MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

CORNWALL V. SURREY 2ND XI

Cornwall opened their Minor Counties Championship series at St. Clare, Penzance, on Wednesday morning, when they met Surrey 2nd XI.

The weather was magnificent and the wicket all that could be desired.

Cornwall won the toss, and sent in J. C. Baker and Rogers (G.). A notable absentee from the Cornwall side was Harry Tresawna, who skipped the home side for many years past, and C. Shaw Baker became skipper.

Lywood took up the bowling for Surrey, J. C. Baker facing his opening deliveries, and scoring a boundary in the first over. E. G. Stroud bowled from the opposite end, where Rogers took the bowling.

Early in the game, Baker returned the ball to Lywood, who missed an easy catch. Scoring was very slow, and 10 went up after a quarter of an hour's play, when Baldwin missed Rogers at points from a rather difficult chance. Rogers took advantage of this later and drove Lywood to the boundary, and followed this up in the same over by putting Lywood again to the boundary through the slips, raising the home score to 20.

Then came Lywood's revenge. Before the over closed, he took Rogers' middle stump.

Stroud's first four overs were maidens, the next yielded one run, and the sixth was a maiden.

Cory filled Rogers' place at the wickets, and when only another couple of runs had been added, J. C. Baker tipped an easy catch to Whitfield in the slips.

C. Shaw Baker took his son's place, and opened shakily, being missed in the slips off his first ball.

Sheffield replaced Lywood, and after scoring only 2, Cory was caught behind the wickets by Mobery. The tide was now running against Cornwall, three wickets being down for 26 runs, after 40 minutes' play.

Addicoat joined Shaw Baker, who put Stroud nicely to boundary off a leg stroke, and the telegraph recorded 30.

Lywood again bowled vice Sheffield, who had had three maidens.

Soon after, further disaster befell Cornwall. Baker mis-hit a delivery from Lywood, and Whitfield brought off a wonderful catch.—4-38-40.

Colquhoun joined Addicoat, and the latter was stumped without any addition to the score.—38-5-3.

Clarence Paull joined Colquhoun, who got a pretty boundary off Lywood, but just after he was bowled by Stroud.—45-6-4.

Rust then joined Paull, and was bowled off the first delivery he received from Lywood.—7-46-0.

Matters were looking decidedly black for Cornwall, and it looked doubtful if they would outlast the luncheon interval.

Ollereanshaw partnered Paull, and opened with a boundary off Stroud, and followed this with a further couple of boundaries in succession.

The field appreciated this and spread out.

Sheffield now again replaced Lywood and 70 went up. Baldwin relieved Stroud, who had bowled unchanged up to this point.

Paull raised the total to 80 with a boundary, and was then taken behind the wicket by Mobery off Baldwin for 80.—82-8-20.

Whiting was next in, and opened with a 2 off Baldwin, but in the next over was bowled by Sheffield—87-9-2.

Kendall completed the Cornish team, and started with a boundary, bringing the score to 90. Both men began to hit out, and runs came more freely than at any time during the innings. The century went up amid applause.

Baldwin was proving expensive, and then Lywood went on for Sheffield, and Ollereanshaw drove him twice to the boundary with his first over.

The innings came to an end at 120, Kendall succumbing to Baldwin for a brief but very merry innings—120-10-17.

Ollereanshaw carried his bat through for 37.

The last wicket put on 33 runs.

SURREY AT THE WICKETS.

Surrey went to the wickets immediately after lunch. W. J. Cook and Mobery batting, and Whiting and Kendall bowled. Runs came freely, but when 22 had been scored Mobery was run out.—22-1-7.

Woolatt filled his place, and when 30 had been scored, Ollereanshaw went on for Kendall. Forty runs went up in the half an hour's play, and Woolatt with a couple of successive boundaries off Whiting raised the half-century.

Whiting, however, had his revenge, for with the semi-hard ball in the over he had Woolatt caught and bowled.—51-2-16.

Stroud joined Cook, who was playing delightfully free and easy cricket, yet putting in power whenever there was an opportunity. Sixty went up in just under 1/2 of an hour.

With the score nearing 70, C. Shaw Baker relieved Whiting, and Cook sent his first delivery to boundary, and later he got the first 6 of the game off Ollereanshaw, and then completed his half-century, which had taken him less than an hour.

With the score at 87, Stroud was smartly stumped by Rust off Baker—87-3-8.

The rate of scoring slowed down after this, but the Surrey men gradually neared the century, which was hoisted in an hour and ten minutes. Of these Cook had claimed 70.

Baldwin opened very cautiously, but gradually settled down. A double change in the bowling was made, Kendall and Whiting taking up the attack, and this brought about Cook's downfall, Kendall taking his middle stump—111-4-70.

Daily joined Baldwin, but made none too sound a start, narrowly escaping being taken by Whiting, and Baldwin previously had an escape, just eluding Rust behind the wickets.

Baldwin did not long survive Cook, falling a victim to Kendall—116-5-10.

The last half-hour had brought about a considerable change, and things began to look less black for the home county.

At 3.45 p.m. Surrey had equalled the home total, but runs were coming far more slowly. In fact, outside of Cook's score, the figures for the other Surrey batsmen up to this period were very moderate.

With 130 on the board, Shaw Baker relieved Whiting, and the rate of scoring quickened, but Baker just failed to take Daily in this over. The batsmen were not showing any great degree of confidence, and at length Baker tempted Daily to come out, with the result that Rust stumped him.

Whitfield succeeded Daily, but Baker took his wicket with the first ball he received—136-7-0.

In the same over Cole was stumped by Rust off Baker, who had now secured three wickets in this over—140-8-3.

The game had swung round remarkably, and from being in an apparently hopeless position, Cornwall were now making a good showing.

The tide still ran with the homesters, Sheffield being stumped by Rust off C. S. Baker for 1-143-0-1.

Lywood was the last man in, and was caught by Kendall off Baker from his last ball—143-10-0.

Few people were prepared for such a collapse.

Baker did the hat trick. The last four wickets fell for four runs.

CORNWALL'S SECOND ATTEMPT.

Cornwall started their second venture at 4.20, with J. C. Baker and Rogers (G.), and again Lywood and Stroud took up the attack. Lywood's first over was a maiden, but Baker broke his duck off Stroud, and then drove Lywood to the boundary.

