 4.20 for 150—a surprisingly small aggregate after the fine opening stand.

Whitting had the fine average of five for 37, and Kendall five for 43.

CORNWALL AT THE WICKETS.

When Devon had been dismissed, the teams adjourned for tea. Amory was unable to resume, and Gillie, an old College boy deputised for him in the field.

Organ and Cory opened for Cornwall to the bowling of Major French and Butcher. When 8 runs had been scored Light replaced Butcher, and Cory drove his first ball for 4. Jennings relieved French. In Jennings' first over Organ put an easy one to Whitton at short leg, off Jennings, and Cornwall thus lost their first wicket when 18 runs had been scored, Organ only having put on three runs.

This bad start was even more badly followed. C. S. Baker, the home skipper, filled Organ's place, and to the astonishment of the spectators, was out lbw. to the second ball he received off Jennings. Cornwall had thus lost two valuable wickets for 12 runs.

Rogers (G.) joined Cory, but did not remain long, being stumped by Carroll off Jennings after he had scored only a single. Three wickets were down for 18 runs.

Cunnack joined Cory, who batted steadily. With 30 on the board, Falding bowled in place of Light, and Cory drove him to boundary. In the next over Cunnack was lbw. to Jennings, after having made 4 runs out of the Cornwall total of 34.

H. Gardener was Cory's next partner. Having scored two 2's from successive balls off Falding, he returned one to the bowler's hands, but the latter failed to hold it. Just after 40 had been reached, Gardener swiped at one from Falding, and was clean bowled—43—5—4.

Roger Simpson was next in, and tapped Falding sweetly for 3 off the first ball he received—as a matter of fact, the first ball he has received in county cricket. From the next ball, off Jennings, he was clean bowled—46—6—3.

Kendall then joined Cory, and was caught by Carroll off Jennings—46—7—0. Whitting was next in, and was out to his first ball lbw. off Jennings, who thus brought off the "hat" trick—46—8—0.

Beecher Williams then joined Cory. With the aid of 4 byes, Cornwall reached the half-century after just over an hour's play.

Bickford was last man in, and made a single, thus giving Beecher Williams the bowling. The next ball saw the innings close, Williams being bowled by Falding. Cornwall's innings had lasted just over an hour.

Jennings had the wonderful average of seven wickets for 7 runs; whilst Falding took three for 16.

JENNINGS'S HAT-TRICK.

DISAPPOINTING END OF COUNTY MATCH AT TREBO

The most notable thing about the opening day of the Cornwall v. Devon Minor Counties Championship match on Trebo College ground on Friday was the poor show put up by the Cornish batsmen. They were all dismissed for 53, and three of them were the victims of the "hat-trick" accomplished by Jennings. Jennings got the remarkable average of seven wickets for seven runs. Cory was the only batsman to make a stand, the next highest score after his 31 being four.

FEW RUNS FROM WHITING'S BOWLING.

Devon won the toss, and Amory elected to bat on a wicket which rather favoured the batsmen than the bowler for the first hour or so, but which, as it dried, became much more tricky. E. A. Fulcher and F. E. Whetton were the opening pair, Whiting and Beecher Williams taking the bowling. The first ball of the match, delivered by Williams, was cut away by Fulcher to the boundary, and the next ball produced a single. No liberties were taken with Whiting's bowling, the Devon batsmen treating his deliveries so cautiously that his first two overs were maidens, and Whetton scored a single off the last ball of the third. Whiting's next two overs were maidens, and scoring was slow. Half-an-hour's play produced only 19 runs, five of which were scored off Whiting. With the score at 21, Kendall replaced Williams, and at 35 Baker relieved Whiting, who had bowled 12 overs, five of which were maidens, and the others had produced 11 runs. Fulcher put Baker away by square leg twice for four, and 40 was scored in an hour.

Re-summing after the lunch interval, Fulcher and Whetton batted as cautiously as ever, on a wicket which had got faster. Twenty-five minutes were spent in getting 12 runs, and when Whetton was stumped by Bickford off Whiting, 66 runs had been made in about an hour and a half. Falding joined Fulcher, and Cory took the ball from Williams, being the fifth man tried by the Cornish captain. Whiting, who was bowling consistently a good length, eventually captured Fulcher's wicket, Kendall holding the ball smartly in the second slip. Fulcher had batted two hours, making 35, including five boundaries.

Devon were two wickets down for 77 when Major the Hon. E. G. French came in. The total of 90 was reached when Falding knocked Whiting to the boundary. Just after Falding was dismissed by a low ball from Kendall, having compiled 23 (including three 4s), Carroll joined French, and three runs were added, making the total 100 after 2½ hours' play. Major French's innings was cut short by Baker, who caught him off Whiting, after he had made five. Carroll also did not stay long, at the wicket, and had not broken his "duck" when he was caught by Organ off Kendall.

When Knapman came in five wickets were down for 101, and only six runs were added before he was very cleverly caught and bowled by Kendall, without having scored a run. Amory, the Devon captain, had been at the wicket a very short time before Light was dismissed, after scoring seven, being smartly held by Cory at deep point, from Kendall's ball. The score was 108 for seven vic-

kets, four wickets having fallen for eleven runs. When Butcher joined Amory the batting was the brightest seen for the match so far. Amory was knocked out by a ball thrown in by Gardener. He resumed after a little attention, but was given out lbw a ball or two later, having made eight. Whiteway Wilkinson, who followed, but out at the second ball he took, missed it, and was bowled. Jennings (T. S.) was the last man in, and he was stumped by Bickford five minutes after the innings closing for 130.

CORNWALL'S POOR START.

Organ and Cory opened what proved to be a very poor reply to the Devon score. French and Butcher opened the attack, and before a dozen runs were scored were relieved by Jennings and Light. Scoring was very slow, and only 12 had been registered when Organ put up an easy catch, which Whetton at short leg had no trouble in holding. Another wicket fell without the gain of a single run. The second ball Baker had to deal with got him out lbw. Rogers (G.) got a single before being stumped by Carroll off Jennings. F. M. Cunnack then joined Cory, who hit up a couple of 4s, and Cunnack added four runs, but the latter was seen on his way back to the pavilion, given out lbw to Jennings, who was proving a very tricky bowler on a wicket which suited him admirably. Gardener had a narrow escape when Falding missed a catch, and the ball went on to the boundary for the four which was Gardener's only score. He was bowled by Falding soon after, and Cornwall had lost five wickets for 13 runs, compiled in about 50 minutes.

Simpson, the young Penzance player, nicked the first ball he played in county cricket away for three; the second ball, delivered by Jennings, clean bowled him. Kendall's stay was even shorter. He was out first ball through a smart catch behind the stumps by Carroll. Jennings completed the hat-trick by getting Whiting out lbw with his next delivery. Eight wickets had fallen for 16 when Beecher Williams went in. Another eight runs were added, and then Cory, the only batsman to exceed a score of four, gave a chance off Falding's bowling, and was caught out by Knapman, having played a good innings of 31, including four boundaries. Williams was joined by Bickford, but the brief partnership produced one run only. Williams was bowled without having scored, and the innings closed for 53.

About half-an-hour remained for play, and Devon opened their second innings with Fulcher and Whetton, Kendall and Whiting taking the bowling. The first wicket went before a run was scored. Whetton sent up a skier, and Gardener caught him smartly. Major French followed, and at the close of play Devon had made eight.

The game was resumed on Saturday in very dull weather, E. A. Fulcher and Major the Hon. E. G. French coming out to bat on a fairly easy wicket. Two maiden overs were bowled before any runs were scored, Fulcher hitting the last two of Whiting's second over to the boundary. Fulcher, who was missed by Kendall when the score stood at 11, was 20 minutes scoring 11 runs before his wicket fell to Whiting's bowling. Falding joined French, but he had a short stay, being run out through a smart return by Gardener after scoring eight. F. H. Carroll came in when three wickets were down for 30 runs. Fifty was registered after seventy minutes' play. Carroll was bowled by Cory after he had scored five, in a partnership which yielded 11 runs in 28 minutes. Light and French put on 23 runs before French was given out lbw. He had been batting for two hours and a quarter, and had scored 31 runs. Rain fell when the score stood at 65. Light and G. B. Knapman resumed, but the latter had only score three before he was sent back to the pavilion, being given out lbw to Whiting. Two balls later E. G. Butcher was clean bowled by Whiting without any addition to the score. In the next over Light was caught and bowled by Kendall after he had scored 18. The players then re-

turned for lunch with eight Devon wickets down for 87, but rain began to fall and continued throughout the afternoon. Further play was impossible, and the game was left drawn scores.

