

KENT 2nd XI. v. SURREY 2nd XI.

This two-day match opened at Kennington on Saturday. Kent fielded a fairly strong side, including men who have appeared at some time or other in the 1st XI. After lunch the attendance increased to several thousand. Surrey won the toss and batted on an easy wicket, Bull and Watt opening the attack for Kent. Surrey sent Cook and Daily in and there was no separation until 60, when the former was smartly stumped by Tyler. At 62 Watt was relieved by Hever and later Bull gave way to Phillips, but Baldwin and Daily slowly but surely increased the score, the 100 going up at 1.10. Five minutes later Phillips superseded Fairservice from the pavilion end and Baldwin seemed anything but comfortable with Phillips, who is an exceptionally fast trundler. Daily was treating Hever cautiously. At luncheon the score stood 121 for 1, Baldwin being not out 25 and Daily not out 66, though Beslee had replaced Phillips. At 161 Daily was caught well down by Taylor. Two runs later Baldwin was stumped by Tyler. The remainder offered little resistance and the innings ended at 3.45 for 191.

The Kent fielding was good all round, and the fact that F. W. Tyler, behind the sticks, conceded only two extras, proves how well he performed in that position. The collapse of the Ovalites' batting was principally due to Beslee, who, after the interval, bowled an excellent length.

The Hop County started anything but well, one wicket being down for 11, two for 25, and three for 26. A useful stand followed, however, between G. S. Watson (Stiffingbourne) and the veteran skipper, "Jerry" Weigall, who took the total to 95 before the latter, after just previously giving a chance to Capt. Barnarto behind the stumps, definitely fell a victim there. Mr. Weigall had shown excellent form, with some pretty strokes. With a fine shot to the leg boundary, Watson sent up the Kent century, and incidentally completed his own 50, but he fell a victim shortly afterwards to L. S. Summers, who had just come on, with a ball that broke deceptively. Watson had played a patient, but invaluable innings, and was heartily cheered on returning to the pavilion. Hever went eight runs later (109), but Bull and Tyler played out time, time total then being 126 for 6.

On Monday, the game ended in a win for Kent on the first innings by 78 runs. Bull and Tyler made a fine stand in the first innings, the latter totalling 74, a score which undoubtedly won the game for the Hop County. In the second knock for Surrey, Baldwin showed good form in carrying his bat for 89, which included a five, and 11 fours. Scores:—

Playing on a hard wicket at the Foxgrove, on Tuesday and Wednesday, Kent's second eleven drew with Norfolk in a second class county match.

Beautiful weather prevailed throughout the match and it was surprising that more enthusiasts did not turn out to watch, what proved to be an interesting game.

G. J. V. Weigall, the Kent Captain, won the toss and put G. S. Watson and T. F. Mitchell in to open the batting against the Norfolk bowlers, C. Rought-Rought and Mower.

Mitchell opened the scoring with a well-hit "three," and carried his innings through for a useful 21.

Recordon, joining Watson on the fall of Mitchell's wicket, knocked up 80 in a little over an hour.

When Kent's last wicket fell in the course of the afternoon, the score was 223.

H. E. Low and B. W. Rought-Rought batted first for Norfolk, Rought-Rought putting on 71 before being dismissed by Taylor. Falcon, the Norfolk skipper, knocked up 84 in a brilliant innings distinguishable by his stylish batting and strong hitting. Norfolk were all out for 358, a reflection more on the Kent bowling and fielding than on Norfolk's batting.

Mower, Norfolk's last man was dismissed for a "duck" by a brilliant catch in the long field off the bowling of Hever.

Kent's second innings included a magnificent display of hard-hitting by Watson, who knocked up 132 and remained undefeated. Bull added a further 69 before being caught by Rought-Rought.

At 274 for 5 wickets, Kent declared and put Norfolk in again, but the visitors only managed to put on 53 at the expense of three wickets before stumps were drawn at half-past six.

In the earlier stages of the game, Kent's bowling did not appear to be up to standard, and their fielding was occasionally weak. Norfolk's bowling and fielding were good in the first stages, but against the strenuous hitting of Watson and Bull in the second innings, was badly knocked to pieces.