When a fourth run had been scored, Baldwin relieved Lywood, and then with the first ball of Stroud's next over, Rogers was bowled—14-1-3.

Cory succeeded Rogers, and after a couple of overs, Baker put up an easy catch which was taken by Whitfield—18-2-14.

Cory exercised great care, but, notwithstanding, he was bowled by Stroud for a single—20-3-1.

Cornwall were thus making a worse show than in their first innings.

Addicoat filled J. C. Baker's place, and C. Shaw Baker came in in place of Cory. Scoring was painfully slow, and Shaw Baker was bowled after scoring a single—25-4-1.

Colquhoun partnered Addicoat. The game had been in progress for 50 minutes for 30 runs.

The batsmen seemed unable to do anything with the bowling, and, when Colquhoun had made 3, he was caught behind the wickets by Mobery off Stroud—33-5-3.

Ollereanshaw was next in, and after a fairly long stay at the wickets, he returned one to Baldwin, who made no mistake—43-6-4.

The nature of the game may be gauged from the fact that an hour and twenty-five minutes was taken in scoring 50 runs. Addicoat, however, deserved the utmost praise for his patience. He was the only batsman on the home side to offer any real opposition to the bowlers.

When the half century had been reached, Addicoat began to open out, and he got boundaries from two successive balls off Baldwin, and 60 was hoisted. Then Addicoat "skied" one, but happily there was no Surrey man in the vicinity, and 70 was hoisted, of which Addicoat had scored 40.

Things were decidedly waking up, and Sheffield relieved Baldwin, but Addicoat nicked him through the slips to the boundary.

Stroud, who had bowled throughout, was now replaced by Geary. When Addicoat had 45 to his credit, he had a close shave. He started a run, and then Paull hesitated, but both men resumed their running, and Addicoat was just home in time.

Time was drawing very near, and Lywood once again took up the attack, but Paull withstood the onslaught, and time arrived with both men unbeaten—Addicoat 46 not out, and Paull 8 not out.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

PENZANCE, Thursday.

When stumps were drawn in the Minor Counties Championship game between Cornwall and Surrey II. last night, Cornwall in their first innings had scored 120, Surrey II. in their first innings had made 143, and Cornwall in their second venture had put on 83 for the loss of six wickets—W. J. Addicoat 46 not out and Clarence V. Paull not out 8.

When the game was resumed this morning, the weather had undergone a change. The brilliant sunshine and cloudless sky had given place to a leaden sky with a slight mist, but the temperature was warm and there was a promise of a fine day.

Addicoat and Paull resumed their innings, to the bowling of Stroud and Lywood. Addicoat soon got going, and was not long in reaching his half-century, and Paull got a boundary off Lywood in his first over. The telegraph read 90 after a few minutes' play, and runs came fairly freely. The partnership, however, did not last long, Addicoat being bowled by Stroud—93-7-50. Addicoat well deserved the applause he received.

Rust filled the vacancy, and out Stroud nicely for 2 in his first over, and then Paull hoisted the century. Stroud tried Rust with a full toss—the ball that beat him on the previous day—but the Penzance man was not to be caught napping on this occasion, and promptly sent the delivery to boundary.

When 112 was signalled Paull was given by off Stroud—112-8-21. Paull's innings had been most valuable. It was he who really stopped the rot which had set in so badly for Cornwall, and, with Addicoat, to whom he lent assistance, with his patient play, changed the complexion of the game.

P. H. Kendall then joined Rust and Geary went on to bowl vice Lywood. Runs continued to come pretty freely, and 120 went up—thus equaling Cornwall's score on the previous day, and then Rust was bowled by Geary—124-9-19.

Whiting went to the wickets, and the end came quickly and unfortunately. Whiting made a stroke and called for a run, but Kendall was late in starting and was run out, the total score being 129.

This left Surrey II. with 107 to win, whilst Surrey II. with 107 to win.

SURREY'S SECOND VENTURE.

Surrey opened with Cook and Mobey, and Kendall and Ollerearnshaw took up the bowling. Both men started cautiously, but runs came steadily. When 35 had been hoisted without separation, Whiting relieved Kendall, who changed over and took Ollerearnshaw's place, and Kendall beautifully beat Mobey in the first over after the change—35—1—11.

Woollatt succeeded Mobey, and drove Whiting to the boundary. Just before the half century went up C. S. Baker relieved Whiting, and a couple of overs later, Kendall bowled Woollatt—57—2—12.

E. G. Stroud filled the vacancy and was dismissed by Kendall off the second ball without scoring—57—3—0.

Baldwin then partnered Cook, and was not happy at the start, but 60 went up after about three quarters of an hour's play. When Cook had made 47 he gave a difficult chance in the deep field to Rogers, who failed to hold it.

When 80 had been signalled, Cook began to hit out. Baldwin narrowly survived being stumped.

Ollerearnshaw replaced Baker, and the century went up with the men unbeaten, and Cook made the winning hit with a boundary, Surrey thus winning by 7 wickets at 1.15. Scores:—

SPLENDID CORNWALL

BRIGHT PLAY IN GAME WITH DEVON

Cornwall's encounter with Devon, on Truro College ground, on Friday and Saturday, provided excellent cricket. Praise is due to Dr. Magson and the College staff for having prepared a first-rate wicket, which was appreciated by the players of both counties. Devon compiled a huge score of 363 runs in their first innings, W. W. Hoare making a century, and Cornwall made a wonderful reply of 335. George Rogers, the Camborne pro., set up a record for Cornwall by scoring 152, the highest individual effort ever made for the county. The result was a draw, Devon taking major points for winning on the first innings.

