DASHING NEW ZEALANDERS.

Spite the tall scoring during the first fortnight of the season, only half a dozen of the inter-county matches have been left unfinished. Lancashire, Yorkshire, and Notts have each registered a couple of victories in the new competition, and Derbyshire by fine out cricket at Chatl., m gained a notable success against Kent. Last season Kent were beaten only twice. Defeat has overtaken Glamorganshire sooner than last year, when for a brief period in June they The stood at the head of the competition. time may come when the county cricket championship will follow the football cup into Wales. At Cardiff on Wednesday Glamorgan had Yorkshire fighting for runs, and only Holmes and Macaulay saved the ex-champions from a collapse; but Yorkshire came into their own the next day, and except for seven overs, Robinson and Macaulay bowled unchanged through two Glamorgan innings and enjoyed a great

Contrary to popular bolief, there are still many "records" left for Hobbs to attack. Grace's aggregate, some 54,000 odd, and some other things accomplished by "W. G." C. B. Fry, A. C. MacLaren, Abel, 'Hayward, Ranjitsinhij, 'Phikip Mead, and Hardinge, are as yet unequalled by the great Surrey batsman. At the moment attention has shifted from Hobbs to his younger contemporary, 'Tom Shepherd, who has so far scored 607 in six innings, and has another fortnight left him to try and equal Grace's record of making 1000 runs in May. Shepherd did big things in Minor Counties cricket before he became a regular member of the Surrey first eleven in 1921, and as was seen by his recent performance against Gloucester, he is also capable of rendering good bowling service to the side.

AN OPEN COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

YORKSHIME'S GRIM STRUGGLE AT MANOHESTER,

Not for several years has championship appeared so open as it does this season. With nearly a fourth of the matches played Lancashire and Leicestershire are the only counties which have not been beaten, and it is a novelty for Leicester to be so close on the heels of Yorkshire at this stage in the season. It is also interesting to note that the county which rejoices in the possession of the most talked of batsman of the year has yet to win a match. Hampshire, Glamorgan, and Somerset are in similar plight, but the latter may remedy omission in the match now in progress at Taunton. On Saturday the Somerset batsmen scored more freely than the players engaged at other centres, although the conditions may have differed, as in some places players were fighting for runs on rain-affected pitches.

The great rivalry between Yorkshire and Lancashire creates a tense atmosphere in the matches between these counties which is not met with elsewhere. One of the players has described these meetings of the rival "Roses" as being so "friendly" that after the players have exchanged a "good morning" on the first day the only words spoken during the three days play are "How's that?" Saturday's play at Manchester was typical of the grim nature of these struggles, for apart from the usual neighbourly keenness, the result of the match will have an important bearing upon the positions of the counties in the championship table. Yorkshire started so badly that Manchester folk had visions of Lancashire strengthening their lead at the head of the table; but Yorkshire are always hard to beat and Yorkshire grit has often pulled the side out of danger. Rhodes, the oldest member of the side and the captain of the day, played a aptain's innings at a time when it was badly needed, and Yorkshire made a better total than they seemed likely to do at lunch time with half the side out for 70. TWO SPLENDID BATTING DISPLAYS.

Although Norfolk consolidated their position at Cokenach and secured a first innings lead 116 they failed to force the win which at half-past three seemed possible when six Herts wickets had been captured for 135 runs. the favourable position in which Nortolk found themselves at noon they owed much to a eplendid innings played by Falcon, and it was Titchmarsh who came to the resenc of Herts and eaved the side from impending defeat by yet another of his finely played centuries. CRICKET TOPICS. NORFOLK PROSPECTS FOR NORWICH WEEK.

BOWLERS' TRIUMPHS AT HIGH WYCOMBE.

