

## CRICKET ASSOCIATION.

### Players to be Eligible for Thursday and Saturday Clubs.

#### HOBBS' PAVILION FUND.

A very satisfactory state of affairs was reported at the annual meeting of the Cambs. Cricket Association, held at the Lion Hotel on Wednesday evening. On the year's working a deficit of over £13 had been turned to a credit balance of about £9, and although there were outstanding items to account for the money in hand, it was stated that the Association would be well on the right side at the beginning of the season, thanks to a generous donation from the Borough Police Recreation Fund. As anticipated, there was a considerable debate on a proposed alteration of rule, which provided for a player being eligible to take part in both Saturday and Thursday Junior Leagues, and to play for more than one club, but it was felt that if the rule was not abused there could be no objection to it. The question of the Hobbs' Pavilion Fund also gave rise to a certain amount of discussion.

The President (Mr. W. Varney Webb) was in the chair, and he was supported by Mr. R. J. Pearson, Mr. F. Dale and Mr. E. H. Church (vice-presidents), Mr. A. B. Diver (acting secretary), Mr. A. P. Gray (treasurer), and Mr. P. A. French (auditor).

#### SECRETARY'S ILLNESS.

The President said that owing to illness, the secretary (Mr. Richford) was unable to be present. They sympathised with him. It was about the first time he had missed attending an annual meeting. He had been ill for some time, but he (the President) heard that he was getting better, and was going away for a change. They all hoped he would come back a new man. He proposed that a letter of sympathy be sent, with best wishes for a speedy recovery. Mr. Diver had kindly agreed to act as secretary for the meeting.

Mr. Pearson seconded, and the proposition was carried.

Owing to Parliamentary duties, Sir Douglas Newton was unable to attend. Major O. Papworth also sent an apology for non-attendance.

#### FINANCIAL POSITION.

The Treasurer's report showed receipts amounting to £50 4s. 6d. The chief items were: President's and vice-presidents' subscriptions £14 13s. 6d., and clubs' affiliation fees £28 18s. Expenditure, which amounted to £40 14s. 2d., included a deficit brought forward of £13 7s. 6d. The next biggest item was £10 for printing, while the remainder was accounted for by postages, umpires' fees, wickets, etc.

This left a balance in hand of £9 10s. 4d. Commenting on the balance sheet, the Treasurer said that the improved position was mainly due to the clubs, more having become affiliated. They had also received a donation from the County Cricket Club, while they had endeavoured to cut down expenses as far as possible. Thanks to the generosity of New Chesterton Institute, they were allowed Trinity Old Ground for their finals without any fee. In connection with the balance of £9 10s. 4d., however, they had to remember that they had three lots of medals to pay for, so that really on the year they would have a deficit of about £2 8s. Since coming into the room, however, they had had a pleasant surprise. Thanks to the sporting generosity of the Chief Constable (Mr. R. J. Pearson) and his fellow constables, the Police Recreation Fund had given a cheque for £5 5s. towards the funds. (Applause.) With that £5 5s. and a few outstanding amounts they would probably have a balance of about £3 with which to start the season.

The President said they were deeply indebted to Mr. Gray for his hard work, and they must express special thanks to Mr. Pearson and his men for their generous gift. "I only hope the County Police will follow suit," the President added.

The balance sheet was adopted.

#### COUNCIL'S REPORT.

The Council's annual report—their 35th—on the work of the season 1927, stated that owing to the extremely wet summer it could not be said that the season was in every way a success. Three out of the four competitions, however, were completed. The entries for the various competitions were as follows:—Senior League, seven (as against five in the previous year); Saturday Junior League, 28 (as against 29); Thursday Junior League, 11 (as against 10); Junior Cup, 32 (as against 34). The Histon Cricket Club were to be congratulated on being the first country club to win both the Senior League and Junior Cup Competitions. The Thursday League was won by practically a new club entering for the competition, viz., Fowhere. It was found im-

possible to complete the Saturday Junior League, and the position now is as follows: L.N.E.R. v. Willingham; Bottisham v. Fulbourn. The competition would be completed as soon as the season commences.

The Association again arranged a match with an eleven got together by Capt. Hicks, who was kind enough to allow the game to be played on his ground at Great Wilbraham. The Association arranged two evening matches with the object of finding new talent, if possible, for the County Club. They considered the experience was quite successful. The thanks of the Association were due to Messrs Hayward for the use of rooms during the past year.

The report was adopted.

#### ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

References to the keen interest Mr. Varney Webb took in cricket were made by Mr. Pearson, in proposing his re-election as President. Mr. Dale, who seconded, described Mr. Webb as "one of the best."

Returning thanks, the President said he felt it was a position that should go round.

The election of vice-presidents was left to the Council. Proposing the re-election of Mr. Richford as hon. secretary, Mr. Diver said it had been said that no one was indispensable, but he believed that Harry Richford nearly reached the mark. No one could tell what work he had done for the Association. It was in May, 1906, that he was proposed as secretary, and from that time he had done faithfully and well towards the Association.

Mr. French, in seconding, said that Mr. Richford had done a tremendous amount of spade work for Cambridge cricket.

The proposition was carried unanimously, and on the suggestion of Mr. Church, a vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Richford for the great work he had done.

The re-election of Mr. Gray as hon. treasurer was proposed by Mr. Church, who said that Mr. Gray looked after the financial side of the Association in a splendid way. Mr. Pearce seconded, and the proposition was carried.

Messrs. F. G. Morgan and P. A. French were re-elected auditors.

#### PLAYERS AND TWO CLUBS.

The following proposed alteration of League Rule VIII, stood in the names of Old Perownians and A.S.L.E. and F. clubs: "That the present Rule VIII, which now reads: "That no player shall be allowed to represent in the course of the season more than one club, and no player may compete (in the Junior League) in both Thursday and Saturday competitions. The members of each representative team may be changed during a series of matches. Professionals are not allowed to play in the Junior Competition. A member of a reserve team may play for the same club in the Senior Competition three times in any one season without forfeiting his junior status." should be altered to read: "The members of each representative team may be changed during a series of matches. Mr. Diver said that the Council had considered the matter, and offered no opposition to the rule. He felt, however, that it should be carefully adhered to, there might be the possibility of abuse. He did not anticipate that any of the clubs would abuse it wilfully, but there was just a possibility that towards the end of the season, when a club found itself in rather a successful position in a competition, there might be bartering for members from somewhere else.

Mr. Reeder (Old Perownians) proposed the alteration, and Mr. Thompson (A.S.L.E. and F.) seconded.

There was some discussion as to what the alteration intended. Some thought it was to enable a player to turn out for either or both the Thursday and Saturday teams of one club, while others felt that a player should be entitled to play for one club on a Thursday and another club on a Saturday.

Mr. Gordon Pratt moved as an amendment: "That no player shall be allowed to represent in the course of a season more than one club," with the proposed alteration tacked on. If they allowed a player to play for one club on Thursdays and a different club on Saturdays, he said, there was nothing to stop a player from having a third club in the Junior Cup.

