BOWLERS' REMARKABLE FEATS

The weather was very bad for this Minor Counties Championship match at Liskeard on Wednesday and Thursday. When Dorset went in a second time at about 5.30 few thought the match could be completed but still fewer were prepared for the sonsations to come. Wickets went down so quickly that half the side were out for 10 runs! With the prospect of a definite finish great excitement prevailed. C. J. P. C. Jowett and R. M. Chadwick improved matters a little, and when the aith wicket fell at 20 there was only half-an-hour to play. M. B. S. Bower (who was top scorer with 21) made a great effort to save the situation, and interest increased with every over. When Dorset's last man went in it was about ten minutes from time, but he was soon out, and the total stood at only 63, Cornwall thus winning a sonsational match by an innings and 59 runs.