CHANGES IN COUNTY XI. FOR RETURN MATCH WITH DEVON

If there was one redeeming feature in Cornwall's display against Devon at Truro last week it was their fielding. Never have I seen the Cornish side field better, and some of the catches that were held were really brilliant, especially that of Cory, which doused Light, and the one that was held by Kendall. Fielding, however, good as it may be, does not win matches, and therefore one is not altogether surprised at the sweeping changes that have taken place for the return match at Plymouth on Friday and Saturday of next week.

As I mentioned last week the general impression was that the team for last week's game did not represent the full batting or bowling strength of the county, and the Selection Committee have now made a determined effort to remedy their previous mistakes by omitting five players, viz., H. Tresawna, Beecher Williams, K. Simpson, J. Beckford, and H. D. Gardener, and filling their places with Commander Gillespie, S. Rust, R. J. Holman, A. Ford, and W. Rogers.

Many would still like to have seen J. E. Mill, the Camborne bowler included in this year he is bowling better than ever he has done, but the success of the Liskeard bowlers (Kendall and Whiting) cannot be overlooked, and the committee have done quite right in trying to strengthen up the batting. The passing over of two such players as H. Tresawna and Beecher Williams however, is to be regretted, as no one has served the county better than these two players have done, but even they cannot go on for ever.

The return of R. J. Holman is one of the most amazing things in Cornish cricket. Twenty years ago the Camborne player could claim a regular place in the County XI, without serious opposition, but having been out of county cricket for such a long period, and then to return to the side, and at the age of 56 years, speaks volumes for his ability and fitness.

At the beginning of the season in a conversation I had with Holman on cricket in general, and without the slightest idea of his then being selected to play for the county, he casually remarked that he was just as fit today as he was 30 years ago, and his performances this season have fully justified his then optimism. In fact, Holman this season has been one of the great successes of the Camborne side. With G. Rogers (will the Cornish captain please note) these two players have proved themselves to be as good (if not a little better) a pair of opening batsmen in the county, and if the best is to be got out of them they will do it if called upon to open an innings.

As a left-hand slow bowler, also, Holman has lost none of his skill, and one can safely say that neither of the Devon batsmen would have daltied with the Cornish bowlers as they did at Truro had they been faced with Holman. The Camborne player can certainly be depended upon not to let the side down.

The Penzance players and supporters alike will certainly feel pleased at the inclusion of S. Rust, and there is no doubt the honour is fully deserved.

Jack Beckford has done well, but he is not the wicket-keeper he was, and as a batsman there is no comparison between him and the Penzance player.

The argument that is often put forward that Rust does not stand up close enough to fast bowling, but there is no bowler in the county side today who can be classed as fast, and the possibility of a good score from Rust is always likely.

It is rather a pity that a promising young player like K. Simpson should be dropped after his first match, but he can take consolation from the fact that many other players in Cornwall have been treated similarly in past years.

In fact, this way of doing things seem to be one of the chief characteristics of the Selection Committee. Simpson, however, can rest assured that his day will come. After all, he is only just 17, and the mistake seems to have been in selecting him so early, as county cricket is a different matter altogether than school cricket.

A new-comer to the side is A. Ford, the Penzance player, and it is to be sincerely hoped that he will be able to accept his place. A brilliant bat, and a good slow bowler, he will prove a decided acquisition. Before coming to Penzance Ford played for Scotland, but business ties have kept him out of the Penzance XI altogether too often.

Now that the county has made a call on his services, one can only hope that some ways and means may be found so that he can play.

The last change is the Camborne professional, W. Rogers, for H. D. Gardener. It was generally thought that the pro. would come into the side sooner or later, and there is no doubt he is a very useful player. Gardener got his place through a very fine innings in the county trial, but, curiously enough that has been his best innings for the season.

Taking the team as a whole, it is certainly a great improvement on last week's. The committee have succeeded in strengthening the batting without interfering with the bowling. In fact, the latter has been considerably strengthened, as Ford, Holman and Rogers are all bowlers to be treated with respect.

One would not help but feel exceedingly sorry for the accident which befell Mr. J. H. Amory, at Truro on Friday afternoon.

The Devon captain has been a most prominent figure on Cornish grounds since the war, and his presence is always sought after when Devon are the visitors. That such a sporting captain should have been knocked out in the unfortunate manner he was regretted by all who witnessed the accident, but everyone was delighted to know that he was well enough to visit the ground on Saturday, and hope that he will soon recover from the effects of the blow.

A WET WICKET.

After a glorious spell of fine weather, all local cricket had to be abandoned on Saturday through rain. Although the rain fell in torrents no one appeared sorry, for it was badly wanted, and should do the hard baked grounds a lot of good, besides bringing the grass back to its natural green colour.

No League cricket was to have been played on Saturday, so the friendly matches that were cancelled were not of serious moment. Next Saturday the League struggles will again be resumed.

THE SUMMER GAME.

RAIN WINS COUNTY MATCH AT TRURO

Cornwall's fixture with Devon on Truro College ground on Friday and Saturday, was a disappointing affair, and was marked by the amazing collapse of the Cornish batsmen, who were dismissed for 55 runs in their first innings, in reply to Devon's 130. The cricket was rather slow, a strong and well-varied Cornish attack was treated with great respect by the Devon batsmen, who in six hours of occupation of the wicket scored 117 runs for the loss of 18 wickets, an average of 12 runs per batsman. The rate of scoring was less than 40 an hour, and the spectators were disappointed at not seeing any bright batting. No play was possible after lunch on Saturday, owing to rain, and the game had to be abandoned. The result will count as a draw, Devon taking two extra points for leading on the first innings.

Winning the toss, Devon took first knock and opened cautiously. The Cornish fielding was very keen and only 20 runs were put on in half an hour, when Whiting had sent down eight overs (six maidens) for five runs. Baker and Kendall had a spell at bowling, but the opening batsmen, Fulcher and Whiting, were still together at the lunch interval, the score then being 48, raised in an hour, and ten minutes. On resuming, the rate of scoring continued painfully slow, only 23 runs being added in 30 minutes, with the score at 66, Whitten was smartly dismissed by Bickford, after being at the wicket for 90 minutes for 30. Fulcher, at 77, was caught by Kendall off Whiting. Fulcher was caught two hours and five minutes to make 117. Then the Cornish attack got the upper hand. Whiting bowling particularly well, successive batsmen went until, with the score at 108 for seven wickets, Capt. Amory and E. G. Butcher (the Plymouth Abbot and International Rugby player) made an attempt to stop the rot. In running, the Devon captain received a nasty blow from the ball from a swift throw, and had to receive attention before he could resume play. Two balls later he was given out for obstruction. It was feared he had fractured a cheek bone. The innings closed for 130—a small total after nearly 70 runs were raised for the first wicket. Whiting claimed five wickets for 37, and his clubmate, Kendall, who proved an acquisition to the Cornish attack, got five for 45.

Cornwall early met with a series of unexpected reverses; three good batsmen—Organ, Baker, and Rogers—were dismissed for 12 runs. Cory and Cunnaack succeeded in carrying the score to 34, but half the side were out for 43. The rout continued, Cory alone offering any resistance. Jennings was almost unplayable with his slow left-handed deliveries all round the wicket. Simpson, Kendall, and Whiting succumbed to successive deliveries by Jennings, who thus completed the "hat-trick," and came out with the remarkable analysis of seven wickets for seven runs. Cory played an invaluable innings for 31. He was the ninth to leave, having lost his wicket in an attempt to force the game when his side was in a hopeless plight. In just over an hour Cornwall were disposed of for 55. It is believed that only on one previous occasion has Cornwall made such a small score, and that was many years ago, when they were skittled out for 32 by Kent 2nd XI on the Tremorvah ground.

Starting their second innings on Friday with about 20 minutes left for play, Devon lost Whitten for one run, and when stumps were drawn they had added seven runs without further loss. Resuming on Saturday morning, the Devonians increased their overnight score to 21 before Fulcher fell a victim to Whiting. The Hon. E. G. French and Falding took the score to 39 before the latter was run out. Carroll remained with French for nearly half an hour for the addition of only 14 runs, the former then being clean bowled by Cory. Rain interrupted play for about 20 minutes. When play was restarted the Hon. E. G. French was out l.b.w. to Kendall after batting for 1½ hours, during which he made 31 runs. Light was at the wickets nearly 40 minutes to collect 18 runs. The sixth wicket fell at 117, and two more dropped at the same total. During the lunch interval rain came on and prevented the resumption of play afterwards. About 4.30 o'clock it was decided to abandon the game. Scores:—

CORNWALL'S COLLAPSE AT CAMBORNE

WAS THERE AN ERROR OF TACTICS?

