Edwards in Fine Bowling Form.

Bucks Defeat Surrey II.

This match was played at Kennington Oval, on Monday and Tuesday, and after a very interesting game ended in a win for Bucks by 45 runs. Bucks won the toss and sent in Powell and Pitchford to the bowling of Lywood (fast), and Geary (medium). Both batsmen scored freely and there were frequent changes in the attack, 75 runs being scored in the hour. Pitchford was out to O'Gorman lbw for 36. Stephenson did not stay long, he also being out lbw. Powell reached 50 in one hour, 20 minutes and soon lost Franklin. Fawcus who filled the vacancy soon settled down but at 109 Powell was caught. He had withstood the attack for one hour, 40 minutes, scoring seven fours. When play as resumed after lunch Theed over-reached himself and was stumped. He had played well for his runs. Aubrey-Fletcher scored four and then returned an easy catch to the bowler. Hazelton did not trouble the scorers being caught at the wicket. Fawcus and James stopped the rot and at 186 Wellings had another try. O'Gorman had bowled 23 overs for 58 runs and five wickets. The new bowler bowled Fawcus for a free hit 57 which contained seven fours. Batcock reached double figures and then fell to Wellings. James played too late to a fast one from Geary and the innings closed at 3.20 for 316. Only a moderate score on such a good wicket.

Surrey commenced with W. T. Cook and Daily, Hazelton and Edwards taking up the attack. They started badly, Cook being caught off Edwards' first ball. Baldwin joined Daily and both played carefully hitting any loose balls. The bowlers were changed, Pitchford and Batcock being tried. The change was successful. Batcock dropped his first ball very short and Daily banged it to leg straight to James' hands. At the tea interval the score was 57 for 2. Having achieved his object via a separation, Franklin put Hazelton on again with Edwards. Baldwin was snapped at the wicket. Pitchford for Edwards again brought success Goodwin being run out. Wellings was well caught in the slips by Edwards and five wickets were down for 96. This was the last wicket to fall before stumps were drawn for the day.

Things looked none too well for Bucks when play was resumed on Tuesday, but a bad misfortune befell the home team as Wilson was run out after adding three to his overnight score. H. Geary and Mabey continued to score freely in spite of frequent changes in the bowling, but at 305 Mabey was taken in the slips. He had batted well, though not scoring very fast. O'Gorman came in but lost Geary. H. bowled by Edwards. O'Gorman was caught from a skier and when the last man came in nine runs were still wanted to beat the Bucks score. Lywood was too anxious to score and was out lbw and Bucks had a lead of three runs.

Second Innings.

The second innings commenced at 12.50 Powell and Pitchford again opening for Bucks whilst the bowlers were Goodwin and Geary. At 38 O'Gorman took the ball from Geary and at lunch (1.15 p.m.) the score was 29 for 0. When play was resumed O'Gorman and Lywood took up the attack and Pitchford was missed in the gully when 23. This let-off made a big difference at the finish as he went on to score 71. Powell was out for 13 and Fawcus also fell for the fatal number. Batcock scored half-a-dozen and then tamely returned one to the bowler. Things were going badly for Bucks four wickets being down for 83. Aubrey-Fletcher kept his wicket up and Pitchford continued to score, Lywood coming in for severe punishment (16 in two overs). Baldwin bowled Franklin with his third ball and Theed fell to a catch at leg. Three wickets had fallen quickly and it looked as if Bucks would not reach 150. However the "tail" wagged and Hazelton soon commenced to lay on the wood. Pitchford fell to a smart catch in the slips after scoring 71, which contained 10 fours. At 182, Aubrey-Fletcher paid the penalty for obstruction. He had batted in his usual style. Edwards was last man and he and Hazelton gave some trouble and when the former was bowled the wicket had put on 80 runs. The innings closed at 4.30 for 223, a much larger total than at one time appeared.

Requiring 220 to win and two hours and ten minutes to make the runs Surrey sent in Daily and Baldwin. There was also time for Surrey to be dismissed and the game was in an interesting condition. Hazelton and Edwards were the bowlers. Runs came apace so a double change was tried, Batcock and Pitchford going on. The latter got Baldwin caught and Cook came in. He commenced to score but lost Daily caught at the wicket. His score of 35 contained seven fours. Cook was badly missed, but the offender made amends by catching his partner. The let off proved very expensive but he had another life later on. O'Gorman stayed some time and saw 100 up and was well taken by Theed. Goodwin scored four (3 over-throw) and was also caught by Theed. Cook was again missed when 50 and a run out might have happened had the fielder been quicker. Taking advantage of the let off, Cook sent Batcock over the rails for 6. The score was mounting quickly, Cook running short runs so as to get the bowling. Franklin finished his innings by stumping him. He had scored one six, one five including over-throw and nine fours. After his departure the run getting slowed down and till the last batsman came in. After scoring three fours Lywood was caught at the wicket and Bucks thus won by 45 runs, a few minutes before time. Theed made some good catches in the slips, but the fielding of the Bucks men was far below their usual standard.

