

COLTS AT BARNSELY.

Yorkshire Council XI. Carry Off Honours.

(From Our Special Representative.)

BARNSELY, Monday.

The team selected by the Yorkshire Cricket Council to oppose the County Second Eleven for the opening fixture of the Colts' programme gave a highly creditable account of themselves on the Shaw Lane ground to-day. They bowled and fielded so well that the young County aspirants were always fighting hard for runs, and the attack was never mastered.

The first fifty actually occupied an hour and twenty minutes, in which time four wickets fell, and the Colts were batting five minutes under three hours for the modest total of 143.

The most impressive of the Council bowlers was C. Nuttall, of South Kirkby, whose left-arm, medium-paced deliveries swung with the arm across the wicket in a way which the left-handed batsmen particularly found disconcerting. He took two wickets in his first four overs for five runs, and altogether bowled 21 overs for 25 runs, and four wickets, while even these figures might have been improved had an easy chance off his bowling near the end of the innings been taken. Nuttall may owe something of his success to the way in which he runs from behind the umpire, but he certainly bowled very skilfully. Dennis, of Hickleton, and Bentley, of Rotherham, both bowling quite fast, lent valuable assistance in the attack.

Just as Nuttall had provided the bowling feature of the day, it was left to a Council batsman, R. Shaw, who now plays for Horsforth, to give the brightest and most confident exhibition at the wicket. In his 50 not out, made at the end of the day in an hour and a quarter, he played with a freedom which no other batsman attained, and was little troubled with the best bowling that the Colts could bring against him. When stumps were drawn for the day, the Council were only 54 runs behind with seven wickets in hand, despite the fact that two of their batsmen had failed to score.

COLTS TOO ANXIOUS.

Match With Council Spoilt by Weather.

(From Our Special Representative.)

Few members of the Yorkshire Colts team have enhanced their reputation in the opening match of the season against the Council XI. The majority of the young players undoubtedly felt the importance of the trial, and did not play their natural game, while the Council gained confidence from their successful start; but it would not be surprising to find one or two of the players who have done so well on the latter side gain places in the Second eleven before long.

The bitterly cold, blustery weather robbed the cricket of almost all pleasure, both for the players and the few spectators, while discomfort was increased to-day by a drizzling rain, which fell for fully an hour during the latter part of the Council's innings.

The Council were batting three hours and fifty minutes—exactly an hour longer than the Colts—for a total of 298, which gave them a lead of 155. The outstanding contribution was R. Shaw's 72, made without fault, and including twelve boundaries. It was a most attractive exhibition of accomplished batmanship, marked particularly by its scoring defensive strokes and spectacular, well-timed pulls. Bentley hit seven fours in his 59, but was less interesting to watch than either Shaw or the young Leeds Clarendon player, Jaques.

Vigorous Batting by Lancashire Tail.

The Second Elevens of Lancashire and Yorkshire had a keen struggle for first innings lead at Old Trafford yesterday, where the bowling as a rule was better than the batting. Yorkshire, batting first, were in for two hours and three-quarters for 139, and even this poor total on such a wicket would probably have been reduced had Holroyd been put on to bowl earlier. He only had four overs, but in that period he took three wickets for nine runs.

Lancashire's batting was uneven, and when eight wickets had fallen for 102 their chance of establishing a lead looked remote. However, Preston batted admirably for 31, and after he had left, with Lancashire six runs ahead, Rushton found a useful partner in Holroyd, the pair putting on 73 runs for the last wicket. Rushton was particularly severe on Nuttall and hit him for a six, two fours, and a single in one over. Lancashire's last two wickets put on 112 runs in 55 minutes, and the innings closed in exactly the same time as Yorkshire's, with Lancashire claiming a lead of 79 runs.

Both Lancashire and Yorkshire seconds had completed innings at the end of their first day's play at Old Trafford, with the result that Lancashire had been left with a lead of 79 runs.