Batting first on a perfect wicket, Devon scored at a fair pace, 30 runs being registered in half an hour. Rogers relieved Whiting, and at 57 he claimed Fulcher's wicket. With the score at 90 Ollerearnshaw went on to bowl in place of Kendall, and with his third delivery he clean bowled Whitting, who had been at the wickets 89 minutes, his contribution being 41. Hoare, the incoming batsman, was lucky to escape being stumped by Rust, the Cornish wicket-keeper making a bad fumble. Hoare and Falding continued to score freely, and later Whiting and Kendall were again brought into action, but the score was taken to 150 for the loss of two wickets at the lunch interval. Soon after resuming Whiting bowled Falding for 72, the third wicket partnership having produced 84 runs. Falding's hits included 10 boundaries. Redman sent up the second hundred, and there was a strong appeal for a catch behind the wicket off Hoare, but he was adjudged not out. Three balls later Ollerearnshaw snapped Redman's wicket with a good ball, the score then being 224 for four wickets. At 245, Rogers relieved Whiting, and bowled Poynder with his first delivery, and Amory, the Devon captain, was dismissed at 264. One run later Sherlock fell a victim to Kendall, the same bowler beating Wilkinson at 281. With eight wickets down for 281, Cornwall had a fair prospect of getting Devon out under 300, but the tired bowling was fogged, and Hoare and Jennings scored at a brisk pace, the former reaching his century by hitting Whiting to the boundary. The score was taken to 359, when a spectacular one-hand catch by Tresawna sent back Jennings, who made 32 in a ninth wicket partnership for 78 runs. Midgley was snapped by Rust off Rogers without opening his account, and the Devon innings finished at 363—the result of about four hours' batting. Hoare, who went in at the fall of the second wicket, was undefeated for 127, of which 13 were boundaries. The Cornishmen had a tiring time in the field in very hot weather. There was no outstanding bowling performance. W. Rogers four for 93, and Ollerearnshaw three for 67, having the best returns.

Cornwall's Big Task

Facing the mammoth task of making 364 runs to obtain a first innings lead, and 264 to avoid having to follow on, Cornwall opened with George Rogers and J. C. Baker against the bowling of Midgley and Jennings. Thirty runs were registered in many minutes, and a double change was made in the bowling, Amory and Sherlock going on. Two runs were added, and Baker was sent back, Sherlock claiming his wicket. Cory and Rogers batted enterprisingly, and were well set, but two runs short of the hundred, Cory was smartly caught in the slips by Redmond off Amory, after contributing 38. Addicoat joined Rogers, and the pair remained together until the close of the day's play, the score being 131 for two wickets, of which Rogers had made 60 and Addicoat 21.

Continuing Cornwall's innings on Saturday morning, George Rogers and Addicoat carried the overnight score of 131 to 144 when Addicoat was bowled by Amory for 27. The fourth wicket fell at 165, C. V. Paul being caught by Hoare off Jennings just when he was settling down. Runs were hard to get, the Devon fieldsmen being well placed, and many hard hits by Rogers were saved close on the boundary line for singles. In eight overs only eight runs were scored, the first hour's play producing only 45 runs. Ollerearnshaw was in about 30 minutes for his nine, and he was got rid of by a smart catch by Jennings. With half the side out for 176 runs, Cornwall's prospects were far from hopeful, about 90 runs being required to prevent a follow on. W. Rogers joined his brother George, but he did not stay long, losing his wicket at 197. The Cornish captain, H. Tresawna, became associated with George Rogers, and by a patient and valuable innings improved the home county's outlook. George Rogers was loudly applauded when he reached his century after being at the wickets for over three hours. Jennings, the Devon pro., after bowling unchanged for two hours, was relieved by Falding, but Rogers and Tresawna improved the rate of scoring, and saved Cornwall from the humiliation of being compelled to follow on. At 285, Wilkinson went on to bowl in place of Amory, and the change was effective. With his third delivery, Wilkinson captured Tresawna's wicket, the Cornish captain having stayed for 60 minutes with Rogers for his 46. The partnership realised 88 runs. The third hundred was sent up soon after lunch, and at 309 Rust was caught behind the wicket.

Rogers's Record Knock

With 2 wickets to fall and 54 runs required to exceed Devon's total, excitement grew. Kendall joined Rogers, and soon afterwards Rogers was cheered on registering his 150, and thus setting up the highest individual batting record for Cornwall. The two previous best performances were 149 by Vihart against Berkshire at Reading, and 140 by Walter Coad the old Lanhedock player, against Carmarthen at Llandoverly. The score crept up to 324, when Kendall made a heroic hit, and was caught near the boundary line by Poynder. All hopes were now centred on Whiting, the veteran Cornish pro., to assist Rogers in saving the game. This is Whiting's 26th season with Cornwall, and on more than one occasion he had been known to come to the rescue of his side with a timely score. Whiting shaped promisingly, and just as Cornwall were within measurable distance of success—only 29 runs behind—and Devon were getting anxious, the innings terminated unsatisfactorily for Cornwall, a decision that left room for doubt, and some of the spectators expressed their disapproval in unmistakable fashion. It was an unflattering conclusion to a wonderful innings by Rogers, who stayed when others were going, but Devon breathed a sigh of relief when they succeeded in dismissing a difficult customer, who had resisted the attack for nearly five hours, and hit 90 boundaries. It was Rogers' third century this season, and against Devon at Truro last year he won distinction by scoring 135. He supplied the type of play which spectators love, and his brilliant effort was recognised in tangible form by the spectators, a collection on his behalf realising 46 3s. 7d.

When Devon started their second innings interest in the game vanished, as there was no prospect of a decisive finish, only three hours remaining for play. Only a miracle could prevent a draw, and Devon were assured of five points for the first innings lead, Cornwall taking three points. The Devonians lost Whiting at 13, and scoring became painfully slow. Two more batsmen, Fulcher and Hoare, were sent back before 60 was reached. Devon took 24 hours to get 153 runs for the loss of six wickets, and stumps were drawn. Scores:

CORNWALL v. BERKSHIRE.

THE GAME ABANDONED.

The two-days' game between Cornwall and Berkshire in the minor counties championship series, which opened at Camborne on Friday, was abandoned on Saturday, in consequence of the heavy rain.

When stumps were drawn on Friday night, Cornwall (who had batted first) had made 86, and to this Berkshire replied with 379 for the loss of eight wickets.

The batting of the visitors was marked with great confidence and vigour, and a better display of forceful cricket has rarely been witnessed in the county.

The Hon. R. J. F. Remnant, who went in first, batted for 2½ hours, and made 127. It was a fine exhibition. He hit with great freedom and soon got complete control of the bowlers. Before he got going, however, he was missed by Ollerearnshaw. This mistake was a costly one, and undoubtedly had an influence on the whole game. Remnant was also missed by Baker and Cory, and it was a fine catch by Tresawna that brought about his downfall.