MINOR COUNTING CHAMPIONSHIP.
BUCKS v. KENT II.

On July 4th and 5th Buckinghamshire played Kent II. at Folkestone and beat them by an innings and 148 runs. Franklin won the toss and Bucks had first innings on a good hard wicket. The County started badly, James being bowled by his first ball and Powell shortly afterwards caught at short leg. However, a good stand was made by Franklin and Stephenson, which put on 142 runs, before Stephenson was caught off a "skier." He played a good innings and was most valuable to his side, though he was a trifle lucky at times. Pitchford and Battcock did not last long, but Franklin continued in fine style and, with the assistance of Stevens-Davis and Aubrey-Fletcher, brought the total up to 305. Stevens-Davis, playing for the first time for the County, hit well and should be of great use in the future. Kent went in to bat at ten minutes past five and at the close of play had lost seven wickets for 91 runs, the only man to do anything against the fine bowling of Edwards and Pitchford being Tyler, who came in full of confidence, hit his first ball for four and continued in this strain till close of play, when he had made 20. On returning the next morning at 11 o'clock the Kent innings was finished off in three overs, Tyler, the hero of the night before, being caught in the slips off his first ball. As the wicket had now started to crumble, Franklin enforced the follow on. In their second attempt Kent fared even worse and were all out for 59, Pitchford, Edwards and Battcock all bowling well. The ground fielding and throwing of the County were excellent, but three or four fairly easy catches went astray. Buckinghamshire have made a good start by winning their first match of the season; let us hope it will be a good augury for the future, and that the County may once again win the Championship. ETON v. HARROW.
Eton's Brilliant Victory.

Eton and Harrow on Saturday were concerned in an even more exciting finish to their annual match at Lord's than Oxford and Cambridge had been three days previously, but whereas Cambridge had been unable to force a victory over Oxford, Eton, from being 108 runs behind on the first innings, recovered in such masterly style that they won a great sporting game by 28 runs. Extra time was necessary in both the university and the schools matches. The great player of Eton was I. Akers-Douglas, than whom no better bat has been turned out by either Eton or Harrow for many years. Akers-Douglas went in first wicket down, and was fifth out at 297, having batted three and a quarter hours for 158 runs. He gave no chance, and hit twenty-six 4's. This young cricketer, putting together the fourth highest score in the history of Eton and Harrow, drove particularly well, and showed himself most attractive batsman, possessed of nearly all the strokes.

Harrow were set 308 to get in three hours and a half, and so had to score at the rate of 88 an hour. Lindsay, their captain, stayed for ninety minutes, making 68 out of 137, with one 6 and seven 4's his chief strokes, and Welch also played well, while, after five wickets had fallen for 104, Lawrence and Riddell added 46 in twenty-five minutes. Harrow at one point wanted 67 for victory in forty minutes, with five wickets to fall, but Nevins and Hazlerigg bowled skilfully towards the end of the game, and the last four wickets fell for 38 runs. There was great enthusiasm at the close. There was an enormous attendance on both days, and the weather was brilliant. Score and bowling analysis:—

ETON FIRE BRIGADE v. ETON CHURCH LADS' BRIGADE.

The Firemen eventually recovered from this blow and finished up with a score of 84 (F. Alder, 19) against the Church Lads' Brigade's 45.

SLOUGH v. HARROW WANDERERS.

On Thursday, July 12th, a Slough XI. soundly defeated a powerful side of Harrow Wanderers by nearly 100 runs after a declaration with one wicket to spare. Slough went in first and lost two men very cheaply. The pitch was difficult to start with, as the surface was still moist in patches, the ball rising sharply and this led to the downfall of Wilder and Gladwell. Battock and Smith, batting very soundly, tided over the awkward period and thus rendered valuable service. At 69 Battock was caught in the slips, though there was doubt amongst the fielders as to whether he had not actually played the ball on to the ground, and at 89 Smith left. Demery played his usual cheerful game and hit one boundary to the on which sent the ball right up to a house in Windsor-road. The skipper started well, but was smartly caught at mid-off from a full toss, and shortly afterwards lunch was taken. After the interval, Payne, who had been going along steadily and had made about 20, quickened up and hit almost as hard as he did in the same game last year. He lost Black at 140 and Morgan at 160, but Dodgson then helped him to put on a splendid 90 at a good pace, before the innings was declared closed at the fall of Dodgson's wicket. Payne remained undefeated after a typically clever innings, and Dodgson batted as one has always felt he ought to bat, forcefully, gracefully and correctly.