Yesterday the Yorkshiremen, thanks mainly to Shackleton's innings, which lasted two hours and forty minutes, and yielded 76 runs, improved on their first venture, and, after batting three hours and forty minutes, left Lancashire with 150 to get to win, and, with the extra half-hour's play, if required, three hours in which to get them.

Twenty minutes was taken for ten, and Lancashire, batting with a total lack of enterprise and imagination, provoked the spectators by their slowness on a hard wicket. The hints had a marked effect upon Houseman and Paynter, and in the end Lancashire won with 20 minutes and 7 wickets to spare.

COLTS AT NEWCASTLE.

Home County Get a First Innings Lead.

Glorious weather favoured the opening of the Minor Counties match between Northumberland and Yorkshire Seconds at Jesmond, Newcastle, yesterday. The wicket favoured the batsmen, and more runs would have been scored had the batsmen been more enterprising.

Both sides completed an innings, and the home county gained a lead of 61, thanks chiefly to the score of 82 by W. G. Mackay and a good stand of 43 for the ninth wicket by J. K. Craig and Hetherton. Mackay opened the innings with J. B. Bruce, and was fifth out with the last ball before lunch.

Without playing brilliantly, his was an invaluable contribution. When four short of his half-century he had a "life," for a ball from Shackleton struck his body and rolled on to the wicket but did not dislodge the bails. Then he developed the habit of playing back, and this proved his undoing, for he broke his wicket in guarding a well-pitched delivery from Bedford.

With Ord, Mackay put on 45 for the fourth wicket, and when he had gone there was something of a collapse, until Craig and Hetherton came together. These two showed the bowling could be hit, and when their partnership was broken the end soon came. Bedford had the best bowling analysis with 5 for 40, but Hall, in his first spell, had 2 for 12. Then he developed leg weakness and was rested for a time, and though he resumed later he was not so effective, and his 3 wickets cost 44. He was the second cripple on the Colts' side, for Major Chichester-Constable sprained a ligament and fielded under a big handicap.

The Yorkshire batting was not very convincing. Turner had the top score with 31, but he was missed on the boundary by Ord when he had scored 7. M. C. Reynolds came in at the sixth wicket, and with Fisher put on 32, and was last out for 23.

Altogether the Yorkshire innings lasted 2 hours and 25 minutes.

Hetherton troubled the Yorkshire batsmen with his medium pace bowling, and he had 5 wickets for 52. In 25 minutes' batting before stumps were drawn, Northumberland scored 33 without loss.

COLTS DEFEATED.

Barnsley Bowler a Success at Newcastle.

After an interesting day's cricket, the Yorkshire colts were defeated by Northumberland by 107 runs at Newcastle yesterday.

Overnight the home county had built up a strong position, having a lead of 84 with all their wickets standing in the second innings. Their batting to-day was brighter, and honours again went to W. G. Mackay, who was at the wicket 12 hours for 86, which included 14 fours. He gave no chance and his only bad stroke was one which brought about his downfall. He then played over a ball from Fisher in attempting a big hit on the leg side.

As far as Northumberland was concerned it was Mackay's match, for, in addition to scoring 168, he took 5 catches.

A valuable stand for the eighth wicket was made by I. C. Maconachie and J. K. Craig, who put on 67 in 35 minutes, providing the brightest cricket of the day.

The young Barnsley professional, Bedford, was the success for Yorkshire in bowling. Keeping a good length, he mixed the balls with skill and his googly had most batsmen in trouble and took a couple of wickets.

Yorkshire had nearly four hours in which to get 303 to win, but they did not look like accomplishing this. The most they could hope for was to save the points. There were one or two useful stands, notably between Turner and Shackleton, which put on 45 for the third wicket, and Fisher and Reynolds, who added 34 for the seventh.

Fisher had a life when he was dropped at the wicket, but otherwise he played confidently, his defence being good. When he had gone the end soon came, Chichester-Constable, still under the disability of a sprained leg, being bowled without scoring. The innings lasted 3 1/2 hours. Maconachie's fast bowling got him 4 wickets for 33.