D. W. Stokes was Remnant's opening partner. Stokes gave a polished display, and his 68 was well deserved. Stokes is only 19.

Another costly mistake for Cornwall was when Colquhoun failed to stump Dempsey before the latter had scored. Dempsey hit with great vigour.

But the champion hitter of the side was R. H. C. Human, who lifted Whiting clean over the high boundary wall for 6 twice in one over.

The fielding on the Cornish side was not all that it might have been, but Pearce, Addicoat, Tresawna, and Cory gave a capital display in this department.

CAMBORNE, Friday.

CORNWALL'S BAD START.

Cornwall made a rather disastrous start in their match with Berkshire at Camborne on Friday, the whole side being dismissed for the small score of 86.

There had been heavy rain over night, and the pitch was soft.

Cornwall won the toss, and Tresawna and Rogers faced the bowling of Palmer and Remnant. Rogers took the first ball, which went to boundary for a bye. The same player somehow narrowly escaped being run out in the first over, and he seemed uncomfortable against Palmer, whose first over was a maiden.

After fifteen minutes' play, Rogers pulled one from Remnant on to his wicket for 7. The total was then 18.

Addicoat went on in the place of Rogers. The scoring was very slow, the ball rising most awkwardly off Palmer. Twenty went up in the first half hour.

Addicoat gradually woke up, and two boundaries were deservedly applauded. Tresawna, who had been batting steadily, also drove Remnant to the boundary, and forty went up after 45 minutes.

Soon after, Sholto-Douglas relieved Palmer; Addicoat got a single off his first delivery, but, with his next, he dropped Tresawna's wicket, after the Cornishman had made 17—48—2—17.

Cory took Tresawna's place, but was caught behind the wickets by Stokes off the first ball he received. 48—3—0.

C. S. Baker succeeded Cory. In the next over, Addicoat was caught by Human off Remnant, without any addition to the score. 48—4—17.

Addicoat's contribution was 17. This had considerably altered the complexion of the game, from Cornwall's point of view. Pearce took Addicoat's place at the wicket. C. S. Baker did not last long, and was caught by Palmer off Douglas when his score was 2—50—5—2. Play had not been in progress much over an hour. Ollerearnshaw succeeded Baker, but was very smartly caught by R. Palmer off Dower, without scoring.—50—6—0.

Colquhoun joined Pearce, and, in the next over, Pearce was dismissed by a catch by Stokes, also off Douglas—51—7—0. Pearce had been batting steadily for twenty minutes without scoring.

Dower then joined Colquhoun, and a confident appeal against him went up from the first ball he received, but he survived it. At 1 o'clock, 60 had been telegraphed and then Woodburn relieved Palmer, who had, up to that point, bowled unchanged.

Colquhoun and Dower batted with more confidence than their predecessors. Prior to their association, Sholto-Douglas had taken four wickets for two runs.

With 70 on the board, R. Palmer relieved Douglas. Then Dower fell to a catch in the slips off Woodburn for a timely 12.—72—8—12.

Whiting joined Colquhoun, and was dismissed by Woodburn after scoring 1. 74—9—1. Kendall was next man in, and lifted his first ball almost to the boundary, where he had the greatest luck in being missed. Just before the lunch adjournment, Woodburn bowled Colquhoun, and Cornwall closed their innings for 80.

BERKSHIRE AT THE WICKETS.

Berkshire started after lunch with the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and D. W. Stokes against the bowling of Whiting and Kendall. Ollerearnshaw dropped a catch off Remnant from Kendall's bowling before the Berkshire man had scored. The weather had considerably improved after lunch, the sun shining brightly, and the wicket also improved. When 30 has been scored, Shaw Baker relieved Whiting. Baker's first over was extraordinary. It included 4 wides, a no-ball, and two boundaries.

Runs came swiftly and 50 were up at 3 p.m. without separation. Remnant was hitting freely, and punishing Baker.

With 60 on the board Ollerearnshaw relieved Baker. Shortly after Remnant completed his half century, and then gave a difficult chance to Baker off Kendall. The Cornwall total was passed in about an hour's play.

The century went up at 3.25. When he had made 80, Remnant had another "life," Baker failing to accept a difficult catch in the slips, and then Stokes completed his half century.

Tresawna made another change in his bowling, putting Cory on in place of Whiting, and Remnant completed his century. Baker relieved Kendall, who took on at the opposite end. Off the second ball, Remnant put up the easiest of catches, which Cory missed.

Cornwall's first success came soon after tea. Stokes failed to get one of Baker's deliveries away, and Kendall stamped it up in the slips.

G. Sayles filled the gap and in Baker's next over he stepped out to a ball, missed it, and was stumped—194—2—3.

Capt. M. C. Dempsey joined Remnant. The second century was signalled, and then Remnant scored the first "6" of the game, lifting Kendall beautifully out of the field.

Ollerearnshaw relieved Baker, and at last Remnant's downfall came. He drove Ollerearnshaw hard, but this time Tresawna made no mistake. Remnant had batted 2½ hours for an invaluable, if not flawless, 127—235—3—127.

M. Turner joined Capt. Dempsey. Scoring continued quite as rapidly, Dempsey hitting with considerable power. A separation came, when Kendall took Dempsey's wicket for a well-played 49—278—49.

W. Y. Woodburn joined Turner, and just as 300 was telegraphed, Woodburn was stumped off Baker—300—5—15.

R. H. C. Human then partnered Turner, and lifted Whiting clean out of the ground for "6," following this by a 4, and then another 6, this over yielding Human 21.

Turner endeavoured to emulate his example, and drove Baker to the boundary with two successive hits. Then came his downfall, he succumbing to a catch by Pearce—339—6—31.

R. H. R. Palmer joined Human, and both hit tremendously, but Palmer missed one of Kendall's and was clean bowled—368—7—21.

Rev. J. Sholto-Douglas was next in, and Whiting badly missed Human. In the same over, however, Kendall clean bowled him—375—8—32.