When the visitors went in the pitch had dried completely, but the ball had bitten out a nasty hole at the Windsor end and occasionally danger to the batsman and wicket keeper threatened. Demery, in fact, did receive a sharp blow on the cheek. The two Crawleys, in putting up 55 for the first wicket, showed the family wrist-work, but K. E. was too adventurous and fell a victim to Wilder directly he went on. In the next over C. L. was taken at mid-off, after the tea interval, and Wills, of Northamptonshire, and Carlisle, of Sussex, came together. They batted very nicely, but at 90 Mills went, and four runs later Slough definitely became top dog when Dodgson made a beautiful catch at 2nd slip to get rid of Carlisle. Of the remaining batsmen only Lord Dundas offered serious resistance. He batted well and hit the bad balls pretty hard. Battock redid-covered his swing, and bowled well after tea, getting in 9 overs, five wickets for only 27 runs. Smith also bowled well, but without any luck, and Black served up some good balls, but was too much on the leg side. The Slough fielding was not at all bad, even in the great heat, and the vigour of the visitors in the field during the sweltering afternoon was most refreshing—to watch!

Mr. and Mrs. Cyril Battock again provided generous hospitality, and the gratitude of the club is due to them for their big share in making the match such a pleasant affair. Score and analysis:—

SLOUGH v. SHEPHERDS BUSH.

At Slough on Saturday the home club managed to save its bacon against its old enemies, the last wicket adding 27 runs in the final quarter of an hour and remaining intact. The pitch was extremely fast, but, contrary to the Slough tradition were badly, and quite early in the Bush's innings, the ball began to fly most dangerously. The large number of byes yielded by both wicket-keepers, bears witness to this, and no doubt there is a confirmatory lump on the back of Demery's head.

The visitors went in first, at 1.50 p.m. The game was timed to start at 11.30 a.m., but as neither side could muster more than 7 men by noon, it was decided to lunch early and play till 7.30. Black and Dewley opened the attack and did pretty well. SLOUGH v. BATTERSEA.

Played at Slough on Saturday, an extraordinary game resulting in a most exciting draw. The weather was perfect but there was a cross-wind from the west, and the wicket, rather difficult at first because of surface moisture, played quite truly. The game was enjoyable to both players and spectators. Slough went in first and very soon lost Southall, who could not resist Caesar's rising ball on the off and was duly caught at first slip. At nine Battersea was bowled by the same man with a swinging yorker. Caesar, by the way, is a fast bowler who has played for Surrey H., and Gentry, who bowled his slow left-handed breaks from the Chelvey end, occasionally turns out for the 1st XI. of the same county. Dewley and Dodgson settled down to steady defence, and almost an hour had elapsed before Dewley was deceived by a trotter, who relieved Gentry—three for 29. Black tried to hit out but soon sided one to mid-off, and Smith played free, but judiciously erieks, to add 20 out of 30 for the fifth wicket. Hubert Wilnot then joined Dodgson and this pair put on a most valuable 50 at a steady pace. Hubert batted very well, his cutting being especially sound, but Dodgson marked an otherwise correct performance by giving four unaccepted chances. Weaver Adams was bowled by a good ball at 140, and soon afterwards declared, Dodgson being still not out after batting for 2 hours and 20 minutes. The most satisfactory features of the innings were, perhaps, Hubert Wilnot's return to form and the very sharp running between wickets of Smith, which, however, unfortunately caused his dismissal.