Michael Falcon's ill-luck this season with the spin of the coin-he has not called correctly since the first match of the season at Leicester -the manner in which the maximum points evaded Norfolk at Leicester and Cokenach, the batting breakdown at High Wycombe, and Nor-folk's first defeat—these topics will provide food for conversation in plenty among those on the benches before the first ball of the 42nd Norwich Week is bowled at Lakenham to-day. We may anticipate inquiries by saying there is nothing particularly wrong with the Norfolk betting. Given the right sort of pitch, bowlers can be unplayable. On the same day that Nor-folk were dismissed for 48 runs, ten Yorkshire wickets fell at Northampton for 17 runs, and V. Jupp's performance of taking seven wickets for 21 (eix wickets for 4 after lunch) reads better than Edwards' six for 28, and Walter Beadsmoore's after lunch figures at High Wycombe-coven wickets for 6-are as good, if not better,

Such bowling performances as these do, at any rate, tell their own story of the bowlens' ability to take advantage of exceptional conditions, and under such circumstances it is not necessary to hold an inquest on the batting.

Norfolk's second innings total of 48 against Buckinghamshire at High Wycombe is the smallest recorded by the County since White and Coleman of Herts dismissed the side for 53 and 39 at 5t. Albans in 1909, the match being finished in a single day. In the same season Coulson of Cambridgeshire took eight wickets for 5 runs at Newmarket, and Norfolk were out for 39, while a little later in the same year E. T. Cooke of Lincolnshire bowled Norfolk and met Frank Edwards oftener on some of his favourite grounds in Buckinghamshire, notably at Bletchley Park, where Kent II. could only scrape together 34 and 15 two years ago, and 55 and 65 this season, Norfolk would have shared the common fate of other counties. During the last six years, in which Bucks have been three times champions and never lower in the table than fourth, Bucks have rarely met with defeat. Five years ago Hertfordshire scored no more than 91 and 44 at Bletchley, Bedfordshire made 75 and 47, and Cambridgeshire 51 and 58. At High Wycombe, Oxfordshire have been disposed of for 33 and 41, Leicester II. for 33 and 118, and Surrey II. for 95 and 76. The list of samples of Buckinghamshire's deadly out cricket could be made much longer if we included away performances such as Leicester II. 95 and 48 for 6 at Hinchley, but we have given sufficient figures to show that Norfolk's case was not an exceptional one.

CRICKETERS' GRAVES.

A correspondent sends these cricket meditations among the tombs: Walking through Rrisley a few days ago. I recalled my last visit there 21 years ago, for the funeral of that fine cricketer of the eighties and nineties of the list century, John Jeffreys Kirby-Smith, better known as J. J. Smith. So I looked at his grave, which is also that of his father, the Parish. In the church I found a tablet to the memory of J. J. placed there "by some of his old friends as a token of their affectionate regard and esteem." Few cricketers of his day were better liked. It was always a pleasure to be in his company, whether he was playing with you of against you—one remembers his curious stand—if such a word be permitted—well outside the batting crease, rather disconcerting to a strange bowler, and raising—generally vain—hopes in the breast of a strange wicketkeeper. An Old Norvicensian, J. J. played a lot of cricket for the old Norfolk and Norwich. Carrow, Dêreham, C.E.Y.M.S., and other clubs, and was one of the few who had taken part in cricket and football finals. As a bowler he developed the swerve long before it became fashionable. He died in 1903 at the age of 40, Continuing my excursion I passed through the mext village—Horningtoft—and forgot that it was the birthplace of Fuller Pilch. Two days later I was at Bergh Apton, and found in the churchyard the grave of Palmer Leeder, who died in 1910 at the age of 33. An old Bracondale boy, P. L. gave promise of becoming a fine cricketer. He was very tall and used to send down his left handed slows with a good deal of cunning. After leaving school he played for Rose Lane Works, but high expectations of fame were never realised. His grave overlooks the beautiful Valley of the Chet quite close to the tombs of Bishop Pelham and Archdeacon Nevill. In the same churchyard are the graves of the third, fourth, and fifth Viscount Canterbury. The rector of this parish is the Rev. G. B. Raikes, an Oxford cricket Blue and goalkeeper for England