R. H. Palmer then partnered Sholto-Douglas, and stumps were soon drawn, Berkshire's score being 379 for eight wickets. Scores:—

CORNWALL COLLAPSE

BERKSHIRE'S COMMANDING LEAD AT CAMBORNE

Cornwall commenced a strenuous campaign of seven consecutive games, two home and five away, at Camborne, on Friday, when Berkshire provided the opposition. The home county had first use of the wicket, and collapsed in startling fashion, no player reaching 20, and the whole side was dismissed for 86. At one time five Cornish wickets fell for two runs. The Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and D. W. Stokes, made a bright stand for Berkshire, putting on 190 for the first wicket, and at the close of the day's play Berkshire had a commanding lead of nearly 300 runs, with two wickets in hand. Cornwall were thus in an almost hopeless position, requiring 300 runs to escape an innings defeat, but they were saved by rain, on Saturday, when it was impossible to resume play. The game was left drawn, Berkshire taking major points for the first innings lead.

Cornwall won the toss, and Tresawna elected to bat first on a plumb wicket. Run getting was slow, and after 15 minutes George Rogers, who opened with Tresawna, pulled a ball from Remnant on to his wicket, the score then being 18 runs. Addicoat joined the Cornish captain, but still the Berkshire bowlers controlled the game. Palmer's fast rising deliveries being almost unplayable. After half an hour's play 20 was registered, but the batsmen took no risks and took the score to 48. They appeared to be laying the foundation of a good score for the home county, but a change in the bowling proved disastrous. The Rev. Sholto Douglas went on in place of R. Palmer, and with his second delivery he clean bowled Tresawna, who had batted patiently for 50 minutes for his 17. Cory was out first ball being caught behind the wicket by Stokes off Douglas, and three balls later Addicoat was sent back. He had batted carefully for 17, and appeared to be well set, but Human smartly accepted a hard catch. It was a profitable bowling change for Berks, Douglas claiming three good wickets for no runs in his first over.

Shaw Baker was expected to stem the tide, but he did not appear at all comfortable, and after making a nice cut for two runs he fell a victim to a catch by R. Palmer off Douglas's bowling. Half the side being out for 50 runs, the outlook was black for Cornwall, disaster following disaster. Ollerenshaw was a short stayer, being dismissed by a clever one-handed catch by R. Palmer. W. Pearce, a young Redruth player, who made his debut for Cornwall, showed a good defence, and stayed for nearly 20 minutes, but was unlucky not to open his scoring account. He was Douglas's fifth victim at a cost of only four runs. Seven wickets were down for 51, and R. Dower, of Troon, another newcomer to the Cornish side, with Colquhoun, the Camborne wicketkeeper, made a grand effort to save their side from a complete rout. Both batsmen played confidently, and added 21 before the Troon man was out to a catch by Remnant off Woodburn, who had just gone on to bowl in place of Remnant. Two runs later Woodburn disposed of Whiting, and shortly afterwards Kendall was given a life. He made a big hit off Woodburn, and an easy catch was dropped in deep field. Kendall then helped Colquhoun to put on another 12 runs before the Camborne man was beaten by Woodburn. The innings closed just under two hours for 86 runs.

The wicket was better for batemen when Berkshire went in, and Cornwall's calculations were upset, the visitors knocking up 190 runs before the first wicket fell. The Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and D. W. Stokes, a young player, completely collared the bowling, although the former gave a chance to Ollerenshaw in the slips before he got a run. This proved a costly blunder, as Remnant stayed for 24 hours to score 128 before he was dismissed, Tresawna making a good catch off the Penzance pro's bowling. Frequent changes were made in the Cornish attack, Whiting, Kendall, Baker, Cory, and Dower being called into action. In his first over Baker had an unhappy experience. He failed to make the ball break in, and bowled four wides and a no ball, making an eleven-ball over for 21 runs. Nothing would go right for Cornwall. Cory, usually a safe catch, missing a couple of chances, and 190 runs were registered in two hours before the first wicket partnership had been broken. Stokes, who batted exceptionally well for 61, without a blemish, was caught by Kendall off Baker.

After breaking the Remnant-Stokes partnership of over two hours, Cornwall met with another success, Savles being stumped for an addition of only three runs. Soon afterwards Cory dropped a straight catch from Remnant, but it was not long before Tresawna safely held a catch from the same batsman, whose innings had lasted 24 hours for 127 runs. The score was then 235 for three wickets, and at 278 Kendall clean bowled Dempsey, who scored 49 in quick time, after luckily escaping being stumped before he opened his account. The third hundred was reached before the fifth wicket fell, the Berks captain, Dr. Woodburn, falling a victim to Baker. The incoming batsman, R. H. C. Human, hit out in great fashion, scoring off all the bowlers with equal ease. He was especially severe on Whiting, whom he punished for 21 in one over—two 6's, two 4's, and a single. Turner was also scoring freely, and after registering three successive boundaries, he was neatly caught by Pearce off Baker, his contribution being 31. R. H. Palmer was next clean bowled by Kendall, the score being 368 for seven, and five runs later Human's merry knock was brought to a close, Kendall again being the successful bowler. Soon afterwards, stumps were drawn for the day, Berkshire being nearly 300 runs ahead, with two wickets in hand.

Owing to heavy rain on Saturday, not a ball was bowled, and the match was left drawn, Berkshire taking five points for leading on the first innings, and Cornwall three points. Scores—

STRUGGLE FOR RUNS

DORSET LEAD CORNWALL BY ONE ON FIRST INNINGS

Cornwall's meeting with Dorset, at Cornborne, on Monday and Tuesday was a disappointing affair in several respects. There was an entire absence of bright play, Cornwall taking three hours to collect 101 runs in their first innings. Dorset replied with 78 for the loss of four wickets, and at 4.30 on Monday afternoon rain caused a cessation of play for the day. Heavy rain overnight saturated the wicket, and limited play on Tuesday to about 1 1/2 hours. The weather was fine on Tuesday morning, but a start was not made until 4.30 p.m. Several inspections of the wicket were made, and the spectators were weary of waiting some being impatient over the delay in resuming play. It was a pity that the wicket was not protected overnight, as practically a full day's cricket would have been possible if that had been done. Apart from the financial loss to the home county through the late start, such delays tend to alienate public support. It must be admitted that the wicket was affected by the rain, but many spectators saw no justifiable reason for such a prolonged delay. But those who endured a weary wait of several hours were rewarded with some interesting play. Dorset, with six wickets in hand, required 24 runs to win on the first innings, and they had to fight hard for them. The Cornishmen made a good bid to obtain chief honours, but failed by the narrow margin of one run. Going in a second time, Cornwall knocked up 49 for the loss of one wicket, and the match was left drawn. Dorset took five points for leading on the first innings, and Cornwall got three points. This was Cornwall's third similar experience this season.