Cornwall established themselves strongly in their Minor Counties engagement with Monmouth at Camborne at the close of the first day's play on Friday. After an unpromising start, six wickets being down for 62, the Cornishmen's outlook was improved by a capital stand by the brothers W. and G. Rogers, whose partnership yielded 118 runs, and the innings closed for 242. Monmouth were disposed of for 125 and could have been compelled by Cornwall to follow on on Saturday morning, but the Cornish captain decided to put in his side to bat again. The result was disastrous for Cornwall, nine wickets going down for the paltry score of 25, and again a last wicket stand by W. Rogers and Whiting produced 30 runs. The innings closed for 55. Monmouth were faced with the task of getting 173 to win, and with this they accomplished with one wicket to spare. The wisdom of Cornwall's policy in not forcing Monmouth to follow on was a debatable point during the game, and many people attributed Cornwall's defeat to this error of tactics.

Cornwall won the toss and batted first. C. Shaw Baker and Organ putting on 20 runs in as many minutes. With 30 runs on the board Organ succumbed to a catch at silly point by Raikes of Harris. Baker remained 49 minutes before falling to a catch at mid-on. Cory and Holman only made brief stays, and Blight, a Callington player, who shined well in his first appearance for the county, was unlucky to be run out through obeying a call for a short run.

With half the side out for 62, Cornwall's position was not hopeful, but when the brothers Rogers, Camborne's pair of "pros," became associated in partnership, their fortunes changed. Both men took a little time to settle down against the strong attack by Harris and Raikes, but gradually they gained a mastery over the bowling and runs came at a merry pace. They took the score to 100 without further loss at the lunch interval, and on resuming W. Rogers twice hit deliveries by Harris out of the ground. The brothers reached the half-century within a few minutes of each other, but in attempting a big hit W. Rogers was caught on the boundary line. The partnership yielded 118 runs in 80 minutes. It was a coincidence that the two brothers made an equal contribution of 59 runs each. It was the brightest and most productive partnership in Cornwall county cricket for a long period. George Rogers was clean bowled by Harris, two balls after his brother's departure, without adding to the score.

Treasawna, the Cornish skipper, made his first appearance in the county side this season and with Rust, who scored freely, the double century was reached before Treasawna was caught in the slips. Rust carried on the good work, ably supported by Whiting, and the score was taken to 242, obtained in four hours, the last wicket having put on 35 runs. Harris bowled unchanged throughout the innings, sending down 40 overs, and his six wickets cost 92 runs.

Monmouth opened their innings after the tea interval. Raikes and Stokes being opposed by Kendall and Holman. Stokes soon fell to Holman, but Boughton and Raikes took the score to 46 before Boughton was smartly caught by Organ of Holman, whose next ball got Raikes' wicket, and three batsmen had departed for 54. Baker went on vice Whiting at the town end and his slow break balls puzzled the batsmen. Hugh Jones and L. B. Williams falling victims in successive balls. Half the side were disposed of for 54. Ralph tried to stop the rot, but after making 27 he returned the ball into Baker's hands, and eight wickets had fallen for 105. Wilcox and Meas added 19 between them, and Monmouth's innings realised 125 runs, or 117 behind Cornwall's total. Baker had a splendid analysis of 5 wickets for 31 runs, and Holman was next best with 3 for 35. It was the cleverness of that pair of bowlers, coupled with the brilliant stand by the brothers Rogers, which placed Cornwall in such an advantageous position over their Welsh visitors.

An Unusual Procedure.

Cornwall, who led by 117 runs on the first innings, could have compelled Monmouth to follow on as they were more than 100 runs behind, but the home county did not insist upon this course being taken, and decided to take a second knock on Saturday. The object, presumably, was to ensure a fair day's cricket, but this unusual procedure did not consolidate the home county's position. Baker was out in the second over after scoring a single, and Cornwall never recovered from this early setback. The Monmouth bowlers, Harris and Raikes appeared to have the Cornish batsmen in a knot, and no enterprise was put into the attack, with the result that nine wickets had fallen for the meagre total of 25 runs. Whiting and W. Rogers in the last wicket partnership lived things up a little, and there was applause when Rogers hit a boundary. The pair made a respectable and acceptable stand for 30 before Rogers fell a victim to a catch off a powerful hit in deep field, and the innings closed for 55—probably the lowest total Cornwall has ever been dismissed for.

Monmouth were set with the task of getting 173 runs to win, and they succeeded in knocking off 32 without loss before the lunch interval. On resuming only seven runs had been added when Raikes was taken by Rust behind the stumps after collecting 30 out of 39. Stokes and Jones were sent back without any addition to the score, and with three wickets down for 39 the trend of things were not unpromising for the Duchy men. Jenkin and Boughton stemmed the tide and several changes were rung in the Cornish bowling, but runs came at a fair pace. A separation was not effected until 83, when Boughton was caught by W. Rogers. Then Williams assisted Jenkin to hoist the century, and one run later Jenkin was dismissed. Baker was again put on and his over cost 14 runs, Ralph hitting one of his deliveries into the Vicarage grounds for six. The Cornish, feeling became loose and the Monmouth batsmen took full advantage of it. At 135 Ralph was beautifully caught by Organ, and Phillips was bowled by Baker without opening his account. With the total at 150 Williams was stumped after collecting 30 runs and Monmouth required 23 runs to win with two wickets still to fall. When the last batsman went in Monmouth were still 35 short of the requisite number of runs to ensure victory, and after Rust twice missed Harris the batsmen did the needful, and Monmouth were victors of a game in which there was a considerable fluctuation of fortunes by one wicket and two runs.

MONMOUTH'S EXCITING WIN.

FRIDAY'S PLAY.

After drawing with Devon at home and away, Cornwall met Monmouthshire in their third game in the minor counties championship at Camborne on Friday. The weather was ideal, and the wicket was easy and in good condition. Cornwall won the toss and decided to take first knock. C. Shaw Baker and P. Organ facing K. C. Raikes and Harris (G.).

Each bowler had a maiden over before Baker opened the score with a single off Raikes. Organ set the next delivery to boundary, but careful play was the order of things, and the batsmen seemed content with singles for some time. Twenty was registered in as many minutes, Baker making some delightful leg strokes. The Cornishmen appeared to get set and runs came more freely, Baker getting a boundary and a three. The fielding was particularly keen and few chances were given the batsmen.

After half an hour's play, Organ was beautifully caught by Raikes at silly point of Harris. He made 9 of the total of 32. Cory followed on with Baker, and after fifty minutes' play, to which the latter contributed 27, he was caught by Williams at mid-on.

R. J. Holman partnered Cory with the total at 43, and with only six added to the total, the Redruth pro. was caught by Wilcox behind the wickets with ten to his credit, and the total at 49 for 3. Rogers (G.) was the next to go in, but the partnership was of short duration. Holman fell to a tempter by Raikes and was caught by Williams after contributing a brace. Things were looking serious for the homesters, four wickets having fallen for 58 after 70 minutes' play. Raikes and Harris gave some tricky deliveries which completely puzzled the batsmen. Blight in trying to get a run from a short hit was run out. Half the side had been dismissed within 90 minutes, and with the total at 62, Rogers (W.) went in with his brother, and Meas bowled vice Raikes at the town end.

The Camborne pros. made things merry, and the century was soon registered. In twenty minutes, they took the score from 72 to 100, and, at the luncheon interval, the total was 108. Rogers (G.) was 29 not out, and Rogers (W.) 20, not out.

On resuming, the Camborne men again batted with confidence, and treated the bowling of Harris and Raikes with contempt. Rogers (W.) lifted the former into the yard of Dolcoath mine for six—the finest hit of the innings.

R. Rolph took the place of Raikes, but the change proved of no advantage. With two nice cuts that went to the boundary, Rogers (G.) got his fifty after being at the wickets for sixty-three minutes. The total now stood at 140, and, a few minutes later, Rogers (W.) made his fifty, after being in for seventy-six minutes. With the total at 180, Rogers (W.) was caught on the boundary by Meas; the partnership had lasted eighty-two minutes, and had yielded 118 runs. Rogers' (W.) score included five 4's, and two 6's. Only two runs had been added to the total when Rogers (G.) was bowled by Harris; he was, up to this time, the only batsman to be so dismissed. Curiously enough, he made the same score as his brother, and, in the 50, were nine 4's. Both innings were delightfully played, without a chance being given.

H. Trezona and S. Rust brought the total to 200, after the game had been in progress for four hours. With three to his credit, the Cornish skipper was caught in the slips by Hugh Jones. Rust hit out merrily for his thirty-nine, and the innings closed with the total at 242.

MONMOUTH'S RESPONSE.