Mr. T. W. Dickinson seconded. Mr. C. A. Wilkinson pointed out that some clubs only ran Thursday teams, and if a player turned out then he would be debarred from playing for another club on Saturdays. Mr. A. J. Bevis felt that Mr. Pratt's amendment would leave them rather in the same position as before, because many clubs did

not run Thursday and Saturday teams. Surely as they were different competitions a man should be allowed to play for another club. After further discussion Mr. Pratt's amendment was defeated.

Mr. Pearce thereupon moved a further amendment; that the following addition be made to the proposed rule: "Players competing in both Thursday and Saturday competitions may represent only one club in each competition."

This was seconded by Mr. Thompson and carried.

#### JUNIOR CUP.

It was agreed that each club desiring to compete in the Junior Cup should give notice to the Secretary by April 10th. Previously the date has been May 1st.

#### HOBBS' PAVILION FUND.

Commenting on the Hobbs' Pavilion Fund, the President said he had seen the Chairman of the Commons Committee, who had assured him that they were sympathetic towards the movement, but that they had decided, in view of the money they had to spend this year, to postpone doing anything for a year. That would give them the opportunity to get some more money for the fund, and he (the President) asked everyone to do all they could in this direction. It would give them a much stronger position if they could go to the Commons Committee and say, "Here is £1,000." The fund at present was just under £600, and he certainly thought that should be increased considerably. They practically agreed to raise £750, and he did not think it was an impossible task to get £150 during the next year. If all clubs would put their shoulders to the wheel they could get a considerable amount of money in.

Replying to a question, the President said the Borough Surveyor had prepared two plans. One that was favoured would cost £2,400 and the other about £1,300. As they knew, the Corporation intended doing other work there.

Mr. Wilkinson: If only £1,000 is raised in subscriptions the other £1,400 will come from the rates?

The President: I cannot pledge myself to that.

Mr. Wilkinson said he felt very strongly that all the money spent should come from Cambridge cricketers. He thought they should make a united effort to get the money so as to prevent part of the cost falling on the rates.

Mr. Diver said his opinion was that the whole thing had got out of hand. When it was first suggested, a modest building was proposed, to cost somewhere about £750. At present the town and county of Cambridge had failed to subscribe the money. The scheme suggested by the Borough Surveyor provided for an extremely beautiful and convenient building, but the amount proposed to be spent was much greater than they suggested. The question of about £1,000 falling upon the rates would be met with great opposition in certain quarters, but he emphasised it was not their scheme. They would continue to do what they could to find more money.

Mr. Bevis: Has any appeal been made to the M.C.C. and the Surrey C.C.C.?

The Treasurer: Yes, but it is out of their jurisdiction.

Mr. T. W. Dickinson urged that they should erect a building for which they themselves could find the money.

Mr. P. A. French said that if the Corporation said: "This is our site, and this building is not commodious enough," the blood rested on their heads. He would not like it to be felt that there was any lack of appreciation on the part of local cricketers and the townspeople because the building was not up. After all, the ratepayers would benefit as much as anyone.

The discussion then dropped.

#### PRESENTATION OF MEDALS.

The President presented the medals to last season's winning teams, and a vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Webb for presiding.

## MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

### Lincolnshire v. Cambridgeshire.

#### CAMBS. DEFEATED BY AN INNINGS AND 104 RUNS.

Cambs. were defeated by an innings and 104 runs in their opening match in the Minor Counties' Championship at Lincoln on Monday and Tuesday.

Winning the toss, Cambs. took first knock on rather a soft wicket, but fared badly, half the side being out for only 19. Ling was bowled first ball. Subsequent batsmen offered a little more resistance, but the whole side was out in 90 minutes for 45 runs, the last three wickets falling at that figure.

Frearson and Bashforth gave Lincolnshire a good start, putting on 41 in half an hour before the former gave a hard return to R. Covill, and Bashforth was dismissed without addition to the score. Both had batted well and had been particularly severe on V. Covill, but his brother effected a separation in his first over. Fairly consistent batting followed and the total reached 220.

Cambs. fared better at the start of the second innings, Hart and Handcombe putting on 33 before the former was bowled with the last ball of Monday.

A slight shower before the resumption on Tuesday had little effect on the wicket. Requiring 142 runs to avoid the innings defeat, Cambridge made a poor start, and quickly lost five wickets for the addition of only 17 runs.

Parfitt was the first to go to a brilliant catch by Shaw, and he was quickly followed by Handcombe, who had his off stump lowered by Hawley. One run later Ling was taken in the slips. The batsmen could do little with Hawley, who got Horn caught and Edwards lbw. with the total at 53.

The remaining batsmen offered a feeble resistance, and the side was out for 71.

In the Cambs. first innings, Wilson took six wickets for 17 runs and in the second Hawley took seven for 33. Cambs.' most successful bowler was R. Covill, who had five for 61. Morton took four for 55.

#### SURPRISE FOR HISTON.

Last season's Senior League champions, Histon Institute, were surprised at home on Saturday, when University Press were successful by 36 runs. The champions were not at full strength. The Press were successful with the toss and decided to bat. Allen and Horn opened the innings, but with only three runs on the board the latter fell to Wakefield. Allen was the next victim at 10, but L. Muncey and Gordon improved the look of things, bringing the total to 38 before the latter was dismissed. Franklin fell at 52, and one run later Muncey, who had batted well for 21, was dismissed. Steady batting by Marriott and S. Muncey further improved the position, the pair putting on 53 before the former was dismissed. Soon afterwards Muncey was sent back, the total then standing at 109. The remaining wickets fell cheaply, the innings closing at 118. G. Wakefield bowled well for Histon.

Like the Press, Histon made a poor start, losing three good wickets—those of Handcomb, Lally and Tadmán—for 13 runs. Rogers went at 26, Roberts at 32, and Smith at 34. Things were looking bad for Histon, but Stanton and Ellis made a timely stand, carrying the score to 57 before Ellis succumbed. Histon's prospects were further brightened by some free hitting by Stanton. He hit a beautiful six, but was clean bowled by Westwood, who was the visitors' best bowler, at 73. Then the end soon came, the venture closing at 82.

#### JUNIOR LEAGUE FINAL.

Willingham established themselves as Junior League champions for 1927 on Saturday, when they defeated Bottisham, previous holders of the title, by 15 runs. The winners, batting first, started erratically, but Frohock, one of the opening pair, improved the position with some steady batting, scoring 27 before falling to Newman. W. Smith, going in at the fall of the sixth wicket, put even a better complexion on the game, and was undefeated for a goal 16, when the innings closed at 72. Bottisham made a shaky opening, and against a well varied attack found runs difficult to get. E. Howlett batted well for 25, but the innings closed 15 behind Willingham's total.

#### JUNIOR CUP.

By the narrow margin of one run, Fulbourn were knocked out of the Junior Cup on Saturday, when in the first round they visited Barrington. The home side had first use of the wicket, but were all dismissed for 32, 21 of which came from Douglas and Mead. Holman took half the wickets for 12 runs. Coote's bowling quickly had the Institute batsmen in difficulties, and when the innings closed at 31 he had taken seven wickets at a cost of a run apiece.