Cornwall won the toss and took first knock on a dead slow wicket. Cory and George Rogers played eight overs before a single run was registered, and the first half-hour's play produced only 10 runs. Harrison and Busk were bowling a good length, and the fielding was exceptionally keen. After 40 minutes Rogers cocked up a ball off Harrison to give Elderton a simple catch behind the wicket, the score then being 12, of which Rogers made three. The first big hit was made by Cory of Harrison, the ball dropping just inside the boundary line, but with his next delivery, Harrison claimed Cory's wicket for obstruction. Cory made 13 of the 17 runs on the board. The batsmen continued to fail to master the bowling, and only 25 runs were put on in the first hour. With the score at 27, the third wicket fell, Addicoat being a victim to Busk. After 1 1/2 hours' play, A. R. Cunnack was caught out, and four wickets were down for 30. J. C. Baker was joined by his father, C. Shaw Baker, both of whom played with restraint. The Dorset fieldsmen were close in, and with the batsmen lacking aggressiveness, runs were not easy to get. It was evident that boldness was needed to save Cornwall from being dismissed for a small total. In one over J. C. Baker gave a chance to Busk, and his partner survived an appeal for l.b.w. After hitting Harrison to the boundary, J. C. Baker was out next ball, half the wickets being down for 47 runs. Ollerearnshaw attempted to tackle the bowling, but his stay was short, Bower catching him in deep field. It was a hefty hit, and a beautiful catch.

Immediately following lunch, the rate of scoring brightened. Baker and Dower were putting on 20 in as many minutes, and the young Troon player looked like helping Baker to raise the hopes of their side, but at 73 the partnership was broken. Dower was caught out by Tabor off Jowett, and Bond was sent back without adding to the score. Four runs later, Kendall succumbed to a grand catch by Bower, who showed an exceptionally safe pair of hands, his four catches being hearties. With the score at 77 for nine wickets, there was a prospect of Cornwall being dismissed for less than their total (86) against Berkshire, but for the first time in the innings some enterprise was shown, Baker collecting 11 runs off Jowett in one over. Whiting made a useful stand, and hoisted the century just under three hours' play. One run later, Whiting succumbed to Harrison, and Shaw Baker was undefeated for 34. Baker fully merited the applause he received on returning to the pavilion, as he undoubtedly saved Cornwall from an inglorious failure.

When Dorset went in to bat, there was a distinct contrast in the type of play. Knight and Bower immediately setting about their task of getting runs, and the half-century was reached in less than half an hour. Ollerearnshaw went on to bowl in place of Whiting, and in his first over he accounted for Knight. Bower batted powerfully and appeared well set, but a smart piece of stumping by Addicoat brought his innings to a close. Tabor and Busk took the score to 77, when the latter was caught by Whiting off Ollerearnshaw, and for the addition of one run, Broome was sent back. Four wickets were down for 78 at the tea interval, when rain prevented a resumption of play.

Dorset's task of getting 24 runs, with six wickets in hand, to lead Cornwall on the first innings, when play was resumed on Tuesday afternoon, seemed a light one, but they had a contrary experience. Tabor and Freeman added 12 runs to the overnight score, when the latter was splendidly caught by Kendall off Whiting. In stopping a powerful shot, Cunnack, a Cornish fieldsman, sustained a compound fracture of a thumb and had to retire. Soon afterwards Kendall claimed the wickets of Van der Byl and Jowett for the addition of only four runs, and Addicoat caught Tabor behind the wicket off Whiting. Eight wickets were down for 96, and one run later a spectacular catch by Kendall, off his own delivery, disposed of Spear. Five runs were needed by Dorset when their last batsman, Harrison, went in, and Cornwall were eager to snatch a win. Harrison, who bats one-handed, equalled the Cornish score by driving Kendall to the boundary. Cory and Dower mis-fielding, after making the winning stroke, a single, Harrison was caught by Cory off Whiting, and the innings concluded, Dorset having taken 55 minutes to obtain 24 runs.

Less than an hour was left for play when Cornwall went in to bat a second time, and Rogers and Cory put on 40 runs before the latter lost his wicket. Rain again stopped play. Scores:—

CRICKET.

CORNWALL V. DORSET.

Cornwall met Dorset at Camborne on Monday in a two days' minor counties championship match and in the first innings would have fared even worse than they did in the Berkshire game, but for the fine last wicket stand which took the score from 77 to 101. The weather was cloudy, with intervals of sunshine and there was a fair gate.

Cornwall won the toss and Shaw Baker elected to take the first knock on a slow and difficult wicket. Cory (W.) and Rogers (G.) faced Harrison and Jowett. It was not until the eighth over that the score was opened when after fifteen minutes Rogers got a single. Cory also managed to get one off Harrison in the same over. Busk bowled vice Jowett at the pavilion end and the batsmen took no liberties as may be judged from the fact that it was only after half an hour's play ten was registered which included a lucky snick to boundary by Cory. The score had not been improved upon when Rogers was smartly caught behind the wickets by Elderton off Harrison. Addicoat partnered the Redruth pro, but the partnership was of short duration. Cory had a fine hit to boundary by Harrison, but in the next delivery there was a successful appeal for lbw. He contributed 13 out of a total of 17 after forty-five minutes' play. The fielding was particularly keen and the bowling was difficult to negotiate. J. C. Baker was the next to go in and Addicoat, who gave the appearance of getting set sent Busk to boundary and made a brace in one over. Runs, however, were slow and after an hour's play with 27 on the telegraph, the Falmouth man fell a victim to Jowett, who had taken Busk's place at the pavilion end. Three wickets had fallen for 27, a really worse performance than the Cornishmen made against Berkshire. A. R. Cunnaack joined Baker, but the rot was not stopped. The Helston man after making two was caught by Bower at close mid-on off Harrison. The telegraph read 30 for 4 after 90 minutes' play. Shaw Baker joined his son, but still runs came very slowly. Singles were the order of the day and these had to be stolen. Towards the luncheon interval the wicket improved and each player managed to get a boundary. With the total at 47 "J. Bond was dismissed by Jowett without making a run. Kendall managed to get a boundary and was caught by Bower off Jowett in the deep field in the same over. The telegraph read 77 for 9. The brightest cricket for the innings was the last wicket stand with the skipper and Whiting. Baker sent Jowett's deliveries to boundary twice in addition to getting a two and a single in one over. Whiting had three knocks—two boundaries and a two—when he was bowled by Harrison. The innings closed for 101. Baker was 34 not out. Cornwall batted just under three hours.