Yorkshire Cricketers' Good Start at Doncaster.

TWO DAYS' MATCH.

A big cricket attraction at Doncaster this week is the Minor Counties match between Yorkshire and Leicestershire Second XI's on the Town ground on Wednesday and today (Thursday). Yorkshire finished off on Wednesday with a big advantage. Yorkshire declared at 275 for 8 and then got seven of the Leicestershire side out for 88.

Major Chichester-Constable won the toss for Yorkshire.

Whitehead and Bedford opened the Yorkshire innings quietly to the bowling of Bale and Tyler. Bale, bowling medium pace and left-handed, got in an occasional ball which "kicked." A cross wind helped him, but the batsmen had ten on the board in as many minutes. Whitehead made one confident leg glance which was smartly stopped by Broughton.

A regular rate of a run a minute was maintained. Bedford's first four was a leg shot off Tyler. York displaced Bale at 36, and Astill, a younger brother of the All-England player, went on for Tyler at 38. Bedford soon put Astill through the covers for a four.

Whitehead thumped a full toss from York to the boundary, and got two more fours off Astill. Yorkshire rounded the 50 mark in just under 45 minutes. It was good cricket now, and the batsmen kept their scores together, being "all square" at 37 each, and the question arose in the minds of many of the spectators whether these young men would emulate their more famous seniors with a first wicket century? They did. They had scored 81, at the end of an hour, and Whitehead reached his 50 with a pull to leg off Bowley, who had taken York's place. The same player soon afterwards sent up the hundred with a boundary shot off Astill.

With the score at 116, Yorkshire lost both these batsmen, Bedford, returning an easy "caught and bowled" to Tyler, while Whitehead played on to Bowley. With three more added, Turner, who followed Bedford, skied a ball from Bowley and was caught.

Whitehead's 69 included nine 4's. Shackleton and Spicer seemed to be in for a good stand when Shackleton played forward to one from Bowley, missed it, and was easily stumped. Four men were out for 134. At lunch the score was 136 for four, and Leicestershire had done very well.

In Bowley's first over after lunch Spicer found himself "yorked" by Bowley, and half the side were out for 141.

Fisher was missed by Bale at first slip when he had scored 30, but otherwise his batting was confident and good to watch. Davidson sent up the 200 with a mighty hit to the leg boundary.

He got several balls on the leg side from Tyler, but was too late with most of them. Bale and Tyler bowled maiden overs with the new ball, and the next 10 overs produced only 2 runs. Fisher stood at 48 when Brown relieved Tyler and bowled Davidson with his fourth ball.

The sixth wicket added 82 runs. Fisher reached his 50 with his captain as partner. The Major hit a two into long field, and then put up a simple catch to mid-off.

Fisher continued at his ease, and McReynolds, the Hickleton Main wicket-keeper, held on at the other end. Fisher put 250 on the board with a hard punch out of Point's reach. He now became top scorer.

Fisher went on to make 86 not out, and the innings was declared at 275 for 8.

Hall's "Bumpers."

When Leicesters opened their innings it was soon evident that they would have trouble in dealing with the fast bowling of Hall, who made the ball bump awkwardly. He got six wickets for 25 during the evening and Leicestershire had lost seven wickets for 88 at the close.

The match will be continued to-day and, if it lasts, it is intended to draw stumps at 6 p.m.

**Yorkshire II v. Leicestershire II
at Doncaster.**

COLTS IN FAVOURABLE POSITION.

Yorkshire Colts finished up in a sound position on Wednesday night in their two-days' match with Leicestershire II. After a fine opening partnership of 118 by Whitehead and Bedford, there was a succession of failures, but Davidson and Fisher made a stand of 82 for the sixth wicket. Fisher went on to make 86, being unbeaten when the Colts declared shortly after tea with 275 runs for 8 wickets.