The Instrument Co. and Stapleford had permission from the Council of the Cricket Association to play also for League points in their Junior Cup tie, and a curious situation arose, for the villagers win the League points and the Company the cup tie. The result came about in this way: Stapleford batted first and scored 27, the Instrument Co. replying with 24, which disposed of the League points. The captains agreed to continue the game, and the result was that the Company won, two innings being completed.

#### A SERIES CHECKED.

The Y.M.C.A. second string's series of victories in the Junior League was broken on Saturday, when they visited Trumpington and lost by 18 runs. Trumpington batted first, but fared badly against the bowling of Buttress and Beaumis, losing 5 wickets for 12 runs. G. Smith, however, stopped the rot, but only A. Haggis gave him any support, and the innings closed at 61. The Y.M.C.A. fared even worse against the bowling of Plummer and Shepherd, only Beaumis offering any resistance. Plummer and Shepherd bowled well, their results being five for 19 and four for 20 respectively.

Runs were plentiful in the Junior League match between Kerridge and Newnham on Park Piece, which the former won by 11 runs. Kerridge were given a capital send off by Argent Turner, and Blowers and Harper made an excellent good stand. Afterwards a rot set in, the last seven batsmen scoring only 17 between them, the innings closing at 121. The Institute made a shaky start, but the Smiths and Reynolds improved the position. The best stand, however, was that between Stearn and Pratt for the last wicket. The pair scored 55 between them, helping the total to 119.

On Trinity New Ground, Hortensia defeated University Press II, by 21 runs. A feature of the Gardeners' innings was splendid batting by Mabbutt, who, going in at the fall of the first wicket, carried his bat for 61 out of 107. The Printers were given a good start by Allen and Darnell, but after they had been separated only Mallion offered resistance to Porter, who took seven wickets for 17 runs, out of a total of 66.

An interesting game between Cherryhinton Constitutionals and Duxford ended in a win for the Clubmen by 44 runs. Batting first, Cherryhinton started well, Collings and Senior making a good second wicket stand. Brochie and Weston also made helpful contributions to a total of 105. The villagers were soon in difficulties, and although T. Angell, who was one of the opening pair, batted steadily, he received little support, apart from G. Harding, and the innings ended at 51.

#### NARROW MARGINS.

In the Junior League there was some excitement at Over, where Histon Reserves won their third successive game by five runs. They batted first on a soft wicket, but only Thorne and Winders could do much, the former getting 26 and the latter 23 out of a total of 62. Histon had quite a "farmyard" six "delivered" being brought home. Over batted rather erratically. Warrington and Pabing made useful contributions, but Over threw away a wicket when Papworth was run out. This enabled Histon to win. Mus-till bowled well for Over, as did A. Peck for Histon.

A margin of six runs decided the points in the match between New Chesterton Institute and Sawton Paper Mill, the former being successful in a low scoring game. The Institute were dismissed for 41, Reeve and Stearn being the only batsmen to reach double figures. Coggs and Bennett did the damage. The Mills were soon in difficulties against a well varied attack, and Fortin's 12 was the last of a total of 38.

#### CAMDEN'S GOOD WIN.

Camden gained a big victory at Haverhill on Monday, when they showed improved all-round form in winning by 156 runs. Batting first, Camden were given a good start by P. C. Gray and A. W. Eagling, who put on 60 runs for the second wicket, and Gray and F. A. Yarrow, who put on 48 for the third wicket. Total scores were also made by P. A. French, G. Hurry, H. Barrett and G. F. Abbs. The last three named were particularly aggressive, each making a six among his hits, the total eventually reaching 217.

After Abbs had bowled Morral with his first delivery, D. R. Gurteen and H. Poole put on 38 runs for the Haverhill second wicket, before Abbs bowled Poole for a bright 25, which included two sixes. After Gurteen was out for a steady 19, only J. Unwin offered a firm resistance to the bowling of Abbs and H. Barrett, and the innings closed for 91. Camden thus winning by 156 runs. Abbs bowled unchanged throughout the innings, and in 14 overs, including four maidens, took five wickets for 22 runs, while Barrett in seven overs took five wickets for 21.

**OLD CHESTERTON AND A CUP TIE.**

Mr H. C. Pawley, hon. secretary of the Grantchester and District Cricket League, writes:

"If you will allow a small space in your sports column, I should like to answer the question in Old Chesterton C.C. As the Old Chesterton and Instrument Company could not fix a date for their match, I told them to leave it to the Council to arrange, which we did, but as Old Chesterton could not have their way they withdrew from the League and Cup without paying their entrance fee. Therefore they were not right in trying to claim the match, as they were not members of the League or Cup and the Instrument Company were."

Since the above letter was published in the "Cambridge Daily News" I have received further letters from Old Chesterton representatives.

"Interested" writes:—  
"Trusting I am not invading your sports column in asking you to publish Old Chesterton R.C.C.'s reply to Mr. Pawley. He says as an excuse, owing to Old Chesterton and the Instrument Company being unable to fix a date for their cup match, that he told them to leave it to the Council to fix. I should be obliged if Mr. Pawley would say when, and who, he told it to, as Old Chesterton received no notification of this until 4th June, two days after the match should have been played.

The date was fixed when the cup draw took place, and Old Chesterton kept the date open. If it was not so, we should have had a League match on that date, as owing to the heavy fixture list, we could not afford to lose one Saturday.

"The date fixed by the Council was not satisfactory for Old Chesterton. The Instrument Company members finish their day's work at 5.30 p.m. Old Chesterton players finish at 5, 6, 6.30 and 7 p.m., so it is impossible for us to play a cup match in the evenings. Is it right for a cup match to be played in the evening? I say 'No' for either team. Would Mr. Pawley like it?"

"Respecting Old Chesterton withdrawing from the Grantchester Cup and League, it was not until after this unsatisfactory date was fixed that we considered it the best course. We are, however, prepared to reconsider our withdrawal if Mr. Pawley, or the Council, act up to the rules, and give us fair play.

"As regards the entrance fees, I am very sorry to say that was a clerical error, as our treasurer enclosed the P.O. with a business letter. By the way, as Mr. Pawley does not say anything about this matter, I must. He forgets about the 10s. from our secretary, which he said he was going to keep, leaving only 2s. 6d. to be paid as entrance fees. Would it not have been more straightforward for him to have said Old Chesterton had paid only a part of their entrance fees?"

"If Mr. Pawley will carry out the rules fixed by the Council and not break them, Old Chesterton, as a sporting team, will reconsider their withdrawal, if they are allowed to do so. It is very nice for Mr. Pawley to break them and try to blame other teams for it. Where the trouble comes from is Grantchester, and nowhere else. Does Mr. Pawley remember other objections that he has laid? If it is asked in what way the rules have been broken, I shall be very pleased to give them."

Mr. F. Parnwell, captain of Old Chesterton, writes: "Will you kindly publish the following reply to Mr. Pawley's letter: He says, 'As Old Chesterton R.C.C. and Instrument Co. could not fix a date for their cup match, I told them to leave it to the Council to arrange a date.'