Messrs Best and Tregar acted as umpires throughout the game.

An Innings Defeat.

HOME BATSMEN FARE BADLY.

The Kent 2nd XI played disappointingly in their Minor Counties match with Buckinghamshire on Wednesday and Thursday at Folkestone.

In no phase of the game did they appear to advantage, and except for the bowling of Beslee and the fielding of B. H. Valentine few players did themselves justice. Bucks won easily by an innings and 146 runs.

There was but a mere handful of spectators present when play started on Wednesday. W. B. Franklin won the toss for Bucks, and naturally decided to take first "knock" on a fast wicket, sending in C. Powell and J. S. James to the fast bowling of Beslee from the pavilion end.

Powell got a cut for four off Beslee's third ball, but in stealing a single off the next delivery he was nearly run out following a smart piece of fielding by third man. The run did not profit Bucks, however, for James had his off stump uprooted by Beslee's very next ball. P. M. R. Stephenson joined Powell, and the pair at once began to run some rather short singles. Powell once drove Beslee for four through extra cover, and soon after collected a couple in the same direction with another hard hit. He was putting the bat hard against the ball, and was playing confidently, so that it was rather a surprise when he put a ball from Watt tamely into Dutnall's hands at short leg.

W. B. Franklin, the well-known M.C.C. wicket keeper, then came in, and he and Stephenson advanced the total by a smart rate of scoring. It was not until the partnership had added 142 runs that Stephenson was caught by Hubble off Beslee for an excellent contribution of 63, which included 10 fours. The next two wickets fell quickly, both Pitchford and C. T. Battcock being snapped at the wicket by Tyler.

FRANKLIN'S SOUND BATTING.

H. L. Aubrey Fletcher joined his captain, and with the batsmen hitting with power the score advanced steadily. Hubble had three men in the outfield when bowling to Franklin, but he continued to score at a good rate and sent the 200 up with a lofty hit for three. Shortly afterwards he obtained his individual century in just under 24 hours out of 200 with a full-blooded drive off mid-off's head to the boundary.

Beslee came on again at 230, the new ball being requisitioned, and in the same over Aubrey Fletcher was run out for a useful innings of 20.

Franklin's splendid innings came to an end soon afterwards, Bull holding a hard hit at mid-on off Todd. His innings was almost free from blemish, and he hit 17 fours.

Edwards, the last man in, made several nice shots off Beslee, and caused the 300 to be hoisted, the innings closing soon afterwards.

The Kent colts fared badly when they went in, and except for Dutnall and later Tyler few of the batsmen could do much against the wily left-hand bowling of Edwards, whose analysis at one time read:

Seven wickets were down for 51, but then F. W. Tyler joined G. J. V. Weigall. The latter's patience and the Kent wicket-keeper's hitting policy paid, and, although Tyler was dropped off mis-hits at cover and extra-cover, the pair had added 35 runs when stumps were drawn on Wednesday.

Less than seven overs were sufficient to end the home team's first innings on Thursday morning, and they had to follow on 305 runs to avoid an innings' defeat, a task which seemed beyond them, judging from their poor first innings' display.

KENT'S SECOND VENTURE.

G. S. Watson and Dutnall again opened for Kent, but the former did not stay long, for with his score at eight he was clean bowled by Battcock.

Another success fell Bucks' way a few runs later, for L. W. Recordon was snapped at the wicket by Franklin off Battcock after only scoring one.

B. H. Valentine came in, and the cricket, which up to then had been very slow, began to brighten up, both the newcomer and Dutnall hitting boundaries.

With his score at nine, Valentine should have been caught at second slip off Battcock, but Pitchford dropped a sharp chance.

Battcock got a third wicket with the score only 66, Dutnall being sent back lbw, and with only 10 more runs added Valentine was bowled by a splendid ball from Edwards.

Bull sent the 50 up with a hard drive through extra cover after 65 minutes' play, but almost immediately a startling collapse set in, and the six last wickets fell for only six runs, Bucks winning by an innings and 146 runs soon after lunch.