A slight mist hung over the ground when Monmouth opened their innings after the tea interval. Raikes and Stokes faced Kendall and Holman, and, with the total at 20, Stokes was beaten to the wicket by Holman, and came back to the pavilion with one to his credit. Boughton got Kendall away for a couple of boundaries in one over, while Raikes scored fairly fast. With 46 on the board, Boughton tried to get Holman to the leg, but was caught by Organ. With the next ball, Holman had

Raikes' wicket with a similar delivery to that which proved Stokes' undoing. Three wickets had now fallen for 46.

SATURDAY'S PLAY.

Cornwall opened their second innings on a good wicket and in fine weather.

H. Tresawna and C. Shaw Baker started, but, with his first ball, Harris sent Baker back with only a single to his credit and the only run scored for the day.

Cory partnered the home skipper, but there was a quick separation. The Redruth pro. played on, and was badly beaten by Harris after having made 6.

The homesters had not lost two wickets for 13 runs.

A. H. Blight tried to stop the "rot," but the Monmouth bowling was deadly, and, with only 2 added to the total, Tresawna fell another victim to Harris.

Rogers (G.) became associated with the Callington man, and here again the partnership was of short duration. With the total at 29, Rogers was caught by Wilcocks behind the wickets, and Blight was caught by Raikes off Harris. Half the side were dismissed in 40 minutes.

The "rot" continued, and, with the total still at 20, Organ was given out l.b.w.

After making a single, Rust was caught by Wilcocks off Harris. Holman was bowled by Raikes and Kendall caught by Meas.

In an hour, 9 wickets had fallen for 25 runs.

The only bit of luck in the game fell to Rogers (W.), who had made the only boundary in the innings up to this time, and who was given a "life" before he had opened his score.

Whiting and the Camborne pro. made the longest stand, and, with a couple of 4's and a single, brought the total to 50 runs after 90 minutes' play. These batsmen, who were very uncomfortable for some time, appeared to get more settled, and Rogers had got Harris into the deep field when he was caught by Jones.

The crowd disputed the catch, but the umpire after conferring with Jones, gave Rogers out, and the innings closed for 55 runs, leaving Monmouth to get 173 runs to win.

Raikes and Stokes opened confidently and when the former had made 14 out of a total of 19, he was given a "life" in the slips by Kendall.

The batsmen hit Whiting and Holman all over the field. Then Kendall bowled vice the Camborne man, and at the luncheon interval Monmouth had made 34 without loss—Raikes not out 27; Stokes not out 7.

On resuming after lunch Raikes took his score to 30, when he was nicely caught by Rust behind the wicket.

Then followed a little of what the Cornishmen had experienced earlier in the day. With the total at 39, Stokes was dismissed for 9, and Hugh-Jones fell to Whiting. Three wickets were down for 39, and within ten minutes of the resumption, Boughton and Jenkins were making a stand—although scoring slowly—when Baker took over the bowling at the town end. This proved of no avail, and 60 were registered just under the hour. Boughton got the Penzance captain out of the field for 6, and treated his deliveries with scant respect. With the total at 83, Boughton was caught by Rogers (W.) after a bright innings of 24.

The telegraph registered 101 when Jenkins was also caught in the slips after making 23.

Baker was put on to bowl again, and Rolph got him into the vicarage field for 6, and the over yielded 14 runs. The telegraph registered 120 for 5.

CORNWALL v. MONMOUTH.

VISITORS WIN EXCITING GAME BY ONE WICKET.

Delightful weather favoured Cornwall's game with Monmouth in the Minor Counties' Championship, which commenced on the Camborne ground at Roskear on Friday. Thursday's brilliant sunshine had dried up the wicket nicely, and the Cornish captain, on winning the toss, had no hesitation in taking first knock.

C. Shaw Baker and P. Organ opened the innings, and the bowling was shared by H. C. Rakes, the Monmouth captain, from the top end, and Harris, the Abernarn professional. Both bowlers opened with a maiden over, and then Baker got a single off Rakes, which was followed with a boundary by Organ. Runs continued to come slowly, the fielding being very keen, but 20 were registered at the end of 20 minutes' play. Rakes had a "leg" trap set for Baker, and the Penzance player did not seem at all comfortable.

Twice he was struck on the leg with fast deliveries, but he afterwards got one through the fieldsmen to the boundary. With the score at 32 Cornwall's first wicket fell, Organ, in attempting a big hit off Harris, being finely held by Rakes at silly point. Cory followed, and runs still proved difficult to get. Eleven later another disaster befell Cornwall, Baker being caught by Williams after having scored 27 out of the 43 runs on the board. This was at the end of 50 minutes' play. Cory, Holman and Blight were dismissed without any serious addition to the score, and with five wickets down for 62 matters were looking none too rosy for the Cornishmen.

A FINE PARTNERSHIP.

Three-quarters of an hour still remained till lunch when W. Rogers joined his brother George, and so confidently did these two bat that they were still together when the adjournment took place. W. Rogers then being 20 and G. Rogers 20. At lunch the score was 108 for five.

The attendance considerably improved when the game was resumed, and the brothers Rogers at once settled down comfortably. The state of the game was far too precarious to take risks, and neither batsman took any. Gradually the score, and Cornwall's position, was certainly being retrieved when the 150 was signalled with the two batsmen still together. W. Rogers hit one of Harris' deliveries into the Doleath yard for a six—a fine hit—having just previously got a six of the same bowler. The score was advanced to 180, and then the partnership came to an end, W. Rogers being caught practically on the boundary line by Meas from a lofty hit. With his brother he had assisted in putting on 118 runs for the sixth wicket, being at the wickets just over an hour and a half for 59 runs. His best hits were two 6's and five 4's.

Two runs later George Rogers also left, being bowled by Harris, with a ball that just caught the top of the bails. George Rogers' score was curiously enough the same as that of his brother, and incidentally it was the best innings of the day. His chief scoring strokes were nine 4's.

Another useful stand was made by S. Rust and Whiting for the last wicket, the Penzance player being in a very aggressive mood. One glorious pull from Rakes for a six was included in his score of 39, and eventually the innings closed for 242, a much bigger total than at one time looked probable.

Harris bowled throughout the whole of the innings, which lasted until nearly four o'clock. Altogether he bowled 40 overs, and took six wickets for 98 runs.

MONMOUTH'S REPLY.

Monmouth opened their innings after the tea interval with K.C. Rakes and A. B. Stokes. The bowling was shared

by H. P. Kendall (top end) and R. J. Holman. Rakes at once commenced to show fine form, and by free cricket scored 19 out of the first 20 runs, at which total Stokes was clean bowled by Holman. E. A. Boughton followed, and after hitting Holman to the boundary for four, he got two successive fours off Kendall before being caught by Organ in the slips. Rakes was also bowled by Holman, and the Camborne pacer thus claimed the first three wickets for 21 runs out of a score of 44. Whiting, who replaced Kendall, and later changed over with Holman, did not meet with any success, but Baker, on coming on at the top end, obtained two wickets in his opening over, and with five wickets down for 54 runs Monmouth's position looked pretty hopeless. Cornwall's fielding was very keen. Baker often had the batsmen in difficulties, although R. Ralph played him with considerable confidence, until in attempting a big hit for six, he sent one back straight to the bowler, and was caught and bowled. Ralph's 27 was a welcome contribution, and after his departure Meas was the only other batsman to give any trouble, and the innings closed for 125 runs, which gave Cornwall a lead of 117.

CORNWALL'S COLLAPSE.

The weather was again delightfully fine on Saturday morning, and with the wicket in a perfect condition the Cornish captain decided to go in, instead of compelling the visitors to follow on. As events turned out this proved to be a fatal policy.

The Cornish batting order was changed, Tresawna opening the innings with Baker.

Rakes bowled from the Pavilion end on Saturday morning, and two singles came in the first over. Harris, with his first delivery from the top end, completely beat Baker, and so fast did the wickets fall that nine were actually down for 25 runs. Cornwall's overnight advantage was therefore completely wiped out. The only semblance of a stand was made when W. Rogers, who had gone at the fall of the fifth wicket, was joined by Whiting, and to show that all the other batsmen's form was wrong, these two defied the attack for 40 minutes, and took the score from 25 to 55, at which total Rogers was magnificently held by Hugh Jones in the long field. There appeared to be a considerable amount of doubt as to whether or no the fieldsmen had taken the ball from off the ground, but the umpire rightly decided otherwise.

Cornwall's wretched display left the visitors with 173 runs to get to win, and as they obtained 32 of this number before lunch without loss, their task appeared quite an easy one when the game was resumed.

A QUICK CHANGE.