On a batsmen's wicket, the opening Yorkshire pair sent up the hundred in just under seventy minutes. Bale, a left-hander, who has played for the Leicestershire first team, opening the bowling to Whitehead, Tyler being the bowler at the other end.

E. A. Broughton earned applause for several pieces of smart fielding in the slips, on one occasion stopping a leg-glance by Whitehead which was wide of him and which would easily have reached the boundary. The first four of the match was a beautiful glance to leg by Bedford. York then went on to bowl for Bale, with the total standing at 36, and Astill at the other end for Tyler.

By York's first ball, Whitehead was sorely puzzled, but the last delivery of the over—a full toss—was sent by him to the leg boundary. Far from decreasing the rate of scoring, the double-bowling change was the herald of a more vigorous display of hitting, and whereas the first forty came in as many minutes, in the five minutes immediately after the change of bowlers, seventeen was scored.

Astill, who is a brother of the Leicestershire first team all-rounder, was not giving too even a display of bowling, for in one over he was knocked for eleven and the next was a maiden. York, off whom 22 had been scored in four overs, was displaced by Bowley at 87. Only sixteen runs had been added to the century when the first wicket fell, Bedford being caught and bowled by Taylor. At the same total Whitehead played on to Bowley, and three runs later the third wicket fell, Turner being caught by York, off Bowley, before he had scored.

Those ten minutes had been rather tragic ones for the Yorkshire team and had resulted in a vast change in the Colts' outlook. After the fall of the third wicket the batsmen—Shackleton and Spicer—showed considerably more restraint, but there was soon another setback, for in playing forward to Bowley, Shackleton misjudged the ball and was cleverly stumped by Corral. At lunch the score stood at 136 for 4.

SLOW SCORING.

In the first over after lunch, Spicer was clean bowled by Bowley, the fifth wicket thus falling at 141. After the departure of Whitehead and Bedford the batting was anything but confident, although Davidson, associated with Fisher, had several pretty boundary shots. Generally speaking, the fielding of the Leicestershire men was smart, and a number of potential fours were restricted to singles. There were mistakes, however, and several runs were conceded by loose work in the outfield.

Davidson and Fisher seemed then to have settled down, offering a steady resistance to what was for the most part good-length bowling. After 200 had been scored, the bowlers, by reason of the new ball, kept the batsmen extremely quiet, and a period of real inactivity followed. Indeed, Fisher and Davidson were irritatingly cautious and for eight successive overs not a run was scored. In ten overs two singles had been registered—and with what a burst of ironic acclamation were they received by the crowd!

What a contrast the batsmen's attitude was to their former policy can be judged when it is said that up to the 200 mark both had been employing enterprising and productive strokes. Particularly was that so with Fisher, who had three successive boundary hits off Bowley. At that stage of the match it was strange to see how ineffective was Bowley, who, immediately before lunch, had been responsible for the collapse in the Colts' batting.

FISHER'S FINE INNINGS.

Davidson's somewhat tedious innings, in which he had compiled 26, ended when his partnership with Fisher had realised 82. Brown claiming the wicket immediately after having displaced Tyler. Despite its slowness, the partnership was invaluable for the runs were needed badly. In subsequent partnerships with Major R. C. Chichester-Constable and Mackeynolds, Fisher went on to make 86, and when the total had reached 275, with eight wickets down, the Yorkshire captain applied the closure.

If the Colts' batting had been uninspiring, it was not nearly so much so as that of the Leicestershire team, and after Hall, the young fast bowler who played for the Yorkshire first team against Middlesex at Lord's a few weeks ago, displaced Tyler, little resistance was offered. Developing considerable speed, and making the ball get up disconcertingly, Hall had the batsmen fairly tied down.

A typical example of his quickness of perception and his readiness to seize opportunities was given when following up his delivery and smartly fielding it, he surprised both batsmen and stumps by flinging the ball back to the wicket, with the batsman well out of the crease. Unfortunately the throw in was inches wide, but apart from the smartness of the action, it was an opportunity which would have gone by unobserved by many.