"I should be very pleased to know who Mr. Pawley means by 'them,' as Old Chesterton received no notice of such an arrangement until Monday, 4th June, two days after the date fixed by the Council for the round to be played off."

"Also he says our entry fees are not paid. Admitted, not all, namely, 2s. 6d., which would have been paid before now had Mr. Pawley written to my club in a proper way, instead of adopting the threatening attitude which he did."

"He also says as Old Chesterton could not get their own way they withdrew from the League and Cup."

"I would like to say, in reply to that, Old Chesterton Cricket Club like to play under a Council that knows how to keep to its rules after they are made."

**COUNTY CLUB RETURNS TO FENNER'S GROUND.**

After an interval of a year or two, the Cambs. County Cricket Club have returned to Fenner's for their home matches this season (with the exception of one which is to be played at Wisbech), and the first of them was commenced on Thursday, when Oxfordshire, who were beaten in the corresponding match last year, were their opponents. In the Cambs. team there were three changes from the last match, Pask coming in for Gray, F. Morton for Allen, and Parfitt for V. Covill. The side was, however, not quite as strong as had been hoped for.

Cambridgeshire won the toss and batted on a plumb wicket, but failed to take advantage of this piece of good fortune, as the first wicket fell for nothing, the second for two, and the third for three, in the course of the first half-hour, all three of these early batsmen failing to get off the mark. Thomas opened the attack from the orchard end and sent down a maiden. Hartley bowled from the pavilion end, and with his fourth ball had Edwards caught in the slips. Covill joined Hart, but neither of the batsmen appeared at all comfortable, and in Hartley's third over Covill was out lbw. With Parfitt in the players, with one eye on the score board, were even more cautious, and there is no doubt that in that first half-hour several runs were thrown away which might easily have been obtained by some resolute running between the wickets. The stroke which is a run in club cricket should also be a run in county cricket. With only three telegraphed Parfitt was out to a " Yorker " from Thomas, which swung a little. The veteran, Sammy Ling, was the next in, and he quickly brought about a different atmosphere. He played his defensive strokes in a hard and determined manner, so that there was always a possibility of a run. Ling opened with a couple of singles, but then drove Hartley to the on-boundary. Hart was quick to respond to the change in the situation, and the next over got Thomas away to leg for four. Within a quarter of an hour 30 runs had been added. He had made a good effort to save the fortunes of the side, and might have succeeded if there had been anybody to stay with him for any length of time. Pask improved matters with a couple of fours, both to the leg at the expense of each of the bowlers. Hartley had now returned to the attack, whilst Walters was called upon for the other end. The hundred went up without further loss after 1hr. 45min. play. Morton and Pask were batting with just that confidence which, for some reason or another, some of the earlier batsmen had lacked. Morton secured three 4's in succession off Hartley. The pair were still together when lunch was taken, having then put on 69 runs by the sort of cricket which was demanded by the occasion, the total being 126 for seven wickets.

Morton only added one to his score after lunch before being taken behind the wicket. Falkner, who had not arrived in time to bat during the morning, went in No. 10, but only made one stroke of three before being bowled. Cockell kept up his end while Pask, who was making his first appearance for the County, ran to his 50. Cockell was last in, and on his advent Pask's score was in the early 40's. The wicketkeeper was content to keep his end up, but he was very severe on a loose ball or two, and twice succeeded in reaching the boundary. Pask ran to his 50, but the end was not yet in sight, as the partnership had put on 41 before Cockell was taken in the slips. Thus the last three wickets had produced 117 out of 184, mainly because the batsmen were not overcome by the occasion and played their natural cricket. Pask, who was undefeated for 60, was batting for an hour and 30 minutes, and batted really

well. Except in his first over or so, when he was a trifle slow getting his bat to the ball, he never looked like being beaten. It was a most valuable contribution to the score, all the more valuable because runs were so badly wanted—a useful addition to the County side. Hartley took six wickets for 75.

Ridgeon and Covill were the opening bowlers, and there should have been an early wicket, as Walker, with only one to his credit, was dropped by Covill fielding second slip to Ridgeon. He got the ball in his hands, but could not hold it. With only 11 scored in a quarter of an hour Ridgeon clean bowled Lee.

The second wicket had put on 39 before Caldwell was well caught behind the wicket. At the tea interval the score stood at 63 for two wickets, and the close of play for the day the visitors had put on 171 for 8 wickets.

Hart, the captain, made a very sporting declaration on Friday, when he left Oxford 24 hours to get 273 runs, which, with the ground as fast as it is at present, should have been well within their capabilities, in fact they obtained the first 50 of them in 22 minutes. After that the run getting slackened off very considerably, and there was never any chance of a finish and Cambs lost the first innings points. Had the game continued for a little longer on the first day I think the home county might have got the remaining wickets, as they were "on their toes" then.

D. K. Falkner's century was a very fine effort, but it is sad news to hear that he is leaving for Germany almost immediately and will not be back in England until after the remaining matches have been played. He was rather slow to start with, but hit the ball very hard when once he had settled down, scoring more runs on the off side than is customary with left-handers. His only actual chance was when he had made 100, but he played a very risky stroke behind the wicket when 82. Ling and Edwards were the two players who assisted him.

Ling was, perhaps, unfortunate over the manner of his dismissal, but he had had his good luck earlier on, as it transpires that he was caught at the wicket off his first ball but nobody appealed. It is past my understanding why Oxfordshire did not try to get the runs, and, useful as the Cambs. bowling was, I cannot help feeling that it was made to appear in rather too favourable a light. Apparently the idea of the visitors was that having gained the lead on the first innings they were content to make sure of the points without running the risks which they would have done if they had been hitting out for the runs. It was an extremely enjoyable match, played in the best possible spirit, and the County can take considerable encouragement from it. The start was disastrous, but they recovered well.

For the return match, with Oxfordshire, at Oxford, on Monday and Tuesday next, Cambs. will probably make two changes from the side that met Herts. on Wednesday and yesterday (Thursday), as A. S. Ling and K. R. J. Saxon are expected to be available.

Y.M. STILL WINNING.

Y.M. gained their seventh Senior League victory of the season on Saturday, when visiting the champions at Histon they were successful by 101 runs. Batting first, Y.M.C.A. were given a fine send off by Saxon and Edwards, over 70 being sent off before the latter was sent back for before, but then Pask and Gray were dismissed fairly cheaply. Another big stand resulted when Kerridge and Saxon for the latter's partnership. Both scored at a good pace, the 200 went up before they were parted. Abbs gave Saxon further support, and with the former's dismissal at 245 the closure was applied. The Old Blue was then unbeaten for 139, his best hits being 19 4's.

EASY FOR ST. GILES'.

## CAMBRIDGESHIRE'S PLUCKY FIGHT AT WISBECH.

SPLENDID VICTORY OVER LINCOLNSHIRE IN THE MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

HOME COUNTY'S FIRST WIN THIS SEASON.

EXCITING FINISH AFTER A SLOW START.