M. B. S. Bower and Knight opened Dorset's innings in bright fashion. Both men hit out freely and paid little regard to the deliveries of Kendall and Whiting. After the second over Shaw Baker took the Roskeard pro's place at the other end. Twenty runs were registered in ten minutes. After one over Baker gave way to Kendall. CORNWALL IN FORM

REMARKABLY GOOD BATTING AGAINST BERKSHIRE

Cornwall gave an improved batting display against Berkshire, at Reading, on Friday, scoring 242 runs. Chief honours went to Cory and Ollerearnshaw, the former registering a century, and the latter a valuable 70. The partnership between this pair lasted for 95 minutes, and produced 170 runs. They treated the bowling with scant respect, and the partnership was dissolved by Woodburn, who got Ollerearnshaw out for obstruction. Shortly afterwards Cory completed his century, and then gave an easy catch to Palmer. Two newcomers to the Cornish side, J. Willis (Cambridge) and J. C. TRURO'S BID FOR VICTORY

ROUSING LAST WICKET STAND SURPRISE TROON

A rousing last wicket stand by C. C. Bennett and K. Holman, for Truro, at Troon, on Saturday, completely surprised Troon, who narrowly escaped defeat. The result was a draw, Truro being two runs short of victory, with one wicket in hand, when stumps were drawn.

Troon were given a good start by E. Trevarthen (a son of Kit Trevarthen, a well-known county cricketer) and S. Fleet, who were home on holiday. They put on 66 for the first wicket, Fleet succumbing to a catch by Hambly off Choak, and one run later C. Rickard was clean bowled by W. R. C. Smith, a former Truro College player. G. CRICKET GOSSIP.

(By LEG-BY-EL)

It was not until the result of Cornwall's first innings against Dorset at Sherborne was published on Friday morning that anyone could say much in favour of the Cornish team that was on tour last week, but when it became known that Cornwall had succeeded in passing Dorset's big score of 437 the previous day, everyone had to admit that it was a great feat on the part of the Cornish batsmen, and the most successful would have been very pleased with themselves had they been at home and heard all the good things that was said about them.

George Rogers and Cory are such good and experienced players that no matter how many runs they get, nothing comes in the nature of a surprise from either, and C. Shaw Baker with an innings of 147 also dealt a staggering blow to his critics who were beginning to shout that he was about passing the mark of a county player. These three players, who between them were responsible for no less than 302 runs out of the Cornish total of 498, served their county well, and yet I fancy that each and all of these three stalwarts were the first to congratulate J. Willis, the young Camborne player, on his splendid innings of 85 runs, which enabled Cornwall to capture the points on a first innings' lead for the first time for the season.

Against Surrey 2nd XI, Willis scored 27, and against Berkshire 25. These two scores were followed up on Thursday with an innings of 86, so there is no doubt but that this youngster has fully justified his selection in the County XI, and probably the members of the Selection Committee who were so reticent about selecting him for county honours in the home matches can now see their error. Had more young players of the stamp of Willis been included in the county side the chances are the team would have had a much better season than has proved to be the case.

The scoring in this match was phenomenal, 909 runs being recorded for the loss of 19 wickets, an average of nearly 48 runs per wicket. The Press stated on Friday morning that it was a record in high scoring in Minor Counties cricket, so even if the team has not succeeded in winning matches, it has accomplished something worth doing.

AT MONMOUTH.

The result at Monmouth was disappointing in the extreme. The Welsh club is regarded as one of the weakest in the Minor Counties competition, and here indeed a win was looked for, especially as Cornwall had succeeded in winning on the first innings.

Monmouth, however, made so light of their task in getting 178 runs to win the match that they knocked the runs off for the loss of three wickets, and won in the easiest possible fashion by seven wickets. Monmouth got their runs on a hard and fast wicket, and the Cornish bowling presented no difficulties whatever to the batsmen except Wilcox, who was dismissed without scoring.

AT EXETER.

A score of 313 against Devon at Exeter was not a bad performance, and C. S. Baker got his second successive century of the tour with 106 not out. In view of fact, however, that four of the batsmen were responsible for no less than 229 out of the Cornish total, it was a good job that these batsmen did not fail, as otherwise the total would probably have been a very poor one.

J. Willis, the young Camborne batsman, followed up his success against Dorset with another good innings of 45 runs, the second highest score, and this promising batsman can easily be written down as the success of the tour.

It was rather a pity that rain interfered with the opening day's play, and as a consequence there was no hope of any finish on the Saturday. The Devon batsmen took no risks, and as they did not have sufficient time left at their disposal to get the runs so as to lead on the first innings, they contented themselves to play out time, and in this they succeeded.

LEAGUE CRICKET.

There was quite a happy return to League cricket on Saturday. Although the leadership of the western section of the League is settled, there were many matches to be played owing to their having been previously cancelled through rain, and three of such games were finished under very pleasant conditions.

LEAGUE RECORD AT TROON.

The most outstanding event was at Troon, where against Falmouth, no less than three new records were set up. E. A. Trevarthen, the youngest son of Kit Trevarthen, the old county professional opened the Troon innings with E. Trevithick, and so complete a mastery did these two batsmen obtain over the bowling that before the first wicket fell a score of 241 runs was on the board.

This in itself was a ground record, and as far as I remember, it also constitutes a first wicket record for League cricket. Trevithick was the first to go, and Trevarthen went on to score 189, before he was dismissed. This is certainly a record score for the Troon ground, and one that probably will not be beaten for a long time to come. In these days of youth clamouring for county honours these feats should not be lost sight of by those responsible for the county side.