There was a surprisingly quick change, however, after lunch, and three wickets went down for nine runs in as many minutes. Hugh Jenkins was missed by the Cornish captain, who collided with the umpire at square leg, and the score went along merrily. 130 was on the board with only five wickets down, but five runs later Organ held a terrific drive from Ralph, and with F. G. Phillips being bowled by Baker without any addition to the score, excitement began to rise higher. Holman was again tried, and he at once got Meas lbw. At the fall of the eighth wicket the Monmouth total was 150, and when Meas left it was 158. Wilcox was then joined by Harris, 15 runs being required to win. Singles came slowly, and when Wilcox got a four the breach was considerably lessened. Wilcox appeared well out of his ground to a delivery from Baker, but escaped, and another single made the position that Monmouth required three to win. There was tense excitement when Holman delivered the last over of the game. The first delivery was stopped, but the second Harris hit for four, and thus won the game for his side by the narrow margin of one wicket.

CRICKET GOSSIP.

(By LEG-BYE).

CORNWALL'S AMAZING DEFEAT.

It is so easy to be wise after an event. If the Cornish captain could have foreseen what would have happened on the Camborne ground on Saturday he would probably have made Monmouth follow on, as he was entitled to do, instead of putting Cornwall in to bat again.

The cause of Cornwall's defeat, however, cannot be put down to the fact that he decided to go in to bat, as nearly everyone who mattered were of the opinion that this was the proper course to adopt. The wicket was equally as good as Saturday morning as it was on Friday, and Mr. Tresawna would have been as much justified in putting Monmouth in to bat on Friday, after winning the toss, as asking them to follow on on Saturday, and no one would have agreed with him if he had adopted this course.

The real cause of Cornwall's defeat must be put down to their wretched batting display. One would have hardly thought it was possible for nine good batsmen to have been dismissed for a paltry 20 runs, and yet this is what actually happened. The Monmouth bowling on Saturday was no better than it was on Friday. Baker was dismissed with a ball that ought easily to have been sent to the boundary, and after that it was a sorry spectacle so far as batting was concerned.

That the bowling could and ought to have been collared was clearly shown by Whiting and Rogers, and with all due respect to the former, who cannot be classed as a batsman, it might be stated that he never looked like getting out. Rogers was to some extent unlucky in being out as he was, as it was up to him to get runs, and the hit which was marvellously scooped up by Hugh Jones was well worth a four.

Cornwall's overnight position was such a good one that no one ever anticipated a defeat on Saturday, and therefore the result was much more of a disappointment than it otherwise might have been. Monmouth batted pluckily at their second attempt, although once or twice it looked as if they would fail in their objective.

The experience of Wilcox and Harris, their two professionals, in the concluding stages, served them in good stead, and it was perhaps a little lucky for Monmouth that less experienced players were not in the side.

At the same time the great majority of those present could not understand why the Cornish captain did not call upon either Cory or W. Rogers to bowl when Monmouth were fighting so hard for their runs. Time after time he tried all the other bowlers, but these two were entirely ignored. It might easily have been a different result if either had a chance.

Another Eastern representative has been tried in the Cornish side, and failed, and at the present moment it really does look as if Whiting and Kendall are the only two players who can produce anything like county form so far as the East is concerned. A. H. Blight, of Callington, who made his first appearance for the county in this match, is either a very ordinary player, or else he was overcome by the occasion. His batting was very weak, but his fielding on Saturday was distinctly good, and a great improvement to that of Friday, when he allowed several balls to pass by.

Whiting again demonstrated what an asset he has been, and still is, to the county XI. He was engaged in two useful batting partnerships, and although he did not get his usual number of wickets, his bowling throughout was admirable. Prior to this match Whiting wanted five wickets to complete a record of 700 wickets for Cornwall. He got four. It was rather a pity he did not get another, as these records arouse much more interest on a home ground than they do on away grounds, and Whiting is almost certain to set up this record in his next match.

It is not often that anything in the nature of a controversy arises over the dismissal of a batsman in a county match, but it did on Saturday morning over the dismissal of W. Rogers, although in the writer's opinion there is not the slightest doubt but that Rogers was fairly caught out. He got in one of his lofty hits off Harris, and Hugh Jones ran inwards, and with his hand practically on the ground, scooped the ball up, and Rogers was given out. It was a wonderfully fine catch, but some of the crowd immediately alleged that the ball had touched the ground. The umpire, however, was very firm about his decision, and there is no doubt he was right.

CORNWALL ON TOUR.

After the county match at Camborne on Saturday the Cornish side to go on tour was chosen as follows:— H. Tresawna (captain), C. Shaw Baker, F. Organ, S. Rust, R. J. Holman, K. C. B. Webster, H. P. Kendall, Rogers (W.), Rogers (G.), Whiting and Cory, with Beecher Williams as twelfth man.

With the exception that K. C. B. Webster displaces A. H. Blight, of Callington, the side is the same, that lost to Monmouth. K. C. B. Webster is attached to the London Dental Hospital, and has the reputation of being a right hand fast bowler. If this proves correct, he is probably just the type of bowler that Cornwall has been looking for.

There was no League cricket in the western section of the League on Saturday, owing to the county match, and the friendly games that were played between the various teams did not reveal anything of outstanding merit.

Next Saturday the League games will again be in full swing, the principal matches being Redruth and Penzance at Redruth, and Falmouth and Camborne at Falmouth.

CORNWALL WIN.

THRILLING FINISH AT LISKEARD.

SPLENDID BOWLING.

Cornwall achieved a sensational victory over Dorset in the Minor Counties Championship match at Liskeard yesterday, winning by an innings and 39 runs when, up to within half an hour of time, the only possibility appeared that the home county would take five points for a first innings lead.

Cornwall compiled 194 in their first innings but on a drying wicket Dorset were always in difficulties and dismissed for 92 had to follow on. With only 35 minutes remaining—65 if there were any possibility of a definite finish—victory for Cornwall seemed impossible, yet so well did Whiting and Pentecost bowl that, with 8 minutes to spare, Dorset were dismissed for 63 runs.

Cornwall's success was in no small measure due to clever bowling by F. Whiting, the Liskeard professional, who turned and served the ball with great effect during the match, and took 13 wickets for 67 runs.

Wednesday's play only yielded 20 minutes' cricket, and yesterday, when Cornwall continued their innings, 33 runs had been scored without loss. Up to lunch time there appeared every prospect of the home team putting up a big score. The wicket was not difficult, and after Tresawna had been smartly taken by Busk at mid-on, the second wicket yielded 43 runs. The cricket, whilst interesting, was slow, the ball only once reaching the boundary in an hour's play, whilst Cornwall took 2 hours to score 103 runs. The partnership between Cory and Baker was broken when the latter was caught off the edge of his bat, having batted for nearly an hour for 19 runs. A hit by Cory to the leg boundary sent up the 100 and his own 50, and thereafter, though a double change of bowling was made, runs came a little quicker, the lunch interval total being 151 for 3.

DRAMATIC CHANGE.

After the interval there came a dramatic change in the game, four wickets falling in three overs for only one run. Cummins first got Rogers caught, the Redruth batsman having been rather fortunate in his innings of 26. Rust, after giving a chance from the first ball he received, was caught by Harrison in the same over, and Rundle had the misfortune to be dismissed leg before wicket before he had scored.

Further disaster for Cornwall followed, for Cory, who, except for a difficult chance when 37, had played a faultless innings, was caught. The left-hander scored most of his runs with hard drives in front of the wicket, and his total of 76 included two 6's and four 4's. None of the tail batsmen made a stand, and the innings closed for 134. Harrison, who pluckily bats one-handed, was the most successful bowler, taking 6 for 61.

WHITING'S OPPORTUNITY.

The wicket was damaged and drying quickly under a hot sun when Dorset commenced their innings, and Whiting, quick to appreciate the conditions, early got Tabor caught. Indeed, as bats fell steadily, the only batsman to appear comfortable being Busk, a stylish player, whose fielding had previously been very smart. His innings of 46 was perhaps the best of the day, full of forceful, wristy strokes. He tried hard to prevent a follow-on, and was himself the last man out, but Dorset had to bat again.

At first it appeared to be a case of playing out time, but as wicket after wicket fell to the bowling of Pentecost and Whiting, the possibility, at one time remote, of a decisive win for Cornwall, became apparent. The first wicket fell with only 4 runs scored, and an astonishing collapse followed, four wickets falling whilst the total remained at 10. The sixth wicket fell with the total at 23. Then Cummins and Chadwick came together in a short stand. Chadwick, however, was bowled by Whiting, and 20 minutes remained, in which Cornwall had three wickets to capture.

SPORTING FINISH.