K. R. J. SAXON'S FINE INNINGS FOR CAMBS.

The Minor Counties championship match between Cambridgeshire and Lincolnshire which was played at the Harecroft Road ground, Wisbech, on Monday and Tuesday, will be well remembered for one of the closest finishes ever seen in an important fixture on that ground. Fielding a weakened side Cambridgeshire gave a disappointing batting display, being dismissed both times for a total score of 270, leaving their opponents to get 92 for victory in the second innings. To the pleasant surprise of the home county's supporters the unlikely happened, and by good bowling and keen fielding Lincolnshire were dismissed for 61, Cambs. thus winning by thirty runs. There were only seven minutes to spare when the last wicket fell.

It is interesting to note that Cambs. have not yet lost a match at Wisbech, and this is their first victory in the Minor Counties Championship this season. Of the other six games played they have lost two, led twice on first innings and lost twice on first innings.

The exciting finish was very much a surprise in view of what had happened earlier. It is true that runs were hard to get even on the first day, but there was no reason to suppose that a consistent batting side like Lincolnshire would be dismissed for sixty-one with the wicket wearing passably well. Cambridgeshire won the toss on Monday, and batting first had lost nine wickets for 71 when an unexpected last wicket stand between P. Morton, of Ely, and W. H. Cockell, the Cambs. "stumper," put on 43, enabling the home county to register a total of 114.

Lincolnshire faced the moderate task very confidently and with 42 on for the first wicket things looked bad for Cambs. The visitors continued to get runs though slowly. When the third wicket fell at 99, a collapse occurred and two more batsmen were dismissed for only nine runs. Ross, who had batted very cautiously, then found a partner in Drakes, and the score went to 150, when Drakes' dismissal concluded the first day's play.

Yesterday morning the remaining four Lincolnshire wickets were disposed of for 29 runs. Ross batted very steadily for his 76 runs, and was at the wickets over 3 1/2 hours. Cambs. went in faced with arrears of 65, which cost them four wickets to wipe off. K. R. J. Saxon, the ex-Varsity man, atoned for his early dismissal on Monday by amassing the fine score of 93 out of the Cambs. total of 160. He narrowly missed carrying out his bat, being ninth man out. Cambs. were thus only able to lead the visitors by 92, and when Lines. went in after tea they had the apparently easy task of scoring these runs in two hours. Although Cambridgeshire bowled well and fielded with the utmost keenness, it is hard to account for the failure of the early Lincolnshire batsmen. One after another wickets collapsed cheaply until six were down for 29. A brief stand slightly improved the position by adding 16 for the seventh wicket. H. W. Dods, a young Donnington player, stood up to the bowling well and scored 17, but no other batsmen reached double figures, and the innings closed for 61. Thus Cambridgeshire's plucky fight ended in victory by 30 runs seven minutes from the time for the stumps to be drawn.

The attendance at the match on both days was disappointingly small. The spectators on Bank Holiday did not number more than 150, and yesterday there were even fewer.

### THE FIRST DAY'S PLAY.

The home side having won the toss, Hart, after carefully inspecting the wicket, de-

ecided to bat first. K. R. J. Saxon and P. Handcombe, who opened the innings, treated the bowling with marked respect on the soft wicket. After three overs Drakes, a fast right-hander, took the place of Sutton at the town end. Only three runs were on the board when Wilson yorked Handcombe, and without addition to the score Saxon was sent back through snicking one up in the slips off Drakes. Covill, who was then joined by F. Morton, had opened promisingly with a four, but in driving Wilson hard to the off he gave Dods the chance to bring off a brilliant catch. N. F. Parfitt, who succeeded Covill, thus faced a score of 7 for 3 wickets. He and Morton settled down to play with the utmost caution, and it was not till three-quarters of an hour had elapsed that ten appeared on the board. The Lincs. skipper rang the changes on the bowling and, this, coupled with the very smart fielding, made runs very hard to get. At the end of 1 hour and 5 minutes, 24 runs had been scored. With the total at 36, Drakes, who had been taken off after only three overs, returned, and seven runs were knocked off his first three balls. Sutton's second turn with the ball was more auspicious, for Morton hit one straight back at the bowler—4 wickets for 52. F. Morton's valuable innings of 25 had enabled 45 runs to be put on for the fourth wicket. H. B. Hart, the Cambs. skipper, was beaten by the first ball he received from Sutton. Smith, who has done well this season, succeeded him and got a four to start with. The next ball he tried to play back to, with disastrous results: 56-6-4. At this stage Sutton had claimed three wickets in two overs for 5 runs. D. Pask, who joined Parfitt at this stage stayed with him till the lunch adjournment, when the score stood at 62 for 6 wickets.

Shortly after the lunch interval Parfitt, who had played a fine defensive game for his 22, was bowled by Sutton with a ball that just nicked the bails off. Only one run had been added to the lunch total, making the score 63 runs for 7 wickets. Eight runs later Mack clean bowled Pask. With the total still at 71 Ayres was beaten by Sutton, and W. H. Cockell, the Cambs. wicket-keeper, went to the wickets as the "hope of the side." After a rather shaky start he settled down to play the bowling with caution, while P. Morton at the other end, scored off every ball he could. Steadily the score mounted until amid applause the 100 went up. The visitors frequently changed their bowling, but it was not till the score had reached 114 that Mack succeeded in bowling Cockell and thus bringing to an end the partnership that had yielded 43 runs. P. Morton was not out 28 at the close.

Lincs. started well, R. E. Frearson and T. D. Ross putting on 42 for the first wicket. Covill and Smith opened the bowling, but it was not till F. Morton came on to bowl that the first wicket fell, Frearson being out to a catch by Ayres. R. Flatters joined Ross, and the total was taken to 63 before Flatters put one one to F. Morton off P. Morton's bowling. Seaby and Ross batted steadily, but without enterprise, and the score had reached 99 when Seaby was snapped behind the wicket. R. Chatterton did not stay long with Ross before he too fell a victim to Cockell's smartness with the gloves. The total stood at 107 for 4. One run later Dods was smartly run out by Saxon. Drakes then helped Ross in an invaluable stand which added 42 for the sixth wicket. With Drakes' dismissal after making 15, stumps were drawn for the day, the total standing at 150 for 6 wickets. Ross was 58 not out at this stage.

### TUESDAY'S PLAY DESCRIBED.

Resuming on Tuesday with a lead of 36, Lincs. soon lost Sutton, only nine runs having been added to the overnight total of 150. G. Shaw joined Ross, and 19 runs were put on for the eighth wicket. Then Ross played back to a ball from P. Morton, and the bowler dashing up the pitch brought off a smart one-handed catch. Ross's innings, which had lasted 3 1/2 hours, yielded 76 runs, an invaluable contribution to his side. Covill got the last two wickets for the addition of one run, and the innings closed for 179, after three-quarters of an hour of the second day's play.

Cambs. went in to bat a second time just before 12 o'clock. There were only nine runs on the board when Drakes bowled Handcombe. Saxon was playing the bowling with confidence, and only required a partner to stay with him. Covill opened confidently, and the pair quickly put on 21 for the third wicket. With the total at 30 Covill was bowled by Sutton. F. Morton joined Saxon, but was never comfortable, and had only got 3 when he was bowled by Wilson: 3-51-3. N. Parfitt who shaped as though he would stay, stepped in front of a straight one from Drakes and was sent back with only two to his credit. Hart, the home skipper, only stayed to collect 9 before Wilson bowled him with the total at 67. Things began to look very black indeed when the sixth wicket, Smith's, fell with only four more runs added. Lunch was taken at this stage.