Battersea had 100 minutes to bat, which gave them plenty of time for the runs, but the capricious gods of cricket decided that Slough, in spite of all their errors, should not lose. Battersea began bowling well and beat Trollope with two successive balls, the second of which hit the leg stump, and the batsman not only was caught at short-leg, but the next wicket proved harder to get. After a quiet start, Gentry and Cook began to collect runs at quite a good pace despite changes in the bowling. Gentry was dreadfully lucky. First of all he was dropped at the wicket off Smith, and from that bowler he (and Cook) had several lucky runs through the slips. When Dewley relieved Battersea, he was three times dropped in the deep, twice from easy catches, and Dewley was also the sufferer when a stilet went astray in the gully. Gentry went for the runs, and when he was bowled, with the score at 132 and with a full quarter-of-an-hour to go, the game looked a certainty for his side. However, with five runs added, Morris was narrowly run out, Gladwell knowing the wicket down from extra time in Battersea's net, and Cook put his left leg in front of a straight one. Cook's innings was notable for his leg-side strokes, many of them made from balls on the wicket. Black had been trusted to bowl, and he began what was destined to be the last over, with seven runs wanted and five minutes left for play. From the first ball Gladwell made a neat catch at extra time off a fierce low drive, the second ball was a good one and clean bowled Hunkin, who ran out and had a swing at it. The third yielded a sharp run to Watts; the fourth was fielded, and the fifth gave Southall a fairly easy catch at mid-on. Time had gone and so stumps were drawn, four wickets having fallen with the score at 137, and in the end seven runs were still needed. It was a remarkably exciting finish, and had Slough fielded throughout as well as they did during the last few overs, they must have won quite comfortably.

Of the home bowlers, Battersea was definitely good, his maiden over at the end, which included Cook's wicket, being a splendid effort. Smith was inclined to bowl to left-handers, and his catches went astray, and was severely punished by Gentry; his luck was right out. Dewley was desperately unfortunate in having four catches dropped, but he bowled well; and Black, too, bowled nicely, though his figures rather flatter him, as he had two overs when the batsmen were taking every conceivable risk. A Close Finish Bucks Beat Herts on Time Last Night's Scenes

County cricket had a fascination for holiday-makers in Wycombe on Wednesday and Thursday (yesterday), when Bucks met Herts in the Minor Counties Championship. Never before have such crowds been seen on the Wycombe ground, that of yesterday being even larger than that on the previous day.

The arrangements in connection with the meetings were carried out by Mr. G. H. Brocklehurst (hon. secretary of the Bucks County C.C.), and Mr. Harold Baker.

Luncheon each day was served under the management of Mr. and Mrs. Bailey, of the Red Lion Hotel, and Mrs. Page looked after teas in the Club's pavilion across the ground.

Laddie Page (the Wycombe groundman) had prepared a good wicket, and he jealously guarded it from dawn till sunset. Visitors flocked to the Wycombe ground from the countryside, and among the throng were not only those whose cricket had been confined to village greens, but the more "polished set." Among the visitors was Bishop Shaw, whose son was playing in the match, and who is spending a few days at the Manor House, Woodburn; the Rev. C. E. Roberts, who holds high offices in the Masonic world, was there as the guest of another Freemason (Councillor J. Gibson, J.P.). Alderman J. G. Peace, J.P., despite his 90 years, sat with his eyes glued to both bowlers and batsmen.

The weather, though threatening at times, was gloriously fine. What was more pleasing than anything else was the sporting feeling that prevailed. No matter whether credit was due to either Bucks or Herts, good performances were unstintingly cheered.

First Day.

Herts won the toss on Wednesday and decided to put the home team in, always a very risky experiment.

Powell and Shaw (a newcomer to county cricket) opened to the bowling of Fordham and Evans. After two overs Roberts (left-hand) relieved Evans. Shaw was bowled by Fordham in his fourth over. Fordham and Roberts changed ends but runs came steadily. At 43 Burton relieved Fordham. He had bowled 9 overs for 13 runs. The 50 went up after an hour's play. Powell and Fawcus seemed well set and runs came more freely. Roberts bowled several "no-balls," Powell being caught off one of them, when at 44. The 100 went up after 1 1/2 hours. After scoring 53 Powell was well caught by Walker. The wicket had put on 88 runs. Franklin did not stay long and lunch was taken with the score 115 for 8. Fawcus being not out 46. Pitchford joined Fawcus but after scoring 7 was taken at the wicket. Fawcus was missed when 63 but only added 2 before being caught at the wicket. He had scored six 4's in his score of 65. Payne was lbw first ball. Skinner and Aubrey-Fletcher caused several changes of bowling before Skinner was caught at the wicket. He had played very well for his runs. The 200 went up at 3.20. Wells settled down at once and runs came quickly but at 251 Aubrey-Fletcher was bowled. He had played his usual patient game, using the late cut to advantage. His innings of 46 contained five 4's. Wells was bowled and Edwards was caught at the wicket, this being Crossman's fourth victim. The innings closed at 4.10 for 262. Kingsley and Fordham were the opening pair for Herts. Batcock and Edwards bowled. Kingsley sent Edwards' first ball to the boundary and after two overs Skinner took the ball from Batcock. In Edwards' third over, Fordham was caught at the wicket. Longton commenced with two 4's but at 23 lost Kingsley who was lbw. At 37 another change was made. Payne going on for Skinner. Walker and Hunter made a stand, but at 62 Edwards got past Hunter's defence. Hodgson did not trouble the scorers, but when Crossman joined Walker things began to liven up. The latter was unfortunately run out when well set. He started to run but was sent back by Crossman, clipped and could not gain the crease in time. Titchmarsh and Crossman played out time the score being 108 for 6. Crossman 22 and Titchmarsh 7.