HALL'S HAVOC.

Allowing for what McReynolds had to contend with when stumping to Hall, his work was not satisfactory, as 26 extras out of a total of 89 shows.

When play closed Hall had secured six wickets at a cost of 25 runs, and Leicestershire, then 88 for seven wickets, required 93 to avert the follow on.

DURHAM'S BIG SCORE.

Yorkshire II's Hard Task.

(By Our Special Representative.)

YORK, Monday.

The strong Durham side, which did so well against the Yorkshire first team in a missionary match at Sunderland last week, had distinctly the better of the opening day's play in the return Minor Counties Championship match with the Yorkshire Second Eleven on the Yorkshire Gentlemen's ground here, and unless the Colts' tail is better than has been the case in recent matches the young Yorkshiremen are likely to be called upon to follow-on to-morrow morning.

Ferens and Moon are absent from the Durham side, but the reserves have proved quite efficient, and early in the visitors' innings it was obvious that the Colts were in for a stern time in the field. Askew and Oliver, the opening batsmen, were confident and aggressive from the start, but there was a time when Hall and Bedford seemed to be bowling well enough to get the upper hand, and, when four wickets were down for 87, the outlook for Yorkshire was promising enough.

Then Adamson and Howell got together and carried their side over a period when the Yorkshire attack was at its best, on a wicket that was on the tricky side. Howell's innings of 56 included one six and 3 fours, while Adamson in his 76 had one five, 6 fours, and 5 threes. Together they carried the score to 200, and did much towards giving Durham their present advantageous position. Quite the brightest bit of batting in the day's play, however, was provided by Carr, who scored 24 in fifteen minutes, hitting a six and 3 fours.

Hall came out with the best analysis—four wickets for 56 runs (at one time he had three for 15)—while Fisher, the East Leeds man, had three for 62, and Bedford two for 66. Bedford, however, bowled better than his figures indicate, and several chances were missed off him, particularly behind the wicket, where Boyes, of Thornaby, was making his first appearance with the side.

Durham took a little over four hours to score 279, and in the two and a half hours left for play the Colts totalled 138, at a cost of seven wickets. Their batting was far from enterprising, and but for a patient innings by Turner, who served his side well with 43 runs, and some sound work by Fisher, who got 32 before being l. b. w. to Brooks, the Durham captain, they would have been in a sad way indeed. Speak, the Leeds Clarendon batsman, who goes to Russia with the Yorkshire Amateurs A.F.C. at the end of the week, played one of his best innings with the Colts, scoring 20 before falling to one of the best balls of the match, sent down by Carr.

Yorkshire Colts' Brave Fight for Victory.

(By Our Special Representative.)

YORK, Tuesday.

In a really fine finish on the Yorkshire Gentlemen's ground here to-day, Durham beat the Yorkshire Second Eleven by 26 runs. The Colts made a brave fight for victory, when they went all out against time and good bowling, and in the end they were only just beaten. Durham owed much to the fine bowling of Cook.

Yorkshire had to fight to save the follow-on in the morning, and it was only the sound work of W. E. Harbord, the Etonian, that prevented his side batting again before lunch. He played a straight bat against the Durham attack at its best, and, picking the right ball to hit, added 29 to the overnight score of 50. Quite a few good judges are watching the work of this young man with more than ordinary interest. Goulder, of Sheffield, was the man who made the run which actually saved the follow-on. He was last man in, and when he went to the wicket the field closed in, but he did his work manfully, and when he was bowled by Cook Durham were 87 on.

The Yorkshire attack was shared by Hall, Fisher, and Bedford, and once again slips behind the stumps cost Bedford wickets. The young Barnsley man, however, had the satisfaction of bowling Gibbon, Carr, and Sadler. He suffered somewhat when the Durham batsmen were forcing the pace prior to the declaration, and again his analysis did not do justice to his bowling. Fisher, the fast Leeds man, took the other two wickets at a cost of 47 runs, and the Durham captain declared his side's innings at 144 for 5 wickets. Dobson was 38 not out, but the brightest batting was provided by the long-limbed Carr, who hit 4 fours in his short innings.