Pask joined Saxon after the interval, and kept up his end successfully. Saxon reached his 50 in two hours. Shortly after 3.45 p.m. the 100 appeared on the board. Three runs later Pask, who had got eight, was easily caught by Ross off Sutton. Ayres joined Saxon, but was never comfortable. Saxon had difficulty in playing Sutton, and once gave a chance to Wilson at mid-off, but the score went to 129 before Ayres was dismissed by a smart catch at fine leg by Seaby.

P. Morton was the newcomer. The pair held the bowling till the total reached 150, when Saxon was snapped behind the wicket off Drakes. His score of 93 included ten boundaries. Cockell's dismissal for a "duck" brought the innings to a close for 156.

Sutton took four wickets for 49, Wilson three for 26, and Drakes three for 46.

Tea was taken at this stage. Lincs. opened their second innings after the interval at 4.25 p.m. They needed 92 runs for victory, and had two hours in which to get them. Frearson and Ross were again the opening pair, and the visitors experienced a shock when Pask with his second ball sent back Ross for a "duck." There was more to come, however, for with only one run on, Flatters was bowled by Smith. Seaby then joined Frearson and a quarter of an hour's play took the total to 11, when Seaby played a ball from Smith on to his stumps. Dods joined Frearson and his confident defence raised the visitors' hopes that there would be a good stand, but with only nineteen on the board Frearson gave Covill an easy chance off Pask. Drakes was the newcomer, but he did not stay long, and when Sutton was bowled by Pask the score stood at 29 runs for the loss of six wickets. Dods who still played a steady defensive game, found a more rapid scoring partner in Shaw, who got five in one over, but after making nine Shaw skied a ball from Covill and Handcombe took the chance. Thus the seventh wicket fell with the total at 45. The Cambs. bowling and fielding were both good, and when Dods left with the score at 52, Lincolnshire's hopes of forcing even a draw, dwindled. They still had, however, two wickets in hand and required 30 runs to avoid defeat. There remained 20 minutes in which to get them. After scoring a boundary Wilson, the visitors' skipper, was out lbw. to Smith, and Chatterton, who went in last, was faced with the job of keeping his end up for ten minutes. Seven minutes from time a fine ball from Pask spreadeagled his stumps, and the innings closed for 61, leaving Cambridgeshire victors by thirty runs. Detailed scores:—

### CAMBRIDGESHIRE VILLAGE CRICKET.

I have received the following letter from Mr. F. Holdway, of Longstowe:

"A little over two years ago I came to reside in Cambridgeshire, and I had not taken an active part in cricket for some years before last season when I was persuaded by our enthusiastic officials to assist the local club. I have played for many seasons in the industrial districts of North Lincolnshire and South Yorkshire, and with your permission I should like to compare the very great difference in cricket there from cricket as I have found it here.

"The standard of cricket here is, perhaps, as good as one would find in districts purely agricultural up and down the country, but the tone of the game is so lamentably low that I feel I may be doing the youth of our villages a good service by calling the attention of the powers-that-be to what I regard as a denominational neglect. In the districts I have above mentioned, when a boy leaves his day or Sunday school he joins the village recreation club. This is regarded as the village Y.M.C.A., and the parson and class leaders take a very live interest in this club. They are there with the bats at practice, in the preparation of the ground, scoring, acting as umpire. They are there to give an encouraging word, or, if needs be, a kindly rebuke. Through their games they teach these youths what our games are intended to teach. They are there to tell them that what isn't cricket on Saturday is not fair, just or honourable during the rest of the week. They are taught their duty to others and their duty to themselves. As these youths grow older their spiritual advisers retain their respect in every particular, and I know these young men would not do or say anything intentionally which would hurt their feelings.

"How very different one finds cricket played in Cambridgeshire, and judging by the weekly reports of the 'News' there is a great deal of village cricket in the county. During the two seasons I have now played I have not seen the village parson on the field of play or in the precincts of the pavilion. I trust I shall not hear 'coals of fire upon my head' when I ask what are they doing about these young men—the fathers of the next generation? Why should the youth of Cambridgeshire be denied that which is so freely given to other young men in other parts further north?"

"I would remind our spiritual guides that the preparation of an elaborate discourse, for the following day will not touch the hearts of the village youth nearly as readily as a little assistance in the preparation of pitches, and I have seen many a non-playing parson and chapel leader assist in doing that.

"One hears players and spectators hurling epithets at each other, without any regard to the small children or women who are present, batsmen openly cursing umpires' decisions, and fieldsmen and batsmen smoking while the game is in progress. May I humbly suggest to the powers that be that in the villages where cricket is played, they institute what is known as 'Cricket Sunday,' and let the fact be announced in no uncertain manner, and let the address to these men be 'What is cricket?'"

"I know the fathers and mothers of our boys would love to see those zealous workers of their various churches invade the cricket grounds of this district. They indeed 'let their light shine before men and they do see their good works,' and they glory that which is best in the game in consequence. I trust my humble remarks will be received in certain quarters in the same spirit as they are written, and that is a sincere desire to benefit our village lads, through their games. At present they are absolutely neglected, and I unhesitatingly say that the churches are not giving them the attention they have a right to expect."

**MINOR COUNTIES' CHAMPIONSHIP.**

**CAMBRIDGESHIRE SECURE THEIR FIRST VICTORY.**

**LINCOLNSHIRE DEFEATED BY 30 RUNS AT WISBECH.**

**SOME GREAT BOWLING.**

The Minor Counties' championship match between Cambridgeshire and Lincolnshire on the Harecroft-road ground, Wisbech, on Monday and Tuesday, provided something of a sensation, for Cambridgeshire, after being in what appeared to be a hopeless position, rallied and won by 30 runs. This is Cambridgeshire's first victory in the championship this season.

The weather was fine, and on Monday there was a fair attendance, but on Tuesday very few people turned up. Cambridgeshire were much below full strength, and there were no local players included in the side, although an invitation had been extended to the local club. Lincolnshire were strongly represented.

The Cambs. skipper won the toss and decided to bat on a wicket that had been rendered soft by Saturday's rain. They made a sorry show against the fine bowling of the Lincs. trundlers, and it appeared extremely unlikely that they would get a hundred. A stand by F. Morton (25) and N. F. Parfitt (22) helped matters, and then there was a further collapse. Wickets fell like ninepins, and the side was saved from a rout by a great last-wicket partnership between P. Morton (not out 28) and W. H. Cockell (14). They put on 43 runs, and the innings closed about 3.30 with the total 114. The Lincolnshire bowling was fine, and was supported by excellent fielding. Six different bowlers were tried, and the chief honours fell to W. A. Sutton, who took five wickets for 18 runs. C. Wilson captured two for 20, the Rev. H. Mack two for 26, and T. E. Drakes one for eight.