The Kent batsmen found considerable difficulty in playing the slow left-hand bowling of Edwards, who in the course of the match took 11 wickets for 61 runs. Pitchford also bowled well, taking two wickets for three runs in the second innings and two for 31 in the first.

In opening Surrey's second innings, W. T. Cook, and Baldwin made a good partnership and had carried the score to 60 when Cook was dismissed lbw, his score being 28. Wilson then came in. Baldwin's hard hitting was mainly responsible for the 100 being signalled after about three-quarters of an hour's batting. Ten minutes later the 130 was up. With his score at 81, Baldwin was caught by Bull off Blunden and received quite an ovation on returning to the pavilion. H. S. Squires, the next man, advanced the score to 157 before being caught by McVittie. Wilson had made a useful 28 and Daily had only had time to knock up 5 when stumps were drawn.

KENT 2nd XI. v. SURREY 2nd XI.

" HOPPERS " FAIL AFTER A GAME FIGHT.

On Monday and Tuesday Kent 2nd XI. and Surrey 2nd XI. met at Hythe in the Minor Counties Championship, Surrey winning an interesting game by 91 runs.

Following the heavy rain of Sunday night (or, rather, early Monday morning), the wicket, drying under the influence of the wind and sun, was extremely doubtful when the captains tossed, and G. J. V. Weigall, who correctly called, put his opponents in. For a time it seemed as though his action was certainly justified, for Surrey were all out before lunch for the modest total of 99.

Cook and Baldwin could do little with the bowling of Watt and Blunden, and both went back as the result of smart catches. Half the side were out for 28, but the two Gearys, hitting well, improved the score to an extent. Mobey, playing a little more quietly, was top scorer with 23. The Kent fielding was excellent.

The Hoppers had a few minutes batting before lunch without mishap.

A sharp shower during lunch did not help the wicket, and Kent had an unhappy experience when play was resumed.

All Out for 74.

Longfield left without scoring, Chalk scored a single, and Todd, a stylish left-hander, who had several trials with the first eleven earlier in the season, was bowled first ball. Watson fell to a brilliant slip catch at 48, and had actually scored 46 of the 47 runs which had come from the bat. A. Geary was bowling splendidly, and received useful support from Lock, who came on towards the end to good effect. A plucky piece of batting by Watt improved matters, but Kent were all out for 74, and therefore were faced with a deficit of 25.

Surrey did much better in their second knock, Cook and Baldwin playing the bowling with confidence. It was obvious that the heavy roller had improved the wicket very largely. Cook left at 60, when he needed only 18 to complete his thousand runs for the season, but Wilson stayed with Baldwin until the score reached 153. Baldwin was then caught, after batting very brightly for a fine 81. His method of pulling high-bouncing balls to leg was a little risky, but delightfully timed. When stumps were drawn Surrey had scored 163 for 3, and led by 188, with seven wickets to fall—a strong position.

Bowlers on Top Again.

The Kent bowlers came into their own again on Tuesday morning, Surrey's seven outstanding wickets falling for the addition of 71 runs. Bull and Todd, two slow bowlers, were fighting the ball cleverly, and always had the batsmen in difficulties.

Set to get 260 to win, a difficult task on such a wicket, Kent made a poor start by losing McVittie, Chalk and Longfield before lunch, when the score was 35 for 3.

Bull, promoted in the batting order, batted dourly after lunch, and displayed a nice stroke to leg with good effect. He left at 83, however, but then followed a fine stand between Todd and Watson. The former played himself in well, but was freer in his methods after Lywood, who had been bowling superbly, and A. Geary was relieved. While these two men were at the wickets a Kent victory was always quite possible.

Todd, however, snicked a faster ball behind the wicket at 140, and, with 100 addition to the score, Watson was bowled. Kent's position was now well-nigh hopeless. Weigall batted stubbornly, and was unlucky enough to receive a severe knock on a hand, which caused a brief retirement to the pavilion to have a finger bandaged. Shortly afterwards he was bowled, the Kent innings closing for 168.