Second Day.

The weather yesterday did not fulfil the prophet's predictions of thunder and rain. Bucks had a lead of 154 runs, Herts having 4 wickets to fall. The match started at 11 a.m. Payne and Edwards resumed the attack. With his third ball Payne dismissed Titchmarsh for 7.

Evans and Crossman were most cautious, but at 126 Crossman was stopped by Franklin off Payne for 29. At 126 Pitchford went on in place of Edwards, and bowled Evans with his third ball. Burton joined Roberts, while Edwards and Payne changed ends. Both batsmen were extremely cautious, and 13 were added before Roberts was out "lbw," and the innings closed at 11.50 for 142, leaving Herts 120 runs to equal the score of Bucks first innings.

Second Innings.

Herts followed on, Walker and Kingsley batting. Several changes were made in the Bucks attack, and it was not until the score had reached 55 when Edwards brought off a splendid catch to dismiss Walker for 32 (5 fours). Kingsley and Fordham caused some trouble to the Bucks bowlers, and when the luncheon hour arrived, Herts showed 98 for 1 wicket—Kingsley 48 not out. On resuming, the cricket continued to be interesting, but it seemed an almost everlasting task before Herts could rub off the arrears, as they were two down for 110, 3 for 15. It was nearly three o'clock before Herts were able to cross over with a clean sheet. The fourth wicket, a nice catch by Wells off Edwards, dismissed Fordham for 34. The scoring pace now became slow, due no doubt to the keenness of the Bucks field. When matters were getting tedious a mighty cheer went up indicating that another "event" had happened; it was Hunter out to Payne for 29-5 for 168. The crowd had reason to cast gloom aside, as Langston was clean bowled by Edwards without any addition to the score—6 for 168. These changes brought Hodgson and Titchmarsh together. At 4 o'clock Herts were 50 runs on. At 105 (for 7) Titchmarsh, who had been appealed against on more than one occasion, was given out "lbw" to Payne for 14. The score was raised to 200 for 7 at 4.25, and at this time Skinner took the ball from Payne. Two runs later there was an adjournment for tea. Immediately afterwards Edwards brought about another change by clean bowling Evans for 6-8 for 206. Roberts, who filled the breach, scored two off Edwards in the over, after which Payne went on again at the Pavilion end in place of Skinner, who at this juncture had 7 no-balls to his credit. Smart fielding and a quick return of the ball enabled Franklin to run out Hodgson, who had batted patiently for his 22; 9 for 211. The most important thing that mattered was time, and it was evident that by the "stone-walling" tactics adopted by Roberts and Burton, that if possible they were going to prevent Bucks from having full scope to get the necessary runs. The end, however, came at 5.20, when Roberts was bowled by Pitchford for 9, the total being 230.

Bucks Required 111 to win.

Bucks required 111 to win, and it had been decided, if necessary, to continue the batting till 7 o'clock. Powell and Shaw started for Bucks at 5.32, it being generally anticipated that there would be some excitement before the last over was called. In the field Herts were exceptionally keen. At 9 Powell (6) was given out leg-before. Fawcus filled the vacancy. Shaw hit out merrily and soon placed 33 to his credit (2 fours) and was then strumped by Crossman—2 for 35. With Franklin joining Fawcus, hopes revived. The first fifty went up in 37 minutes. After displaying hesitancy in starting, Fawcus (18) was run out—3 for 87. Three runs later there was another fall, Skinner being bowled by Fordham before he had scored—4 for 90. When the last half-hour arrived and Bucks required 38 runs to win, everybody seemed on tenterhooks, especially in view of the very smart work of the Herts fieldmen, who saved a lot of runs. The century was hoisted at 10 minutes to 7, with a boundary by Pitchford, and the excitement was great, even single runs being greeted with cheers. The task was accomplished, Franklin cutting to the boundary, and with the next ball he repeated the performance, making Bucks' score 115 for the loss of 4 wickets and a victory by 4 runs and 6 wickets; Franklin not out 33, Pitchford not out 31. Holiday Games at High Wycombe

M.C.C. Match Abandoned

Those who intended to spend part of their holiday vacation on the cricket field got off the mark very badly on Saturday. Owing to the heavy rains on Friday night, cricket was well nigh impossible, matches being scratched by the dozen. Here and there a late start was made, particularly on village greens, but very few games were played out. The High Wycombe v. M.C.C. match is regarded as one of the principal events of the season, but that was not started, consequently there is a financial loss to the Club. By the way, "Laddie" Page, who has been with the Wycombe C.C. rapidly approaching forty years, will have his annual benefit on Saturday, the 18th inst., when North Middlesex C.C. will be the visitors. Connected with "N.M." is Mr. J. A. Ritchie, who was at one time Honorary Secretary of the Wycombe C.C., and although he has left the town for some years now, he takes more than passing interest in his "old love."