When Lincolnshire went in they made a much more auspicious opening than their opponents, and when the innings closed just before lunch on Tuesday, the score was 179. T. D. Ross played a sound innings for 76, and R. E. Frearson contributed 32. D. Pask bowled well to take four wickets for 28 runs, whilst Covill and F. Morton each secured two for 28, and P. Morton one for 30.

Thus, 65 runs behind, Cambs. went in again, and, mainly through a fine knock by K. R. J. Saxon, who compiled 93, they made 156 in their second effort. This gave them a lead of only 91, and as Lincolnshire had 2½ hours in which to knock off the runs, things looked black for Cambridgeshire. However, great bowling by Smith, Pask, and Covill, coupled with keen fielding, turned the tables, and the last Lincolnshire wicket fell seven minutes from time, with the meagre total of 61. Dods, with 17, was the only player to reach double figures. Smith took five wickets for 22 runs, Pask three for 20, and Covill two for six.

**MONDAY'S PLAY.**

Cambridgeshire opened with K. R. T. Saxon and F. Handscombe, against the bowling of C. Wilson and W. R. Sutton. The opening was very quiet, the excellent bowling served up by the trundlers making the batsmen cautious. Runs came at a pace that was painfully slow, and only three were on when a bowling change was made, T. E. Drakes relieving Sutton. Then, before the score had been increased, the first wicket fell, Handscombe being yorked by Wilson, the ball removing his leg peg. Covill came in, and his arrival signalled the departure of Saxon, who was smartly taken by Searby in the slips. He left with his account unopened. His place was taken by F. Morton, but the rot was not stopped, Covill being the next victim. He had collected four when he opened his shoulders to a ball from Wilson; there was smuck—and he had been brilliantly caught by Dods at mid-off. The board indicated 7 runs for 3 wickets. When N. F. Parfitt joined Morton the innings assumed a more cheery outlook, for the pair got down to the business of run-getting. Morton marked the arrival of the newcomer by hitting the first boundary of the match, to send 10 up after 45 minutes. Another bowling change was then made, T. D. Ross

relieving Drakes. The score had gone on to 24 when Wilson was taken off, and the Rev. H. Mack took a turn with the ball. Runs came slowly but surely, and when the total had reached 36, after an hour and 20 minutes, Drakes went on again at the town end. With 49 on, Sutton took another turn with the ball at the pavilion end, relieving Mack, who went on at the other end, Drakes coming off. The fine partnership between Covill and Morton came to an end when the latter, who had been batting soundly, played back to Sutton and left with 25 to his credit, the board showing 52 for 4. Parfitt's next partner was H. B. Hart. The newcomer played the last ball of the Rev. Mack's over, and then the first ball he received from Sutton scattered his stumps, the board showing 52 for 5. Smith came in and opened with a boundary off Sutton, but he got no further, the bowler beating him with a beautiful ball in the same over. The total then stood at 66 for six wickets. D. Pask joined Parfitt, and when a stop was made for lunch the score stood at 65, Parfitt not out 21, D. Pask not out 1.

When play was resumed the partnership was quickly broken, Parfitt having increased his pre-lunch total to 22 when he was bowled by Sutton. (63-7.) His place was taken by R. J. Ayres, and with 71 runs showing, Pask left with 5. P. Morton came in, and before the total had been increased Ayres returned the ball into the safe hands of Sutton and went back with 4. The arrival of W. H. Cockell marked the beginning of a fine last-wicket stand. The pair had taken the score to 90 when a bowling change was made, Wilson relieving Sutton. Eight runs later Frearson relieved Ross, and off his first ball Cockell scored two, to send 100 up, amid applause. Runs came at a lively pace, and at 114 Mack took another turn with the ball. His fourth delivery brought the innings to a close, when he bowled Cockell, who had made 14, with the total 114. Morton had made the highest score of the side with 23 not out. The partnership put on 43 runs.

Frearson and Ross went out to open for Lincolnshire, the former taking first over from Smith. Covill took charge of the ball at the other end. A splendid first wicket stand was made, the pair putting together 42 before Frearson was caught by Ayres on the boundary. His contribution was 32. R. Flatters took his place, and at 58 F. Morton took over the ball from Smith. Four runs later Covill came off in favour of Pask, and the score had progressed to 61 when P. Morton relieved his brother, and with his first ball dismissed Flatters with 10. J. E. Searby joined Ross, and the score steadily mounted until 80 runs were on the board at 5.30, when Pask was taken off and Smith went on. At the pavilion end Covill took another turn in place of P. Morton. Searson had compiled a clever 16 when he was smartly taken behind the wicket by Cockell, the board indicating 90-3. Ross next had R. Chatterton as a partner, and with a drive for four sent 100 up after two hours. Another bowling change was then made, F. Morton relieving Smith, while Pask took another turn at the pavilion end. Chatterton, who was suffering from a damaged finger, was anything but comfortable, and had made only two when he was caught by Cockell off Pask, with the total 107-4. H. W. Dods took his place at the crease, and another run had been scored when Dods was run out as the result of a remarkably fine piece of fielding by Saxon, who broke the wicket with his throw-in. The board registered 108-5. T. E. Drakes came in, and when 119 runs were on the board P. Morton took over the ball from Pask, and Smith went on again at the town end. Lincolnshire had been batting for 2½ hours when 120 went up. Covill went on to bowl again, and off his fourth delivery Ross stole a single to reach his half-century, after an hour and three-quarters extremely clever batting. Morton was relieved by Saxon at the pavilion end, but runs continued to steadily accumulate, and the total had reached 150 when Drakes, with 15, was caught by Saxon. Play then closed for the day, with Ross not out 58.

**TUESDAY'S PLAY.**

On Tuesday morning Ross resumed with W. A. Sutton as his partner, the latter taking first over from Pask. It was a maiden, and one run was knocked off Covill in the next over, who was on at the town end. A change

was then made, Smith relieving Pask, who went on at the other end in place of Covill. Ross and Sutton had been together twenty minutes for nine runs when the latter was clean bowled by Pask, the board showing 159 for 7. G. Shaw joined Ross, and with the total at 165 Pask was taken off, P. Morton taking a turn, while Covill relieved Smith. Ross had played a splendid innings for 76 when he played back to P. Morton, who fell in bringing off a smart one-handed catch. It had taken Ross 3½ hours in which to get his runs. The total stood at 178 when the Rev. H. Mack went out to join Shaw. He did not stay long, poking the second ball he received from Covill into the safe hands of Pask, and left with a duck. C. Wilson came in, and the first ball he received from Covill scattered his stumps, bringing the innings to a close with 179, G. Shaw not out 5.