This sporting declaration left the Colts to get 232 in just over three hours, and right well did Whitehead and Bedford start. The former who comes from Friarmero, scored a very quick 23, before being bowled by Cook. Bedford was unlucky in being stumped off the wicket-keeper's pads, and three wickets were down for 50 runs. Then Turner and Speak, a former Leeds University captain, carried the score to 123—they added 73 runs in 42 minutes—and brought the prospect of a Yorkshire victory into sight.

Speak, who is now with the Leeds Clarendon Club, played his best innings for the Colts. He dealt with the bowling on its merits, and was especially hard on the loose ball. He took less than an hour to get his 74 runs, and altogether played as good an innings as has been seen on the ground for many a day. In his total there were 11 fours and one 6, and while he was at the wicket there was always a chance of victory for the Colts.

A stand by Harbord and Boyes roused hopes, until Cook got the wicket of the Thornaby stumper, and then the Colts captain hit 15 to help the total along. When Goulder joined Harbord 31 runs were required for victory, and at 6.15, with the total at 205, Goulder was bowled by Cook, and Durham won by 26 runs. Again Harbord carried out his bat. This time he had 18 to his credit, and has every reason to be satisfied with his debut with the Second Eleven.

COLTS IN DIFFICULT POSITION.

Overshadowed in the Match at Halifax.

23 WICKETS FALL.

HALIFAX, Monday.

There was a vast difference in the work of the second elevens of Yorkshire and Lancashire in the opening day's play in the Minor Counties Championship match at the Thrum Hall ground of the Halifax club, and the young Yorkshiremen were so overshadowed in bowling and batting, at all events, that they are in grave danger of an innings defeat.

In a full day's cricket 23 wickets fell, and as the 13 Yorkshire wickets only produced 119 runs against the Lancashire first innings total of 214, it will be seen that there is a stern fight in front of the home side to-morrow. Their work, however, was never as distinguished as that of the members of the Lancashire second team, and from the very first ball of the match the Yorkshire Colts were playing second fiddle.

Yorkshire's second string had first use of a wicket which had no terrors for the Lancashire batsmen an hour and three-quarters later, and Whitehead, a Huddersfield League player, who has previously distinguished himself by sound work with the Colts, was completely baffled by Booth's opening ball. Bedford, of Barnsley, followed Whitehead with only 3 runs on the board, and from that point the Lancashire Colts supremacy was clearly established. Harbord, the Etoman, quite one of the most promising amateur bats seen with the Colts for several seasons, and Turner set up a resistance which carried the score to 30, but judicious use of the effective visiting bowlers broke this partnership, and the Colts were all out in 90 minutes for 78 runs—less than half the total expected of them.

Senior, who plays with Huddersfield, was the one member of the side to face the bowling of Preston with any assurance. He went to the wicket after Preston had claimed two victims in an over, and he hit the Lancashire fast bowler for 2 fours and a two in his first over. Boys, the Thornaby wicket-keeper, also reached double figures, but the innings was a comfortless one from Yorkshire's point of view.

The ease with which the visitors tackled the Colts' bowling afterwards was none too encouraging either. Here Paynter played the part in the batting that Booth had played in the Lancashire attack. He went out at Bedford from the start, hit 5 fours in the Burneley man's first three overs, and had 50 of the first 68 to his credit in something like 40 minutes. His bright and courageous innings produced 62 and included 10 fours, and as Booth and Higson, the Lancashire Colts' captain, shared 80 between them, the young Yorkshire bowlers had none too happy a time.

