Declaring at 372 for eight wickets, Lancashire soucceeded in dismissing one of Cheshire's opening pair at 57, but the day closed with Cheshire 198 without further loss.

His first ball to Barrett resulted in a loud appeal for a catch at the wicket, which was negatived. The verdict availed him little, as three balls later he went out, missed the ball and was stumped. Then two minutes of comic interlude, during which the Walsden bag carrier, dressed in grey flannel trousers and a dirty sweater, pranced joyously about the middle, and achieved four byes, brought an exciting innings to a close for 93, notched in exactly a hundred minutes.

Holt came in to join Mellalieu at the fall of the seventh wicket, and it was this party enship which saved Castleton from disaster, for, whereas the "slows" of Hargreaves had hitherto proved formidable to the batsmen, these two attacked the bowling right merrily, holt in particular being very severe on the sloss bowlet. With the sours standing at 78 Mellalieu was bowled in trying to drive Street, and four runs later Holt met with a similar fate at the hands of Wright. After this valuable stand of 47, scored in very quick time, hopes were entertained of a much more respectable total being achieved than at one time seemed possible. These hopes were subsequently justified, for with Sadler and Taylor together for the last wicket the century was distant by only two runs, when Sadler's valuable contribution of 17 was brought to a close by his attempting to pull a straight one from Dutton.

When the second phase of the match commenced it was soon evident that the score of 98 was not sufficient to win, especially in view of the fact that Castleton were handicapped by the absence of Lewis through leg strain.
