DEVON BOWLING.

I was not particularly impressed with the Devon bowling. Amory still possesses a good deal of pace, but not the pace of days of yore. COUNTY CRICKET FINANCES

HEAVY LOSS ON LAST SEASON'S WORKING

A debit balance of £86 on the year was A debit balance of £86 on the year was reported at a meeting of Cornwall County Cricket Club at Truro Town Hall on Thursday, when there was considerable discussion regarding the future finances of the club and the number of professionals playing in county matches. Col. Sir Hugh Prothero-Smith prosided and was conplaying in county matches. Col. Sir Hugh Prothero-Smith presided, and was con-gratulated on the honour of Knighthood conferred upon him by the King, on the motion of Major G. T. Williams (joint hon. sec.), who said he had been of more assistance to county cricket than almost anybody they knew.—Sir Hugh replied hieft. briefly.

briefly.

Presenting the accounts, showing a debit balance of £86, Mr. A. C. Polwhere (hontreasurer) stated that the receipts were £40/12s., of which £214 came from £59 members, and £180 17s. td. match receipts. The expenditure of £493 included £425 for matches. The whole of the deposit of £115 had been withdrawn, making a net balance in hand of £34, and there was a liability of at lenst £30.

In reply to a question by Mr. Polglase as to what the position was attributed, Mr. Polwhele said they lost £27 in 1928 on the five home matches and £37 on the four matches in 1927, but the 1923 tour, with five matches, cost only £14 more than the tour in 1927.

Mr. Beecher Williams (joint hon, see,) mentioned that through paying so many professionals they had to pay more for home games than they, received.—Mr. W. Mr. Treweck pointed out thet they could not afford to pay so many professionals, and, he thought that where possible amateurs should be played in preference.—Mr. Beecher Williams said he estimated the professionals cost them £170 per year at home or away.

The Rev. J. H. Williams thought there was no other minor county that paid so much for professionals as Cornwall. If they continued at that rate they would soon be bankrupt.—Mr. Polglase stated that although their professionals were not paid very high fees, £170 per year was more than the county could afford.

As a recommendation to the Selection

As a recommendation to the Selection Committee, Mr. Cubit Blamey moved that only two professionals should be played in future county matches, but that if necessary a third be engaged.

Expenses of Players

Mr. Beecher Williams pointed out that many amateurs could not afford to leave their work for two days' county cricket unless their expenses were paid, and the difference between that payment and that of the professionals was not much.—Major G. T. Williams, on the ground of finance, seconded the recommendation, but Mr. Polglase thought that if they fied the hands of the Selection Committee they

Polglase thought that if they fied the hands of the Selection Committee they might make matters worse. He proposed as an amendment that the matter be left in the hands of the Selection Committee, who should watch carefully the financial problem.—The amendment was carried by ten votes to five.

It was stated that on the occasion of the county match with Berkshire at Camborne, a collection was taken for the funds of the Camborne club.—Mr. Polwhele questioned whether grants should be given to clubs that made use in that way of grounds hired by the county.—Mr. W. H. Vinter objected to such collections being made, and Mr. Polwhele suggested that the amount collected on the day in question be deducted from the grant to the club.—Mr. Gardinner said the practice was a wrong one, and he did not think the club would do it again.

Grants of £10 to Penzance and £5 to Truro College, Camborne, and Liskeard for the use of their grounds during last summer were agreed to, and it was decided to pay subsidies totalling £55 to clubs engaing professionals.

Mr. Polwhele asked how the amounts were to be paid, seeing there was only £34 in liand.—It was decided that the amounts be paid as soon as subscriptions and other monies were received.

Fixtures for next season were decided as follow:—June 19th and 20th, Surrey 2nd XI., at Penzance; July 5th and 6th, Devon, at Truro; August 2nd and 3rd, Berkshire, at Camborne; August 5th and 6th, Dorset, at Camborne; August 21st and 22nd, Monmouth, at Liskeard; August 7th and 8th, Surrey 2nd XI., at the Oval; August 12th and 10th, Berkshire, away; August 12th and 15th, Monmouth, away; August 12th and 15th, Dorset, at Bridport; and August 16th und 17th, Devon, at Exeter.