Shackleton, who plays with Keighley, came out with the best analysis—3 wickets for 37. Horbury, the Harrogate all-rounder, who was making his first appearance with the side, bowled six overs for 28 runs and no wickets, and Bedford, despite his severe treatment by Paynter, finished with three for 58. But generally speaking the Yorkshire attack was undistinguished against that of their opponents.

Booth, who had three wickets for eight runs in the first innings, showed his merit in the Yorkshire Colts' second innings, taking the wickets of Whitehead and Bedford again for 11 runs. Again Harbord played a sound little innings, and the day ended with Turner and Horbury batting stubbornly and Yorkshire's second eleven, with seven wickets standing, needing 95 runs to avoid an innings defeat.

The Northumberland bowlers had made the wicket appear none too easy, for the ball had got up awkwardly, but Bruce and Mackay found run getting a simple sort of a matter, and had 60 runs on the board in half an hour. A brilliant catch in the slips by Harbury dismissed Bruce, and Shackleton, bowling well, followed with a couple of cheap wickets. Four wickets were down for less than a hundred, but a partnership by Broadbelt and McKinnell altered the outlook once again. In his 31 the former had five 4's, while McKinnell, in the best innings of the match, hit eight 4's, and was well bowled by Shackleton when three short of his 50.

Shackleton, who is 20 years old and has played with Keighley since he was 17, has had a most satisfactory game. He is a right arm slow bowler, with a fair command of length, and he can bowl a googly. In both innings he took seven wickets for 58 runs, and he batted soundly each time he went to the wicket. Hall, the York man, bowled at a fair pace this afternoon, and was hardly rewarded with four wickets for 53 runs.

There was an unfortunate happening near the end of the Northumberland innings. Smith, the Colts' wicket-keeper, left the field with a hand which had been damaged two overs earlier in taking a sharp return from the field. A doctor was called for, and it was found that the trouble was a compound fracture of the third finger of the left hand. This, of course, put Smith out of the game, and he was missed in the thrilling closing half hour, when his hitting powers might have pulled the match out of the fire for his side.

The young Yorkshiremen would have won with ease had their batting been as steady as in the first innings. They wanted 104 for victory, and had just over two hours in which to make the runs, but their nine wickets could only total 92. While it has to be remembered that they had the worst of the pitch, the task was one which seemed well within their power, until Atkinson started his third over. Shackleton and Cooper had carried the score from 32 to 71, and there were six wickets standing. Five runs were scored off the first four balls in this all-important over, and the last two got the wickets of Shackleton and Fisher. Lamb was caught off the second ball of Atkinson's next over—three wickets in four balls—and Northumberland were definitely on top. Cooper, the Bridlington amateur, looked like saving the game, but he, too, fell a victim to Atkinson. But for his contribution of 34, the Colts' second innings total would have been a poor one. PUBLIC SCHOOLBOYS AGAINST COLTS.

Batting Superior to Attack.

COUNTY OPENING PAIR STILL TOGETHER.

HARROGATE, Wednesday.

Some of the most promising of the public schoolboys born in the county are included in a Yorkshire Public Schoolboys XVI, which opened a two days' fixture with the Colts on the Harrogate club's ground to-day, a match which seems likely to be as successful as the first of the series, played at York last season, which drew attention to one or two young amateur batsmen.

What is more, the match is shaping a similar course, for, once again, the members of the Public Schoolboys' side, while showing an ability to get runs quickly and well, have not so far produced a bowler of sufficient ability to trouble the Colts seriously. The weakness of the schoolboys' team last season was in the bowling, and though no fewer than nine young men with vastly different styles were tried in the 105 minutes the Colts' opening pair were at the wicket this evening, the young professionals were never in difficulties.

The fact that Whitehead and Davidson scored 183 runs off this varied attack demonstrates just how completely they were masters of the situation. They—Whitehead especially—took full toll off the medium fast bowlers called upon by Mr. Hesketh, of Barnsley, who is acting as captain of the Public Schoolboys' team, and they might have scored even more heavily off some of the slow break bowlers. The schoolboys' bowlers, as is only to be expected, lacked control of length, and in all the overs the nine of them sent down there was only one maiden, and that was placed to the credit of Haigh-Lumby.