Dorset played a sporting game, batting normally when time was invaluable and runs practically useless. Seventeen minutes remained when Whiting caught Bower, and Harrison, the one-handed batsman, faced Pentecost. He scored a single off the last ball of the over, and Tabor, one of Dorset's best batsmen, played a careful over against Whiting. Harrison got a single off the first ball of the next over, but Tabor could not get the necessary run, and with Whiting's first ball of his next over Harrison was caught. Eleven minutes remained when the last batsman came in, but Whiting cleaned bowled him with the only ball he received. It was a magnificent climax, and both Whiting and Pentecost were enthusiastically cheered.

THE SUMMER GAME

On the first innings Cornwall led by four runs, and Herts knocked up 176 runs in their second innings, thus setting Cornwall to get 173 runs to win. The Cornishmen got the necessary runs for the loss of only two wickets, Cory scoring 109 not out. Other features of the game were the splendid batting by C. Shaw Baker in the first innings, and the remarkable bowling form of Whiting, who claimed 12 wickets for 127 runs.

Herts won the toss and began batting on an easy wicket. G. R. Walker and C. B. Fordham, the opening batsmen, were opposed to A. N. Tilly and Whiting. Runs came steadily and 30 was reached in the first half-hour. Whiting had bowled five successive maiden overs before Titchmarsh hit him for a single. The half-century was reached in as many minutes. Half the side were out for 36 after 90 minutes were out for 58 after Titchmarsh, when he had played 40, was fortunate to escape being caught by Cory of Pentecost. At the lunch interval Herts had scored 128 for the loss of five wickets. After lunch a change came over the game, the Herts innings being concluded soon after 3 o'clock for 167 runs. Whiting bowled unchanged throughout, proof of his deadliness being reflected in the fact that he bowled 21 maidens in his 38 overs, and took four wickets for 48 runs.

Cornwall lost Tresawna when 11 runs had been scored, and Cory and C. Shaw Baker took the score to 40 before Cory was out for obstruction. After contributing 11, G. Rogers was clean bowled, three wickets being down for 58. Things were not going well for Cornwall, Tilly and Rust being disposed of for an addition of 19 runs, and half the side were out for 77. The outlook for Cornwall improved when P. Harvey joined Baker in a sixth wicket partnership which produced 60 runs. Harvey, who is a Blundell's School player and lives at St. Columb, proved a valuable recruit to the county team, and gave promise of developing into a first-rate batsman. He always played the Herts' bowling with a nice blend of caution and aggression, and some of his hits were very powerful. His contribution of 32 helped to lay the foundation of Cornwall's lead on the first innings. Shaw Baker, who was in his best form, played in his usual polished style and was the saviour of the side. After the departure of Harvey there was no prolonged stand, but 31 runs were required by Cornwall to gain a first innings lead, and they were obtained, thanks to Baker's great effort. Two successive boundaries by Baker put Cornwall ahead, and the innings closed for 171. Baker, who went in at the fall of the first wicket, was undefeated at the close, his contribution being 75.

The game took a surprising turn soon after it was resumed on Tuesday. In less than three-quarters of an hour no fewer than five of the Herts' batsmen had been dismissed for the remarkably low total of 23 runs. Whiting having taken the whole of the wickets. A bright innings of 35 by Dumpleton stopped the rot, and Crossman, with a steady 24, brought the total to 105 for eight. The next wicket fell at 110, and the innings should have ended at this point, but Shaw Baker missed Evans, and the latter and Rogers added another 66 before Rogers was bowled, this pair having made 86 between them. At one period of the innings Whiting had the remarkable average of six wickets for 28 runs.

Cornwall were left with a total of 173 to get to win when the game was resumed after lunch. Tresawna and Cory opened the batting, and 41 had been scored before Tresawna was dismissed. C. Shaw Baker joined Cory, and the score was taken to 83, when Baker was caught behind the wicket. Rogers (G.), Camborne, joined Cory, who had been batting freely, and this pair took the score to 175 without loss, thus enabling Cornwall to win by eight wickets. Cory had the satisfaction of making 109 not out, for which he was loudly applauded. It was a very fine effort, but was marred by a couple of chances, Dumpleton and Titchmarsh failing to hold catches. CORNWALL BEAT DORSET BY AN INNINGS

Winning by an innings and 39 runs, Cornwall achieved a sensational victory over Dorset in the Minor Counties Championship at Liskeard on Thursday. Up to within half-an-hour of time it seemed as though Cornwall would only take five points for a first innings lead. In their first innings Cornwall scored 194, but Dorset were dismissed for 92, and had to follow on. For Cornwall, victory seemed impossible with only 35 minutes remaining—65 if there were any possibility of a definite finish. But Whiting and Pentecost bowled so well that Dorset were dismissed for 63 runs with eight minutes to spare. Whiting took 13 wickets during the game for 67 runs.

Wednesday's play only yielded 20 minutes' cricket, and on Thursday, when Cornwall continued their innings, 33 runs had been scored without loss. The wicket was not difficult, and after Tresawna had been smartly taken by Buck at mid-on, the second wicket yielded 43 runs. The cricket was interesting, but slow. Cornwall took two hours to score 100 runs. Cory, who, except for a difficult chance when 37, had played a faultless innings, was caught. He scored most of his runs by hard drives in front of the wicket, and his total of 76 included two 6's and four 4's. The innings closed for 194. Harrison, who bats one-handed, was the most successful bowler taking six wickets for 81. When Dorset went in to bat wickets fell steadily. Only Busk, who scored 47, was able to settle down. His batting was one of the best displays of the day. Six wickets fell for 28. When the last batsman came in eleven minutes remained, but he was bowled by Whiting with an only ball he received.

CORNISH CRICKET.

HOW THE CLUBS FARED DURING THE SEASON.

The Cornwall County Cricket Club may view the results of the season's play with fair satisfaction. Cornwall finished tenth in the Minor Counties table, with a percentage of 42.5. This is a much better result than at one time seemed possible. The results were: Played 8, won 2, won on the first innings 1, lost 1, lost on first innings 4.

The match lost against Monmouth at Camborne should have been won, and the game with Herts was very close, Herts leading by four runs only on the first innings. Rain seriously interfered with the progress of several other matches.

C. Shaw-Baker and Cory have again been the mainstay of the batting and have averages of 35 and 29 respectively. Rogers (G.) has much improved this season as a county player and has been quite useful, while Rust has done well behind the stumps and occasionally with the bat.

Whiting has had another wonderful season with the ball, securing 52 wickets at an average cost of 12.5 runs. He has now taken well over 700 wickets for Cornwall in Minor County games. Kendall has done moderately well, but has been hampered by an injury to his arm. The prospects of the club are very hopeful. The financial position is now much sounder than at some former periods, and the playing strength for next year should be strengthened with such men as Ollerearnshaw, K. C. B. Webster, M. Tilley, and N. Harvey available. The interest in county cricket in Cornwall is well maintained and is probably greater than at any previous time.

THE LEAGUE.

One of the keenest fought competitions in the history of the Cornwall Cricket League was brought to a conclusion when Camborne and Lanhydrock, met in the final game on the Camborne ground on Saturday. The competition is now divided into three sections, and 18 clubs have been engaged, eight in the West, four in the Mid-Cornwall section, and six in the East. This year it was arranged to play off the final games between the leaders in the sections by means of a draw. The East drew the bye, and passed into the final, and the leaders of the other sections had to play a semi-final.

It is still a little doubtful whether this is quite a fair arrangement, as the struggle in the Western section is so strenuous that an advantage seems to lie with the smaller sections. In the East a replay was necessary, Fowey and Lanhydrock having tied, and Lanhydrock won the game. Truro won the Mid-Cornwall section comfortably.

In the West there has been a hard struggle. Penzance and Camborne early showed their superiority, and the former, by winning both their games with the latter, seemed to have an excellent lead, but they lost games against Truro and St. Just, and so a replay was necessary in this section also. This game, played at Penzance, was won by Camborne after a good game. Camborne very easily disposed of Truro in the semi-final on Friday, and then almost as easily accounted for Lanhydrock in the final.

By winning three important games in a week the Camborne club are the cup-winners for 1927, and it must be generally agreed that they have thoroughly merited this honour.

They are under a considerable obligation to Holman, who has contributed very materially to their success, and has had a remarkable season for a player of his age. During the final game Mill took his 100th wicket for the season, and has bowled well for the club.

WEST'S ADVANTAGE.

One cannot refrain from commenting on the relative strength of the clubs in West Cornwall and those from other parts of the county. Unless there is considerable improvement in the standard of play the West seems certain to win the cup each year. Lanhydrock did pretty well to get the Camborne side out for 132, but then gave a very poor show with the bat, being quite unable to play the bowling of Holman and Mill.