Battersea, who visited the Wycombe round on Monday, were treated to some real leather hunting, and, considering the sultry weather, I am inclined to think that they will not soon forget August Bank Holiday at Wycombe. N. H. Theed and Page (the younger) were too smart with the ball for Brondesbury. Wycombe knocked up a total of 297 and out of that number the first five batsmen were responsible for 162 (L. G. Baker 66), and at the tail W. M. Pierce, judging by his form, looked like making a century, but he caused an obstruction, and had to retire with 23 to his credit. The trio of bowlers named put a lid on Battersea's activities for 87, and out of that small total, McCollend and Wasthu contributed 51 runs.

Wycombe 2nd went to the pretty village of Moaks Risborough, where they were made to "bite the dust." Although Dollman scored 25, Sutton 10, and P. C. Stratford 18, they could only muster 71, and by way of response W. H. Lavington's Brigade (formidable in the best sense of the word) replied with 210—Calman 52, Franklin 48, and others making double figures; in fact, every batsman scored. The Wycombe "A" team started off on Monday to visit Colshill, and as they left the town I heard the Wycombe skipper express the hope that there would not be much leather hunting. Fate was, in the circumstances, most unkind to Mr. Bolton's boys, as you will see by these figures: Wycombe 41 and 58, Colshill, 205. There must have been some "brow mugging," particularly as seven Wycombe bowlers had to be brought into action before they could end Colshill's batting operations.

That hardy annual between Wycombe 2nd XI and the High Wycombe and District Cricket League, was decided on Tuesday, and the scores prove that the ball was master over the bat. As the outcome of smart bowling by S. Hinkett (8 for 45) and A. E. Mason (3 for 34), the League "cranks" were dismissed for 65—a total which on paper presented an easy task for Wycombe, but they crumbled before Baldwin, Brown and A. Blad. Three wickets were lost for 12 runs, 4 for 13, and 3 for 48, Wycombe's flag being eventually lowered for 67, and the League claimed a popular victory by 18 runs.

DOWNEY NOTES.

In most of the sections of the High Wycombe and District Cricket League, the destinations of the respective trophies are already obvious. This is not the case, however, in Division 3, where a keen struggle for supremacy is being waged between Hooker Reserves and Lane End's second team. The final stages of this long, stern chess is being eagerly watched by the other teams who are members of this Division, and there will be plenty of excitement when these old rivals meet on the Common at Hooker. May the best team win.

Downley Reserves journeyed to Lacey Green last Saturday, and after a pleasant game, Downley won by an innings and 6 runs.

The annual fixture with the Queenmill Old Boys C.C. was played on August Bank Holiday, the home side winning comfortably by 33 runs. Scores: Downley 61, and 42 for 2 (C. Avery 22 not out).

Tomorrow, Downley Reserves are playing Hooker Reserves, at Downley. This should be a keen game. Stumps pitched at 2.30. (Div. 3).

Bucks Fight Hard for Points.

Cook and His Century.

There have been many brilliant features connected with the meetings between Bucks and Surrey II. in the Minor Counties' Championship, and we recall how Bucks snatched a victory on the Wycombe ground in the last over—a performance that gained them the championship. On Wednesday and yesterday Bucks once again met Surrey, with the result that the attendance on both days was most gratifying, showing that while normal conditions prevailed (after the holidays, of course) Wycombe folk have a liking for county cricket. Mr. Harold Baker had again charge of the arrangements and luncheon was served each day by Mrs. J. Bailey, of the Red Lion Hotel, and teas were under the supervision of Mrs. H. Page. The pitch was in excellent condition after the rain of the early morning hours. "Laddie" having zealously guarded the scene of operations.