In at least one over runs were made off every ball, and the pace of the scoring is revealed by the book, which shows that Whitehead hit 16 fours in his 94, while Davidson had five in his 73. These capable young professionals—Whitehead, of course, has had considerable experience in Huddersfield League cricket, and Davidson is one of the most consistent batsmen in the Bradford League—are well on the way to the completion of a first wicket stand of 200, and their batting has placed the Colts in a very strong position, for the Public Schoolboys, who had first use of the wicket, are only 87 on.

The sixteen members of the schoolboys' team totalled 270, and the best innings was that of C. C. Garthwaite, who is at the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich. He tackled the Colts' attack in a very efficient style, and displayed a commendable inclination to get runs on the off-side. He had 9 fours in his total. Troup, of York St. Peter's, who is the wicket-keeper, gave his side a good start, for he hit a six off Goulder and batted soundly for 21.

Another St. Peter's boy, Elliott, played a pleasing innings of 28, while Bader, Barker, Place, and Barwick helped the total along in good fashion. The side from a batting point of view was confident and enterprising, and there was some enthusiastic running in the innings, which lasted just over four hours. If the bowling had been as good as the batting and the fielding the Colts batsmen would have had a vastly different experience.

COUNTY COLTS SEASON.

Promising Talent Among the Batsmen.

FAST BOWLER NOT FOUND.

Yorkshire Second Eleven closed their season's work in the Minor Counties Championship competition with a defeat by Northumberland at Bridlington, and once again they are nearer the bottom of the table than the top. The winning of matches, however, is not the first aim of those who select the Colts' side, and though the season has been disappointing in a playing sense, it cannot be doubted that the mission of the side has been fulfilled in producing certain promising talent.

This is a point made by Major R. C. Chichester-Constable, the captain, and he says that among the thirty young men who have been given trials with the side are several distinctly good batsmen. W. E. Harbord, the old Etonian, came into the team for the last three matches in the Minor Counties Championship, and he showed himself to be probably the best amateur bat the Colts have had for some time. His defence is extremely good, and he has shown—in the games with Durham and Lancashire Second, for instance—that he has the right temperament. His work has been so good that he was promoted to be opening batsman with Whitehead, of Friarmer, who is a left-handed batsman of much more than average ability.

Speak, a former captain of the Leeds University XI, has made a favourable impression, and as a forcing bat more must be heard of him. He demonstrated his mettle in the second innings of the Durham match at York, and while he was at the wicket there was always a possibility of the Colts gaining a great victory. A lack of steadiness in batting has given rise to an opinion that an "old hand" or two in the team would stiffen the batting and help to give the youngsters confidence.

The work of Bedford, Turner, and Shackleton is well known—they are all-rounders with a future before them—and Barber, the batsman, who was discovered in the Colts team the season before last, is regarded as the man who should be able to fill any vacancy in the first team's batting list which may occur. Dennis and Hall have been the bowlers who have provided the pace, Bedford, Shackleton, and Goulder the slow spin bowlers, and Fisher and Turner the medium pace. Nuttall is a good bat with promise as a left arm bowler, while Lamb, of Bradford, who came in for the last match, bowled a good length.

It has to be admitted, however, that the batsmen are more promising than the bowlers. Douglas, who has done so well with the Second Eleven for four or five seasons, has been handicapped with an injury this season, and the Colts captain sums up the situation by saying that while there has been much promise in the bowlers tried it cannot be said that the man for whom Yorkshire seeks has been found.

"The crying need of Yorkshire," he says, "is for a really fast bowler, or, alternatively, one who can take his share of the donkey work and keep an end going, and we have not yet discovered him."

The Colts work in the field has been good, and Major Chichester-Constable says he is happy to be able to speak well of their enthusiasm and department.