The Troon innings was declared closed at 288 for the loss of only two wickets. With such colossal scoring the Troon supporters were naturally delighted, but the captain delayed the declaration a bit too long, and in the end Falmouth saved the game by scoring 100 for the loss of five wickets.

CAMBORNE AT TROON.

Another interesting game took place at Troon, where Camborne, the League leaders, although short of several of their most prominent players, proved far too good for the City XI. The Camborne batting proved fairly consistent, W. B. Frayne being top scorer with 42 runs. J. C. Hays, who bowled exceedingly well at Camborne earlier in the season, proved the surprise packet by opening the bowling for Troon with slow deliveries, but he did not prove a success at this kind of bowling. Camborne's score of 160 runs was considered too much for Troon, and this proved to be correct.

When Troon opened their innings J. C. Hays was dismissed in a rather peculiar manner, and which did not appear to be very clear to the spectators. What actually happened was that in playing forward to W. Rogers, Hays snicked the ball and was caught by the wicket-keeper. At the time he was well out of his crease, and the wicket-keeper made an unsuccessful attempt to stump him as well. Rogers, seeing the attempt at stumping fail, appealed for a catch, which was immediately given. Everyone appeared to be watching the attempt that was being made to stump the batsman, and this is where the confusion arose.

W. Rogers, who has already taken well over 100 wickets this season, proved far too tricky for the Troon batsmen, and had not J. E. Shearing towards the end of the innings hit him for three successive 4's, his five wickets would have been captured for very small figures.

It was very pleasing to note that the game was watched by quite a good number of spectators, the largest number I have seen on the Troon ground, which no longer is an indication that the game is on the upward grade at Troon.

Liskeard defeated Lanhydrock during the past week, and as this now puts them at the head of the League table, they will appear in the League final against Camborne on Saturday week. It is several years since Liskeard has appeared in a final, and as they are the strongest side in the east, the game should provide a much closer finish than has been the case in finals of recent years.

SHAW BAKER'S CENTURY

CORNWALL SHAPE WELL
AGAINST DEVON

Cornwall's concluding match of the tour was with Devon, at Exeter, on Friday and Saturday. Rain prevented a start before lunch on Friday, and winning the toss, Cornwall batted first. Cory and Rogers opened carefully on an easy-paced wicket, but before Cory became familiar with the bowling, he succumbed to Midgley with the total at 27. Addicoat joined Rogers, and the score reached 50 after 40 minutes' play, but at 97 Addicoat was caught behind the wicket by Shepherd, having contributed 34. Just before the tea interval Rogers was out to a deceptive ball by Falding, the total then being 102 for three wickets. After tea, Cornwall lost two more batsmen, Dower and Ollerearnshaw, for the addition of 20 runs, but C. S. Baker and J. F. CORNWALL v. MONMOUTH.

LISKEARD GAME SPOILT BY RAIN.

Cornwall's last game for the season in the Minor Counties' Championship, which opened at Liskeard on Wednesday, when Monmouth were the visitors, could not be completed owing to rain, and was abandoned yesterday without a ball being bowled. Heavy showers fell all the morning, culminating after lunch in a steady downpour which made any play impossible, and at 2 o'clock it was regretfully decided to abandon the game.

FINE CENTURY BY ROGERS.

In spite of dull weather on Wednesday, there was quite a good crowd of spectators, who were treated to practically a full day's cricket. After heavy rain the previous evening, the wicket was naturally on the soft side, but it looked fairly easy, and no surprise was occasioned when C. Shaw Baker, on winning the toss, decided that Cornwall should bat first. Cory and Rogers opened the innings, and the first over proved uneventful, but there was a thrill in the second, when T. B. Williams, the Monmouth skipper, fielding at square leg, missed an easy chance offered by Cory of Pickthall, when he had scored 3. Runs came very slowly, however, and the mistake did not prove expensive. Pickthall was troubling Cory, and the expected happened when he got him lbw, the first wicket being down for 15. H. F. Taylor, one of three Liskeard players in the Cornish team, who was making his debut in county cricket, was then sent in. After he had obtained 3, Harris failed to hold a chance in the slips, Pickthall again being the unlucky bowler, but in the next over Harris atoned by bowling Taylor off his pads.

With two wickets fallen for 20, Cornwall were in a bad way, but when the skipper joined Rogers the pair settled down to a sound partnership, which was not broken until after lunch. Both were subdued at first, the slow scoring being brightened only by an occasional four from the Camborne pro., and the first hour's play only produced 40 runs. A bowling change proved ineffective, Rogers punishing two loose balls in succession from L. Lewis, by sending them to the rails. He got his 50 before lunch, and just after Shaw Baker was dismissed for an invaluable 28, the partnership realising 80 runs.

None of the other batsmen "came off," but Rogers sent the score along, although he should have been caught by J. M. Smith when 77. He celebrated his "escape" by opening his shoulders, and had the satisfaction of completing his century in just over 2½ hours. Although not faultless, his dogged innings of 110 out of 175 was a great effort, and saved the home side from collapse. He was the last man out, and was unlucky in not carrying his bat.

MONMOUTH'S COLLAPSE AND RECOVERY.

Monmouth started disastrously, Wilcox being brilliantly caught at deep mid-off by Taylor off the second ball in Whiting's opening over. The Liskeard pro. and P. H. Kendall were in deadly form, and with G. H. I. Bickford doing great things behind the wicket, only one run was scored in the first six overs. At 17 Ollereanshaw relieved Kendall, and Monmouth collapsed in startling fashion. Six wickets were lost for 41, and at one time it seemed certain they would have to follow on. But then S. Watkins and A. R. Ralph became associated in a timely seventh wicket partnership which retrieved the situation, 75 being added before the former, through a misunderstanding, was run out. Ralph had batted faultlessly, executing some grand late cuts off Kendall, while his driving, too, was perfect in timing and placing. Towards the end of the day's play rain sent the players scurrying to the pavilion, but they quickly resumed. Bickford dismissed the Monmouth captain with a brilliant piece of stumping, and the batsmen then successfully appealed against the light.