Surrey won the toss on Wednesday and sent in W. T. Cook and Baldwin to the bowling of Rutter and Edwards. Scoring was very slow; the first half-hour only producing 28 runs (three boundaries). At 30 a change was tried, Pitchford taking the ball from Rutter. After batting an hour Cook was caught at leg, the first wicket falling at 48. Wilson came in, but at 4 for 60 lost Baldwin, caught high up in the slips. Rutter came on again and got Squires caught in the slips, the ball going off Edwards to Skinner. Daily now joined Wilson and play was very quiet until at 87, the latter was run out from a smart return by Fawcus. Mobey filled the breach, but was lbw and lunch was taken with the score 87 for 5.

Last Wicket Fireworks.

Geary (H.) joined Daily, but was caught without scoring. Capt. Barnato filled the vacancy, but did not stay long, being out for obstruction. Geary was caught on the boundary and it seemed as if the end was near. Cricket is an uncertain quantity and when the last man came in the spectators were treated to some sparkling play. Lock and Pilkington hit the bowling in all directions, the latter scoring six off each bowler. After adding 35, Lock was bowled having scored 84 in 12 minutes. The total (155) was much better than seemed at one time probable.

Bucks Innings.

Bucks began with Powell and Pitchford, Geary (A.) and Lock bowling. Runs came freely and 60 runs were scored in three-quarters of an hour, but with another run scored Pitchford was brilliantly caught by Baldwin. Fawcus soon got to work and caused changes in the bowling. Powell was bowled for 37, and Franklin joined Fawcus. Franklin missed a straight one and was lbw. Skinner was bowled without scoring and tea was taken with the score 103 for 4 wickets. Aubrey Fletcher joined Fawcus, who was well set, but was bowled for 8. Baker stayed to make the hit that beat the Surrey score, but was caught next ball. Fawcus reached 50 with a four off Lock, but that bowler had the satisfaction of upsetting his stumps soon after. Stevens-Davis shaped well and made some nice strokes before being bowled. The 200 went up at 6 o'clock, Geary bowling with a new ball. Barnato smartly stumped Rutter; Edwards was caught at the wicket, the score being 202. Battecock was not out for a useful 15. Surrey had 10 minutes batting in which they scored 14 without loss.

Yesterday's Play.

Sensational Start.

When play was resumed yesterday morning Cook was an absentee, Wilson taking his place. Despite the fact that there had been no rain there was a heavy dew. A sensational start was created; Baldwin was bowled with the first ball from Rutter, who with his 4th delivery dismissed Daily "lbw." Cook now joined Wilson and made a stand, while at 50 Pitchford was tried in the place of Rutter. Runs continued to come, Cook scoring the faster and reaching his 50. Soon afterwards rain drove the players to shelter for a quar-

ter of an hour. Rutter and Edwards bowled, the former finding his way to Wilson's stumps. The wicket had put on 80 runs. Skinner was tried in place of Edwards, but this did not curtail the rate of scoring, so Edwards again took the ball. The parting came from Rutter, Edwards making a brilliant catch. At the luncheon interval the score was 150 for 4 (Cook 101). On resuming, there were many sensational incidents. Surrey carried their total to 215, A. Geary being not out 46—six 4's and one 6.

Bucks Require 169 to Win.

Bucks required 169 to win. They started in a manner that created a shock to the spectators and incidentally to themselves. Pitchford was out for 2, Powell for 4, and Fawcus for a "blob"—1 for 3, 2 for 3, 3 for 16. Then followed some fine batting between Baker and Franklin, whose contributions towards reducing the arrears were watched with keen interest. Neither batsmen took nor gave chances. With 60 runs up and both Baker and Franklin still "at it," excitement began to manifest itself. There was an appeal against Franklin, but Umpire Fuller declared "No." The "pair" changed the total from 3 for 16 to 4 for 66, Baker then being bowled for 11. Aubrey-Fletcher joined Franklin, against whom another appeal was negatived; but with the next ball Franklin was given out for 44—5 for 6. Skinner filled the vacancy, but runs came slowly. Skinner was out before he had scored—8 for 70, Stevens-Davis joined Aubrey-Fletcher, the latter being given out lbw to Lock, who so far had controlled the situation—7 for 70. The hope of Bucks now rested with Battecock and Stevens-Davis. A confident appeal against Battecock was disallowed. At 101 for 8, Stevens-Davis was bowled by Baldwin for 19. With only two wickets to fall Bucks required 68 to win. Surrey were very keen in the field and their brilliant work saved many runs. When the tea interval arrived, Bucks' book registered 108. Despite the desperate efforts made by Stevens-Davis (19), Battecock (17), Rutter (17), Battecock was badly run out, and with Edwards not out, 1, the venture closed for 128—a win for Surrey by 40 runs. Bucks can attribute their loss to missing two catches. The two Surrey players who made the stand on Wednesday failed yesterday with "ducks." Cook was early missed. If Bucks can beat Norfolk they have a chance of being challengers.