This game gave an opportunity of seeing K. C. B. Webster, a fast bowler who had been selected earlier in the season for the County XI., but had been unable to play. He took 7 wickets for 41 runs, and certainly impressed the crowd as probably the best fast bowler seen on the ground for some time. He should be of considerable help to the county side next year.

It now seems likely that the League Committee shortly will have to consider several proposals of great importance to the game in Cornwall, which have arisen out of the past season's experience. It is now proposed to form an 'Umpires' Association, somewhat analogous to the Referees' Associations in Rugby and Association football.

If such a scheme is found workable it is likely to solve the difficulty now obtaining. It is also felt that some organization should be vested with authority to deal with clubs on whose grounds unpleasant incidents arise, for which spectators are predominantly responsible. This is an urgent problem, and requires careful handling.

There is very little doubt that the 1928 season will start with improved arrangements in these matters, and possibly with the scope of the League extended to include most of the junior leagues now existing in the county.

CORNWALL COUNTY CRICKET.

PREPARING FOR NEXT SEASON.

Cornwall County Cricket Club Committee had an important agenda at their meeting at Truro yesterday, Mr. H. Tresawna presiding.

Subsidies for 1927 to clubs and professional were granted to Redruth £10, Camborne and Liskeard £15 each, Penzance and Truro College £5 each.

Mr. A. C. Polwhele, hon. treasurer, reported a credit balance of £73 10s. on current account and £107 19s. on deposit. The subsidies brought these credits down to about £130. He had not yet prepared details of the "gates" for the past season, but on the whole they were down. At Liskeard the receipts did not cover expenses. Generally the expenses were rising by leaps and bounds. On the season, with its bad weather, there was an approximate loss of £100.

DEFICIT PROBABLE.

The Chairman said there was a probability of a deficit in the neighbourhood of £75, and they would have £100 to meet it. The club would thus be solvent, and that was about all.

Mr. Beecher Williams (joint hon. secretary with Major Godfrey T. Williams): We are lucky to be solvent. Many a county is the other way.

Mr. Elliott said Liskeard Club had the greatest difficulty in paying their way, and they would not be justified in re-engaging Whiting without knowing if they would be able to pay him. The cost was about £100 a year. If the county were prepared to help, Liskeard would like to retain Whiting, at any rate, for another season.

Mr. Beecher Williams said Whiting had been and was still a valuable asset, and if the county could help Liskeard to keep him they would be helping themselves also.

The Chairman said they ought to do their best to keep Whiting in Cornwall. It was resolved, on the proposition of Col. Protheroe-Smith, to make Liskeard a total grant of £25 for 1928 in order that they might retain Whiting's services.

The application of Ollerearnshaw (Penzance) for an increase of salary in winter was regretfully refused on financial grounds.

NEXT SEASON'S MATCHES.

Mr. Beecher Williams said Hertfordshire were unable, on the question of terms, to come into the Cornwall fixture list next season, but Berkshire were willing to step into the breach.

The committee accordingly approved the following home matches for 1928:—

- Surrey 2nd, June 20-21, at Penzance.
- Devon, June 29-30, at Truro College.
- Dorset, August 15-16, at Liskeard.
- Monmouth, August 17-18, at Penzance.
- Berkshire, August 27-28, at Camborne.

It was decided that the Colts v. Schools be played, and that East v. West take the place of Probables v. Possibles on Truro College ground.

Mr. Maclean (Camborne) asked that two county matches be played there. Cricket, he wrote, was going with a swing at Camborne, and the club were contemplating improvements on the ground, especially stand accommodation for the public.

Cornwall's away matches are:—Devon, July 27-28, at Plymouth; Monmouth, July 30-31; Surrey 2nd XI., August 1-2; Berks, August 3-4; Dorset, August 6-7, at Bridport.

NEW PROFESSIONALS.

On the question of qualifying another professional, the Selection Committee recommended the engagement of a left-hand slow bowler, and from 80 applicants they had chosen F. Lee, of Taunton, who had played for Somerset eleven times, and W. H. Davis, of the Cardiff Club, who had played for Glamorgan. The committee further recommended that the professional be allocated to Redruth Club, and that he be paid by the county not exceeding £1 per week for 32 winter weeks.

These recommendations were adopted, and the appointment was left to two members of the County Club and two from Redruth Club.

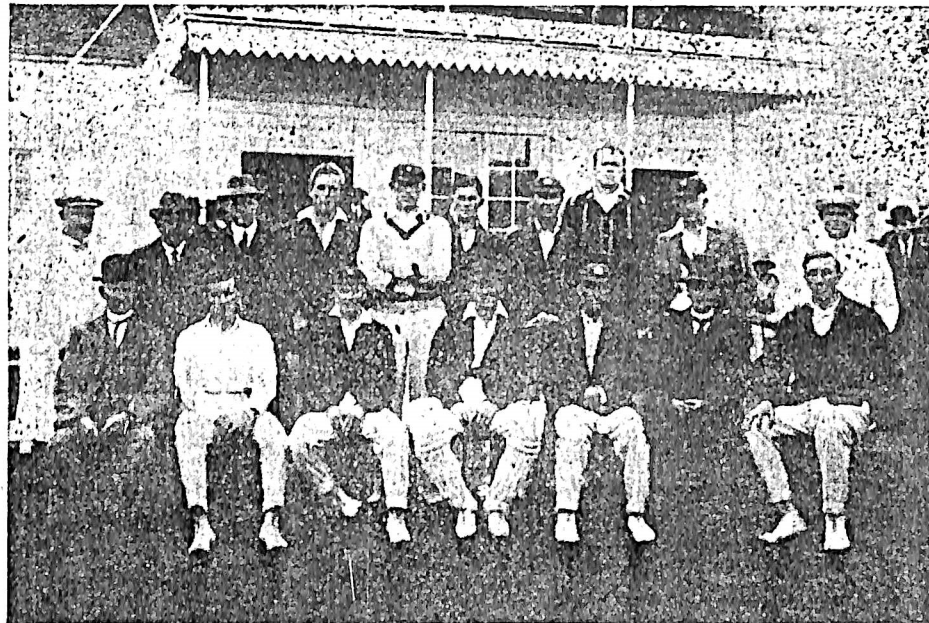

FAMOUS CRICKETERS AT PENZANCE

VISIT OF MESSRS. HOBBS AND STRUDWICK

PENZANCE V. WEST CORNWALL XI.

Thanks to the enterprise of the Penzance Cricket Club and the sporting spirit of the players in various parts of the county, Jack Hobbs, the famous Surrey cricketer, who is universally admitted to be one of the finest batsmen in the world, and H. Strudwick, England's greatest wicket-keeper, were induced to visit Penzance, and two matches were arranged in which they participated. An additional attraction was the inclusion of J. J. Bridges, the Somerset batsman.

The first of the matches was arranged for Thursday, when Penzance met a West Cornwall XI. Hobbs and Strudwick were included in the Penzance side, whilst Bridges played for the West Cornwall side, which also had the assistance of Frank Whiting, the popular Cornish bowler, and who for a number of years assisted Penzance.

Unfortunately, the weather proved most unkind. Rain fell throughout the greater part of Wednesday and also during the night, and Thursday dawned with heavy skies, and threats of rain, which were soon fulfilled, although the wind had veered round to the north.

This proved a great disappointment, as the fixture had been looked forward to with great interest throughout the locality, and there was no doubt that had the day turned out fine there would have been a record attendance, and that the spectators would have been treated to a fine all round display of cricket.

The game was timed to start at 11.30 a.m., and just at this period there was a slight break in the clouds, and there were spots of blue sky. But this was only temporary, and soon again rain was falling pitilessly, driving from the field all but the most ardent supporters of the game and the officials.

The ground was rain-soaked, and there were pools of water close to the prepared pitch, where previous matches had been played.

The officials, however, had taken all the precautions they could to meet such a possible emergency, and the pitch itself was covered with a strip of matting.

It soon became apparent that there would be no play at least before lunch, and, to avoid any undue delay, it was decided that this should be partaken of soon after mid-day instead of at 1.30, as arranged.

Just before 1 p.m., there was a fitful gleam of sunshine, which was quickly blotted out, rain again descended, and the sky became even more overcast.

SUNSHINE AFTER RAIN.

At 2 o'clock it was still raining, but just at this period a change came over the horizon of the Bay, where the clouds assumed a lighter hue. This gradually spread, particularly towards the west. Still there was a huge bank of black clouds in the northern sky, from which direction the wind was blowing.