Cambridgeshire, 65 runs behind, went out again at 11.55, Saxon and Handscombe being the opening pair. Drakes and Sutton took charge of the bowling. The start was again anything but cheerful, for only nine runs were registered when Handscombe was clean bowled by Drakes with his account unopened. Covill took his place, and runs came in a steady trickle, 20 going up after 30 minutes. The score had progressed to 30 when Sutton removed Covill's bails with a deadly swinger, and the batsman went back with 13 as his quota. Saxon was then joined by F. Morton, and the pair had taken the score to 35 when a bowling change was made, Wilson going on in place of Drakes. The rate of scoring steadied somewhat, and 50 was reached after an hour and ten minutes. One run later, Morton, with 3, played on from Wilson, the board indicating 51-3. Parfitt was the next man in, and at 53 a bowling change was made, Drakes relieving Sutton at the pavilion end. The change quickly brought a wicket, for with his fourth delivery Drakes removed Parfitt, l.b.w. The board registered 54-4, the outgoing batsman's contribution being 2. Hart took his place, and opened with a glide to leg for 4. The arrears were wiped off just before lunch, and with 67 on, Hart, with 9, was clean bowled by Wilson. Smith came in, and Ross went on in place of Drakes, to serve up left-handed slows. Smith had not scored when he lifted the ball into the hands of Flatters, with the total 71 for 6. Lunch was then taken, with Saxon not out 33.

Pask partnered Saxon after the interval, and Drakes took a turn with the ball at the pavilion end. The pair had carried the total to 89 when another bowling change was made, Sutton going on in place of Drakes. Saxon reached his 50 with a fine drive to the off boundary, after about two hours at the wickets. The same player sent the 100 up on the board with a pull to leg for 4. The total had reached 103 when Pask, with eight, gave a chance to Ross, which was accepted. Ayres joined Saxon, and 129 runs were on the board when the newcomer succumbed to a fine catch by Searby. (129-8.) P. Morton followed, and the score had gone on to 150 when Saxon, who had played an almost faultless innings for 93, was caught behind the wicket off Drakes, the board reading 150 for 9. Cockell joined Morton, and he had not scored when he had a life at the hands of Ross. His account was still unopened when he was caught by Frearson, the innings coming to a close about 4 o'clock with the total 156. Lincolnshire were then left with nearly two and a half hours in which to get the 92 runs required for victory.

They opened with Frearson and Ross, and Pask, who took charge of the ball at the town end, clean bowled Ross with his second delivery. Flatters took his place, and he had notched only a single when his stumps were spreadeagled by Smith. The bowling was extremely good, and the batsmen had to go carefully. Searby joined Frearson, and with the total 11, Searby got into difficulties with a ball from Smith and played on, leaving with 5 to his credit. Dods was the next man in, and P. Morton took a turn with the ball at the town end. Scoring was very slow, and only 17 runs were showing after 40 minutes, when Pask went on again in place of Morton. Frearson had made 9 when he was caught by Covill off Pask, the board reading 19-4. Drakes then became associated with Dods. The excellence of the bowling may be judged from the fact that at this stage five consecutive maidens had been bowled. With 22 on the board, Covill relieved Smith at the pavilion end, and off the last ball of his first over Drakes scored the first boundary of the

innings. He had not increased his total when he was caught by Saxon at forward short leg, with the total 26 for five wickets. Sutton took his place at the crease, and with another run on, P. Morton took over the ball from Pask. The rot continued, Sutton being the next victim, with only one run in his bag, and the total 29 for 6. Shaw was the next man to go in, and with 30 runs showing Smith relieved Covill at the pavilion end. With Shaw batting with confidence, runs became more frequent, and when 40 went up on the board another bowling change was made, Covill relieving Morton. He soon secured a wicket, Shaw lifting a ball high into the air to be caught by Handscombe, the board reading 45-7. He left to make room for the Rev. H. Mack. Dods swept a ball from Smith round to the leg boundary to send 50 up at 6 o'clock. With only 30 minutes left in which to get the 42 runs required for victory, the batsmen still refrained from hitting out. When Dods did let out at a ball from Smith he was promptly caught by Hart at mid-off, with the total at 52 for 8. Dods had made the useful score of 17. His place was taken by Wilson, who hit a 4 and then stepped in front of a straight ball from Smith, with the board indicating 60-9. Chatterton was the last man, and he had not scored when he was beaten by Pask, the innings coming to a dramatic finish seven minutes from time, with a total of 61.

## COUNTY CRICKET CLUB.

### Second Half Revival After a Poor Start.

#### BATTING AND BOWLING AVERAGES

Had the Cambridgeshire Cricket Club produced the form earlier in the season that they displayed in their later matches they would have finished in a much higher position in the Minor Counties Championship table. In their last four matches they collected 14 points out of a possible 20, as a result of two victories and two drawn games. Previous to this period of success they had gained only one point out of 20, so that their aggregate for the season was 15 out of 40, representing a percentage of 37.50.

From this point of view their record was better than that of the preceding season, when their percentage was 32.50, as compared with only 25.00 in 1926. It will thus be seen that improvement is being made, even if only slight. As usual eight matches were played this season, and of these two were won, three drawn—one won on the first innings and two lost on the first innings—and three lost. Hertfordshire were the only side twice to defeat Cambs.

At the beginning of the season, for financial reasons, it was decided to discontinue the recent practice of playing matches in various parts of the County, but an exception was made in the case of Wisbech, which is a hot bed of cricket. Moreover, it has always proved a happy hunting ground for Cambs. who, I believe I am right in saying, have never lost a Minor Counties Championship match there.

The customary whole day club matches against strong sides have been played, and as usual, have given a number of young players a taste of better class cricket. The record in regard to club matches is not so favourable as last season, when all were won, but too much attention must not be paid to the results side, for some of the youngsters, who have done well in ordinary club cricket, have not come up to expectations in the higher circle.

So far as the Minor Counties Championship matches are concerned, the season can be regarded as satisfactory. The Club have again found it impossible always to field their strongest eleven, as may be seen from the fact that the services of 23 players have been called upon during the year. Such sound batsmen as K. R. J. Saxon and G. Carnegie-Brown were able to make only occasional appearances, while K. Falkner, who made a successful debut for Cambs. by heading the averages, only batted four times. He was, by the way, Cambs. only centurion of the season. Taken all round the batting has been unreliable. The Club are adopting the right policy in persevering with young players, but several have shown themselves lacking in county cricket temperament.

The greatest success of the season was R. Covill, who is on the ground staff at Lords. He is a steady all-rounder as may be seen from the fact that not only has he made the most runs, but has also taken the most wickets. His brother, Vic, however, did not reproduce his previous season's form. Smith has also shown good all-round form and closely follows R. Covill in both batting and bowling averages, while another player sound in both departments is F. A. Ridgeon. Whether his new professional duties will prevent him turning up next year remains to be seen, but there is no doubt that he will assist his native county, when occasion permits.

The bowling has always been steady, and the averages are headed by D. Pask, who also topped the figures of the Y.M.C.A., the Senior League champions, but he is closely followed by R. Covill and Smith, on whom the brunt of the attack has fallen. Apart from occasional lapses, the fielding has been very satisfactory throughout the season, and good work was again done behind the stumps by W. H. Cockell.

Altogether Cambs. have scored 2,608 runs for the loss of 130 wickets, an average of 20.04 per wicket (compared with 16.12 last year), while their opponents have knocked up 2,537 for the loss of 106 wickets, an average of 23.93 (as against 18.32).