Jones himself was mainly responsible for the dismissal of Kilburn for the meagre total of 115, taking five wickets very cheaply. The first-mentioned treated us to some good hitting after the match was won and altogether batted better than I've ever seen him—a good advertisement for that South Coast resort !!

SLOUGH CRICKET CLUB.

FIRST XI. SEASON 1928.

The paper record of this season must be set down as disappointing in almost every respect, but to those who do not have to judge from bare figures there is great hope for the side in future seasons. The weather was wonderful, but the batting did not overwhelm our opponents as we had hoped, yet in that department there is vast promise for the future. The wickets were mainly hard but our battery of fast and fastish bowlers did not carry all before them, yet here, too, can be discerned reason for optimism and so to those who have followed the side's doings in person (and they are very few) the statistics will be disappointing but not disheartening. Seven matches won, 10 lost and 13 drawn seems poor enough, but of those losses three were by the narrowest margin and three were sustained during cricket week, when, as in previous years, absurdly weak teams were put in the field. Of the drawn games, three at least ought to have been won had time and weather permitted, and then, of course, there was that wonderful tie with the M.C.C. when Slough took the last 4 wickets for 2 runs to make the match a tie. From this it will be readily gathered that the bald account of the results is rather misleading.

Of the batsmen, Southall deservedly heads the list, and now that he is learning to run and defend, he should do remarkably well in years to come. His 125 at Beaconsfield, made against time, his 61 v. the R.A.F. at Halton, and his patient 24 against the M.C.C. were in their different ways perhaps his best innings. Charles Wye, who had an unlucky year, being out of the game for about a month after a blow on the chest received at Halton, occasionally batted excellently, his brisk 60 going a long way towards Beaconsfield's defeat on their ground, but his 74 not out against the same club at Slough was perhaps his best effort. Battcock played very well at times, especially noteworthy was his 83 against the Occasionals, and Norman Black's terrific hitting was a joy when it came off; those who saw his 89 against Hampstead will agree. Both those men by paying a little more attention to defence should improve vastly. Frank Smith made his annual improvement with the bat, and is now a very useful performer, while Skinner and Lloyd should both develop into good men. With Hubert Wilmot, who has had a rotten spell, but who will come along again eventually, is the making of a very useful batting nucleus of young players with years of cricket ahead of them. Dodgson was perhaps the batting discovery of the season, but one is not quite sure that his final average does not flatter him. Although the fieldsmen were generally kind to him he very often made runs when they were badly needed, and should prove very useful for some seasons yet. Dr. Fye Smith only turned out once, and his century was a fine display of how to punish weak bowling.

The bowling figures are not so impressive as on the wetter wickets of previous years. Frank Smith and Battcock had to bear the burden most of the time, and towards the end of the year Smith undoubtedly began to feel the strain, his figures however are pretty good. Unfortunately, Grugeon had to leave the side in the middle of June owing to developing synovitis on the knee, and no suitable substitute was ever discovered—too often was it a case of ringing the changes between the fast men. Norman Black, beginning at Beaconsfield, bowled extremely fast, and ought to train on well. His physique should enable him to

follow in Smith's footsteps when in the future that player becomes a bowler of less pace. Douglas Stott bowled very well at times, and towards the end of the season proved a decided asset to the side. All these bowlers have years to go yet, and Lloyd, Byass, Skinner, Burcher and Norman Wilmot with others all show promise of great things, so that the club should not be unduly weak in attack. The return to form of George Dewley when first Grugeon fell sick was most welcome, and his 5 wickets against the M.C.C. was a more than useful performance.

The fielding was averagely good, but not strikingly so. The unofficial record shows that the 12 most regular players (not including the ever reliable Demery behind the stumps) caught 58 catches and dropped 36. Frank Smith, with 12 to his credit, heads the list.

In Hemmings, the new groundman, the club has found a splendid worker, and with added experience he will no doubt learn to turn out the perfect wickets associated with the reign of George Fisher. Occasionally the "sporty" character of the pitch has been a little too pronounced. The ladies have nobly carried on with their voluntary catering efforts, and it has been most pleasant to eat their excellent meals and to listen to the unstinted appreciation given by members of visiting teams. Long may their efforts be crowned with success.

Finally, thanks are due to a number of ladies and gentlemen for scoring at various times, especially to Mr. Rogers, and to that buoyant character, George Pithouse, the umpire, who, although scrupulously fair on the field, is as much a member of the 1st XI. as anyone in flannels. His genial encouragement and eternal optimism are quite invaluable.