Hope springs eternal in the human breast, and particularly in the breasts of cricketers, who are so accustomed to the vagaries of the weather and the startling changes in the game.

The rain ceased, the sky was brightening, and there came a stirring among the little knot of enthusiasts who up to this period had braved the elements.

Then a bright blue patch appeared in the sky and rapidly spread, and the sun itself shone out at 2.30.

Hope was superseded by almost certainty, and spectators paraded the ground and inspected the pitch, whilst the members of the teams began to prepare for active operations.

The favourable omens continued overhead, till there was practically a blue sky. The temperature also improved, and soon the forms in front of the pavilion—which had been exposed to the whole of the weather—had dried up.

At five minutes to three, the bell sounded, and the umpires inspected the pitch.

THE GAME STARTS.

After a momentary flash of the sun, the sky again became overcast. The teams were photographed, and at 3.15, Hobbs and C. S. Baker opened the game for Penzance, to the bowling of Whiting and Bridges. Hobbs took the first over facing Whiting. This over yielded only a single.

Runs came rather slowly, and a quarter of an hour elapsed before 10 went up. Trevarthen here took the ball from Whiting, and in this bowler's first over Hobbs hit the first boundary for the game.

P. H. Kendall, who had taken Lugg's place, relieved Bridges, and Baker sent him to the boundary.

When 40 had been scored, rain again began to fall, causing the players to return to the pavilion and an abandonment of the game.

PENZANCE v CORNWALL XI.

PENZANCE, Friday.

The second of the two matches arranged by Penzance Cricket Club in connection with the visit of the famous cricketers, J. B. Hobbs and H. Strudwick, was played at Penzance, on Friday, when a Penzance XI met a Cornwall XI. Hobbs and Strudwick were included in the Penzance side, whilst the side was further strengthened by the inclusion of J. J. Bridges, the Somerset cricketer, who played vice F. Hutchens.

The Cornwall side was a representative one, and included most of the players who had represented the county in the minor counties championship.

The weather was a complete contrast to that of the previous day. The wind had continued from the north, and whilst the morning dawned with a somewhat overcast sky, this cleared long before the start of the match at 11.30, and the sun shone quite brightly. This, combined with the north-easterly wind, had its influence on the ground, which dried rapidly.

Cornwall won the toss, and opened their innings with H. Tresawna and G. M. Cunnaack (Helston). Bridges and Hobbs took the bowling for Penzance. When the game opened at 11.45, there was a fair attendance.

Neither Tresawna nor Cunnaack seemed happy with Bridges' bowling, and, after a quarter of an hour's play, Cunnaack fell a victim to this bowler after having made only 3 runs—9-1-3.

P. Harvey, of St. Columb, who played at Penzance for Cornwall against Herts, and who shaped so promisingly, filled Cunnaack's vacancy. Harvey at first did not appear to be able to time accurately Bridges' deliveries, being frequently too late with his strokes. But, having broken his "duck," he drove Hobbs to the boundary in a far more hopeful style, and then treated Bridges in similar fashion.

In the same over Bridges was "no balled," but with his next delivery he knocked Harvey's middle stump out of the ground, after the latter had made 9-21-4-9.

M. Tilley succeeded Harvey, and Ollerearnshaw took the bowling from Hobbs.

Ollerearnshaw was not long in securing his first success. He had beaten Tilley on more than one occasion, and then scattered his stumps after the batsman had only scored a single—25-5-1.

W. Rogers (Camborne) now partnered Tresawna, and scoring proceeded steadily. Eventually Rogers was caught in the slips by Ollerearnshaw off Bridges, after making 4-39-4-4.

Bridges had been transferred from the county side to Penzance side, and his place was taken by R. J. Ward, of the Scilly Isles. Before he could get settled, however, he was bowled by Ollerearnshaw—40-5-0.

P. Polglase was next in, but Ollerearnshaw scattered his stumps with the first ball he received—40-6-0.

P. K. Webster then became Tresawna's partner. C. S. Baker took over the bowling from Bridges, and secured Webster's wicket in his first over—41-2-0.

P. Whiting, who was the next batsman, was greeted with a round of applause.

Gordon Rowe relieved Ollerearnshaw with the ball, and Whiting drove him to the boundary. At one o'clock the half-century was hoisted.

Shortly after Tresawna gave an easy chance to W. J. Rogers, of Rowe, but the ball was dropped.

In the next over, however, Rogers made no mistake when Whiting proffered him with another chance. Whiting's stay had been short, but he added 11-2-1-11.

Beecher Williams, who is skipping the county side, took Whiting's place. Williams narrowly escaped being run out from a smart throw in by W. J. Rogers, and 60 was hoisted. Soon after Williams was caught by Gordon Rowe off Baker—42-9-2.

Unfortunately W. D. Cory, who has been playing for Redruth this season, and who made a century, not out, recently at Penzance against Herts, was unable to play, and his place was taken by N. D. Thomas, who now partnered Tresawna for the last wicket. J. C. Baker joined his father in the bowling, and Thomas put the latter to the boundary.

Roger Simpson relieved C. S. Baker, and Bridges took the place at the other end of J. C. Baker, and after a single over, gave place to C. S. Baker Thomas put up a hefty hit, which Simpson dropped in deep field. This was proving the best stand of the game, and the score gradually mounted, and 80 and then 90 were telegraphed. Bridges took the bowling from the road end, where he had not with his successes in the earlier portion of the match. In the next over, Thomas was smartly caught by Strudwick, and the innings closed for 97. Tresawna had carried his bat through for 12, his innings being marred by only one fault.

The teams then adjourned for lunch.

PENZANCE AT THE WICKETS.

Somehow, events happened just as they ought to, to-day. By winning the toss, Cornwall had enabled Penzance to be at the wickets after lunch, when, as might be expected, there was a greatly augmented attendance, and the spectators had thus an opportunity of witnessing Hobbs bat—which, of course, was primarily the object of the fixture. The weather, too, as if to atone for the previous day, actually improved after lunch; the wind dropped, and the sun shone out with quite summer warmth.

Penzance opened their innings with Hobbs and C. S. Baker, to face Beecher Williams and Whiting. Runs soon came readily.

Hobbs sent Whiting to the boundary, and hit up his next delivery, where Harvey had a dimurt chance in the field. Harvey actually handled the ball, but was unable to hold it.

After 35 minutes' play, 60 was signalled.

Webster relieved Whiting at the road end, and W. Rogers bowled vice Williams at the Trencres end. Runs came freely, and the public were getting what they had paid for, an exhibition of polished batting.

Tilley relieved Rogers after 70 runs had been scored, and then, after 80 had been registered, Beecher Williams took the ball from Webster.

Just before 4 o'clock the century went up, with the same men still at the wickets. Then came the eagerly anticipated event, Hobbs was clean bowled by Beecher Williams, with his score at the level half century.

Rust joined Baker and Whiting went on in place of Tilley, and Rust was stumped in the first over after the change—11-2-2.

Strudwick joined Baker, who batted merrily, eventually taking a victim to Williams, who caught him off his own bowling—120-3-62.

Before 130 had been reached, Ward missed an easy catch from Strudwick off Williams, and then Bridges was bow to Whiting 133-4-7.

Ollerearnshaw joined Strudwick, and was also bow to Whiting in the same over—133-5-0.

J. V. Bentley was next on, and at the tea adjournment the score was 140 for 8.

Play maintained its interest after tea, Strudwick hitting freely. Bentley followed his example, and drove Williams to the boundary, whilst in the same over he ran four for a big hit.

With 176 on the board for the loss of five wickets, Penzance declared, and put the County in for the second time, with about an hour left for batting. They opened with Cunnaack and Harvey, to the bowling of C. S. Baker and Ollerearnshaw. Harvey played more confidently on this occasion, and was loudly applauded for a lovely 6. Cunnaack was the first to go, being bowled by Ollerearnshaw after making 5-11-1-5.

W. Rogers joined Harvey, and the batting was far less restrained than in the morning. When 20 had been signalled, Bridges relieved Baker. These batsmen continued to cope with the bowling and 40 was up without further loss.

Hobbs had taken the bowling at the Trencres end, and his deliveries seemed to be to Harvey's liking. With a magnificent hit he lifted Hobbs out of the boundary for a beautiful 4, and sent the next two deliveries to the boundary, and W. Rogers got a boundary in the same over. Putting 60 appeared on the board, both men putting plenty of beef into their shots.

Bentley took a turn with the ball, but the runs came quite as quickly. Eventually Harvey fell to a catch by Rust off Bentley for a well played 45-99-2-45. Just before 6.30, Bentley bowled Rogers for 59, and the game terminated.

Strudwick, of course, kept wicket for Penzance. Scores:—
